handle this stuff at a loss in many instances would get cash for their goods and the farmers would get cash for their produce and it would be a good deal for every one. Sanford could have the best public market in the state for the size of the city on account of the great farming country that surrounds us on all sides. The state agent for the University of Florida has the following article in a bulletin recently issued:

Public markets save money to both the producer and the consumer, because they bring the two together. Perhaps the greatest loss in marketing perishable goods comes from deterioration. Of course the consumer must pay a large part of that which is lost in the product which he buys. The producer usually loses all unless he is able to market at the right time.

The public market gives the producer and consumer opportunity to trade direct and save the expense of distribution and the loss from spoiled products. C. K. McQuarrie, state agent for the University of Florida Extension Division, suggests that every city of 20,000 population could support a public market. According to European experience every small town could have a market, but conditions are different here. There are some towns smaller than 20,000, however, which probably would support a market.

The market is a good index to the possibilities of the country surrounding the city. Strangers can learn at a glance what the country is producing.

Politics will soon be a thing of the past and it will be time for us to settle down to the hard cold facts of business and getting the people to home here in the fall and help us to build a big city. I wish that every citizen of Sanford would get in the hard wagon and help build the city. The Palm Beach Post has the right idea of the good citizen of the following:

One duty each man owes to the community is to be a producer. Also for the benefit of the people living in Sanford who cannot get this produce when they want it. No city or town will progress and take upon itself the prominence it ordinarily deserves when the knocker is in evidence! It is not possible for a business or a community to stand still. It must either go forward at the instance of those who are active in framing measures for advancement—or it must gradually retrograde because of the lax methods adopted by those who do not care. There is need in every community for the man who takes hold and does things, for the man who will get behind all good ideas and plans and methods and see that every effort is made to advance the interests of the locality. It is not the man who chooses to allow "some other man who is more used to it" do the work that should be carried on by all who receives the plaudits of the people. Such a man may be excellent in many ways but he is not the sort which really "make" a town or a city.

What every city needs, and needs exclusively is the man who never speaks ill of the place. All localities occasionally have conditions which are not perfect but the man who will keep continually maligning every proposition which is not perfect, and at the same time proffer no way for a betterment, is not a man who advances any place. What every city needs is some man who is ever ready to step into the place where a leader is needed, and play his part. And when all the city, county, community, are of this ilk, there will be seen a town that will quickly grow into a city of a size that will soon have spots that metropolitan airs.

It is a booster. San a booster for a town of one day scattered here and there throughout the year not a booster when there is some special day, wherein it is to be given some gala event, but an earnest, sterling, all day, year, round booster who sees that every good deed and every worthy act for his city.

We need a ball team in Sanford this summer and I hope that all loyal citizens will rally to the call and whomp them up for a good home team. There is nothing that keeps our blood circulating in the summer just like a good ball team. It is the best way to forget your troubles and enjoy an afternoon in the open air.

The advertising manager of the largest Chicago mail order house says:

We have a bureau whose duty it is to read each week's newspapers from all over the country. There is not a paper of any consequence in our trade territory we do not get. The bureau looks over these papers, and when we find a town where the merchants do not advertise in the local paper, we immediately flood that territory with our literature. It always brings results far in excess of the same efforts put in territory where the local merchants use their local papers.

The cities where the merchants do not advertise are meat for the mail order houses.

Demand Large for Men Trained in Agriculture

High school students are constantly reminded that they should choose their life work before they enter college. Many of them, however, are unable to decide. This fact is borne out by the number of students who change from one profession to another after they have been in college for a while. Not many years ago there was little choice. The broadest fields were law, medicine and probably engineering. The largest field today is agriculture.

Every high school graduate should at least consider agriculture. The field can never become overcrowded. One does not need to till the soil, although that is the best branch of the profession. Subdivisions are arising all the time. Eventually every county in the United States will have a demonstration agent. Some counties will have two or more. The work will be subdivided in each county. A specialist will be obtained for each branch of agriculture. Agricultural high schools are coming more and more into demand and men must be qualified to take charge of them.

The United States Department of Agriculture needs men now who are capable of carrying on special work and investigations. More men will be needed as the work expands. States are needing men but cannot find them. Many land owners want men to manage estates, plantations and ranches. The demand cannot be met. Railroads and other industrial and commercial institutions are seeking men to handle the agricultural interests of their business. Still the demand cannot be filled.

Agriculture is a principle profession, the supply of men who are capable of handling agricultural problems. The man who has a skill in the practical and technical aspects has no trouble in finding employment. Call upon George Dawson, county agent of the University of Florida, Department of Agriculture, for men trained in some branch of agriculture. Most of these calls must go unfilled. Demand is made for Florida trained boys, owing to conditions in the agriculture of the state, but enough Florida trained men are not available.

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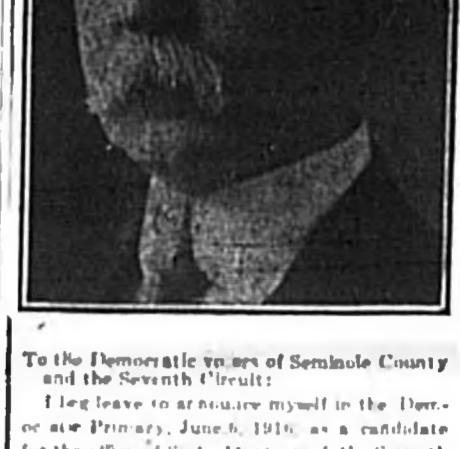
