## ITALIAN AVIATOR MAY HOP OFF FOR AMERICA TONIGHT

Non-Stop Flight May Be One Of Most Daring Since The Brown-Alcock Flight Made Over Atlantic Years Ago

ROME, Feb. 15.—(INS)—The great aerial adventure of Commander De Pinedo, of the Italian navy, is expected to take place tonight, as reports were received of the commander's departure on the night of Feb. 15.

Commander De Pinedo has taken on fuel and supplies at Bloama, Portuguese New Guinea on the western coast of Africa, and at 8 o'clock tonight will start a moonlight flight for the eastern coast of South America.

Port Natal, Brazil is the ultimate goal of commander De Pinedo but if he finds himself running short of fuel or with engine trouble he will make for Fernando de Noronha.

The distance from Bloama to Port Natal is nearly 1800 miles, while the distance to Fernando de Noronha is some 300 miles less.

Since Sunday, when he made his start from Sarina, commander De Pinedo has flown at an average speed of 125 miles an hour, and if he can maintain this speed during his flight over the ocean he will be in South America by daybreak tomorrow.

Although the Italian government is sending out radio messages to ships at sea of commander De Pinedo's impending departure there is no organized naval escort, and the flight takes on more of the nature of a real aerial adventure than any flight since the Brown-Alcock flight.

## Dawes Credited By Senators With The Farm Bill Passage

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—(INS)—Vice president Dawes was publicly credited today with having fathered the McNary-Haig farm relief bill, to which President Coolidge is opposed, on its successful journey through the senate.

Describing Dawes as the "bill-renting genius" behind the bill, senator George (D), of Georgia, protested against credit being given to a "certain ex-governor of Illinois."

Earlier, senator Caraway (D) of Arkansas, made a mock protest against President Coolidge ignoring secretary of agriculture Jardine on agriculture matters and criticized a recent statement by secretary of the treasury Mellon denouncing the bill.

Caraway said Mellon wouldn't "know a horse from a cow if the cow was dehorned."

## Mexican Charges U.S. Boycotting Country

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—(INS)—The United States is directing a financial and economic boycott against Mexico "that is far deeper than any other intervention," Miguel Bejarano, of the Mexican Chamber of Commerce, New York, charged before the senate foreign relations sub-committee today.

"American bankers are refusing to renew loans," Mexico, and, in many cases, have recalled loans, he believed in Mexico that this financial boycott is being conducted at the direction of the state department.

## MINE WORKERS HEAD OUTLINES NEW PROPOSAL

Plan To End Deadlock Submitted Today Before Meet In Miami By John L. Lewis Of U. S. Federation Of Miners

Present Contract Asked For 2 Years

Loopholes Left By Which Conference Could Again Be Called By The Arbitrators

MIAMI, Fla., Feb. 16.—(INS)—The mine workers' plan to end the deadlock over a new wage contract was submitted today to the conference of mine owners and operators today by John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers.

The proposal, if effect, would continue for two years the present contract but a loophole was left open by providing that the conference could meet from time to time to readjust wages and working conditions.

If adopted, the plan would require both sides to recognize the independence of wage reductions to effect commercial purity and stability in the bituminous industry.

This was taken to mean that the mine union officials might later listen to proposals from the operators to readjust wages temporarily, at least, to meet the lower scale in the non-union fields of West Virginia and Kentucky.

It has been the cardinal principle of the miners to concede not one penny reduction.

The plan differed chiefly from the existing contract in that the conference would be authorized to employ counsel, rate experts, and other advisers, to carry out the program, the expense to be borne equally by both sides.

This provision was intended to counter the operators' proposal for a permanent joint wage commission to regulate wages as conditions warranted.

Lewis also demanded a readjustment of freight rates to wipe out alleged discriminatory schedules given the non-union fields.

## Three Chicago Men Volunteer Trip To Capital On Charge

CHICAGO, Feb. 16.—(INS)—The three central figures in contempt proceedings before the senate in Washington without being served with subpoenas in Chicago, it was announced today.

Samuel Insull, state's attorney Robert E. Crowe and attorney Daniel Schuyler declared today they would appear before the Reed investigating committee Monday in Washington to clear up the "slush fund" charges.

Crowe wired Senator Reed (D) Mo., a request that his examination be expedited as he is prosecuting an important criminal case.

None of the trio would comment on the action of the committee in giving them another chance to answer questions before they delinquent to answer last spring at the Chicago meeting, rather than recommend citations for contempt before the senate.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—(INS)—The three-month battle of eastern financial interests for enactment of the McFadden-Pepper bill, strengthening the whole-federal banking system, closed today with the bill ready for a final vote on the measure.

The bill will, as early as today, be voted on by the senate, following the adoption of cloture by a vote of 63 to 18. The measure then will go to the White House for the signature of President Coolidge as the House already has approved it.

## STATE LETS HUGE CHAMBER URGES BACKING AGAINST SHADY SCHEMES

New Construction Figures Of All Departments Total Sum Of \$15,560,113, A Record According To Dodge Co.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Feb. 16.—(INS)—The state of Florida had \$15,560,113 worth of contracts for new construction during January according to a statement received here today from the Dodge Corporation. The above figure was 12 per cent in excess of December.

The more important items in last month's building and engineering record for Florida were: \$7,024,900, or 45 per cent of all construction, for public works and utilities; \$4,197,230, or 27 per cent for residential buildings; \$2,123,700, or 14 per cent, for commercial buildings; \$625,590, or 4 per cent, for industrial and municipal buildings; and \$774,900, or 5 per cent, for educational buildings.

January construction contracts let in some of Florida's principal cities were: Tampa, \$2,123,700; Jacksonville, \$1,705,400; Miami, \$992,000; St. Petersburg, \$1,150,000; and Palm Beach, \$195,000. The statement said, "Tampa was the only city in the above list, which showed an increase in construction activities over January, 1926."

## Four Men Rescued From Log Raft As Barge Passes Them

NEW ORLEANS, La., Feb. 16.—(INS)—Four prominent men, who narrowly escaped with their lives yesterday when their raft sank and who were marooned on a log raft for several hours before being rescued, reached New Orleans today.

They are Joseph Lelief, Chicago Millionaire, W. B. Alford of the Dupont Power Company, D. W. Fulton, vice president of the Ziegler Coal Company, and John Dymond of New Orleans.

The party was returning from Louisiana's hunting preserve at Chalcat, when the yacht struck a snag and sank in a few minutes. In the overflow of the Mississippi they found a roily constructed barge of logs where they stayed until a boat passed and picked them up.

## UNITED STATES TO STUDY NOTE OF REJECTION

Efforts Will Be Continued For Great Powers Agreement For Disarmament Of Large Navies And Armies

Note From France Gives Little Hope

Washington Does Not Believe Geneva Conference Will Be Able To Accomplish Result

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—(INS)—The American government will continue its efforts to obtain an agreement with the great powers limiting auxiliary naval craft, notwithstanding that such efforts now appear almost futile in the light of France's refusal to make Geneva the place of definite action next month.

France's note of rejection was being studied here today. It seemed to afford but little hope of any concrete success in the near future toward further naval disarmament. Indeed, secretary of State Kellogg characterized it as a "striking and serious blow at the whole cause of disarmament."

France's move, if it will, however, await the receipt of replies from Great Britain, Italy and Japan, and other powers addressed last week.

In no official quarter in Washington is there any hope of the Geneva conference accomplishing anything real in the way of disarmament, despite the expression of lofty hopes in the French note that the Geneva gathering is working toward the same goal as President Coolidge proposed.

The Geneva conference, it was pointed out today, has been "dismissing" disarmament for almost a year without making any progress discernible to the naked eye.

France refuses to join with other potential allies, most of which have no navies, constitute a majority at the conference. They have not only refused every concrete proposal advanced by the American and British delegates, but also have refused to accept the American government's offer to get some definite action.

The official reason advanced in the French note for refusing to accept the Coolidge proposals was that it might interfere with the work of the Geneva conference.

"In other words," ironically observed one high official today, "France refuses to join with other potential allies because it might interfere with the talk of disarming. All the Geneva conference has done to date by talk, and that is all it will ever do, is all probability."

Discussion of possible agreement between the other naval powers would agree to limit their own navies while such a potentially powerful nation as France would leave free to build at will. It felt here that Italy certainly would refuse to enter any such arrangement as the rivalry between Italy and France for Mediterranean domination is and always has been keen.

It is felt that Britain has drawn to such an arrangement.

## Moscow Newspaper Derides Coolidge's Disarmament Plan

MOSCOW, Feb. 16.—(INS)—President Coolidge's disarmament proposals were put forth in order to permit an increase in the American naval establishment, according to the newspaper Izvestia.

This official newspaper, which is the official organ of the Soviet government, said that the proposals would divert attention from the Nicaraguan situation.

Izvestia says the Geneva conference is doomed to failure because England, with superior cruisers, would allow them to be reduced, while Japan, with cruisers equal to those of the United States, would accept an inferior position and France would give up her submarine strength.

LONDON, Feb. 16.—(INS)—The British Cabinet today considered President Coolidge's disarmament proposals. It is understood that the proposals will be referred to a special committee consisting of Lord Balfour, Winston Churchill, and first Lord of the admiralty Bridgeman.

## Storms And Quakes Take Heavy Toll In States Of The West

Eleven Die In Large California Slides While Floods Are Ravishing Country

Many Injuries Reported Today

Protective Measures Taken In Many Of Western Sections

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 16.—(INS)—Two relief trains today were making desperate efforts against flooded tracks to reach the scene near Pico, on Duarte Creek, 15 miles east of here, where last evening Eastbound Los Angeles Limited, crack union Pacific Chicago flyer, plunged into the raging waters of the creek, after the torrential rains had weakened a heavy steel bridge.

The accident occurred in a blind spot. Charles Ireland, engineer, and an unidentified work met instant death in the accident. Six persons were injured, two perhaps fatally, according to a late check-up.

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 16.—(INS)—Southern California and Arizona continued to be deluged today by the unrelenting rains, which have been pouring without letup since last Friday night.

Along the coast coast a gale that at times attained 50 miles an hour, according to reports received by the local weather bureau. Shipping is virtually paralyzed.

Death and property damage, due to the winds of the storm inland. Serious bridges have been washed out, highways have been flooded and many communities surrounded to evacuate their neighborhoods.

Seven persons have been killed in Los Angeles in traffic accidents, the result of heavy rains.

Two members of the crew of a Union Pacific train were killed last night when the train plunged into a swollen creek about 25 miles from Los Angeles. Twenty passengers were injured, some of them critically.

The train plunged through a bridge weakened by the rains of the past three days.

Another accident took the toll of two lives near Congress Ariz. when a Santa Fe train crashed into a trestle that had been washed down on the track. The engineer and fireman were killed.

A snowslide at the construction camp of the Deep Creek tunnel project of the Southern California Edison Company, 15 miles north-east of Fresno, exacted another heavy toll. Eleven men were known to have been killed and others are thought to have met the same fate, according to belated advice received here today.

Relief parties have been sent to the isolated camps in the Sierra Nevada mountains.

## Los Angeles Flood Stops All Traffic Cuts Off World

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Feb. 16.—(INS)—Los Angeles was isolated from the outside world today in so far as traffic communication was concerned, as a result of bridge failures in the wake up of a raging gale.

Not a single train was able to enter the city during the morning hours of the tracks of the three main lines.

The three main railroads entering Los Angeles were unable to move traffic because of flooded tracks and broken bridges. San Diego was similarly isolated and most of smaller cities were similarly affected.

The wind attained a velocity of more than 55 miles an hour in Oakland and other bay region cities, breaking hundreds of plate glass windows, unroofing houses and stranding telephone poles and trees over the ground like toothpicks.

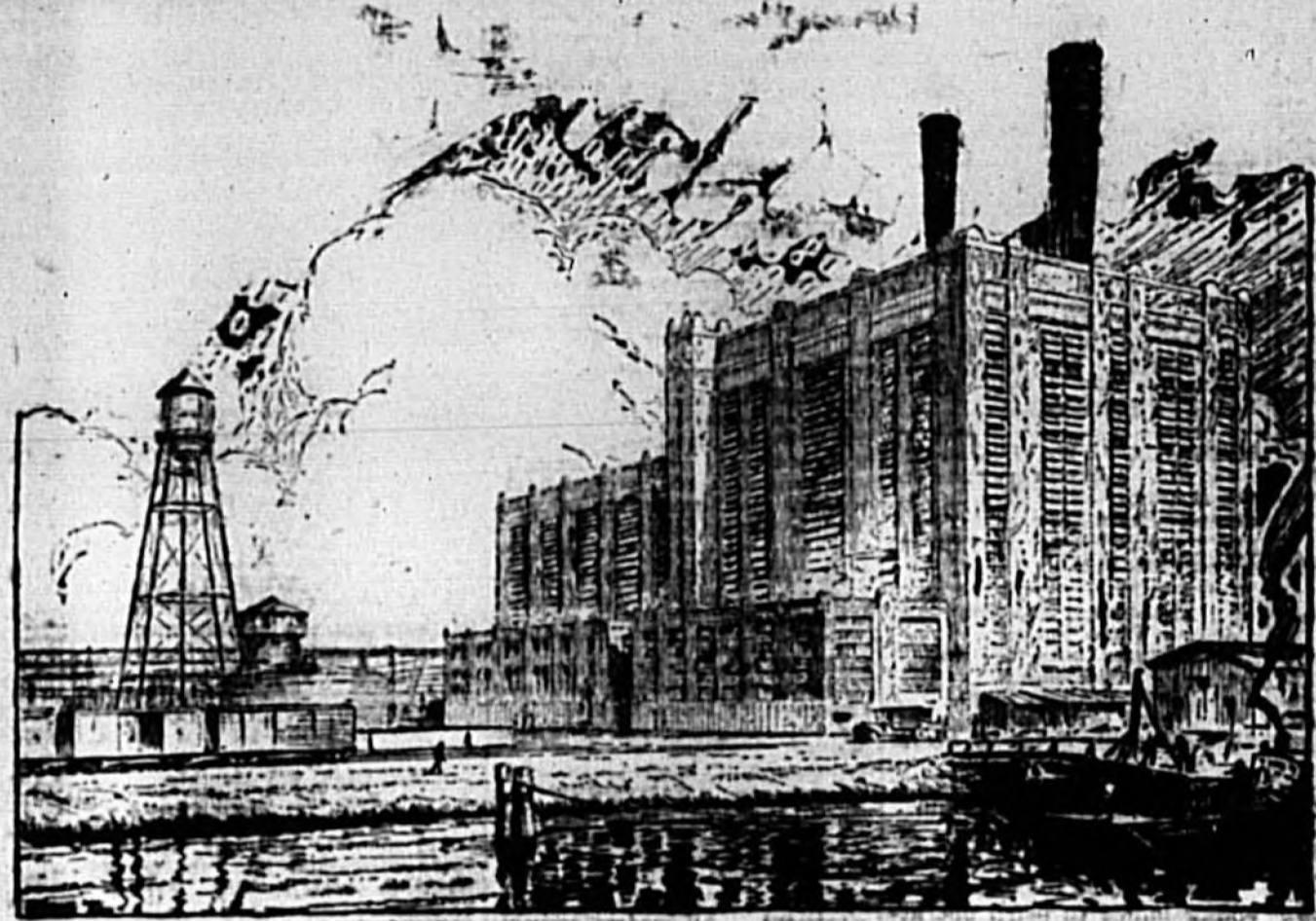

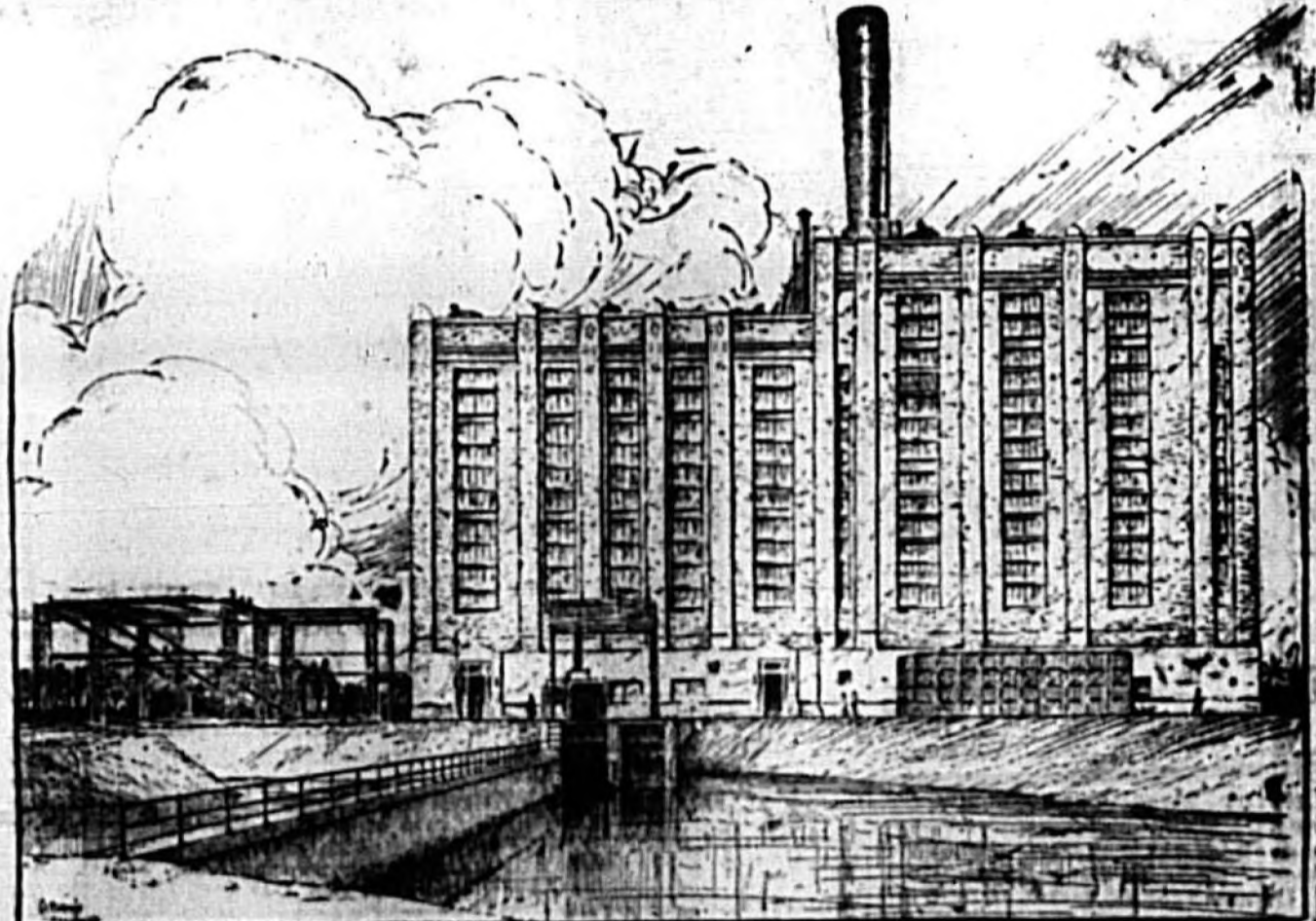
