Fire investigators say Sanford house blaze is suspicious

A suspicious house fire that occurred Wednesday morning at the 100 block of East Coleman Circle in Sanford is being investigated by state fire marshals.

According to Mark James, a Sanford fire investigator, the fire department responded to the scene at about 2 a.m.

"The fire was fairly involved as it was through the roof when we got there," he said.

The blaze was reported to the fire department by a neighbor down the street, who tried to help knock down the flames with a gar-den hose before fire engines

arrived. The fire appeared to have started in the kitchen area, James said. No one was

home at the time of the fire. He said the resident hadn't been home since 11 p.m. and was staying with a she learned of the house fire.

While much of the home suffered heat and smoke damage, the structure is not apparently a total loss.

Police investigate bloody crime scene

One dead, one critically injured in domestic case gone awry

SANFORD — Nearly a week since the yellow crime tape went up at the Poinsettia Avenue home, Sanford investigators are still trying to piece together what exactly

went wrong.
Authorities have confirmed that one man is dead and one woman is in critical condition, however, they are unsure of who attacked who as the scene appears to be a domestic situation gone

"We're still in the investigation phase, we haven't draw any hard conclusions of exactly what happened," Chief Brian Tooley said.
"We're not sure exactly what it is at this point, but we do have an

Iraqi Diary: All Hallows Eve in the Middle East sand

Editor's note: Staff Sgt. Charlie C. Carlson III, son of Sanford historian Charlie C. Carlson II, is deployed in Baghdad as part of the 549th Military Police Company. He is pro-viding the Herald with a journal of his experiences.

31 Oct. 2003 and Happy Halloween. We got up about 0430 and we left about 0500 to meet with CSM Blackwood [command sergeant-

major] to escort him to a prayer breakfast at the headquarters. He gave me another coin. [A special dollar-size commemorative coin, usually given by the regimental sergeant-major or commander, to a soldier in recognition of a good jobl. I told him that he had already given me a coin and that I would give this one to my driver SPC Finnell. She is a good soldier, although she gets road rage and an attitude with Iraqi men.

CSM Blackwood pretty much talks to me on a one-to-one basis like we are the same rank. I guess it is because he knows dad is a sergeant-major, but it makes me feel a little uneasy because he is three



ranks higher than me. The Regimental XO [executive officer] flew in on the chopper and walked up to me and reeted me by name. So I've got pretty good rap-port with the headquarters group. The CSM said he is still trying to send some things out to Dad for the Sanford Museum. Me and the CSM spend a lot of time talking 2nd Cavalry his-tory and about the Second

Dragoons at Fort Mellon.

After I gave that coin to Finnell,
I had the CSM give coins to the
rest of my soldiers. I love my soldiers. I love my soldiers. I don't know what I would
do if one got hurt. I try to take care
of them and furnish their needs. of them and furnish their needs as well as I can. I don't want to be like those leaders in Washington who know absolutely nothing about leading soldiers in the field

and see us more as simply numbers on a board. I told you about SPC Finnell, my driver. And once again, I want to point out that all the "boys" over here are not "boys." Some of my





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

Special to the Candlelight Tour this year is a new exhibit of artwork from local students and residents depicting historic homes throughout the district. The works are entries in an art contest sponsored by Wharton Smith Inc., to raise awareness and promote the district.

The Saturday, Dec. 6, and Sunday Dec. 7, tours occur from noon to 5 p.m. and begins at tour headquar-ters found at Park on Park on the corner of South Park Avenue and Eighth Street, five blocks east of U.S. Highway 17-92. The tour showcases eight of Sanford's historic homes as well as two newly built homes in

the district.
"This year we wanted to show how new homes could blend in with our historic homes in the district," explained Tony Daniels, marketing chair for the trust.

In addition to the homes, the tour will feature three porch stops that offer a place to sit and enjoy light refresh-ments. A person knowledge-able about Sanford history will be stationed at each porch stop. While tour visi-tors are welcome to sit as long as they like, theses homes are not open to the

public. A new feature in this year's tour is a door decorating contest open to the entire Sanford community. In the past the Trust sponsored a holiday lighting contest but opted for a door decorating contest this

year so that more residents could participate in the festivities.

Entry forms are available at Knight's Shoes, Mollie & Me Antiques, Sanford Chamber of Commerce, Sanford Museum and The Seminole Herald. 

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
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

What if WE (Seminole County) were the great Mouse House

Looking through my birthday list, I find that Mickey Mouse will be 75 this coming Tuesday, Nov. 18. It was 1928 when he first appeared in a cartoon named Steamboat Willie, in the Colony Theater in New York City. It was the first animated cartoon with sound. (Donald Duck is younger, born June 9,

It got me to thinking — and perhaps you can think about this as well. When Walt Disney was looking for a place to establish Disney World, one of the prime areas was near Sanford. It was the land to the west of Interstate-4, (and some to

the east), in the area now occupied by the Seminole Towne Center, AAA headquarters, and all the other major businesses between Sanford and Lake Mary, I believe the area on which the Central Florida Zoo is located was also in consideration. What if this area was chosen instead of

southwest of Orlando. WOW!!!!! What a difference we would have in our area. First of all, we'd probably have a few more million-

aires than we do now, with people selling their property to Disney for its many parks and attractions. Had the facility developed as it has now, I would expect many longtime Sanford residents would have moved away, because of the hustle and bustle of activities, the crowds and

especially the traffic.

New, younger folks would have moved in and we would have a much lower age group average than we do at present. With them would be their children which would double or

triple our school population and school building needs.
There would be condos and apartment complexes all over the place for workers. We wouldn't have, as I said before, the zoo or the mail. But Seminole County would have a grand and placetors for income a unless that partablished their own. and glorious tax income — unless they established their own taxing district. But with the influx of new people and residential areas, we would still have a higher tax income, and as a result, possibly a lower millage for the rest of the local folks. While downtown Sanford might still have many antique shoppes, there would also be stores salling Dispay items, and

shoppes, there would also be stores selling Disney items, and probably some major clothing and other type businesses.

Many of the longtime businesses may no longer be here, while others would have moved in. I doubt if there would be an empty store in the downtown area.

We can only wonder if places like SeaWorld and Universal Studios may have also moved close by — possibly on the other side of the St. Johns, thus expanding Volusia County in

all ways, just as it has Polk County in the present location.

Back when Disney first appeared on the local scene, Sanford was a calm, small town. Only Central Floridians knew where Sanford was located. Therefore, in order to identify the location to the rest of the nation and even around the world, even though it was in Sanford, Disney may have called his complex, "Orlando Disney World" (like our airport).

Orlando may not have grown to be as big as it is now. I doubt, however, that Sanford would have grown into some

doubt, however, that Sanford would have grown into some major mega-metropolis. The surrounding areas would absorb most of the people that the surrounding areas would absorb most of the people that the peopl major corporations there now.


With the influx of people, our airport would have grown unbelievably. Possibly our highways would be much wider (but much more crowded). The average family income might have been higher.

Seminole County and our cities have benefited from the Orlando Disney location. We have many folks living here, paying taxes and shopping, who work at Disney, but not what we could have had.

As far as I'm concerned — I'm glad we have Disney World within close proximity — but I'm glad Mickey Mouse's dri-ver's license says he's a resident of Orange County, rather than Seminole.

That would be ruinous. The U.S. needs to keep 100,000 or so troops in Iraq for two to five years to bring about a modicum of stability. Any less a commitment will surrender Iraq to an anarchy that would make us long for Saddam Hussein.

This war has already been too much a political exercise. The invasion was a disastrous idea based on deceit and dissembling — a trumped-up cause to satisfy the imperial cravings of a bunch of powerful men. After the White House hyped the threat posed by Saddam, Democrats cravenly fell refuses to give the American in line because of their own

short-term political calculations. But now that the U.S. has

destabilized Iraq, it would be unconscionable to leave prematurely in the hope of winning a few votes. An Iraq without a stable government would lapse into a multifaceted civil war - the perfect launching pad for al-

(Bush's sudden interest in getting an Iraqi government in place quickly — and getting our troops out - is replete with irony and cynicism. One of the reasons we're in this war is that Dick Cheney wanted to defeat the ghosts of Vietnam - a war he couldn't be bothered to fight in because he had "other priorities — and prove that the U.S. was big and had once again. Wouldn't a premature retreat just be another version of Vietnam syndrome?)

The Democratic field of presidential candidates has so far found its surest footing in attacking Bush on the war, even though several of the candidates voted to support it. If Howard Dean ends up the nominee, it's hard to imagine that he would resist efforts to bring American

soldiers home quickly.
But these shallow political cal-culations could easily lead to calamity. If we clear out too soon. we may be setting the stage for Armageddon in the Middle East before 2008. And we'll be sending a message to hundreds of American families that their sons and daughters died for nothing



More people in the community equals more crime

Geneva residents met recently with representatives from the Seminole County Sheriff's Office (SCSO) to discuss concerns specific to the rural community.

Since the sheriff's office community service center moved from the old Geneva Elementary 'Resource Center,' some have felt that perhaps SCSO coverage of the area had suffered a bit. Those who wished to express the desire for a stronger SCSO presence had prepared a petition to present to sheriff's deputies who patrol Geneva's streets.

New District Commander Lt. Karen Mills (with eight years of service here) addressed the more than 20 people present and laid out statistics the SCSO uses to assign deputies to the location with the most need

Noting that the SCSO had outgrown the office at the resource center, and the repairs needed there, Mills said the SCSO chose to move to their current location — actually more central to their response area - when offered the larger offices in the city of Oviedo.

According to Mills, the district that includes the University of Central Florida and surrounding unincorporated Seminole County generates 14,493 calls while the district covering Black



Scoles

County east requires response to 9,536 calls for service in that same period of time. The Geneva area district, Mills said, has the same amount of deputies as all the other districts in the rest of Seminole County.

Chuluota, and unin-corporated Seminole

Mills also assured those present that there are always SCSO personnel somewhere in the Geneva area, even during shift changes. Patrolling deputies spend very little time in the Oviedo substation, continued Mills, but added that the station does provide needed access to the south as with its greater number of calls for assistance.

Attendees then questioned Mills and other officers regarding a seeming increase in incidents of vandalism such as the recent graffiti damage to the Geneva Post Office.

The investigating officer explained that the post office and several other events involving a home on Pine Street,

few individuals the SCSO is trying to build a case against with gathered evidence. Because of foreclosure proceedings on the home involved, however, contact with an owner is difficult leaving that case with





Guzman, director of the Readiness Center, families with loved ones deployed in the Middle East have problems making ends meet some months. The holldays can exacerbate those problems, especially since Guard members aren't drawing paychecks from their civilian jobs.

"Our focus is on helping the families, whether it be a financial problem, a pay problem or any other type of issue they might have," Guzman seld.

With the increased attacks on American troops in recent months, the Family Readiness Center has become a place where families turn to for information

and moral support.
"When we have incidents over in Iraq, the families want to know if their soldier Involved," Guzman "We try to provide them the information as quickly as possible.

"Also, a lot of these families haven't been in this

situation before, as far as having their husband or son deployed," Guzman added. "Some of them are just now realizing that they need the support of others, especially to talk about what's happening."

During the holidays, most

people are inclined to donate toys, and Operation Red, White & Blue will accept unwrapped toys for kids ages 6 to 16. However, many of the military families need more practical items to use around the home or in some cases donations of

best soldiers are women, and they face the same risks and hardships as the guys, in many cases they excel above the guys. They can handle an ambush as well as any of the men. I just want to make sure they get

I also have my gunner on top, in the turret, I call him "my eye in the sky" since he

is up in the turret.

1 Nov. 2003 We went on another patrol in Sadir City. We had most of the cavalry out with their tanks due to the fact that insurgents were going to target elementary schools with car bombs. This is a sick bunch of folks that would think of doing something like that. We know that some of these insurgents are from Syria and a few from Iran. Anyway, there was no inci-dent and everything was good.

We stopped on one city street where a bunch of tanks were stopped (when any patrol like that stops, they stagger the formation and pull a 360-degree security). It turned out that one of their tanks had thrown a track and they were fixing it. Chalk up another breakdown.

We then moved on to continue our patrol. I looked out my window and saw some sheep cating garbage, a common sight here, except for one sheep, which caused me to laugh. The sheep was eating garbage like his fellow sheep, but there was one of those rubber, flip-flop, shower shoes stuck to the wool on his butt.

I forgot to mention about the other day when I was not feeling well. PFC Hildebrand, our platoon medic, said he noticed that I was under the weather and wanted to know "what was wrong." I had the flu and upset stomach, plus I was starving from not eating. My shoulder still gives me a bit of pain, but I try to ignore it.

These are the best medics I have seen in the army yet. They know their jobs and are real dedicated. I have seen them patch up builet wounds and stab wounds in no time flat and come back with bloody DCU's |desert uniform] from their efforts. They are the epitome of medics in the army. There are five medics: SPC Jasso, SPC Valentin, SPC Edwards, PFC Hildebrand, and the senior medic SSG Sutton who we call "Doc." Hildebrand is always ready

to stick someone with an IV and even loves to instruct others on giving an IV. He uses his own arm to do so. I would not use my arm with someone learning to give an IV, although I have given about 5 since I've been here (mostly IVs with solution for dehydration).

We have nicknamed the long robe things the Iraqi men wear as "Man Dresses." For an example of a "man dress," look on a coffee can of Hill's Brothers Coffee, they have a guy in their trademark wearing a 'man dress."

I got a nice card, and two packs of playing cards from Mrs.Ghrist in Lake Mary. I try to answer all those who send me cards and letters and share them with my

troops.
All the letters have been very kind, and I might pleasantly add, they've all been from women! It's been my observation that most letters that soldiers get, or care-package things, are from women.

I bought a rug for \$8 and have fixed my living area up. I have my own desk, a lamp, and my rug and a lit-tle more privacy for myself. I'm also video taping some of our patrols, it is going to be the real thing, nothing staged. I will send the tape home when I'm finished. It will keep you to the edge of your seat. It is turning cool here, like fall of the year. It gets down right cold at night which is a big change

from a month ago. 2 Nov. 2003 It's been a

bad week here and getting worse. Eighteen soldiers killed today, many got shot down in a chopper. I count somewhere between 27 and 30 American soldiers killed this past week with twice that number wounded. This is getting to be like a slaughter house. It depresses me and it depresses my soldiers too.

We are told it is about Iraqi freedom. Yeah, tell us another one. We are tired of hearing, "It's about this, no, it's about that, no, It's about the ather". the other"... so what is it really about? How about profits and power? Are we to believe that Americans put more value on Iraqis than they do the lives of American soldiers? Something is really sick about this war.

I'm okay, but don't feel much like writing today.

Quality **Education** for Florida's Children

Providing all of Florida's children with a quality education is our most important priority. As Chairman of the Senate Education Committee, I can tell you that the legislature took great strides toward further improving the quality of education for all our

2003-04 budget reflects Florida's strong commitment to education with an increase in the Public School Funding of \$837.4 million, or 6.35%. This represents an increase of \$240.80 per student and the third largest increase in our state's history. This year's budget also fully funds projected enrollment growth of 42,730 new students.

The Bright Futures program allows our state's best students to attend State Universities on a statefunded scholarship. I am happy to report that the legislature maintained full funding for this program amounting to \$235.7 million (an increase of \$16.8) million over last year's budget).

The legislature in 2003 passed legislation in response to the people's mandate that would enact the Education Constitutional Amendments passed in the 2002 general election. Among these is the Class Size bill (which is discussed below), the University Governance bill which creates the State University Board of Governors; and this year we will continue to implement the Universal Pre-K program that the voters approved for every four year old in the state.

As many of you are aware, I have been a tireless advocate of better education for Florida's students. I believe that this year's policies and budget reflect that commitment. The Wekiva River Basin

Last year I sponsored a bill that would have enacted the 17 unanimous recommendations of the Governor's Wekiva River Basin Task Force. Although the bill passed the Senate by a 38-0 vote, the House falled to take up the bill. Recognizing that the important work of the task force must be continued, the Governor has appointed me chairman of the newly created Wekiva River Basin Coordinating Committee.

This diverse committee consists of state and local leaders, transportation officials, business owners, land owners and environmental representatives. Reaching a consensus within such a diverse group of people could be viewed as difficult. However during the August 27th and 28th meeting, the coordinating committee established the boundaries of the study area that will be the focus of the group's work by a broad consensus by the members of the committee.

The new Wekiva River Basin Coordinating Committee will explore options that protect the Wekiva springshed and surrounding environment. complete the beltway around Orlando and provide cities and counties in central Florida with the opportunity to grow within the environment rather than in place of it. These goals are not mutually exclusive and can all be achieved with hard work, creative thinking and

Insurance Crisis Resolved

This year the Legislature in conjunction with the Governor worked to address the growing insurance crisis in Florida by passing meaningful legislation in three major areas – Medical Malpractice, Workers Compensation and PIP (Personal Injury Protection).

The plan on medical malpractice reform reflects the continued commitment to protect access to health care for Floridians by: • Capping the amount of awards against Emergency rooms and Physicians • Encouraging quality care through preventive strategies & enhanced disciplinary action • Increasing physicians* access to affordable insurance coverage.

The "Florida Motor Vehicle Insurance Affordability Reform Act" institutes various changes that The "Florida Motor venicle insurance Arronability Reform Act" institutes various changes that will help make PIP insurance more affordable and eliminate fraud within the system. The bill:

Provides tougher new penalties for fraudulent activities like soliciting accident victims, and presenting false insurance cards • Eliminates the \$2000 PIP deductible • Provides that PIP deductibles may be recovered from the at fault driver in an accident.

Class Size

During the 2002 General Election, voters approved a constitutional amendment designed to increase the education experience of students by reducing class size. The Senate was fully committed to responding to the voice of Florida's voters. In 2003, the legiscomprehensive package that is meant to assist schools in class size reduction through increased funding for teachers and new facilities.

The new law provides increased flexibility to local school boards through programs like corporate Scholarships, high school graduation alternatives and the Florida Virtual School. Additionally we created the surposes and Education in Schools Toanshop Business and Education in Schools Together (BEST Program). This program is designed to

help reduce the cost of operating schools for a district while maintaining a quality educational opportunity for students by encouraging businesses to house K-3 programs in facilities they own for the benefit of their own small stage, children. These programs are supervised by the foral school board and operate employees' children. These programs are supervised by the focal school board and operate under the same guidelines as regular public schools but will pose less of a financial burden on school districts while providing an opportunity for increased parental involvement.

The Senate is committed to making sure that our children receive the highest quality education and that the schools they attend operate safely, efficiently and effectively.

Universal Pre-K

In the November 2002 General Election, Floridians voted by a large margin to provide a school based pre-kindergarten program to all 4 year old children at no cost to the child's parents. In 2003, the legislature set out to make that goal a reality. We have authorized a study on a new voluntary Universal Pre-K education program within that will provide eligible children with a high quality Pre-K learning opportunity.

The goal is to create an early childhood development and education program that would allow every 4-year old child in the state to enter the K-12 system better prepared to succeed in school and beyond. Learning is a continuous process and the sooner we begin to educate our children, the more productive and successful they will be. During the upcoming legislative session we will begin implementing our plans for this much needed program.

The "Family and School Partnership for Student Achievement Act" was passed by the legislature in an effort to provide parents with needed information about their child's educational progress. Living Wage

This year I sponsored and the Legislature passed an economic development bill that preempts Florida from having different minimum wages throughout its 67 countles. Local governments will still be able to establish a minimum wage for their own employees and there is no limit to what a private business can pay an employee if they choose to pay a higher wage.

What the law DOES DO is keep Florida from having a hodge-podge of minimum wage laws in order to provide businesses with a more stable economic environment. This law protects businesses and consumers alike and is a necessary step toward continuing to build a strong and


played their hearts out."



FWC sets public meeting for federal shrimp relief

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) has scheduled a public meeting to address the proposed distribution of iederal shrimp relief funds. The FWC will reconvene a shrimp industry committee to address specific issues expressed by the Legislative Budget Commission regarding the distribution of federal shrimp relief funds authorized by the U.S. Congress.

The issues to be considered include: (1) the use of a portion of the funds for statewide marketing of fresh Florida shrimp; (2) the disbursal of funds based on either equal payments or volume of landings; and (3) the disbursal of funds to outof-state fishermen.

The Commission encourages all interested persons to participate at the meeting on Tuesday, Dec. 2 from 10 a.m. - 3 p.m. at the Kissimmee Civic Center, 201 East Dakin Avenue, in Kissimmee.

Hearing- or speech-impaired persons should contact the agency by calling (850) 488-9542 to arrange assistance.

FWC SELECTS NORTHWEST FLORIDA FOR AIRCRAFT CARRIER REEF

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) today chose to recommend a deep-water site off Escambia County to place the decommissioned aircraft carrier "U.S.S. Oriskany" for use as an artificial reef. The U.S. Navy and the U.S. Maritime Administration (MARAD) have solicited applications from states interested in receiving the "Oriskany" for sinking as an artificial reef, and a decision on which state will receive the carrier could come before the end of the year.

The Navy and MARAD have specified that they will accept only one application for the "Oriskany" per state. The FWC received and evaluated two applications, one from Dade/Broward/Palm Beach counties for a proposed site that straddles the Broward/Dade line about two miles shore, and one from Escambia/Okaloosa counties for a proposed site about 22.5 miles south of Pensacola Pass.

The FWC again selected the northwest Florida site because it believed the application for that location best met the Navy's specific evaluation criteria for the project and is the best-suited to compete with applications from other interested states. However, the FWC hopes to receive 20 or more large combatant or noncombatant decommissioned military ships in the future to be distributed among other Florida counties.

FWC staff will work with Escambia

County officials to ensure Florida's application for the "Oriskany" will meet MARAD's Nov. 20 application deadline.

The decommissioned 888-foot aircraft carrier currently is in the inactive reserve

fleet at Beaumont, Tex., but it probably will be towed to Corpus Christi, Tex. for cleaning. The "Oriskany" may be ready for deployment as an artificial reef by April or May. It will be the largest sunkenship artificial reef in U.S. waters.

Officials believe the "Oriskany," which has been mothballed since 1975, would be an excellent artificial reef that would enhance marine life and offer superior recreational opportunities for anglers and scuba divers. Texas, South Carolina and Mississippi have indicated they also plan to apply for the "Oriskany."

Kentucky at Vanderbilt

Cats on prowl for bowl bid

n the surface, it might not look like it, but this week's matchup between Kentucky and Vanderbilt has a lot riding on it for both teams. Records, streaks and all-time series bragging rights all hang in the balance as the Wildcata visit the Commodores.

Vanderbilt needs to win in the worst way, to map a 23-game losing streak and restore some confidence to a team that has been far more competitive than its record indicates. The Commodores' previous losing streak, which was snapped in 1998 against South Carolina, was 22 games, and you can bet this team doesn't want to go any deeper into that record territory.

Kentucky hopes to pull even at 5-5 and get its second conference victory of the season. The Wildcats need to win two of their final three games to qualify for a bowl game, and they want to pick up one of those victories right here, since they face Georgia on the road and host Tenneasee in the season finale at home. A victory for the Cats would also even the all-time series at 36-36-4.

Commodores quarterback Jay Cutler hopes to find wideout Erik Davis in the open so he can pick up some YAC (yards after eatch), which he specializes in, averaging almost 17 yards a eatch this season. That would help Cutler, who needs 785 total yards in the next two games to pass Kurt Page (3,034 yards in 1983) as the single-season school record-holder. On the other side, the Wildcats want to keep it on the ground and involve running back Alexis Bwenge a lot more after his 89-yard, two-touchdown performance last week.




