A GLANCE AROUND OUR COUNTY

Sanford's mayoral race between Whitey Eckstein and Linda Kuhn drew interest beyond Central Florida. Readers of the *Sun-Sentinel* in South Florida opened their newspapers Tuesday morning to find sports columnist Mike Berardino weighing in on the race with a piece titled, "Political process wears on Eckstein."

Berardino is covering the St. Louis Cardinals training camp in Jupiter. With camp winding down and the Cardinals about to leave town, Berardino sought a new angle for his column and focused on the Sanford mayor's race through the eyes of Whitey's son David. According to Berardino, the junior Eckstein is seeing red.

"Don't tell David Eckstein about journalistic ethics or the glories of representative democracy," Berardino wrote. "Don't tell the St. Louis Cardinals shortstop there's no such thing as a biased press."

"He has seen too much over these past few months to maintain such blind faith any longer. He has been disappointed time and again by what his father has endured in his bid to become a small-town mayor."

How did Eckstein become so jaded? According to Berardino's column, the blame lies solely with me.

David claims The Herald exaggerated the seriousness of his father's six-week stay in the hospital in December and January. In this day and age when HMOs and insurance companies have made the overnight hospital stay almost extinct, I'm not sure how you exaggerate a six-week stay in the hospital, particularly when many of those days were in the intensive care unit. Steve Paradis, The Herald's managing editor, did do a story on Whitey Eckstein's health. It was the only story devoted to Whitey's health that ran in the newspaper. In the article titled "Eckstein: 'My health should be fine,'" Paradis described the senior Eckstein's health this way:

"(Eckstein) said he has lived with kidney problems and dialysis for 40 years, including during his time on the Commission. He goes for dialysis three times per week.

"Recent problems that have led to extended hospital stays stemmed from a serious fall when he tripped over his dog. His lungs filled up with blood and fluid, and he was keeping too much water in his body.

"He said doctors have adjusted his dialysis to remove fluid, and he has to limit his water intake.

"I was drinking too much water, and I didn't realize that," he said. (Eckstein) said he only missed two meetings out of probably more than 1,000 meetings, so he suggested he has a good record.

"My health should be fine," he said. "I might be out for a week if I get a kidney."

"Asked if his health concerns would affect his ability to be mayor of Sanford, Eckstein said the mayor's position is part-time and he will not hang out at City Hall all day.

"I think I'm in pretty good shape," he said. "I wouldn't run if I thought (my health) would have an effect."

Sounds like a real hatchet job, huh?

In his Sun-Sentinel column Berardino notes that David Eckstein signed about 100 baseballs as part of a Herald subscription drive three years ago. That's true, and I thanked David for doing so, especially since David voluntarily signed twice as many balls as I had originally asked. He didn't charge a dime for doing so, but evidently the newspaper is now going to pay the price because David believes The Herald was out to get his dad.

"Eckstein, one of the most approachable professional athletes, vows never to grant another interview to his hometown paper," Berardino wrote.

I hope David changes his mind because he's not hurting me, he's hurting our readers.

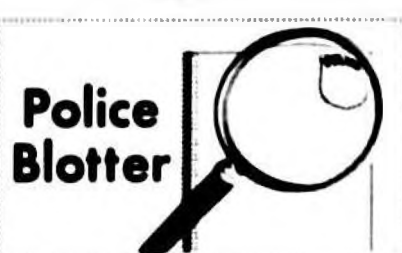

ment we want in Sanford," she said. Once the city reaches build out, the budget will have to stabilize because the tax base will slow down.

"There won't be any more space to build anything," she said. Right now the only open space is on State Road 46 and Rinehart Road. She acknowledged that many areas need rebuilding.

"We need to make sure we continue to enhance what we have," she said.

One aspect that Kuhn wants to avoid in planning is what she called a crisis management culture. It occurs too often in Sanford in connection with development, she said.

"We don't have a master plan or any codified plan," she said. "We need a good master plan in place with development standards. That way there won't be a question of is this what we want or don't want."

The answers for developers will be quick, and they can use the city's master plan to create their designs knowing what the standards are.

Some have said the election caused division in Sanford, but Kuhn envisions the city moving forward together with everyone having a voice in the process.

Although she defeated former Commissioner Herbert "Whitey" Eckstein by just 153 votes, Kuhn said with less than 3,500 people voting, that is a significant margin.

"I don't know about division in Sanford," she said. "I have to tell you I was pleased with the turnout for the runoff. Issues did get attention, but the election is over. We can now work together toward making Sanford the community we want it to be."

One promise that Eckstein ran on was giving a voice to residents toward the start of Commission meetings.

"I don't know that residents have not been given a chance to speak," Kuhn said. She hasn't decided on when to include citizen participation on the agenda.

"We're on the right path."

Property owners, paid professionals and attorneys appear at meetings when they are on the agenda. They should be afforded every opportunity to have their zoning change or other issue heard without having to wait for hours.

"Citizens certainly need to be heard," Kuhn said. She has considered putting citizen participation first on the agenda and including a time limit. "I haven't decided yet," she said. "We will have a little trial and error because I want to be very careful in how the procedure is set."

Probably the question she and all the candidates were asked most frequently during the campaign is what they plan to do in regard to the city manager's contract.

Kuhn said she has been asked that question frequently even since winning the election March 29.

"I stand by my position that the Commission has already voted on that issue and the decision was made that his contract not be renewed," Kuhn said.

As a former law enforcement officer, Kuhn is concerned about the incident at Academy Manor over Easter weekend. A fight broke out and a driver tried to run into police officers and did run over one man.

Kuhn said the incident was discussed in her meeting with police Chief Tooley and his

staff Thursday morning. That neighborhood also holds a large Mother's Day gathering and steps are being taken to prevent any further violence, she said. Law enforcement should not be blamed for the Easter violence.

"We need to give law enforcement and firefighters the proper tools to do their job," she said.

She acknowledged that law enforcement has had an image problem in the past, but crime rates have dropped. "We still have a long ways to go," she admitted.

She told a story about when she and her husband, Bob, decided to move to Palmetto Avenue. Family and friends thought they were nuts, as Kuhn put it, because of the prevalent crime and prostitution in the neighborhood.

Five or six years later, she said, people ask whether there are any more houses that can be fixed up.

Kuhn believes in the Broken Window theory espoused by former New York City Mayor Rudy Guiliani.

"If you leave one window broken, it perpetuates blight," the new mayor explained. Fix the problem when it occurs, she said, that way it does not get so far out of control that it becomes impossible or difficult to correct.

Realistically, she said, these changes will not happen overnight.

"We need to continue to have that vision and strive to raise the bar," Kuhn said. "The First Street project is the first step."

Buildings on First Street have been worked on and brought up to code as the streetscape project took place.

"Once things are in place, that will start a snowball effect," she predicted. Absentee ownership is starting to turn around, she suggested, and events like Alive After Five have begun to paint a new image of Sanford.

"We're on the right path," Kuhn said. "We just need to continue moving that way."

The U.S. government will pay 50 percent of the cost. The state of Florida will pay 25 percent and local county and city governments along the route would be responsible for the final 25 percent of the funding.

According to Olore, \$50 million dollars in state money has already been set aside for the project. Olore is confident the federal funds can be obtained.

Mica has also secured \$500,000 to be used for a viability study and the design process for stations in Winter Park and Lake Mary. An additional \$5 million in federal dollars has been secured by Mica for intermodal station development.

The information gathered from that study will then be used in conjunction with information and input gathered from the city leaders from the cities along the rail route.

The last remaining hurdle in the funding stage of the project is getting local county and city governments on board. In a letter recently sent to Longwood City Administrator John Drago, the FDOT asked that each city along the route provide some general information about possible locations each city had in mind.

Although he was pleased by the possibility of a commuter rail system passing through Longwood, a city not served by Lynx bus service, John Drago cautioned those in attendance at the recent City Commission meeting, "Not to hold your breaths." He acknowledged that final plans for the route are not in place, meaning until they are, no one should get their hopes too high.

In addition to the construction of a train station just off of Ronald Reagan Boulevard, near downtown Longwood, city leaders discussed the construction of a privately owned themed restaurant to be constructed next to, or adjoined with, to the train station.

The commuter rail system would provide easy access to city events such as the Longwood Arts Festival and the parking lot could be used to alleviate parking in conjunction

with city events.

The only potential negative aspect of the project that was discussed was the possibility of some traffic delays as the trains pass through the various cities during rush hour. Because the trains would consist of passenger cars only, the delays would be minimal.

"This is part of a three-pronged approach relieve traffic for those commuting along the I-4 corridor," according to Olore.

The other two parts of the solution are the continued improvements to the general use lanes and interchanges on I-4 and express lanes along I-4.

Upon final approval, construction on the initial leg of the project would begin in 2009. That initial segment would run from Debary to the Downtown Amtrak station. A second construction phase, set to begin in 2011, would complete the route, enabling rail

travel as far as Polk County Boulevard, in Osceola County.

When asked how the response has been from the various cities along the proposed route, Olore stated that every city she has been in touch with has had a positive response to project.

Lake Mary City Manager John Litton said: "The concept makes a lot of sense, but it has to be done right, and I think the way Congressman Mica has presented it will work. We are actively looking at property already for a rail station."

Sanford City Manager Al Grieshaber Jr., said Sanford likes the idea of a rail system.

"There's no doubt that the city of Sanford supports the commuter rail project and looks forward to its Sanford Station along State Road 46. We think that it will give our residents easy access and be a welcome alternative to traffic congestion on I-4."

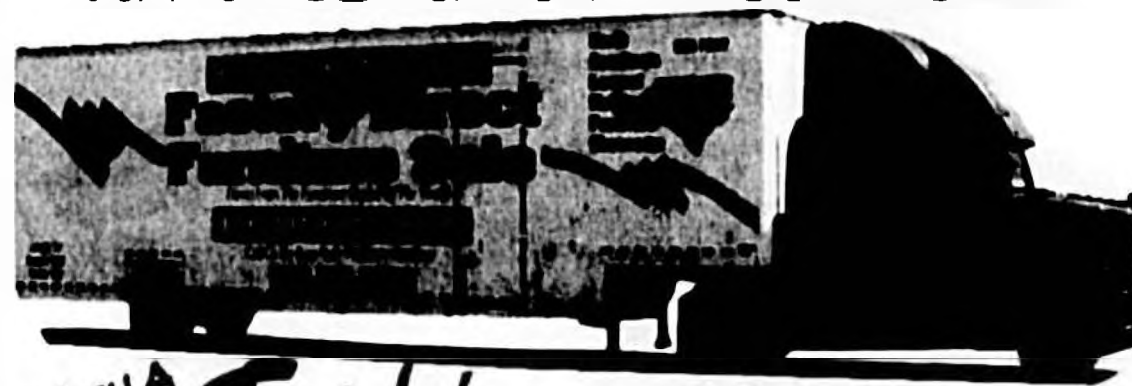

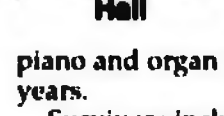

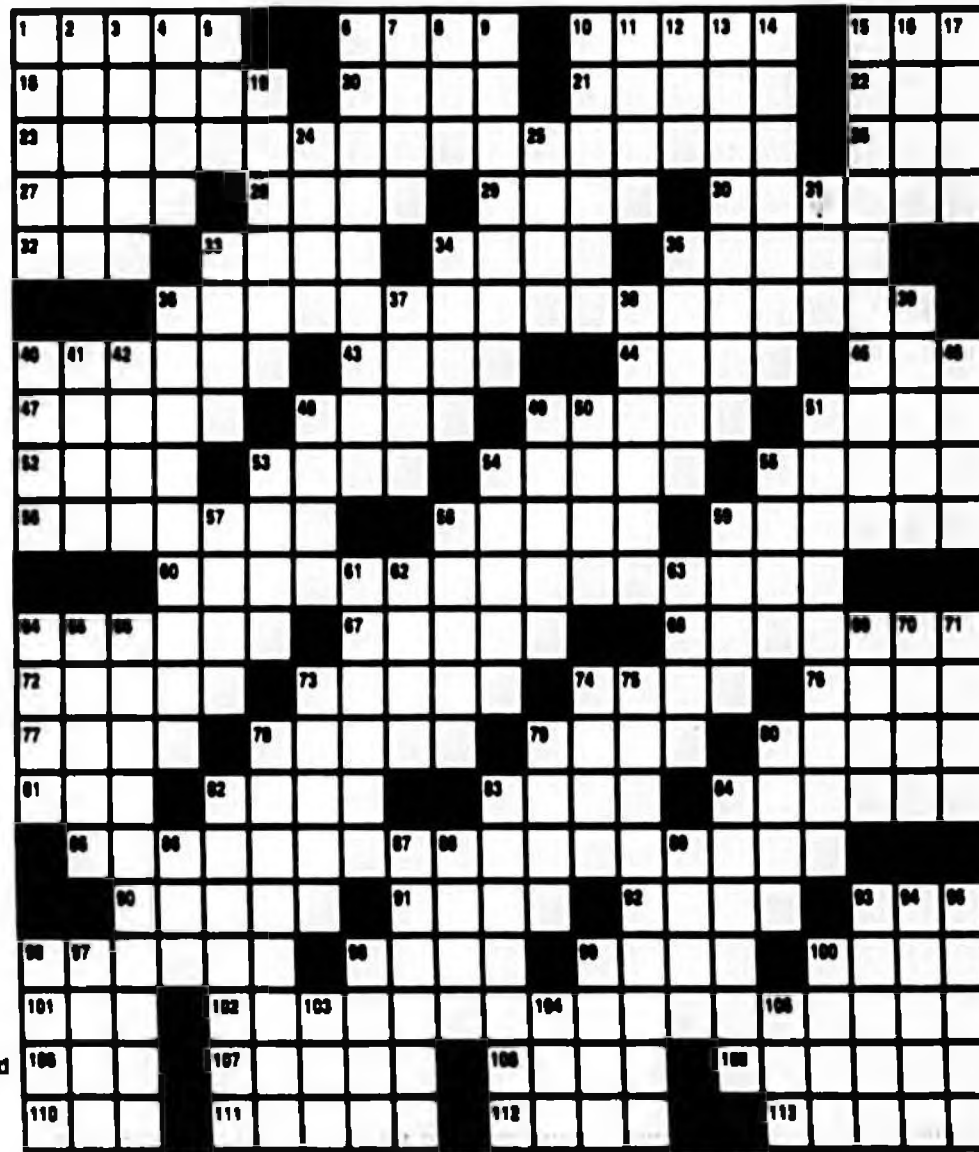

Welcome to Stetson's Corner, where weekly we hope to share a bit of what is good about the Village of Geneva. This column is dedicated to a man who did the same - Deputy Sheriff Gene "Stetson" Gregory, who was killed in the line of duty July 8, 1998, in the place he was sworn to protect, but which could not protect him. Geneva will never be the same because of Deputy Gregory... it will be better.

On March 25, more than 100 teens traveled from Longwood, Casselberry, Eustis, Leesburg, Sanford, and Oviedo to three Seminole County Natural Lands Wilderness Areas to perform service as part of a three-day Youth Conference. The youth, age 14 to 18 were participating in a service project as part of the "I AM" themed event, sponsored by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

They were learning - and showing - who they are by what they choose to do.

This day they chose to help with a variety of activities to benefit the Natural Lands Program and its acres and acres of hurricane ravaged landscape.

"I AM ... searching for turtle burrows," said Sarah, "and if we find one we place a flag on the side of it so it can be monitored later."

"I AM ... picking up trash because it helps the environment," offered Sean as he cleaned up the roadside in Geneva, "and doing service feels good and I'm having a good time."

"I AM ... helping the environment by providing shelter for a snake," replied Emily when asked about her pine straw gathering and sorting activity. "I'm here for service but I'm having fun."

"I AM ... flagging turtles and it was hot, but lots of fun," commented Hannah as she rested after three hours of working at Lake Proctor Wilderness Area in Geneva.

"I AM ... much more aware of how much litter people throw on the side of the road," lamented Liz

as she worked at the Geneva Wilderness Area to clean up trash left

behind by visitors and passers-by. "I'm glad I came today."

"I AM ... taking home this awesome cow skull that I found at the Chuluota Wilderness Area," Rachel informed us. "We were clearing a wide enough area for fire trucks to get in for a prescribed burn and it was right beside the fence. So I climbed over, picked it up and now I can put it in my room!"

"I think everything went well, we got a lot accomplished," reported Brian Suber, Land Management Specialist with the county program.

Said Natural Lands Volunteer Program Manager, Amy Raub of the service event, "I think overall the day went very well. We flagged over 60 gopher tortoise burrows at Geneva, cleared thousands of coral ardesia seeds off plants, picked up all trash bordering CR 426, in the parking lot and in the hammock. At Lake Proctor, participants worked on clearing trails, pulling Sand Pine Seedlings and then finished the day with a splash collecting bullfrog tadpoles for the Nature Center. At Chuluota, students cleared the last of the hurricane debris from trails and fire lines and collected trash. Quite a bit of work was accomplished and I think that everyone had a great time!"

Additionally, one energetic group scrubbed and shined the Yarrowborough Nature Center building at the Geneva Wilderness Area. I AM ... impressed!

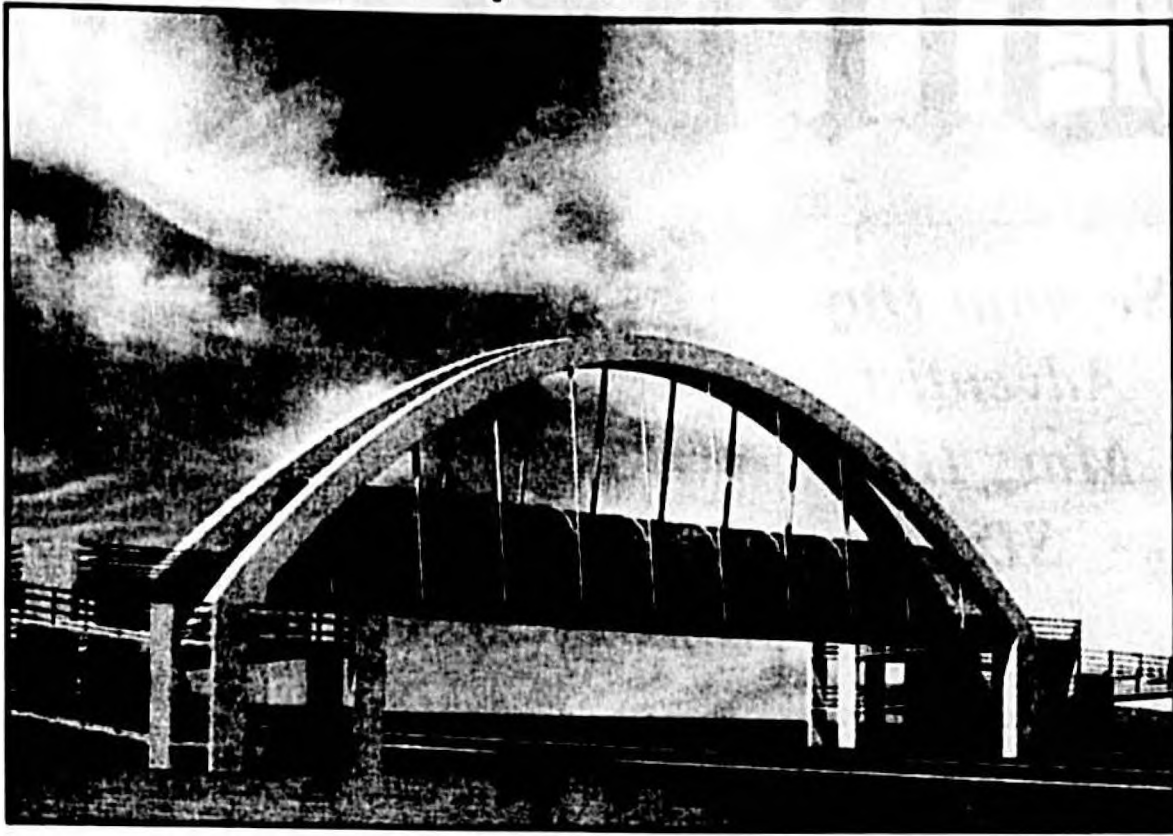

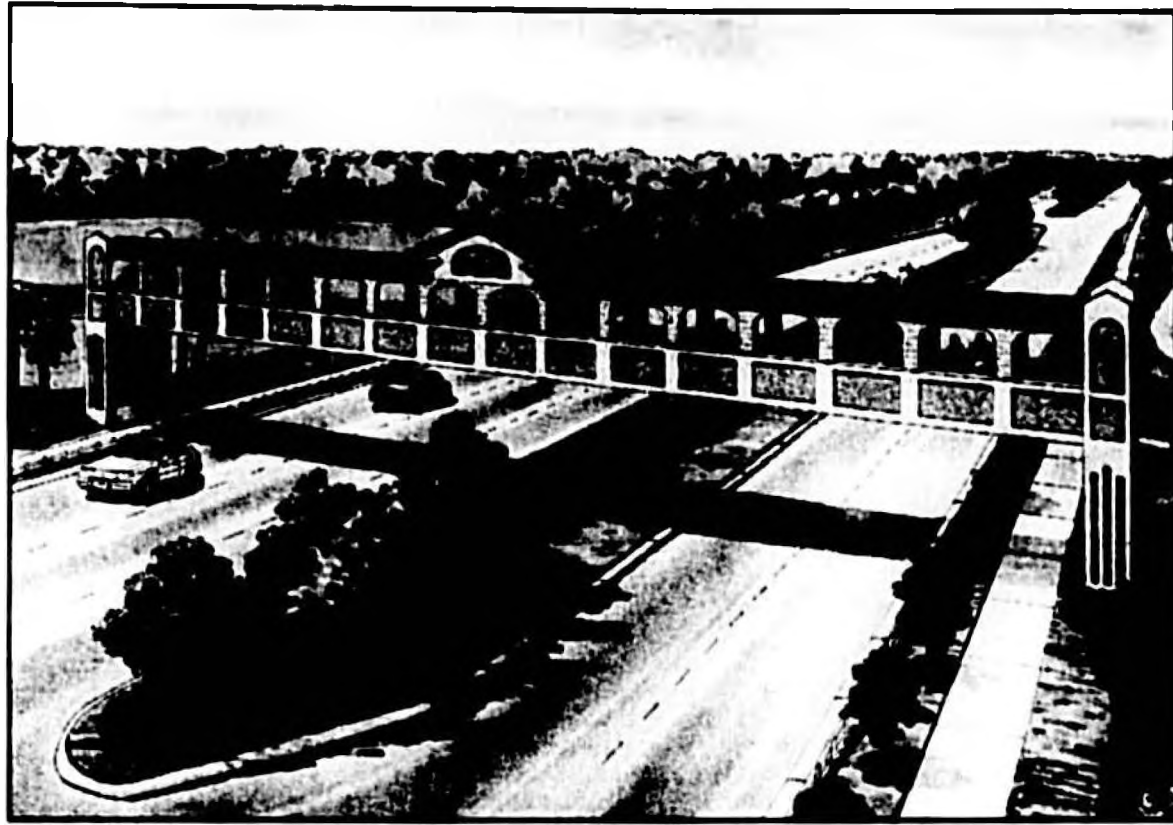

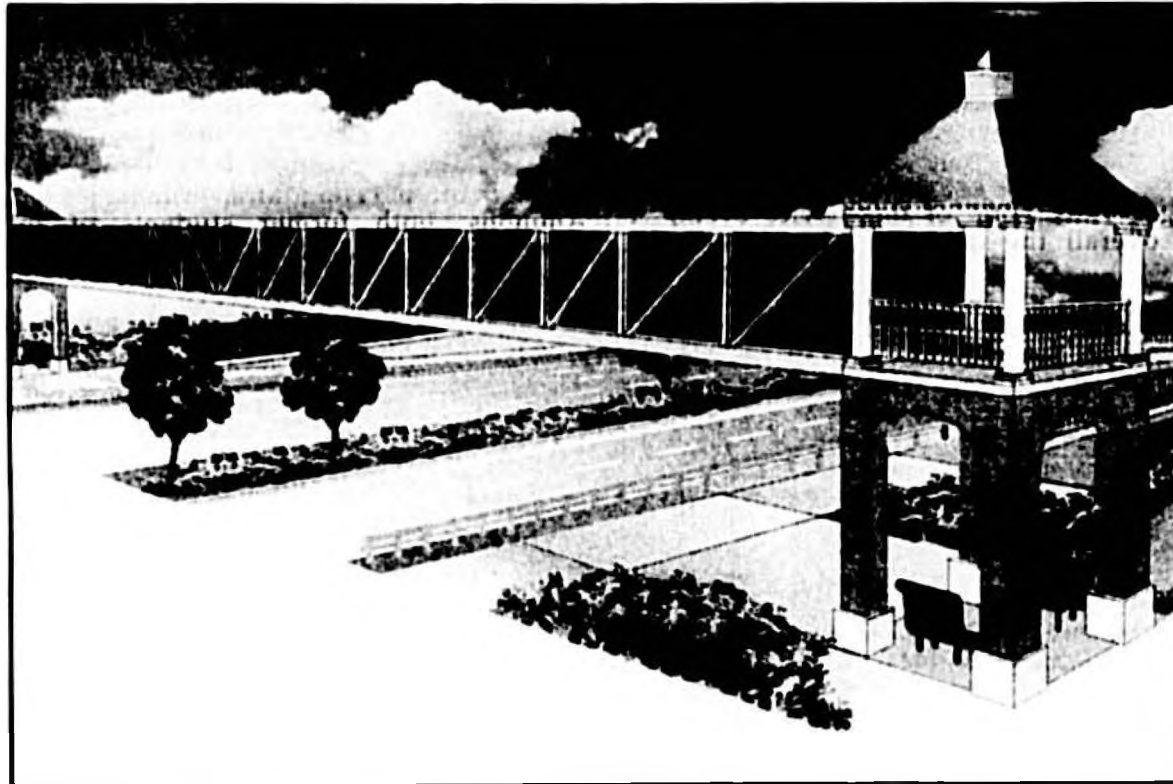

lion. The first proposal is an enclosed bridge with chain-link fence along the walkway. McCollum said it would be a pre-cast structure that could be built in six months according to the construction company. (See renderings, this page.) Mayor Thomas Greene had reservations about the chain fence, and Commissioner Gary Brender said special consideration had to be made for this bridge which will be used primarily by elementary school children. McCollum said usage by children was considered in all the proposals.

The second concept, that came in a close second in the rankings, is the most expensive at \$3.9 million. This one looked more like a covered bridge. It has a roof and a welded mesh fabric covering the walkway. The ramps leading to the bridge have look-outs over the ponds on either end.

"Beauty is in the eye of the beholder, but this has a very different design," McCollum said in explaining the second proposal.

Commissioners brought up

the fact that the much larger pedestrian overpass spanning Interstate 4 in Lake Mary cost just \$3.5 million. McCollum responded that that was four years ago and construction materials have increased substantially.

The third proposal would cost \$3.5 million. McCollum said the design is different again and would include pointed roofs on the ends with mesh across the top of the actual bridge. A sitting area was planned below the ramps on either end. The ramps on this proposal would be less compact, he said, with two levels.

Greene said the Mediterranean design of the second proposal would fit better with future plans for the downtown area. Brender like the roof over the second proposal as well to keep the students dry as they cross the bridge.

Commissioner George Duryea said the cover would cut down on light and may create a security issue on the bridge.

The number one concern, however, on all the concepts is the problem of having chil-

dren 15 to 20 feet off the ground on ramps that are not covered.

Commissioners Brender and Michael McLean were concerned about the artists' renderings showing what looked like a 4-foot fence on the ramps.

Commissioner Janet Jernigan said she didn't like the idea of an overpass, but she had the same safety concerns.

"I can just see a child saying, 'I bet you can't jump,'" she explained, adding that there is the potential for young people to throw things.

Greene suggested that a lot of parents are still walking with children in elementary school.

It is possible to have crossing guards keep an eye on the situation as well.

Whatever concept is chosen for Lake Mary Boulevard would make a logical choice for the second overpass on Rinehart Road, McCollum said.

"We might try to use the same design on the other end of the city," he said.

"It's something to think about."

for compliance with storm water drainage regulations.

By January 2004 the demolition work had been completed, but no new construction had begun. In assessing the property for 2004 tax purposes, Johnson denied Northland's tax exempt status and assessed a property tax of \$30,581 for the property valued at \$1,663,903. The Northland Church properties on Dog Track Road are tax exempt and are not part of the lawsuit.

When determining tax-exempt status, two main factors come in to play: ownership and usage. Ownership is not an issue in the Northland lawsuit.

The suit filed by Northland states: "Since 2001 Northland has been using the property from time to time for church related religious purposes and has been preparing the property for the construction of a church sanctuary, church school and related recreational facilities."

The lawsuit also states that prayer meetings, church committee meetings, gatherings of the board of elders and other church related activities have taken place on the property in question, which in the eyes of the Northland community constitutes "church use." It concludes that the property should qualify for tax exempt status.

When disputing a tax assessment, the parties involved have the right to take their case to the Value Adjustment Board to plea their case to an independent magistrate.

In the fall of 2004, Northland brought their case

before the Board. The magistrate ruled in favor of the property appraiser Johnson's assessment, and Northland's request for tax exemption for the property was again denied.

Northland Church then made a "Good Faith" payment, paying the full amount of taxes owed. Northland now hopes to recoup that payment as a result of the lawsuit filed in February.

"We are convinced the property is exempt from property taxes. We strongly disagree with Mr. Johnson's appraisal," said Northland's Tim Tracey.

Complicating the dispute is an agreement reached between Seminole County and Northland Church that provides for the extension of Seminola Boulevard (Lake Avenue).

Northland's Attorney, James Spoonhour, noted that the lack of a road extension has hampered the construction efforts by making it difficult to reach the property. There is also a concern on Northland's behalf that a completed church with limited access would create a multitude of problems.

Johnson, the county property appraiser, acknowledged that the road extension issue does create some timing issues, but the lack of a road extension was not seen as a determining factor in his decision to deny Northland's tax exempt status for the property in dispute.

Johnson's reasoning was that "it doesn't require a four-lane divided roadway, with a median and irrigation sprinklers, to begin work on a construction project."

"Construction on the extension of Seminola Boulevard is scheduled to begin in mid to late summer and expected to take two years to complete," said county spokeswoman Patti Michel.

The sale of part of the Northland property to Centax Homes for the construction of a housing development also complicated the matter.

Northland's attorney claimed the sale should have no bearing on the property's tax exemption status. In Johnson's opinion, the sale created a case of "mixed use" — another contributing factor in his decision to revoke the property's tax-exempt status for 2004.

The lawsuit filed by Northland Church is seen as a matter of following proper procedure rather than a contentious battle between a religious entity and a county government.

Johnson, Spoonhour and Tracey all commented that they are hopeful that an agreement can be reached before the matter goes to trial.

Johnson noted that cases involving churches are rare because there isn't usually much question as to how the property is being used. An attempt to resolve the dispute through discussion and documentation as part of the process to determine property tax status is currently being made.

New Smyrna Beach attorney Jordan Stewart is representing Johnson.

The law firm of Lowndes, Drosdick, Doster, Kantor & Reed is representing Northland Church.

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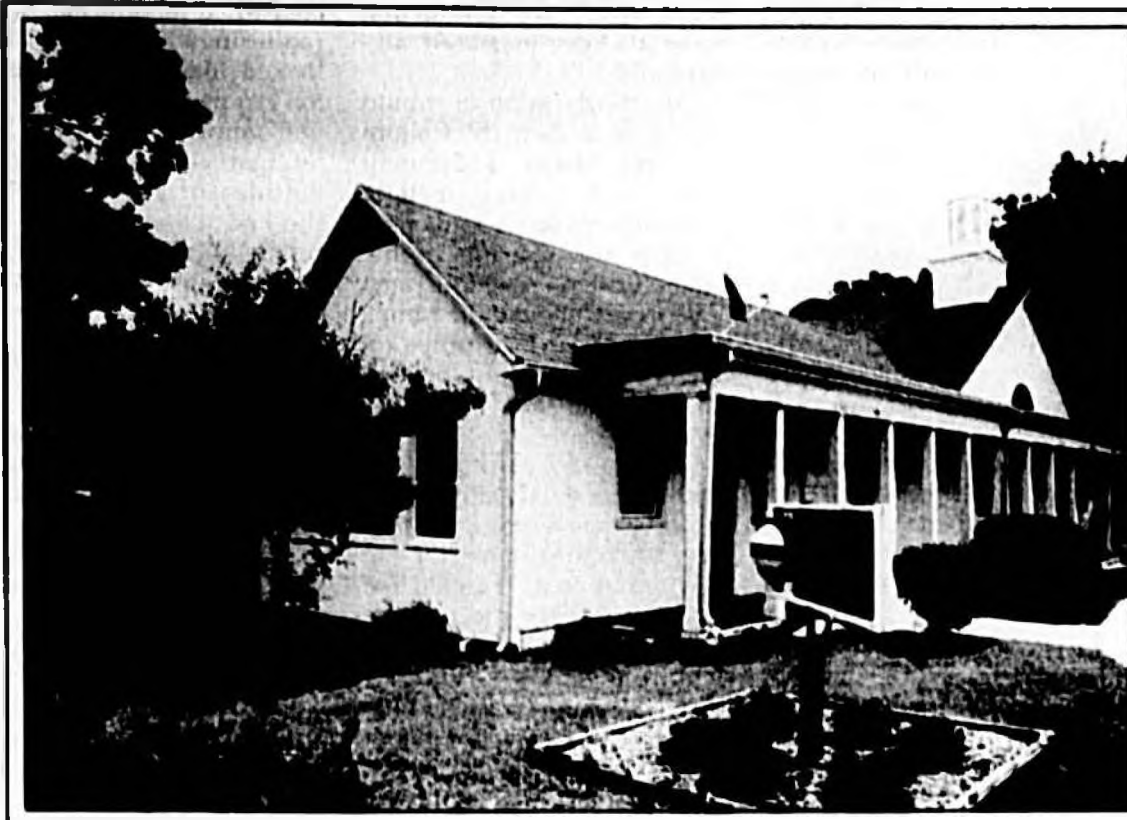

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Lake Mary sued over rezoning

LAKE MARY — Joseph and Sarabeca Rosier have sued the city of Lake Mary because they object to rezoning on property adjacent to theirs off South Country Club Road near Main Street.

"Basically the rezoning we believe was incorrect," Joe Rosier said in an interview Tuesday. The Rosiers said the zoning change from Agricultural A-1 to Rural Country Estate will allow greater density on the parcel just north of their property and could signal higher density in the southern entrance to Lake Mary.

"We believe that this is natural land out here. It's a great entrance to the city and has an ambiance that we don't feel should change," Rosier said.

City Manager John Litton said Lake Mary received the lawsuit March 18. Mayor Thomas Greene said Tuesday that the suit

was not unexpected given that Rosier disagreed with the city Commission's decision to rezone and had hired a court reporter to take verbatim minutes.

The suit says the rezoning of the property owned by Steve and Ramona Lash should have been denied for nine reasons.

The Rosiers contend that the city used incorrect legal descriptions in advertising public notice to neighboring landowners. They said the public notices describe three individual lots rather than one 3-acre property.

The suit also alleges that the city staff did not provide the Commission with complete history on the property in question, and that previous Commissions had set a precedent with the property by not changing zoning.

Another objection contained in the suit says there have been not significant changes in the south section of Lake Mary, and that staff had informed the board that there was.

"The Commission did not provide Rosier

and other citizens a fair and impartial public hearing and did not provide substantial due process rights," the suit alleges.

Individual commissioners were asked by the city attorney to disclose discussions about the rezoning that they had with the property owners. The Rosiers could not cross examine the Commission members as to what information was provided, the suit states.

The suit also alleges that after the public hearing was closed Feb. 3, the Commission continued to allow testimony from its staff and no one else could make comments.

One commissioner, the lawsuit says, visited the Lash's property either alone or with Lash.

Rosier said Greene was the one who visited the property. The mayor said he did visit the property, but that it was purely coincidental that Lash showed up while he was there.

Greene said there is no prohibition against

talking with people involved, and that the commissioners stated they would make their decisions only on the testimony or evidence heard during the public meeting.

The lawsuit also calls the property change spot zoning because land around the property is the same size. The zoning change could allow three homes to be built on the property where only one was allowed in the former A-1 zone.

Litton said the city was waiting to hear from the Lashes to see if they would join their side in the suit. No one knew when the matter would be brought before a judge.

"I believe there's an attitude downtown to cement over the area," Rosier said. More homes and buildings increase the tax base, he added.

"This has to do with changing a lifestyle in the city that I don't think should be changed," he said. "When people don't say anything, well, there's too many changes taking place in the whole county now."

Piece of history comes to Longwood

LONGWOOD — A piece of steel girder from the World Trade Centers will serve as a focal point for a memorial planned in Longwood to honor members of the New York Fire and Police departments and the New York Port Authority.

James "Jim" Bomford, legislative representative of the 10-13 Association of America, New York Police Department, Brooklyn and Staten Island, and John Pedalino, past-president of the Fire Department New York Retiree's Central Florida Division presented Longwood Mayor Butch Bundy and city commissioners with the steel piece recovered from the World Trade Center in the aftermath of the terrorist attacks on Sept. 11, 2001.

The piece had been kept in a Port Authority warehouse located on the grounds of Kennedy Airport. Welded to the top of the piece are the words: WTC 911.

When completed, the Longwood 911 memorial will be among the first in Central Florida.

Plans for the exact location and type of monument to be constructed will be discussed at the next City Commission meeting, March 21.

Possible locations include an area in front of City Hall, a spot

in one of the Longwood's city parks, or a place in one of Longwood's cemeteries.

City commissioners also have to decide if they want to build a stand-alone monument in remembrance of 911 or incorporate the piece from the World Trade Center into a larger monument that would also include all branches of the United States military.

According to Bomford, the memorial will be engraved with the names of the 34 firefighters, 23 police officers and 40 Port Authority officers who lost their lives on Sept. 11, 2001. Among

those Port Authority officers to be honored is Sirius, a beloved Port Authority dog who perished in the attack.

Bomford, a retired New York City Police officer who lost 50 friends on 9-11, said: "The heroes of that day are already being forgotten; they should never be forgotten."

It was Bomford, a Longwood resident, who first contacted Bundy that Pedalino had access to remnants of the World Trade Center. Bomford praised Bundy for his expediency and enthusiasm in regard to getting a memorial monument built in

Longwood.

In the months following the attacks of 911, Pedalino, a retired New York City firefighter, working in unison with members of the Central Florida Fire Chiefs Association, helped raise \$3 million for the Widows and Orphans Fund, a memorial fund dedicated to helping the children and spouses of New York City public servants who lost their lives in the line of duty.

Among those who perished on 911 was Pedalino's close friend Gerald Barbara, an assistant deputy chief with NYFD.

"We are doing this for them," Pedalino said. Pedalino is an active member of Florida's "We Will Never Forget 911 Foundation."

In addition to his help with the Longwood memorial, Pedalino has also secured a piece of the WTC to be used for a monument to be built in Woodlawn Cemetery in Orange County.

The City of Vero Beach recently erected a monument to NYFD firefighters and plans are in place for a part of the WTC to be embedded in a new fire station to be built in Palm Coast.

Pedalino said he would love to see a monument erected on the grounds of the Daytona Beach International Speedway. To this point, however, he has run into difficulties trying to determine who has the final say on the matter.

Sheriff's academy revised, new course starts April 20

SANFORD — The Seminole County Sheriff's Office Community Law Enforcement Academy has undergone a complete re-engineering of the Academy, and the largest restructuring of course material in the last 10 years, according to a Sheriff's Office news release.

The revised course begins Wednesday, April 20 and will last for 15 weeks.

The course is now organized in four major blocks of instruction: Seminole Neighborhood Policing/Special Operations, Corrections, Criminal Investigations, and Youth Services.

The course begins with an introduction by Sheriff Don Eslinger and Chief Deputy Sheriff Steve Harriett. That's followed by presentations on patrol operations and use of force, which includes operation of less than lethal weapons. This lays the groundwork for a scenario to start the following week.

During the scenario, students witness an aggravated felony, the fleeing and eluding of an armed suspect, a felony stop and takedown of the suspect's accomplices, and the fleeing of the main suspect.

The case will work its way through many facets of the Sheriff's Office, including Seminole Neighborhood Policing, Special Operations, Forensics, Corrections and the judicial process.

Also, one evening will be devoted to aggressive driving and DUI enforcement during which students will be offered the opportunity to drive golf carts wearing fatal vision goggles which simulate various degrees of impairment.

Additionally, students will be offered the opportunity to participate in ride-along with a uniformed deputy sheriff, fire Sheriff's Office weapons at the gun range, and observe our 911 operators in the Telecommunications Center, according to the Sheriff's Office Web site.

To be eligible, one must: Live or work in Seminole County; be at least 19 years of age; possess a valid driver's license; not have been convicted of a felony; file an application with the Sheriff's Office.

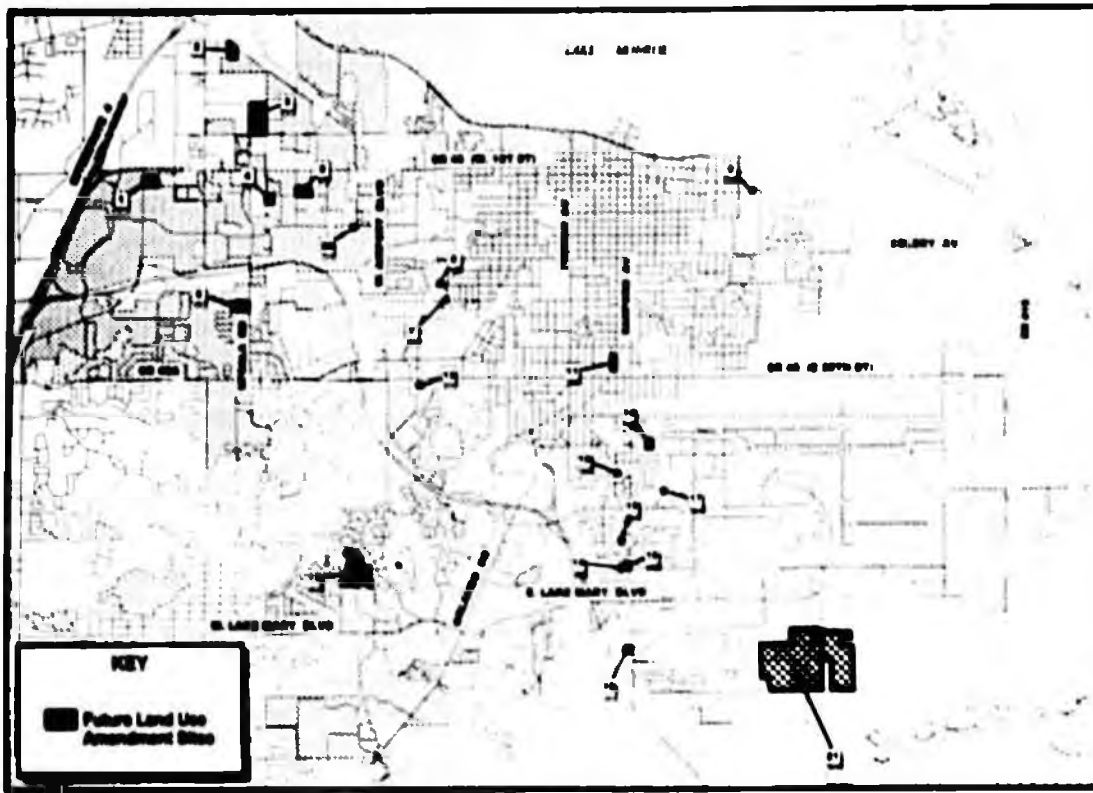

Sanford pastor ready to have second and third book published

SANFORD — A Sanford pastor and resident is about to have his second and third devotional book published.

PublishAmerica, a traditional publishing company specializing in books written by new and previously undiscovered talent said they believe Carnes is a perfect example of the type of books they publish.

"We were already familiar with Mr. Carnes' work from his first book, Spiritual Food for the Soul. In Make Life Count, the first chapter, Day 1 discusses failure, and says "failing doesn't make you a failure." Carnes then goes on to discuss past president's, such as Abraham Lincoln.

"Abraham Lincoln's first business as owner of a dry goods store was a flop," the author writes.

At the end of the Day 1 section he writes a quote and asks that the reader read the quote everyday that week. "I expect to pass through this life but once. Any good therefore that I can do, any kindness, any encouragement, or any

investment that I can make in the life of others, let me do it immediately. Let me not wait until a more opportune time, for I may never get this chance again."

Carnes second and third books are due out on the market later this year. One is titled, Spiritual Food for the Soul and What I Wish I'd Known: What I didn't learn in college. Carnes said that Spiritual Food for the Soul is much like his first book.

What I Wish I'd Known is about life lessons, leadership, attitudes for life and other things that you don't learn in college.

Examples include: Why people disagree with you; where to find help with your own personal weaknesses; defining my own ministry; how to build and lead a voluntary force; how to define purpose and cast vision and living the example you want people to follow.

"Basically, that's the book," Carnes said.

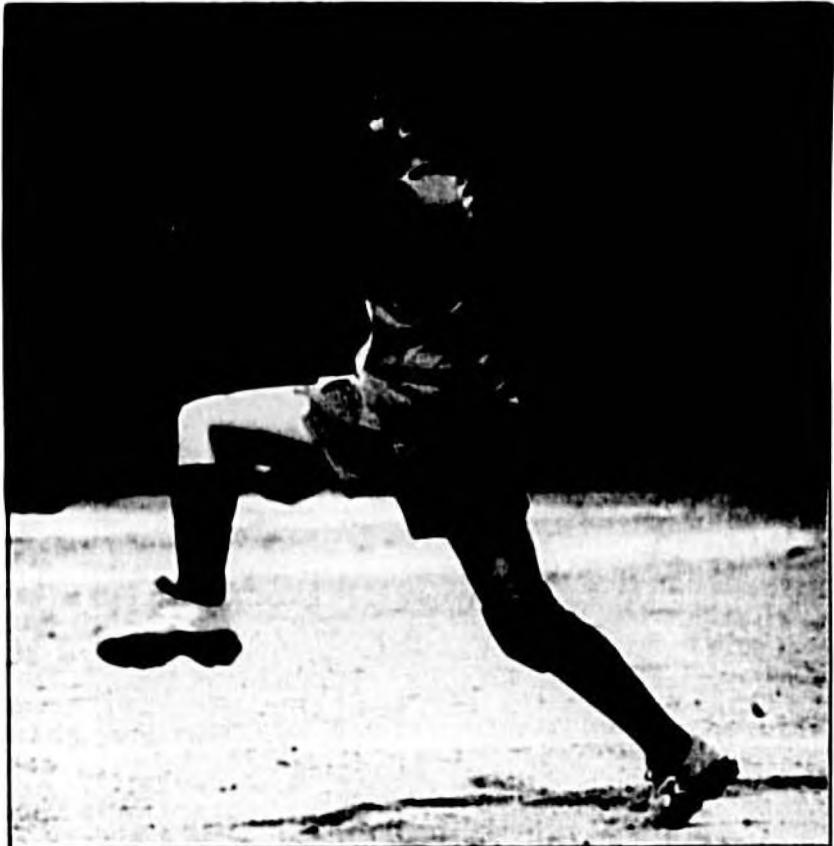
Lake Highland appeared to be in control behind the pitching of Beth Laurence, another former Rams standout, but the Seminole offense came alive in the sixth.

Spring into boating with checklist

To help boaters have a trouble-free summer boating season, BoatU.S., the nation's largest recreational boating association, has a spring commissioning checklist. Whether you have a power or sailboat, inboard or outboard, following this checklist is an easy way to get ready for the boating season.

BEFORE YOU LAUNCH:

- Inspect and lubricate sea-cocks. Hoses and hose clamps should be inspected and replaced as necessary.

- Replace deteriorated zincs.

- Inspect prop(s) for ding, pitting and distortion. Make sure cotter pins are secure. Grip the prop and try moving the shaft - if it's loose, the collar bearing may need to be replaced.

- Check to make sure the rudderstock hasn't been bent.

- Inspect the hull for blisters, distortions and stress cracks.

- Make sure your engine intake sea strainer is free of corrosion and properly secured.

- Check the engine shaft and rudder stuffing boxes for looseness. After the boat is launched, be sure to check these as well as through-hulls for leaks.

- Use a hose to check for deck leaks at ports and hatches. Renew caulk or gaskets as necessary.

- If equipped, ensure that stern drain plug is installed.

OUTDRIVES and OUTBOARD ENGINES:

- Inspect rubber outdrive bellows for cracked, dried and/or deteriorated spots (look especially in the folds), and replace if suspect.

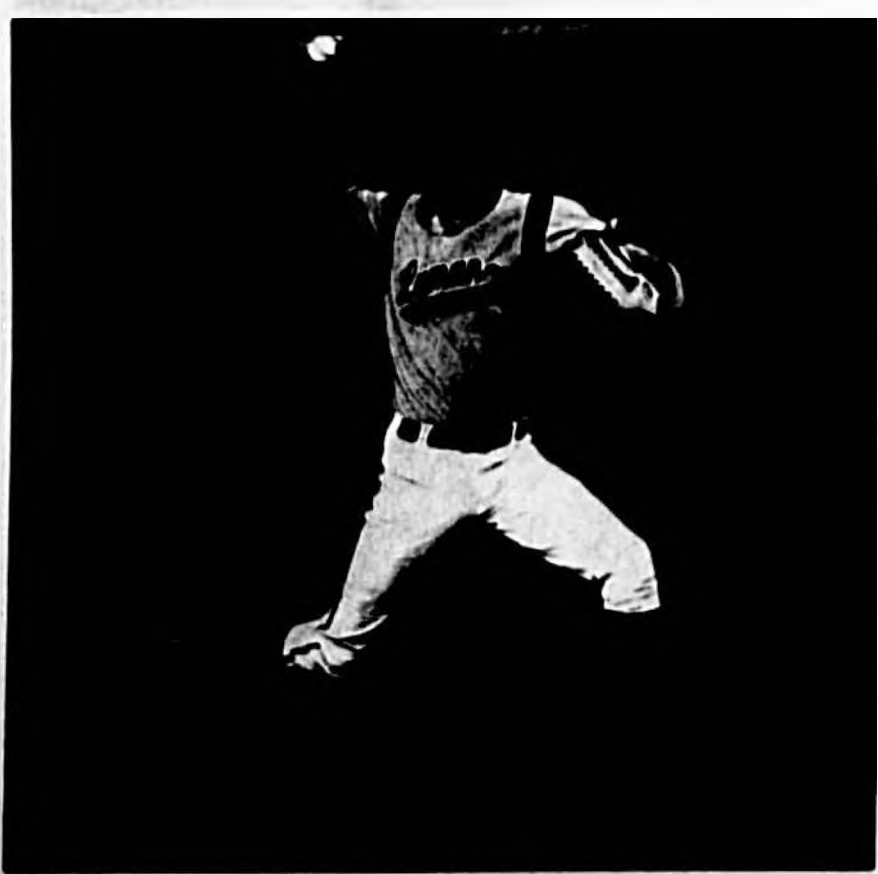
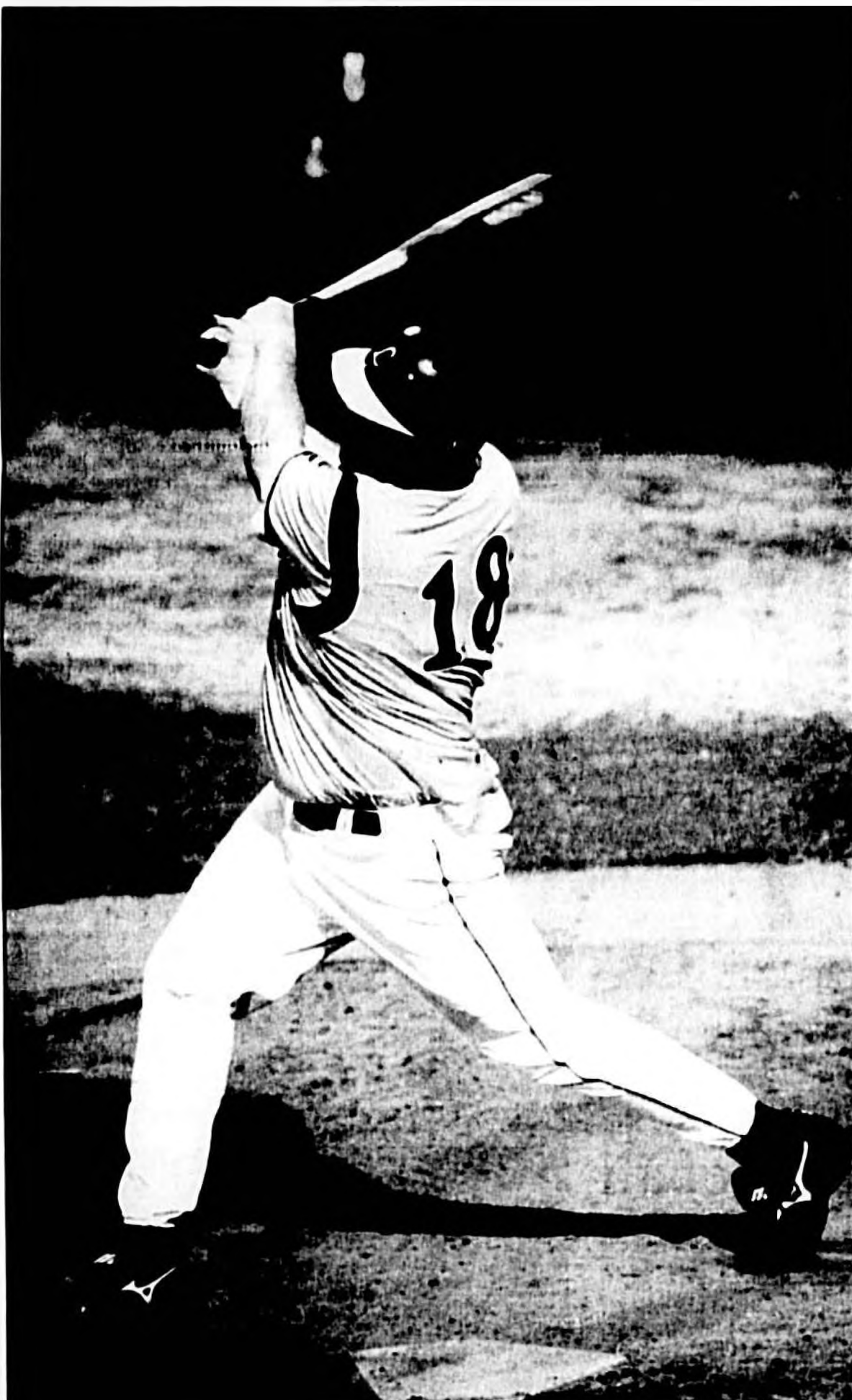

Lake Brantley's Rickie Weeks continued to make quick progress in the Milwaukee Brewers organization, playing in 17 games this spring, the second baseman hit .275 (11-for-40) with eight runs scored, two doubles and two triples and four RBI and going 3-for-4 on stolen base attempts.

A rib-cage injury had cost Weeks a run at some Arizona Fall League records prior to Christmas as he was sidelined for the last week of the prestigious AFL and finished with a .382 batting average, six home runs and 21 RBIs in 22 games for the Scottsdale Scorpions, who went 21-15 and won the league's American Division.

Brewers farm director Reid Nichols characterized Weeks' injury as a "tweak" and said it was not serious.

"We just didn't want to take any chances with

him," Nichols said.

Weeks finished with a .520 on-base percentage and .737 slugging percentage, just a few points shy of the league records Kansas City's Ken Harvey set in 2002. Harvey, who played first base for the Royals last season, posted a .537 OBP and slugged .752 for Scottsdale to set the AFL marks.

The performance was welcome news for Brewers observers, who watched Weeks play through an up and down season at Double-A Huntsville. In his first season at that level, Weeks batted .259 with eight homers, 42 RBIs and 107 strikeouts in 133 games. He was hit by a pitch a whopping 28 times.

Thanks partly to his strong fall season, Weeks is headed to Triple-A Nashville next year.

"That solidified his opportunity at Triple-A," Nichols said.

Seminole High's Tim Raines Jr. also got a lot of exposure again this spring, but has been optioned to AAA Ottawa to begin the season.

Raines got into 18 games, most as a pinch-runner or late-inning defensive replacement, but was still 3-for-25 (.120) at the plate with three runs scored and three RBI. He also was 4-for-4 in stolen base attempts.

Two other local products will be coaching this season at Sanford's Tim Raines Sr. will be the first base coach for Manager Ozzie Guillen and the Chicago White Sox and Rick Eckstein will be a coach in the Washington Nationals, formerly the Montreal Expos, Minor League system.

Check power steering and power trim oil levels. Replace worn-out zincs.
Inspect outer jacket of control cables. Cracks or swelling indicate corrosion and mean that the cable has to be replaced.
Inspect fuel lines, including fill and vent hoses, for softness, brittleness or cracking. Check all joints for leaks and make sure all lines are well supported with non-combustible clips or straps with smooth edges.

ENGINES AND FUEL SYSTEMS:
Inspect fuel tanks, fuel pumps and filters for leaks. Clamps should be snug and free of rust. Clean fuel filters.
Inspect cooling hoses and fittings for stiffness, rot, leaks and/or cracking. Make sure they fit snugly and are double-clamped.
Every few years, remove and inspect exhaust manifold for corrosion.
Clean and tighten electrical connections, especially both

ends of battery cables. Wire-brush battery terminals and fill cells with distilled water.
Inspect bilge blower hose for leaks.

SAILBOAT RIGGING:
Inspect fittings for cracks and rust. Inspect wire halyards and running backstays for "fishhooks" and rust.
Remove tape on turnbuckles and lubricate threads, preferably with Teflon. Replace old tape with fresh tape.
Recaulk through-deck chainplates as necessary (generally, once a decade).

TRAILERS:
Inspect tire treads and sidewalls for cracks or lack of tread and replace as necessary. Check air pressure. Don't forget the spare!
Inspect bearings and repack as necessary.
Test tail and back-up lights. Test winch to make sure it's working properly.
Inspect trailer frame for rust. Sand and paint to prevent further deterioration.

MISCELLANEOUS:
Check expiration dates on

flares and fire extinguishers.
Check stove and remote tanks for loose fittings and leaking hoses.
Inspect bilge pump and float switch to make sure it's working properly.
Inspect dock and anchor lines for chafing.
Update or replace old charts, waterway guides.
Check shore power cable connections for burns, which indicates the cable needs to be replaced.
Make sure your boating license and/or registration is up to date. Don't forget your trailer tags.
Review your boat insurance policy and update coverage if needed. Be sure you have fuel spill insurance coverage.
Make sure you have a properly sized and wearable life jackets in good condition for each passenger, including kids and pets.

Licenses are available at county tax collectors' offices, license agents, online at MyFWC.com or over the phone at 1-888-FISH FLORIDA. License sellers collect fees of \$2-\$4.83 in addition to the cost of the license.

BOAT BUYERS AND SELLERS CAN THWART ONLINE SCAMMERS
The Internet can be a great tool to buy or sell a boat. However, sometimes its murky waters swirl with fraud, con artists and scams. To help you avoid these unseen shoals, BoatU.S. Consumer Affairs has these tips to help online buyers and sellers protect themselves.
Buying A Boat:
The first rule on protecting yourself online is to never buy a boat unseen. Make a visit to the boat, sea trial it, and have a survey done by a professional marine surveyor.
One potential scam is called "phishing," in which scammers use some tidbit of personal information to lure you into divulging financial data such as credit card numbers, account user names and passwords, and social security numbers. This is done by using counterfeit e-mails and fraudulent Web sites to fool recipients into believing they are actually providing the sensitive information to a legitimate company.
You can protect yourself by calling the companies whenever a questionable situation arises, and unless you are actually paying for something, never give out any personal informa-

tion to anyone. Online window shopping is fine but the actual purchase is best made in person, unless you know that the Web site is secure and reputable. Also try to obtain a physical address rather than merely a post office box and a phone number. BoatU.S. strongly urges that boat buyers decline a purchase when sellers don't provide you with this type of information. If the seller is company like a dealer or broker, you can also check with the Better Business Bureau from the seller's area.
Selling a Boat:
One of the biggest scams is the oldest one: the "Nigerian" scam, which targets individuals that use Internet classified ads to sell merchandise. Some BoatU.S. members have reported several versions of the scam, which entails an overseas buyer in Nigeria, London, Bulgaria, or Canada attempting to buy a boat with a bank draft written for more than the asking price — with the stipulation that the seller sends back a cashier's check for the overage. Of course, the "buyers" check is counterfeit.
To defeat this scam, use an escrow or alternate payment service to buy the boat, and never send any money back to the purchaser without making certain that their check has cleared your bank. Also be aware that cashier's checks are not considered cash by your bank — the sender of such a check can always put a stop payment on the check.

REGISTER NOW FOR SUMMER CAMP

Do your children long to spend their summer days in the great outdoors? Would they love the chance to learn about wildlife from the experts, or swim, hike and canoe with other children their age?

Then it's time to sign them up for the Ocala Outdoor Adventure Camp at the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission's (FWC) Ocala Conservation Center in the Ocala National Forest.

The summer camp is for boys and girls ages 10-15, and is based on wildlife conservation, firearm safety and outdoor skills. This year the camp offers five one-week sessions with all new programs beginning on June 19.

The primary goal of the camp program is to provide children with the necessary skills and knowledge to become better sportsmen and women, while instilling an awareness of firearm safety, conservation and wildlife stewardship. In addition, campers will fish, canoe, swim, hike and participate in many other outdoor activities.

Tuition is only \$295 per camper per week, and includes lodging, food, program materials and instruction for each session. Each weeklong session is divided into four groups based on their individual focus: Wild about Wildlife, Wet and Wildlife, Hunting and Hunter Safety, and Expedition. All programs are new or significantly revised in format and scope from previous years.

"Campers in Wild about Wildlife, a new program this year, will have a chance to go wild exploring nature," said Cardinal Collins, director of the Ocala Conservation Center. "They will learn about wildlife management, and enjoy many camp activities including basic wilderness survival and field first-aid training, canoeing, fishing, hiking, shooting sports, and other hands-on outdoor programs."

For those who simply can't resist the water, the camp another new program aptly named Wet and Wildlife.

"This program gets into the fun of fishing, marine ecology and boating safety. In addition to the traditional camp activities already described above, Wet and Wildlife campers will have the opportunity to become certified in the FWC's Boater Safety Course," said Collins.

For the intermediate level camper, the camp offers the Hunting and Hunter Safety group.

"These campers will learn about wild game and its habitat, and apply this to developing ethical hunting skills. Then they will have a chance to get their hunter safety certification."

"They will receive firearm safety as well as shotgun and rifle shooting instruction from National Rifle Association (NRA) certified range safety officers. And, they will receive archery instruction from National Archery Association certified instructors, while participating in numerous shooting range activities. They will also have a chance to participate in many camp activities including basic wilderness survival and field first-aid training, canoeing, fishing, hiking, and other hands-on outdoor programs," said Collins.

The final program is for advanced campers who have already completed a hunter safety course.

"The Expedition group is designed for the camper with an avid interest in the outdoors who has already successfully completed the hunter safety course," said Collins. "Expedition is an outdoor adventure, including a trip into the forest for two days of primitive camping. Before leaving base camp, campers will prepare for this experience by learning the fundamentals of wilderness survival, orienteering, backpacking and campsite preparation."

The Ocala Conservation Center is located on a 57-acre peninsula rich in history and wildlife in beautiful Marion County in north Central Florida. 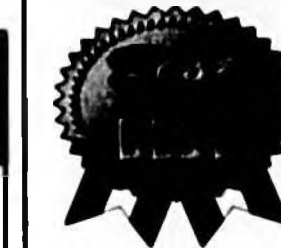
