





Hathaway Appointment Set For Senate Approval Today

WASHINGTON (AP) - With the expected Senate confirmation of Stanley K. Hathaway as secretary of the interior, President Ford will have appointed a majority of the 11 Cabinet members. Although his environmental record has been under attack, Hathaway, 50, a Republican and former two term governor of Wyoming, was expected to win Senate approval today.

No Spending Found Here

CLYMAN, Wis. (AP) - "If we haven't got it, we don't spend it." That's the motto, expressed by deputy village clerk Mildred Gahlman, of this village of 320 residents. Clyman has not followed the trend of big cities toward deficit spending, a trend that has brought New York, the nation's largest city, to the brink of bankruptcy. Village President Line Halt says in the Veste onchi Hat Liget but sets aside about \$3,000 annually for welfare cases. "You never know when we're going to have one," she says. "This year it looks like we may have one. We're not sure yet." In New York City nearly one person in eight is on welfare.

Ky Links Thieu With Polo

WASHINGTON (AP) - Former South Vietnamese Premier Nguyen Cao Ky says President Nguyen Van Thieu tried to have him murdered, apparently after learning of a plot by Ky and some associates to oust Thieu in a military coup last April. Ky said the murder scheme failed when security guards shot three would-be assassins who managed to penetrate the compound where he lived at Saigon's Tan Son Nhut airbase.

Ford, Rabin Begin Talks

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Ford's push for a new Israeli-Egyptian settlement turns to talks with Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin who arrived here saying his country was prepared to do "whatever is possible" to move toward peace. It was a matter of life and death Monday afternoon when duty in the emergency room without every minute counted for victims of the tragic Seminole County Jail fire which claimed 11 lives.

All available ambulances rushed inmates and others suffering from smoke inhalation to area hospitals as fast as they revive them - seven inmates and Deputy Bob Moore. could be evacuated from the burning building. Seminole Memorial Hospital Administrator Robert Besserer spoke with pride of his staff's efficient response to the worst

The victims were not breathing on arrival, but every effort was made by the doctors and nurses to stimulate the heartbeat and restore breathing. Several were placed in ICJ and one was

Mike DiBona of the emergency room staff noted the trained ambulance crews administered emergency medical treatment enroute, but there were some heart stimulant drugs that could not be administered until they got to the hospital. 



Bankruptcy Judge Raps FTC On Koscot Pay Order

TAMPA (AP) - A bankruptcy judge says Federal Trade Commission order for Koscot Interplanetary Inc. to repay \$44 million to victims of a cosmetics sale scheme flies in the face of protection the company was granted in his court.

In an order issued Tuesday in Tampa, Federal Bankruptcy Judge Alexander Paskay said that a plan for paying Koscot's debts - at least partially - is part of reorganization proceedings the company began more than two years ago.

Paskay criticized the FTC order and rejected the commission's request to be allowed to file claims against Koscot as a creditor.

FTC administrative judge Donald R. Moore last month ordered Koscot's founder, supersalesman Glenn W. Turner, to pay back persons drawn into the company's pyramid scheme of distributorship sales.

Oil Search Halted In Gulf

TALLAHASSEE (AP) - Three giant oil companies have halted, at least temporarily, a search for oil in the Gulf of Mexico off Northwest Florida after pouring \$647.4 million down seven dry wells.

A spokeswoman for Exxon U.S.A. said Tuesday "there currently are no plans for additional drilling" on sites under the sparkling green waters south of Panama City,

But she said Exxon and its partners have not completely abandoned hope of striking oil in the Destine anticline, a promising geological hump beneath the waters. "We're very confident that it's there," she said. "We

ust haven't found it yet." The Destin anticline was considered one of the best nopes for new oil to reduce American dependence on foreign oil when the federal government threw the area

TALLAHASSEE (AP) - Utilities lawyer Edwin Mason compounded his problems by trying to conceal the fact that he gave two Supreme Court justices a secret memorandum, a Florida Bar referee says.

Eli Subin, an Orlando attorney, recommended Tuesday that the Supreme Court suspend Mason's practice for one year and publicly reprimand him for violating bar rules by giving the memo to the justices and then trying to cover up his actions.

Subin made the recommendation in a report to the bar, filed with the court. It is now up to the court to decide what action should be taken against the 59-year-old Tallahassee attorney.

In his report, Subin found Mason guilty of: -Giving Justice Joseph Boyd and former Justice Hal Dekle copies of the memorandum favoring utilities in a

pending tax case involving millions of dollars.

Dunn Sees No Conflict

TALLAHASSEE (AP) - Sen. Edgar Dunn Jr., D-Daytona Beach, says he doesn't see any conflict of interest in his serving on a special committee probing the Florida Department of Criminal Law Enforcement.

But Senate President Dempsey Barron removed Dunn from the special three-member panel, saying he wanted to avoid any possible criticism of conflict.

In a letter to Dunn, Barron said that he was taking the action because Dunn served with the FDCLE's director. William Troelstrup, on three advisory committees on

"Obviously, not knowing about your service and not having asked you in advance of the select committee appointment, I have placed you in a position of possible criticism for conflict of interest when the select committee completes its task and issues its report," Barron

Ministers Face Jail Terms

PENSACOLA (AP) - Two black ministers face prison terms of up to 15 years after being convicted of extortion in connection with a march protesting the slaying of a local black man by a sheriff's deputy.

Rev. B.J. Brooks and Rev. H.K. Matthews, local civilrights workers, were convicted Tuesday in Escambia County Circuit Court by an all-white jury that deliberated for about an hour.

"That's what happens when you are a black in this community." said the Rev. Mr. Matthews, a Pensacola official of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference. The Rev. Mr. Brooks had no comment.

They were to be sentenced July 23. The ministers were accused of threatening harm to various officials in order to get the sheriff's deputy fired

Last Defendant Sentenced

JACKSONVILLE (AP) - "By coming forward and testifying, he has helped eliminate the cancer of racial hatred in this community," says a circuit judge in sentencing the last of five black men charged in the slayings of two white youths.

Judge Hudson Olliff gave William Lee Hearn, 21, a term of 15 years in prison Tuesday. Hearn had pleaded guilty to second-degree murder.

The sentence wrapped up the so-called Black Liberation Army slayings, in which notes on the victims' bodies and tape recordings sent to news media, claiming the start of a racial revolution by the BLA.

Earlier, Olliff decreed death penalties for Jacob John Dougan Jr., 27, and Elwood Clark Barclay, 23; a 398-year prison term for Dwyne Crittendon, 21, and 199 years for Brad W. Evans, 20.

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Social Security Crisis Ignored

Pique and frustration apparently led Caspar W. Weinberger, secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, to tell Congress recently that he will not propose any more plans to help pull the Social Security program out of the ruincus deficit that it faces in the years ahead. Mr. Weinberger and President Ford are irritated at the cavalier Security actuarially sound got at the hands of the MUST EOIN Democrats in Congress.

Admittedly, Mr. Ford's plan to limit this year's Social Security cost-of-living increase was only a stop gap measure. Much more will have to be done before the program becomes solvent. The President's plan would reduce by \$2 billion a federal deficit that appears certain to reach nearly \$100 billion. Rather than bite the bullet, Congress decided to allow the 35 million recipients of Social Security to have an eight per cent cost-of-living increase in July.

That means the Social Security program will face a deficit calculated at \$14.6 billion during the next three fiscal years.

Despite the disagreement about methods between Congress and the Ford administration, it is clear that some action must be taken to balance the \$60 billion-a-year Social Security trust fund, which will start chewing into its reserves for the first time this year. There have been many suggestions. One that must be rejected is to finance medical portions of Social Security benefits from the federal General Fund-revenue contributed by general taxpayers. Obviously, that would defeat the purpose of the program which is to have benefits tied to income.

Another plan would raise the amount of income taxed for Social Security purposes beyond the present limit of \$14,100-a-year to \$24,000-a-year or more, thus feeding more money into the fund for a longer period of time. But where is the limit? And raising taxes on high income, to help support retired persons who had earned less, still is a transfer of wealth that is contrary to the purpose of the program.

To begin, Congress should reconsider its previous action and adopt a realistic five per cent lid on increased Social Security benefits that was proposed by the Ford administration earlier.

A modest increase in benefits is not a longrange solution to financing Social Security properly. However, it will reopen a dialogue between the administration and the Congress without which Social Security will just continue to be a political football every year, during which the recipients and the public are invited to establish the good guys and bad guys.

The truth of the matter is that there is enough fault to go around, but that won't put food on the table of the retired folks in a few years when benefits exceed the ability of the tax base to sustain the program.

That, essentially, is the message that the administration is trying to put across - without too much success, unfortunately.

Rationing Wasteful

The Federal Energy Administration has provided a peek at what would confront the American people if it became necessary to ration gasoline. The government would have to hire 93,000 people to administer the program. It would cost \$400 million just to start, and if rationing remained for a prolonged period the annual cost would be \$2 billion.

Those 93,000 people would be doing nothing to provide more gasoline, but would only be trying to police a shortage. The \$2 billion would not drill a single oil well, dig one lump of coal or pay for any research into alternate sources of energy that would relieve the demand for petroleum. If Congress needed any further reminder of the penalty to be paid for failure to keep our energy problem from developing into another crisis, the staggering waste of a rationing bureaucracy ought to provide it.

RAY CROMLEY South Korea U.S. Help

As a firm believer in the defense of South Korea against invasion from the North, it is clear to me that we must demand several preconditions of President Park as a price for our defense of his country.

South Korea is an independent country and has every right to refuse our conditions. But the United States, likewise, as an independent nation, has the right to withdraw troops and to cancel military commitments, if the presence of our forces and the wording of treaties threaten to lead us into a war without victory.

The basic conditions for our support must be: First, that Park restore free speech and a free press in South Korea. Second, that he restore open and free elections, without police coercion.

Third, that he immediately set in motion significant steps to lower financial corruption in government.

Fourth, that he cease using the police to hound his political opponents. These are necessary conditions for military victory. As South Vietnam, Cambodia and Laos have demonstrated, without a viable government backed by a unified people, the defense of a

country is difficult in the extreme, even with U.S. military superiority. My visits to Korea have convinced me the South has been and is unified in hatred for Communists, and that this hatred is strong


throughout the social structure. It is also true that almost all Koreans I have known have a strong passion for individuality and freedom. A continued democratic blackout of the type carried out by Park could destroy unity in the South and weaken the will of South Koreans to fight vigorously even the ruthless enemy they know Kim Il Sung's communists to be.

The situation on Taiwan is different. Here the government founded by Chiang Kai-shek has made strong, successful efforts to widen participation in public office and to narrow the economic gap between the top 20 per cent of the people and the lowest 40 per cent. That is, the government of Taiwan and its economy seem to be moving toward democracy in the broad sense, making it defendable with reasonable assistance from the U.S.

Korea, likewise, had been making remarkable conomic progress, and had in recent years achieved a significant broadening of income. But, by contrast, Park has of late shut off one democratic right after another.

The clampdown did not begin with the loss of Cambodia, South Vietnam and Laos. I remember arguing this point with some of Park's closest advisers years back. They were convinced then, as now, that only strength from above could insure South Korea's progress and

The threat from the North is real. I have been privileged to see a significant amount of the ocumentary evidence and to talk first hand with former North Korean agents. If I were a South Korean, I would argue for a very strong defense and constant readiness.

Really Like Pantyhose? Advertising isn't expected to change very much as a result of a set of new guidelines just promulgated by the Federal Trade Commission.

Consumers may still be subjected to some of the more offensive product - plugging, both in print and via the radio and television waves. But thanks to the agency, consumers in the

future will have the assurance that the "expert" touting this or that product really does possess the implied qualifications. Tests claimed to have been conducted must really have been made. and endorsements by organizations must be bonafide endorsements reflecting "the collective judgment of the organization." Either that or the advertiser is subject to legal action.

These requirements became effective immediately. At the same time, however, the FTC proposed others which may or may not go into effect until the end of July, pending comment from industry and the public, and at least one of which would seem to carry "truth in advertising" into a rather nettlesome thicket.

This is the proposal that people endorsing a product - especially well-known personalities must actually be users of the product. The star who recommends a brand of coffee must actually drink it regularly. The athlete who swears by a certain breakfast cereal must actually eat the stuff.

Now it shouldn't be too difficult for an advertiser to keep on file a signed statement by a celebrity testifying that he really, truly does eat, drink, wear, wash with, etc. the product in question, thus presumably satisfying the government bird dogs.

Come to think of it, advertisers should welcome this. It would add that much more to the celebrity's persuasiveness and influence about. 



WASHINGTON (AP) - Here are the major findings, conclusions and recommendations of the Rockefeller Commission report on the CIA. FINDINGS

MAIL: For more than 20 years, the CIA intercepted mail between the United States and the Soviet Union, handling up to 4.3 million pieces of mail a year and opening as many as 13,000 letters year.

SURVEILLANCE: During the late 1960s and early 1970s, Operation CHAOS inserted agents into domestic dissident groups and compiled files on 7,200 Americans in an effort to uncover a foreign influence behind domestic unrest. A simultaneous operation infiltrated dissident groups in the Washington, D.C., area to determine if they planned activities against the CIA. Five investigations, some involving wiretaps and other

physical surveillance, were directed against newsmen suspected of receiving classified leaks while investigations of agency personnel identified as security risks involved such "invalid techniques as breakins, wiretaps and bugging.

DRUGS: From 1953 to 1963, the agency conducted "a clearly illegal" program to test the influence of drugs on humans, including the administration of LSD to persons without their knowledge. POLITICS: A CIA agent was infiltrated into the cam-

paign of an unidentified congressional candidate sometime during the 1970s and furnished the agency with reports of behind-the-scene campaign activities. FILES: The CIA maintains intelligence files on 57,000 Americans plus some 800,000 active and inactive security

files on individuals connected with the agency in some way, including 75 current members of Congress. KENNEDY: There is no credible evidence to support

allegations that the CIA was involved in the assassination of President John F. Kennedy. CONCLUSIONS

Some of the CIA domestic activities were plainly unlawful and constituted improper invasions upon the rights of Americans.

Some illegal and improper activities "were initiated or ordered by Presidents, either directly or indirectly." "A detailed analysis of the facts has convinced the commission that the great majority of the CIA's domestic activities comply with its statutory authority."

RECOMMENDATIONS The National Security Act should be amended to make clear that CIA activities must be related to foreign, not domestic, intelligence.

With certain exceptions, the President should prohibit the CIA from the collection of information about the domestic activities of U.S. citizens. The President should recommend to Congress creation

of a joint congressional oversight committee. A similar oversight committee should be created within the executive branch. All files on the domestic activities of American

dissidents should be destroyed following completion of the various congressional investigations now in progress.
