



"He has seen too much over these past few months to maintain such blind faith any longer. He has been disappointed time and again by what his father has endured in his bid to become a small-town mayor."

How did Eckstein become so jaded? According to Berardino's column, the blame lies solely with me.

David claims The Herald exaggerated the seriousness of his father's six-week stay in the hospital in December and January. In this day and age when HMOs and insurance companies have made the overnight hospital stay almost extinct, I'm not sure how you exaggerate a sixweek stay in the hospital, particularly when many of those days where in the intensive care unit. 'He said doctors have adjusted his dialysis to remove fluid, and he has to limit his water

" 'I was drinking too much water, and I didn't realize that,' he said. (Eckstein) said he only missed two meetings out of probably more than 1,000 meetings, so he suggested he has a good record.

" 'My health should be fine,' he said. 'I might be out for a week if I get a kidney."

"Asked if his health concerns would affect his ability to be mayor of Sanford, Eckstein said the mayor's position is part-time and he will not hang out at City Hall all day.

" 'I think I'm in pretty good shape,' he said. 'I wouldn't run if I thought (my health) would have an effect."

Sounds like a real hatchet job, huh? In his Sun-Sentinel column Berardino notes that David Eckstein signed about 100 baseballs as part of a Herald subscription drive three years ago. That's true, and I thanked David for doing so, especially since David voluntarily signed twice as many balls as I had originally asked. ment we want in Sanford," she said. Once the city reaches build out, the budget will have to stabilize because the tax base will slow down.

"There won't be any more space to build anything," she said. Right now the only open space is on State Road 46 and Rinehart Road. She acknowledged that many areas need rebuilding.

"We need to make sure we continue to enhance what we have," she said.

One aspect that Kuhn wants to avoid in planning is what she called a crisis management culture. It occurs too often in Sanford in connection with development, she said.

"We don't have a master plan or any codified plan," she said. "We need a good master plan in place with development standards. That way there won't be a question. of is this what we want or don't want."

The answers for developers will be quick, and they can use the city's master plan to create their designs knowing what the standards are.

Some have said the election caused division in Sanford, but Kuhn envisions the city moving forward together with everyone having a voice in the process.

Although she defeated former Commissioner Herbert "Whitey" Eckstein by just 153 votes, Kuhn said with less than 3,500 people voting, that is a significant margin.

"I don't know about division in Sanford," she said. "I have to tell you I was pleased with the turnout for the runoff. Issues did get attention, but the election is over. We can now work together toward making Sanford the community we want it to be."

One promise that Eckstein ran on was giving a voice to residents toward the start of Commission meetings.

"I don't know that residents have not been given a chance to speak," Kuhn said. She hasn't decided on when to include citizen participation on the agenda.

We're on the right path.

Property owners, paid professionals and attorneys appear at meetings when they are on the agenda. They should be afforded every opportunity to have their zoning change or other issue heard without having to wait for hours.

"Citizens certainly need to be heard," Kuhn said. She has considered putting citizen participation first on the agenda and including a time limit.

"I haven't decided yet," she said. "We will have a little trial and error because I want to be very careful in how the procedure is set."

Probably the question she and all the candidates were asked most frequently during the campaign is what they plan to do in regard to the city manager's contract.

Kuhn said she has been asked that question frequently even since winning the election March 29.

"I stand by my position that the Commission has already voted on that issue and the decision was made that his contract not be renewed," Kuhn said.

As a former law enforcement officer, Kuhn is concerned about the incident at Academy Manor over Easter weekend. A fight broke out and a driver tried to run into police officers and did run over one man.

Kuhn said the incident was police Chief Tooley and his

staff Thursday morning. That neighborhood also holds a large Mother's Day gathering and steps are being taken to prevent any further violence, she said. Law enforcement should not be blamed for the Easter violence.

"We need to give law enforcement and firefighters the proper tools to do their job," she said.

She acknowledged that law enforcement has had an image problem in the past, but crime rates have dropped. "We still have a long ways to go," she admitted.

She told a story about when she and her husband, Bob, decided to move to Palmetto Avenue. Family and friends thought they were nuts, as Kuhn put it, because of the prevalent crime and prostitution in the neighborhood.

Five or six years later, she said, people ask whether there are any more houses that can be fixed up.

Kuhn believes in the Broken Window theory espoused by former New York City Mayor Rudy Guiliani.

"If you leave one window broken, it perpetuates blight," the new mayor explained. Fix the problem when it occurs, she said, that way it does not get so far out of control that it becomes impossible or difficult to correct.

Realistically, she said, these changes will not happen overnight.

"We need to continue to have that vision and strive to raise the bar," Kuhn said. "The First Street project is the first step."

Buildings on First Street have been worked on and brought up to code as the streetscape project took place.

"Once things are in place, that will start a snowball effect," she predicted. Absentee ownership is starting to turn around, she suggested, and events like Alive After Five have begun to paint a new image of Sanford.

"We're on the right path," discussed in her meeting with. Kuhn said. "We just need to continue moving that way."

The U.S. government will pay 50 percent of the cost. The state of Florida will pay 25 percent and local county and city governments along the route would be responsible for the final 25 percent of the funding.

According to Olore, \$50 million dollars in state money has already been set aside for the project. Olore is confident the federal funds can be obtained.

Mica has also secured \$500,000 to be used for a viability study and the design process for stations in Winter Park and Lake Mary. An additional \$5 million in federal dollars has been secured by Mica for intermodal station development.

The information gathered from that study will then be used in conjunction with information and input gathered from the city leaders from the cities along the rail route.

The last remaining hurdle in the funding stage of the project is getting local county and city governments on board. In a letter recently sent to Longwood City Administrator John Drago, the FDOT asked that each city along the route provide some general information about possible locations each city had in mind.

Although he was pleased by the possibility of a commuter rail system passing through Longwood, a city not served by Lynx bus service, John Drago cautioned those in attendance at the recent City Commission meeting, "Not to hold your breaths." He acknowledged that final plans for the route are not in place, meaning until they are, no one should get their hopes too high.

In addition to the construction of a train station just off of Ronald Reagan Boulevard, near downtown Longwood, city leaders discussed the construction of a privately owned themed restaurant to be constructed next to, or adjoined with, to the train station.

The commuter rail system would provide easy access to city events such as the Longwood Arts Festival and the parking lot could be used to alleviate parking in conjunction

with city events.

The only potential negative aspect of the project that was discussed was the possibility of some traffic delays as the trains pass through the various cities during rush hour. Because the trains would consist of passenger cars only, the delays would be minimal.

"This is part of a threepronged approach relieve traffic for those commuting along the 1-4 corridor," according to Olore.

The other two parts of the solution are the continued improvements to the general use lanes and interchanges on I-4 and express lanes along I-4.

Upon final approval, construction on the initial leg of the project would begin in 2009.

That initial segment would run from Debary to the Downtown Amtrak station. A second construction phase, set to begin in 2011, would complete the route, enabling rail travel as far as Poinciana

Boulevard, in Osocola County. When asked how response has been from the various cities along the proposed route, Olore stated that every city she has been in touch with has had a positive response to

Lake Mary City Manager John Litton said: "The concept makes a lot of sense, but is has to be done right, and I think the way Congressman Mica has presented it will work. We are actively looking at property already for a rail station."

Sanford City Manager Al Grieshaber Jr., said Sanford likes the idea of a rail system.




Pops will put their best foot forward on a special production to benefit victims of the recent Isunami in Asia.







The first proposal is an enclosed bridge with chainlink fence along the walkway. McCollum said it would be a pre-cast structure that could be built in six months according to the construction company. (See renderings, this page.)

Mayor Thomas Greene had reservations about the chain fence, and Commissioner Gary Brender said special consideration had to be made for this bridge which will be used primarily by elementary school children.

McCollum said usage by children was considered in all the proposals.

The second concept, that came in a close second in the rankings, is the most expensive at \$3.9 million. This one looked more like a covered bridge. It has a roof and a welded mesh fabric covering the walkway. The ramps leading to the bridge have lookouts over the ponds on either end.

"Beauty is in the eye of the beholder, but this has a very different design," McCollum said in explaining the second proposal.

roposai. Commissioners brought up the fact that the much larger pedestrian overpass spanning interstate 4 in Lake Mary cost just \$3.5 million. McCollum responded that that was four years ago and construction materials have increased substantially.

The third proposal would cost \$3.5 million. McCollum said the design is different again and would include pointed roofs on the ends with mesh across the top of the actual bridge. A sitting area was planned below the ramps on either end. The ramps on this proposal would be less compact, he said, with two levels.

Greene said the Mediterranean design of the second proposal would fit better with future plans for the downtown area. Brender like the roof over the second proposal as well to keep the students dry as they cross the bridge.

Commissioner George Duryea said the cover would cut down on light and may create a security issue on the bridge.

The number one concern, however, on all the concepts is the problem of having chil-

dren 15 to 20 feet off the ground on ramps that are not covered.

Commissioners Brender and Michael McLean were concerned about the artists' renderings showing what looked like a 4-foot fence on the ramps.

Jernigan said she didn't like
the idea of an overpass, but
she had the same safety con-

"I can just see a child saying, 'I bet you can't jump," she explained, adding that there is the potential for young people to throw things.

Greene suggested that a lot of parents are still walking with children in elementary school.

It is possible to have crossing guards keep an eye on the situation as well.

Whatever concept is chosen for Lake Mary Boulevard would make a logical choice for the second overpass on Rinehart Road, McCollum said.

"We might try to use the same design on the other end of the city," he said.

for compliance with storm

water drainage regulations.

By January 2004 the demolition work had been completed, but no new construction had begun. In assessing the property for 2004 tax purposes, Johnson denied Northland's tax exempt status and assessed a property tax of \$30,581 for the property valued at \$1,663,903. The Northland Church properties on Dog Track Road are tax exempt and are not part of the lawsuit.

When determining taxexempt status, two main factors come in to play: ownership and usage.

Ownership is not an issue in the Northland lawsuit.

The suit filed by Northland states: "Since 2001 Northland has been using the property from time to time for church related religious purposes and has been preparing the property for the construction of a church sanctuary, church school and related recreational facilities."

The lawsuit also states that prayer meetings, church committee meetings, gatherings of the board of elders and other church related activities have taken place on the property in question, which in the eyes of the Northland community constitutes "church use." It concludes that the property should qualify for tax exempt status.

When disputing a tax assessment, the parties involved have the right to take their case to the Value Adjustment Board to plea their case to an independent magistrate.

In the fall of 2004, Northland brought their case before the Board. The magistrate ruled in favor of the property appraiser Johnson's assessment, and Northland's request for tax exemption for the property was again denied.

Northland Church then made a "Good Faith" payment, paying the full amount of taxes owed. Northland now hopes to recoup that payment as a result of the lawsuit filed in February.

"We are convinced the property is exempt from property taxes. We strongly disagree with Mr. Johnson's appraisal," said Northland's Tim Tracey.

Complicating the dispute is an agreement reached between Seminole County and Northland Church that provides for the extension of Seminola Boulevard (Lake Avenue).

Northland's Attorney, James Spoonhour, noted that the lack of a road extension has hampered the construction efforts by making it difficult for construction vehicles to reach the property. There is also a concern on Northland's behalf that a completed church with limited access would create a mul-

titude of problems.

Johnson, the county property appraiser, acknowledged that the road extension issue does create some timing issues, but the lack of a road extension was not seen as a determining factor in his decision to deny Northland's tax exempt status for the property in dispute.

Johnson's reasoning was that "it doesn't require a four-lane divided roadway, with a median and irrigation sprinklers, to begin work on a construction project." "Construction on the extension of Seminola Boulevard is scheduled to begin in mid to late summer and expected to take two years to complete," said county spokeswoman Patti Michel.

The sale of part of the Northland property to Centax Homes for the construction of a housing development also complicated the matter.

Northland's attorney claimed the sale should have no bearing on the property's tax exemption status. In Johnson's opinion, the sale created a case of "mixed use" — another contributing factor in his decision to revoke the property's tax-exempt status for 2004.

The lawsuit filed by Northland Church is seen as a matter of following proper procedure rather than a contentious battle between a religious entity and a county government.

Johnson, Spoonhour and Tracey all commented that they are hopeful that an agreement can be reached before the matter goes to trial.


Johnson noted that cases involving churches are rare because there isn't usually much question as to how the property is being used. An attempt to resolve the dispute through discussion and documentation as part of the process to determine property tax status is currently being made.

New Smyrna Beach attorney Jordan Stewart is representing Johnson.

The law firm of Lowndes, Drosdick, Doster, Kantor & Reed is representing Northland Church.

Lake Mary sued over rezoning

LAKE MARY — Joseph and Sarabecca Rosier have sued the city of Lake Mary because they object to rezoning on property adjacent to theirs off South Country Club Road near Main Street.

"Basically the rezoning we believe was incorrect," Joe Rosier said in an interview Tuesday. The Rosiers said the zoning change from Agricultural A-1 to Rural Country Estate will allow greater density on the parcel just north of their property and could signal higher density in the southern entrance to Lake Mary.

"We believe that this is natural land out here, It's a great entrance to the city and has ambiance that we don't feel should change," Rosier said.

City Manager John Litton said Lake Mary received the lawsuit March 18. Mayor Thomas Greene said Tuesday that the suit

was not unexpected given that Rosier disagreed with the city Commission's decision to rezone and had hired a court reporter to take verbatim minutes.

The suit says the rezoning of the property owned by Steve and Ramona Lash should have been denied for nine reasons.

The Rosiers contend that the city used incorrect legal descriptions in advertising public notice to neighboring landowners. They said the public notices describe three individual lots rather than one 3-acre proper-

The also alleges that the city staff did not provide the Commission with complete history on the property in question, and that previous Commissions had set a precedent with the property by not changing zoning.

Another objection contained in the suit says there have been not significant changes in the south section of Lake Mary, and that

staff had informed the board that there was, "The Commission did not provide Rosier

and other citizens a fair and impartial public talking with people involved, and that the hearing and did not provide substantial due process rights," the suit alleges.

Individual commissioners were asked by the city attorney to disclose discussions about the rezoning that they had with the property owners. The Rosiers could not cross examine the Commission members as to what information was provided, the suit

The suit also alleges that after the public hearing was closed Feb. 3, the Commission continued to allow testimony from its staff and no one else could make comments.

One commissioner, the lawsuit says, visited the Lash's property either alone or with

It was Bomford, a Longwood Asident, Who Brst confided Bundy that Pedalino had access to remnants of the World Trade Center Bomford praised Bundy for his expediency and enthusiasm in regard to getting a memorial monument built in

In the months following the attacks of 911, Pedalino, a retired New York City firefighter, working in unison with members of the Central Florida Fire Chiefs Association, helped raise \$3 million for the Widows and Orphans Fund, a memorial fund dedicated to helping the children and spouses of New York City public servants who lost their lives in the line of duty.

Among those who perished on 911 was Pedalino's close friend Gerald Barbara, an assistant deputy chief with NYFD.

"We are doing this for them," Pedalino said. Pedalino is an active member of Florida's "We-Will Never Forget 911 Foundation."

In addition to his help with the Longwood memorial, Pedalino has also secured a piece of the WTC to be used for a monument to be built in Woodlawn Cemetery in Orange

The City of Vero Beach recently erected a monument to NYFD firefighters and plans are in place for a part of the WTC to be embedded in a new fire station to be built in Palm Coast

Pedalino said he would love to see a monument erected on the grounds of the Daytona Beach International Speedway. To this point, however, he has run into difficulties trying to determine who has the final say. on the matter.

Sheriff's academy revised, new course starts April 20

SANFORD - The Seminole County Sheriff's Office Community Law Enforcement Academy has undergone a complete re-engineering of the Academy, and the largest restructuring of course material in the last 10 years, according to a Sheriff's Office news release.

The course is now organized in four major blocks of instruction: Seminole Neighborhood Policing/Special Operations, Corrections, Criminal Investigations, and Youth Services.

The course begins with an introduction by Sheriff Don Eslinger and Chief Deputy Sheriff Steve Harriett. That's followed by presentations on patrol operations and use of force, which includes operation of less than lethal weapons. This lays the groundwork for a scenario to start the following week.

During the scenario, students witness an aggravated felony, the fleeing and eluding of an armed suspect, a felony stop and takedown of the suspect's accomplices, and the fleeing of the main suspect.

The case will work its way through many facets of the Sheriff's Office, including Seminole Neighborhood Policing, Special Operations, Forensics, Corrections and the judicial

Also, one evening will be devoted to aggressive driving and DUI enforcement during which students will be offered the opportunity to drive golf carts wearing fatal vision goggles which simulate various degrees of impairment. Additionally, students will be offered the opportunity to par-

* Use a hose to check for

deck leaks at ports and hatches. Renew caulk or gaskets as necessary.

* If equipped, ensure that

* Inspect rubber outdrive bellows for cracked, dried and/or deteriorated spots (look especially in the folds), and replace if suspect.



* Check power steering and power trim oil levels. Replace worn-out zincs.

Inspect outer jacket of control cables. Cracks or swelling indicate corrosion and mean that the cable has to be

Inspect fuel lines, including fill and vent hoses, for softness, brittleness or cracking. Check all joints for leaks and make sure all lines are well supported with non-combustible clips or straps with smooth edges.

ENGINES AND FUEL SYSTEMS:
Inspect fuel tanks, fuel pumps and filters for leaks.
Clamps should be snug and

free of rust. Clean fuel filters.

* Inspect cooling hoses and fittings for stiffness, rot, leaks and/or cracking. Make sure they fit snugly and are double-clamped.

* Every few years, remove and inspect exhaust manifold for corrosion.

Clean and tighten electrical connections, especially both

ends of battery cables. Wirebrush battery terminals and fill cells with distilled water.

Licenses are available at county tax collectors' offices, license agents, online at MyFWC.com or over the phone at 1-868-FISH FLORIDA.

License sellers collect fees of \$2 - \$4.83 in addition to the cost of the license.

BOAT BUYERS AND SELL-ERS CAN THWART ONLINE SCAMMERS

The Internet can be a great tool to buy or sell a boat. However, sometimes its murky waters swirl with fraud, con artists and scams. To help you avoid these unseen shoals, BoatU.S. Consumer Affairs has these tips to help online buyers and sellers protect themselves.

Buying A Boat:
The first rule on protecting yourself online is to never buy a boat unseen. Make a visit to the boat, sea trial it, and have a survey done by a professional marine surveyor.

One potential scam is called "phishing." in which scammers use some tidbit of personal information to lure you into divulging financial data such as credit card numbers, account usernames and passwords, and social security numbers. This is done by using counterfeit e-mails and fraudulent Web sites to fool recipients into believing they are actually providing the sensitive information to a legitimate company.

You can protect yourself by calling the companies whenever a questionable situation arises, and unless you are actually paying for something, never give out any personal informa-

tion to anyone. Online window shopping is fine but the actual purchase is best made in person, unless you know that the Web site is secure and reputable. Also try to obtain a physical address rather than merely a post omice box and a phone number. BoatU.S. strongly urges that boat buyers decline a purchase when sellers don't provide you with this type of information. If the seller is company like a dealer or broker, you can also check with the Better Business Bureau from the seller's area.

Selling a Boat: One of the biggest scams is the oldest one: the "Nigerian" scam, which targets individuals that use Internet classified ads to sell merchandise. Some BoatU.S. members have reported several versions of the scam, which entails an overseas buyer in Nigeria, London, Bulgaria, or Canada attempting to buy a boat with a bank draft written for more than the asking price — with the stipulation that the seller sends back a cashier's check for the overage. Of course, the "buyers" check is counterfeit.

To defeat this scam, use an escrow or alternate payment service to buy the boat, and never send any money back to the purchaser without making certain that their check has cleared your bank. Also be aware that cashier's checks are not considered cash by your bank — the sender of such a check can always put a stop payment on the check.

REGISTER NOW FOR SUMMER CAMP

Do your children long to spend their summer days in the great outdoors? Would they love the chance to learn about wildlife from the experts, or swim, hike and canoe with other children their age?

Then it's time to sign them up for the Ocala Outdoor Adventure Camp at the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission's (FWC) Ocala Conservation Center in the Ocala National Forest.

The summer camp is for boys and girls ages 10-15, and is based on wildlife conservation, firearm safety and outdoor skills. This year the camp offers five one-week sessions with all new programs beginning on June 19.

The primary goal of the camp program is to provide children with the necessary skills and knowledge to become better sportsmen and women, while instilling an awareness of firearm safety, conservation and wildlife stewardship. In addition, campers will fish, canoe, swim, hike

and participate in many other outdoor activities. Tuition is only \$295 per camper per week, and includes lodging, food, program materials and instruction for each session. Each weeklong session is divided into four groups based on their individual focus: Wild about Wildlife, Wet and Wildlife, Hunting and Hunter Safety, and Expedition. All programs are new or significantly revised in format and scope from previous

years.

"Campers in Wild about Wildlife, a new program this year, will have a chance to go wild exploring nature," said Cardinal Collins, director of the Ocala Conservation Center. "They will learn about wildlife management, and enjoy many camp activities including basic wilderness survival and field first-aid training, canoeing, fishing, hiking, shooting sports, and other

hands-on outdoor programs.

For those who simply can't resist the water, the camp another new program aptly named Wet and Wildlife.

"This program gets into the fun of fishing, marine ecology and boating safety. In addition to the traditional camp activities already described above, Wet and Wildlife campers will have the opportunity to become certified in the FWC's Boater Safety Course," said Collins.

For the intermediate level camper, the camp offers the Hunting and Hunter Safety group.

"These campers will learn about wild game and its habitat, and apply this to developing ethical hunting skills. Then they will have a chance to get their hunter safety certification.

They will receive firearm safety as well as shotgun and rifle shooting instruction from National Rifle Association (NRA) certified range safety officers. And, they will receive archery instruction from National Archery Association certified instructors, while participating in numerous shooting range activities. They will also have a chance to participate in many camp activities including basic wilderness survival and field first-aid training, canoeing, fishing, hiking, and other hands-on outdoor programs," said Collins.

The final program is for advanced campers who have already completed a hunter safety course.

"The Expedition group is designed for the camper with an avid interest in the outdoors who has already successfully completed the hunter safety course," said Collins. "Expedition is an outdoor adventure, including a trip into the forest for two days of primitive camping. Before leaving base camp, campers will prepare for this experience by learning the fundamentals of wilderness survival, orienteering, backpacking and campaits preparation."

The Ocala Conservation Center is located on a 57-acre perinsula rich in history and wildlife in beautiful Marion County in north Central Florids. Located just 20 miles east of Ocala, it is beautifully situated on Lake Eaton in the heart of the Ocala National Forest. The facilities are rustic, yet comfortable, with air-conditioned cabies and dising hall. Classrooms are fishing piers, shooting ranges, nature trails, Lake Eaton, and the vast Ocala National Forest.

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




