Hospitals Rushed Into Emergency Action

It was a matter of life and death Monday afternoon when every minute counted for victims of the tragic Seminole County Jail fire which claimed 11 lives.

Ten nurses in a training class rushed on duty in the emergency room without stopping to change into their uniforms.

Casselberry, and Forest City Fire Department were not to protect victims. The Longwood Fire Department rescue unit was also helping at the scene, but was not used for transport.
As Seminole Memorial facilities became overtaxed, other victims were rushed to Florida Hospital North in Altamonte Springs. Three more treated at Florida Hospital in Orlando were later admitted at Florida North.

cupied at the time by Ray McCall, a 16-year-old Orange County juvenile indicted to stand trial as an adult on a robbery charge, and by 21-year-old Patrick A. Sims of Casselberry, who had pleaded guilty to assault with intent to commit sexual battery on an 18-year-old man.

Jailer Robert O. Moore, 40, of Longwood, using special oxygen equipment installed in the jail after a March mattress fire that sent six inmates in another cellblock to a hospital for treatment for smoke inhalation, led the way for prisoners and jailers in Monday's evacuation until his life preserving air pack was almost empty.

But Moore went back into the smoke-filled jail, looking for more prisoners. He was found a short time later on the jail floor, overcome by the heavy smoke. He was reported dead on arrival at a hospital.
Investigators yesterday reportedly had determined that most of the 10 inmates who died in the smoke-filled jail were in cells in the central portion of the T-shaped second floor facility.

jail so inmates can be returned from adjacent counties where they're being temporarily housed.
"We definitely need a new jail," he said, "because of the overcrowded conditions in this one and the fact that it can't meet federal and state requirements."

Last fall Seminole County voters rejected a proposed \$3.9 million bond issue for a central jail complex. County Commission Chairman Sid Vilhen Jr. this week said he'll push now for a new jail to be built and financed with property taxes.
"Even starting today it would take 18 months to build and occupy," Polk said yesterday.
Also during the press conference, Polk revealed that the department and families of deputies have received a number of anonymous obscene, accusatory telephone calls about the fatal jail fire. He described the callers as "sick people" and said, "I'm sure some of the calls are from a public that's naturally bereaved by the whole thing."

Four Of 10 Inmates Killed In Fire Were Trustees

Four of the 10 inmates killed in Monday's Seminole County Jail fire were trustees, according to a spokesman for Sheriff John Polk.
Three of the 10 were in jail pending completion of presentence investigations and sentencing by the courts.
Four of the dead inmates had already been jailed awaiting trial.
Billy Gene McPeak, 31, of Apopka, had been arrested Feb. 29 on a probation violation charge. Officials said he was being held pending a PSI and sentencing on the probation violation and a forgery charge.

'Possum Slim' To Face Murder Charge

Myers, who officials called the oldest man in Lake County, originally was jailed on police charges of first-degree murder in the death of Mrs. Stewart and attempted murder in the wounding of Sammy Tolbert, 41.

In Gurney Trial Aides Panicked, Groot Testifies

TAMPA (AP) — "I want to see that room of mine open one day in jail," an onetime aide claims former Sen. Edward Gurney said as allegations of a fund-raising scandal surfaced.
James L. Groot, who was Gurney's chief aide, testified Tuesday that panic gripped the Gurney camp in summer 1973, following the disclosure of fund-raiser Larry Williams' activities.

Conspiracy to raise an illegal slush fund from builder payoffs by using Gurney's influence with the Federal Housing Administration.
Groot testified that he told Gurney in June 1973 about a panicky call from Williams, who just had been interviewed by the Miami Herald. Although the reporters seemed to know a lot about his activities, Williams denied working for Gurney, Groot said.

Stewart Returns To Duty

Sheriff's Department personnel today were busy compiling an updated listing of county jail prisoners still hospitalized after Monday's jail fire that killed 10 inmates and a jailer.
Chief Confinement Officer L. Max Stewart, who received burns about the face and head evacuating inmates and assisting jailers and firemen, was back on the job today as cleanup of the damaged jail got under way.

"It's just a mess, I know," said Aulis. "But I don't know what we could do. Age is no defense. I can't see how we could avoid it."

Bankruptcy Judge Raps

TAMPA (AP) — A bankruptcy judge says a Federal Trade Commission order for Kosco Interplanetary Inc. to repay \$44 million to victims of a cosmetics sale scheme in the face of protection the company was granted in his court.
In an order issued Tuesday in Tampa, Federal Bankruptcy Judge Alexander Paskay said that a plan for paying Kosco's debts — at least partially — is part of reorganization proceedings the company began more than two years ago.
Paskay criticized the FTC order and rejected the commission's request to be allowed to file claims against Kosco as a creditor.

County Takes No Action On Banning Of Hoop Nets

The Seminole Board of County Commissioners (BOC) yesterday was asked by a conservationist group to ban the use of hoop nets by fishermen in the St. Johns River. However, the Florida Game and Fresh Water Commission has adopted a law effective July 1 allowing the use of hoop nets.

Because of what BOC Chairman Sid Vilhen Jr. called a "technical objection," the board took no action on the banning request pending further investigation. Appearing before the BOC were representatives of the Friends of the St. Johns (FOSJ), opposing the hoop nets, and the president of the Mid-Florida Chapter of the Organization of Fishermen of Florida, Mrs. Dora Lee Russell of Sanford.

Delbert Euga, executive director of the FOSJ, made a plea to the BOC for a resolution banning the use of the hoop nets in the county, primarily in the St. Johns from the Volusia Bar to 46. Euga also on the advisory council of the state Department of Natural Resources. Euga contends that the

hoop nets, six feet wide and 18- to 24 feet long, can ruin sport fishing in the river and also are safety hazards to motor boats. He said that the nets can be stretched across a narrow channel and completely block any fish or boat traffic. Euga also said that some commercial fishermen will use hoop nets to catch game fish and then transport the fish to Georgia for sale.

16 CETA Positions Retained By Board

Some LEAA Assistance Assured

Longwood Seeks Funds For Police Needs

LONGWOOD—Public Safety Director Doug Keller, in his second week on the job, is seeking federal money for an investigative unit, a juvenile office and vehicle, a national teletype service and a high frequency radio system. Keller told The Herald today he has met with Steve Horrell, who is in charge of the Law Enforcement Assistance

Administration (LEAA) program for much of Central Florida to discuss the police department needs Tuesday and received some assurance at least part of the requests will be approved. But, it may be 1976 before the funding is available, he said. Keller reported to the City Council this week he is considering a program to beef up the police patrol by using reserve officers, who are fully qualified under the state's

requirement of 320 hours of law enforcement training. Keller's plan is to reassign the five qualified reserve police officers to one eight-hour shift weekly. The men, to wear regular police uniforms, in return would receive an expense allowance of \$20 monthly. The remaining reserves with 80 hours training would ride with regular officers and continue to wear brown uniforms, he said. Keller was asked to look into federal funding for the innovative program. The public safety director asked for and received city council approval to hire a fourth fireman to have two full-time paid men on duty during the laytime. He recommended the money received by volunteer firemen be designated strictly a reimbursable expense item, eliminating the need for income tax forms. Keller assured his two departments will stay within their budgets for the remainder of the fiscal year ending Sept. 30. The Council turned down Keller's offer to sign over the title of his personal car to the city, but did agree to lease the vehicle, which happens to be a police special, for \$1 annually. Keller said the car would eventually be used as an unmarked vehicle by the detective bureau he hopes to establish with federal money. The Council gave Keller a unanimous vote of confidence for his efforts in settling the walkout by the volunteer firemen his first week on the job. Keller solved the walkout and had volunteers back on the job within 24 hours. Roger Mobley, who reorganized the volunteer firefighters on the city council's request, was also given a vote of confidence.

Lake Mary Faces Five Ordinances, Long Agenda

LAKE MARY—A lengthy agenda, that includes five proposed ordinances is scheduled for consideration at tonight's 7:30 meeting of the city council. The ordinance on purchasing procedures, at first objected to strenuously by the volunteer fire department, but later given First Chief Charles Smith's blessing is expected to pass its first reading. Also scheduled for first readings are: an ordinance amending the Southern Standard Building Code to provide finished floor levels and a proposal to extend social security benefits to city employees.

Ordinances scheduled for second and final reading are: to provide condemnation proceedings for dilapidated or unsafe buildings, setting rules and regulations for city parks and amendments to the criminal code. A proposed interlocal agreement between the city and the county to provide water and sewer utility service to the Scott Electronics plant by Wilco Utilities, a county controlled utility, is expected to be approved. A resolution will be considered permitting the city to apply for Federal Farm Home Administration funding for the water system. Other action on the agenda includes approval for Sanford to be the lead applicant and contracting agent on a drainage study; approval of an agreement with H.K. Builders providing street paving and drainage by the builder in the area being developed on Floyd, Frederick and Goodheart Streets; public hearings on federal revenue sharing fund allocations and on a proposed change of zoning from agriculture to mobile home district; letters from Fire Chief Smith on street openings and from the County Commission on assistance with paving of Country Club Road and Lake Mary Boulevard. Council will discuss the possibility of acquiring a communication system for the police and fire departments.

Parked Vehicles Lead To Arrests

CASSELBERRY—Two Orlando residents made the mistake of parking a late model automobile incorrectly last night at the Butler Plaza and as a result face possession of stolen property and controlled substance charges today. Gerald Fay Cleary, 39, and Diane Isola Benedetti, 20, both of 1415 E. Amelia St., Orlando, were arrested about 6 p.m. by agents of the Florida Department of Criminal Law Enforcement, when one agent spotted a 1974 Chevrolet in a parking lot and became suspicious of the car and the way it was parked. Checking the license tag, the agent found the vehicle had been stolen five days before from the Butler Plaza and as a result of the arrest. Some 1,500 pills and tablets were found along with a quantity of marijuana when the two persons were taken into custody.

Deputy Jim Hibbard said items valued at \$2,707 were reported stolen yesterday in a burglary at the residence of Jeff Sargent, 300 E. Oregon Ave., Sanford. Items listed as taken by the burglars, who entered by a window, included a saddle, riding boots, stereo equipment, a citizens band radio, shotgun, pistol and three rifles. A budget of \$1500 has been approved from the program with a salary of \$1100 to go to the director; \$64.35 to FICA and the balance for equipment. In addition, Comprehensive Employment Training Act (CETA) funds will be available for four students to assist with the program. The program will include team and individual sports activities, such as basketball, softball, volleyball, table tennis, shuffleboard, chess and checkers. Tenets will be included for individuals providing their own equipment. All participants must register and their parents are requested to sign a liability release form prior to the child's participation. Miller says special events are also being planned and he hopes to make arrangements for swimming at the Lyman High School pool.

A 14-year-old Longwood boy was listed in fair condition today at Florida Hospital North, Altamonte Springs, after being injured in a train-motorcycle collision yesterday in Longwood. Longwood police said this morning that Chief Doug Keller hadn't authorized release of information about the accident since Keller wasn't immediately available. Sheriff's deputies who also responded to the accident call reported that Scott Korb, 14, of 708 Skylark Circle, Longwood, was pushing a motorcycle across railroad tracks west of N. Grant St., Longwood, when the motorcycle was struck by an Amtrak passenger train. Deputies said investigation of the accident was handled by officer Partain of the Longwood Police Department.

A 21-year-old Oviedo man shot early today outside Club 438, Lake Howell Road, Altamonte Springs, was also listed in fair condition at Florida Hospital North. Sheriff's deputies reported Steven Argro, 21, Route One, Harrison St., Oviedo, was shot in the hand and stomach by an unidentified man during an argument outside the nightclub. 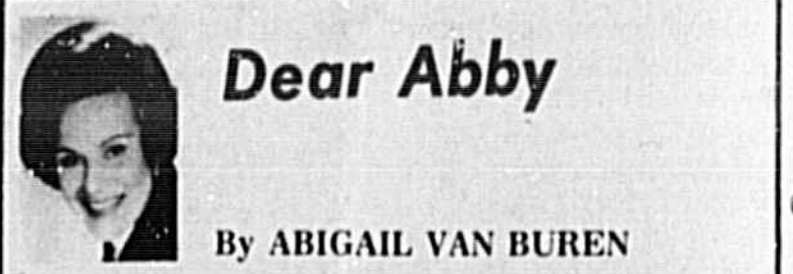

Blackbird Pie Boosts Jaded U.S. Palate

This spring, the Army sprayed to death thousands of blackbirds in Fort Campbell, Kentucky. They were nesting in trees and becoming pests as well as potential disease carriers.
But the French have another way of reducing the blackbird population. They eat them.
In the translation of "Secrets of the Great French Restaurants" by Louise Barthele, it is suggested you get out your gun and shoot down 100 blackbirds then prepare a Pate de Merles. The book (\$17.50 Macmillan) gives instruction for the recipe as used at the Michelin Guide-rated L'Auberge restaurant in Corsica.
"Although impractical for American cooks," the book states in part, "this incredible pate is so interesting and curious that it seems worthwhile to describe it anyway. It is made with 100 brood blackbirds, plus two-thirds their weight in pig lard. It is flavored with Cognac and Madeira and seasoned with juniper berries, pepper, and nutmeg and salted with tarragon. All pretty costly and maybe too rich for the American tastes. Hunting blackbirds in Corsica is not difficult. You can bag hundreds on a single hunt. Certainly far more than you would need to make a pie with

"four and twenty blackbirds to set before the king."
For another sort of slightly crazy food are green and white eggs. A special breed of chickens in South America do actually lay colored eggs. They are not Easter eggs despite the fact that their colors range from medium, black to medium green.
Food faddists should note, however, that claims that the blue or green eggs are better for the diet than white or brown eggs have not been established, according to the American Medical Association.
Here's a drop of coffee information. You can now gauge the amount of coffee in a cup. Until recently, a cup of coffee might have been three ounces, or anything up to 8 ounces. Housewives' and coffee scientists never could agree exactly about size. But all that is now settled.
At the request of the National Coffee Association, Dr. Alan Berg, a senior biochemist at Arthur D. Little, Inc., recommended that the cup be established at five ounces.
How much caffeine in each five ounce cup? The answer is an average of 60 milligrams per cup of roasted-and-ground-brewed coffee, 60 milligrams per cup of instant coffee, and 3 milligrams per cup of decaffeinated coffee. Each milligram is about 100,000ths of an ounce.

Add Creole Touch To Aid Barbeques

A holiday cookout can be just that with most of the cooking done on a grill with a well-built charcoal fire. Start your outdoor entertaining with a touch of Creole cooking suggested by a New Orleans favorite, jambalaya, with toasted bread poles and a very special praline sundae. For those who cling to something more traditional there are the smoky barbecued ribs and hamburger oriented youngsters.

simmer gently for 5 minutes. Scoop vanilla ice cream into serving dishes. Spoon on hot sauce. Serve at once. Makes about 2 cups.

(Note: This sauce is also delicious when served on slices of pound cake which have been toasted on the grill.)

HICKORY SMOKED TURKEY HALVES

1 small turkey (about 4 to 5 pounds)
1/2 cup melted butter
Melted butter
Salt and pepper
Hickory flakes

Remove giblets and rinse turkey off with cold water; pat dry. Cut turkey in half. Brush bone side of turkey halves with butter and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Place bone side down on grill about 5 to 6 inches from medium coals and grill for 40 to 50 minutes or until meat browns nicely. After about 15 minutes of cooking, spoon about 1/4 cup of hickory flakes over coals. Lower cover or lid of grill and continue cooking 25 to 35 minutes. Brush skin side of turkey halves with melted butter and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Turn turkey halves. Sprinkle about another 1/4 cup of hickory flakes over coals. Cover grill and continue cooking another 40 to 50 minutes or until turkey is cooked. To test for doneness, the drumstick should move easily and the breast meat will be fork-tender.

(Note: If you are using a grill without a cover, turkey will still have a hickory smoked flavor but it will be more subtle.)
Cook until peas are heated through. Serve with Toasted Bread Poles.

SOMBRERO BURGERS
Toasted Bread Poles
Cut an unliced loaf of bread into halves lengthwise. Cut each half into 3 pieces. Melt 1/2 cup butter or margarine and stir in 2 tablespoons minced chives. Roll long pieces of bread in butter mixture or use a brush to cover bread with butter. Place bread on grill above medium hot coals and cook about 3 to 4 minutes on each side. Turn bread poles on all four sides until all pieces are brown and crusty.

HOT PRALINE SUNDAES
1/2 cup butter or margarine
1 cup firmly packed dark brown sugar
1 cup blended maple syrup
1 can (4 ounces) pecan halves
Vanilla ice cream

Traditional Fashion For Meal Persian Chicken Delightful

Betty Tara, born and bred in the U.S.A., often cooks Persian style. That's because her mother-in-law, a native of Iran, paid two long visits to the Taras' New Jersey home and taught Betty some Persian dishes.

A favorite of the three Tara children (ages 6 to 12), of Betty's husband, Dr. Harold H. Tara, and of the family's guests, is Persian Chicken. One version of it is a great combination of chicken, rice, lima beans and raisins that's seasoned with mint and dill. It's perfect for summer because it's cooked on top of the range and the fresh herbs come from the garden or local market.

One feature of the dish the Tara youngsters adore: the crusty golden-brown layer of rice at the bottom of the cooking

pot. In traditional Persian fashion, Betty achieves this while keeping the rice atop it white and separate.

Betty Tara has cooked the dish so many times that, like her mother-in-law, she varies the ingredients and doesn't measure them — rather she goes by what's at hand and by eye and feel.

A friend of the Taras and mine who has often watched Betty prepare Persian Chicken and who has delved into books on Persian cooking.

PERSIAN CHICKEN
1 cup converted rice
Broiler-fryer chicken (about 3 pounds), cut up
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup butter or margarine
1 cup chopped onion
1/2 cup finely chopped fresh raisins
2 to 4 tablespoons finely

chopped fresh mint
1/2 cup dark or light (golden) raisins
1/4 cup finely chopped fresh dill
Cook rice according to package directions for firm rice.

Sprinkle chicken with salt. In a 12-inch skillet in 2 tablespoons of the butter, gently cook onion until wilted; with a slotted spoon, remove onion and reserve. To the skillet add 2 more tablespoons of the butter and heat; add chicken and cook uncovered, turning as necessary and adjusting heat, until browned and tender — 35 to 45 minutes.

Cook lima beans according to package directions, adding nutmeg, onion, raisins and lima beans — until reduced to about 2 tablespoons; stir in the mint; reserve.

In a 3 to 4-quart saucepot or range-top casserole, melt 2 more tablespoons of the butter. Add one-half the rice, all the chicken, one-half the onion, lima beans and one-half the dill. Add one-half of the remaining rice and all the remaining onion, raisins, lima beans and dill. Top with remaining rice. Gently heat the remaining 2 tablespoons butter with the bean liquid and mint until butter melts; spoon over rice. Place a clean towel over the top of the pot; cover and cook over medium-low heat about 40 minutes; ideally there should be a golden-brown crust at the bottom. But even if you don't achieve the crust, simmering the cooked ingredients — rice, chicken, onion and lima beans — with the raisins, mint and dill results in a delicious blending of flavors. But don't expect the lima beans to stay green.

How To Cook In Clay Pots

I recently sampled a tasty dish made by a culinary method in vogue some 3,000 years ago and have become a fan of wet-clay pot cooking.

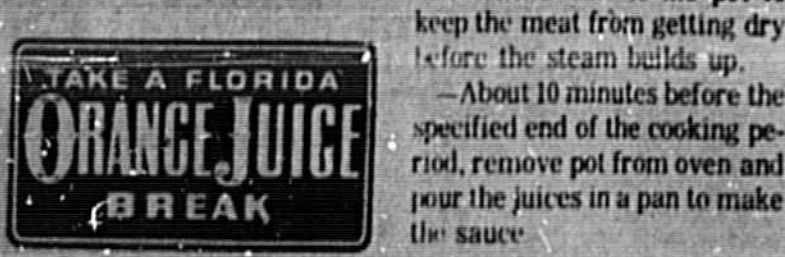
When archeologists unearthed the ancient cities of Etruria, it seems they discovered a curious assortment of rudely made unglazed terra cotta pots the housewives of that civilization used to prepare their meals.

In recent years there has been a growing movement to revive this venerable form of cookery which has some distinct advantages. The unique method has been described in the "Clay-Pot Cookbook" by Georgia M. and Grover Sales (Atheneum, New York). The book also contains a wide range of recipes which come in handy, since the cooks of Etruria apparently left behind no records of what they were up to in their kitchens.

To produce the desired results, I discovered, you must immerse the pot you plan to use in water for 10 to 15 minutes before you start cooking. The porous clay soaks up the water like a sponge and breathes. When baked at high temperatures, the water turns to steam, mingling with the natural juices of the contents of the pot and penetrates the food with a self-soothing action.

With this method, most any meal can be prepared without using fats or oil. And inexpensive cuts of meat are said to come out fork tender.

There are some words of advice for those being initiated into the wet-clay pot method. —Always place the pot in a cold oven, since the slow increase of heat is vital for the cooking method. —Use a high temperature of 400 degrees or more to create the desired steam. —Trim as much fat off meat as you can before cooking. Then add a little wine to the pot to keep the meat from getting dry before the steam builds up. —About 10 minutes before the specified end of the cooking period, remove pot from oven and pour the juices in a pan to make the sauce.

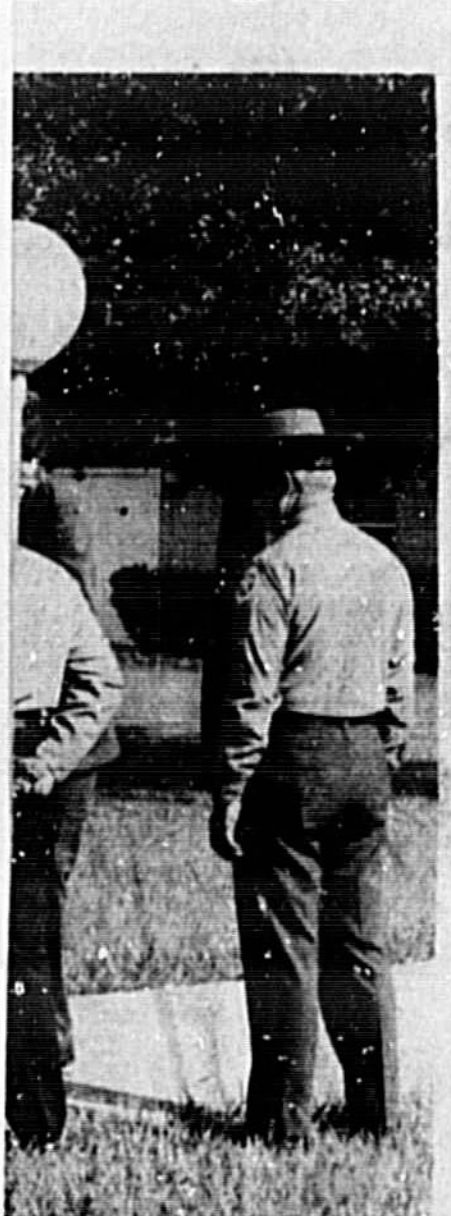
