MINE WORKERS HEAD OUTLINES NEW PROPOSAL

Plan To End Deadlock Submitted Today Before Meet In Miami By John L. Lewis Of U. S. Federation Of Miners

MIAMI, Fla., Feb. 16.—(INS)—The miners' plan to end the deadlock over a new wage contract was submitted to the joint conference for the signatures of President Coolidge, who has already approved it.

The proposal, in effect, would continue for two years the present contract, but a loophole left open by providing that the conference could end each year by a vote of 43 to 18. The miners

New Construction Figures Of All Departments Total Sum Of \$15,600,000 For Record According To Dodge Co.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Feb. 16.—(INS)—The state of Florida had \$15,600,000 worth of contracts for new constructions during January according to a statement received here today from the Dodge corporation. British Statesmen Entertain House Of Commons With Chinese Argument

LONDON, Feb. 16.—Oswald Mosley, newly elected labor member of the House of Commons, husband of Lady Cynthia Mosley, and son of a wealthy English family, caused an uproar in Commons today when he heckled Sir Austen Chamberlain, foreign minister, on the British Government's action in sending troops to China.

"Under what treaty rights are British troops being landed on Chinese soil?" queried Mosley.

"The right of a state to protect

Note From France Gives Little Hope

Washington Does Not Believe Geneva Conference Will Be Able To Accomplish Result

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—(INS)—The American government will continue its efforts to obtain an agreement with the great powers limiting auxiliary naval craft, notwithstanding that such efforts now appear almost futile to the Right of France's refusal to make Geneva the place of definite action next month.

France's note of rejection was being studied today. It seemed to afford but little hope of any concrete success in the near future toward further naval disarmament. Indeed, Secretary of State Kellogg characterized it indirectly as "striking a serious blow at the whole cause of disarmament."

Future moves on the part of this government, if any, will, however, await the receipt of replies from Great Britain, Italy and Japan, and other powers ad-




