

Ann Arundel Or Seminole, News The Same...

Ed Zimmerman of Lake Mary, a Florida Cracker transplant from Ann Arundel County, Maryland, has called the Herald's attention to the fact that many residents of the "Old Line State" are now in Florida, either with the Navy, for the Shad Season or as winter vacationers.

Bringing with him a copy of his hometown newspaper, The Maryland Gazette, published at Glen Burnie, Md., Zimmerman pointed out a marked similarity of its headlines with recent ones in the Herald.

Incidentally, the Gazette enjoys the record as being America's oldest continuous publication since its first issue on Sept. 19, 1727. It produced the nation's first columnist and its first female

editor and publisher and presently is rated America's number one weekly.

Front page stories of the March 8 Gazette centered around elections, schools and, believe it or not, POPULATION EXPLOSION and a CAT BURGLER.

Ann Arundel's population was reported at an estimated 223,000.

The lead story announced that 146 Democrats and 48 Republicans had qualified for various political offices as of March 7. Included in this total for the May Primary were 30 for the House of Delegates, 48 for State Central Committee, 32 for the County Commission, 10 for Sheriff and five for the State Senate.

Other stories called for support of the reapportionment bill before the Senate and for the people to "wake up" to the fact that organized gambling exists in the county. Another headline announced that the schools are far over-populated and that the county redistricting has been completed. (Sound familiar?)

Inside features were on the development of the airport and anniversary and expansion celebration of the paper's plant. Of particular interest was a story and picture of the Holly Run Methodist Church, the world's first Protestant Methodist Church which soon is to be restored to its original state and made a national and historical monument.

Lyman High To Offer Course In Electronics Technology

Next year a two-year course in Electronics Technology will be offered at Lyman High School in Longwood.

In charge of planning and supervising the course totaling 1,080 hours will be Chairman David E. Carr, electronics engineer at Dynatronics, Inc. at Johnson Electronics, Richard Hovious, environmental engineer of Dearborn Electronic Laboratories, Inc.; George M. Freedom Academy Sponsor Guest Of Casselberry Lions

The Lions Club of Casselberry was privileged to have Alan G. Grant Jr., prominent Orlando attorney and sponsor of the proposed Freedom Academy Bill, as its guest speaker at last Thursday night's meeting. Topic of his address was "Getting Organized in the Cold War Through the Freedom Academy."

A recognized authority on Communism, Grant held the rapt attention of the group for an hour as he briefed them on the Bill which he again will present to the Congress this year.

Aware of the complete lack of an institution to consolidate and teach knowledge of the many facets of Communism and its full scale operation

of propaganda and subversion, Grant and other members of the Orlando committee conceived the idea of the Freedom Academy. They have worked tirelessly for its establishment ever since.

Though the bill was introduced in the 86th Congress and passed the Senate, it failed to pass the House of Representatives. It is hoped that it will succeed this time as the Communists already are far ahead in the field and our government leaders, diplomats and military officers are at a distinct disadvantage in the life or death struggle of the so-called "Cold War," members were told.

If the Freedom Academy is established, special courses will be available to civic

leaders and educators as well, Grant advised. There are 15 million to 20 million exchange students from abroad who are studying in this country every year. Many of these young people have asked how they can combat Communist influence in their native lands, but, at present, there are no such facilities available, the speaker pointed out. Special study would be available for such student groups at the Freedom Academy, he stated.

When asked what private individuals and organizations could do, Grant told of the "Operation Amigo" sponsored by the Miami Herald which is promoting good will for the United States in Latin America by bringing students to this country to stay in pri-

vate homes while they are here. He also said that an effort is being made to raise \$50,000 by private subscription to put on a one-week school in Tallahassee this summer for the purpose of training teachers who will instruct courses on Communism in the public schools next fall.

Although the teaching of classes on Communism have been required by law in Florida, in most cases, qualified experts on the subject are not available and funds are not provided to give the educators even a rudimentary course, Grant advised.

The committee asks Lions and other such civic organizations to write their U. S. representatives in support of the bill.

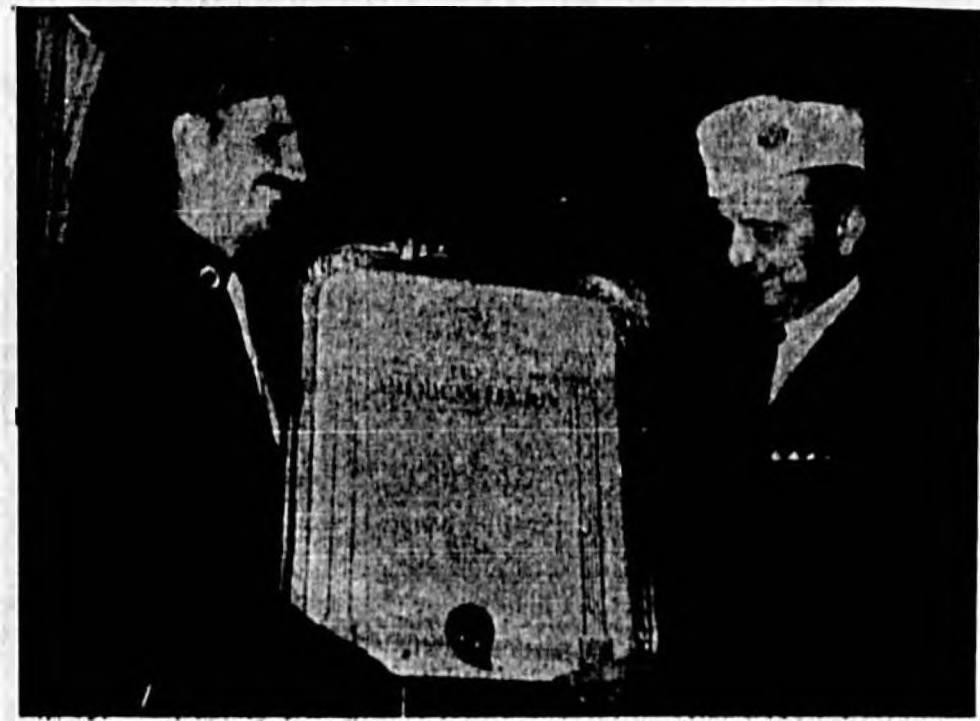
Hages Open New Grocery

Chamber of Commerce Road Committee Chairman Douglas Stenstrom warned members Thursday night that Seminole County must "keep up with its neighbors or lose its chance to have a four-lane road from Seminole County to Mims.

Discussing SR 46, and the need to acquire rights of way "now," the former state senator said that Volusia county officials are now discussing an alternate route to Mims through Osteen and Enterprise.

"When the State Road Department gets ready to do the job," Stenstrom said, "they'll see who will have the rights of way ready."

He cited published reports that much of the right of way on that West Volusia link has already been donated or promised.

"If we want SR 46 four-lane we just don't have any time to lose," he said. State Rep. Gordon Frederick, chairman of the sub-committee on acquiring the right of way for SR 46, told members that his group felt that many of the rights of way could be acquired by gift and his sub-group plans to work closely with the State Road Department on a center line survey as well as alignment.

Hutchinson also stressed that plans call for a causeway extension from 46 onto Merritt Island and the Cape. Regarding SR 436, Court appointed Appraiser, John Sauls told members that appraisals are almost completed and that bids will be let on a portion of the project by the "end of the month."

Group Hears Franchise Protests

Wording Of Redraft Hit As Ambiguous

Fern Park's Paul Allou, saying, "To me the whole thing smells like a sewer," apparently expressed the consensus of opinion at Thursday night's meeting to discuss the County's redrafted franchise directive on water and sewer plants in unincorporated areas.

More than 45 persons from all parts of the county were at the Howell Park meeting led by Pitt Varner, president of the Lake Ridge Park Civic Assn., and County Commission candidate for District 4. Many attended as representatives of various civic organizations which plan to sponsor similar discussions in their own areas if needed.

A hand count showed that 14 of those present would appear at today's commission meeting to protest any further extension of a franchise money for printing copies, notices of public hearing, or the actual hearing, on the directive in its present form.

In addition to objectionable points printed Wednesday by newspapers serving the county, ambiguous wording of the directive was criticized, terms of rate structure and eligible applicants for a franchise were questioned and specifications for location descriptions were felt to be contradictory.

Peronists Begin General Strike

BUENOS AIRES (UPI) — Peronist unions began a general strike today to protest nullification of their election victories last Sunday, but the walkout was only partly effective.

The strike centered mainly in the factories in the industrial suburbs to the south and west of Buenos Aires, where supporters of former dictator Juan D. Peron are strongest.

In the downtown district people went about their business as usual, and there were no visible signs of any unusual security precautions.

U. S. Hunts Men Who Tried To Export 34 Planes Illegally

MIAMI (UPI) — U. S. Customs agents confiscated \$200,000 worth of spare parts and spare parts in a North Florida warehouse today and hunted here for the men who tried to export them, probably to Cuba.

The planes, 34 single-engine Piper Pawnees, plus about \$80,000 worth of spare parts and equipment, were found Thursday crated and ready for shipment to some foreign country, contrary to export laws, federal authorities said.

J. H. Wilchester, acting supervising customs agent for the Miami district, said the planes were rigged for crop dusting and other agricultural uses.

Kennedys Fly To California

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy, accompanied by his brother, Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy, flew to the West Coast today for an important speech in California and possibly his campaign of a major missile launching.

The chief executive's big Air Force jet took off from Andrews Air Force Base at 8:49 a. m. for Alameda naval air station on San Francisco Bay.

The attorney general hitched a ride with the President to attend a state conference on crime prevention in Los Angeles.

Bear Bails Out At 35,000 Feet

EDWARDS AFB, Calif. (UPI) — Yogi Bear made it big on television and Smokey made the grade in fire prevention circles, but an unidentified bear threatened to slip both Thursday. He bailed out of a superionic B58 Hustler at 35,000 feet.

A stand-in for a test jumper, the bear was ejected from the B58 in an escape capsule. It marked the first time a live animal was ejected from the plane at supersonic speeds.

An Air Force spokesman said the bear was used because his weight more nearly equaled that of a man than the chimpanzees used in previous tests.

Eden Found?

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A British anthropologist's discovery of a 4-million-year-old missing link strengthened scientific speculation today that the "Garden of Eden" birthplace of man might have been central Africa.

French Troops Battle OAS In Algiers Streets

ALGIERS (UPI) — Full-scale street fighting today pitted French soldiers against commandos of the outlawed Secret Army Organization (OAS) and the OAS briefly seized control of various sections of the city.

Heavy fighting broke out in the OAS stronghold of Bab-el-Oued, after OAS gunmen attacked a French army patrol, killing six soldiers and wounding 20 others.

OAS commandos, battling to keep Algeria French and wreck the newly proclaimed cease-fire, this afternoon fired on French soldiers straggling, barbed wire rolls across streets of the Bab-el-Oued, a European working class section.

The French troops, who had been ordered to "keep out" of the area by the OAS Wednesday, immediately took shelter and began firing back. The OAS civilians—armed with submachine guns, bazookas and grenade launching rifles—took up battle positions at key intersections and started an all-out onslaught on the soldiers.

It was not immediately known how high casualties were running in the street fighting. Reports of violence throughout the country sent the Algerian toll since Monday's cease-fire soaring to 301 dead and at least 264 wounded. The total since Jan. 1 went up to 2,660 killed and 8,831 wounded.

At about the same time as street fighting broke out in Bab-el-Oued, other OAS commandos shot up an adjoining Moslem suburb and several shacks were set ablaze.

Authorized sources revealed that 100 Moslems were killed in a clash with Moslem auxiliary troops Harkia at Reliance, near Oran, Wednesday.

It followed a similar bloody clash between Moslem civilians and the Harki auxiliaries—considered as traitors by rebel-sympathizing Moslems—at St. Denis du Sig, south-east of Oran, in which scores of persons were killed Tuesday.

Fighting began in Algiers Thursday night when commandos attacked French soldiers with bazookas, mortars, machine guns and Molotov cocktail bombs.

Guest speaker at the Lyman School P-TA meeting held on Tuesday night was Juvenile Judge Vernon Mize who spoke of the Seminole County Juvenile Council and its work with delinquent and dependent children.
He defined a delinquent child as one who violates a law or ordinance, is truant from school, is beyond parental control or is found in a place where crime is promoted.
A dependent child is one who is abandoned, mistreated or neglected by his parents.
The Council's Board of Directors is comprised of a varied group of citizens such as school principals, attorneys, law officers and housewives. Membership is open to the public and dues are \$2 per year.
The committees are detention, foster home, special probation officer, aftercare and publicity. The detention committee works with juveniles who are confined to the county jail and supplies wholesome reading material, clean usable clothing, toothbrushes, combs and stationery for their use.
The aftercare committee works with juveniles who have returned from the State Industrial School, often to the same bad home environment. If the youngster is 16 years or older, he no longer is compelled by law to attend school and if he does not wish to do so, the committee attempts to find suitable employment and help him make a satisfactory adjustment. Finding jobs for these juveniles is often difficult and Judge Mize solicits the help of the people of Seminole County in helping to rehabilitate them.
The special probation officer committee tries to keep the delinquent from getting into trouble again. Presently, 20 children in the county are being guided by these volunteer citizens who serve as special probation officers. Each adult can work effectively with only one child at a time and therefore many more volunteers are needed for this rewarding work.
Judge Mize emphasized the need for a foster home program in the county in which both white and colored homes could be licensed to care for the dependent children.
He said that his request for funds for this program was turned down last year by the County Commission but that he plans to ask again at this summer's budget meeting.
He stated that many P-TA's and civic organizations in the county have expressed interest and ask that those supporting the foster home program make their opinions known to the county commissioners.
He feels the situation will worsen with the projected population increase expected from the Nova project and that we should start to prepare for it.
The meeting, opened by Fr. Hubert J. Reason of the St. Mary-Magdalen Church at Altamonte Springs, was highlighted by presentation of a new flag from Art Block of VFW Post 8207, Casselberry.

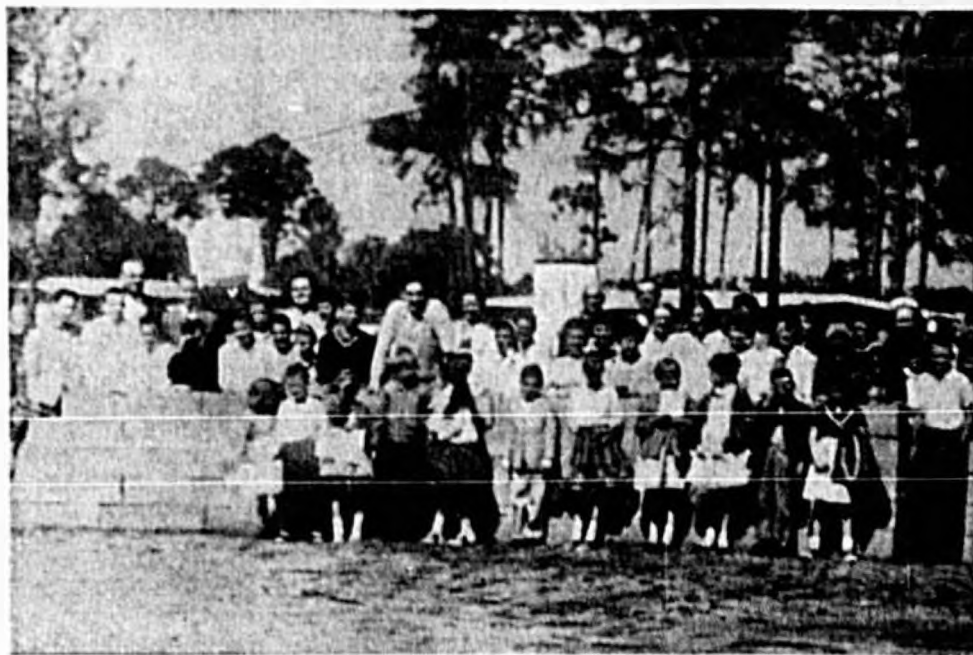
Kennedy May Witness Ailas Missile Blast

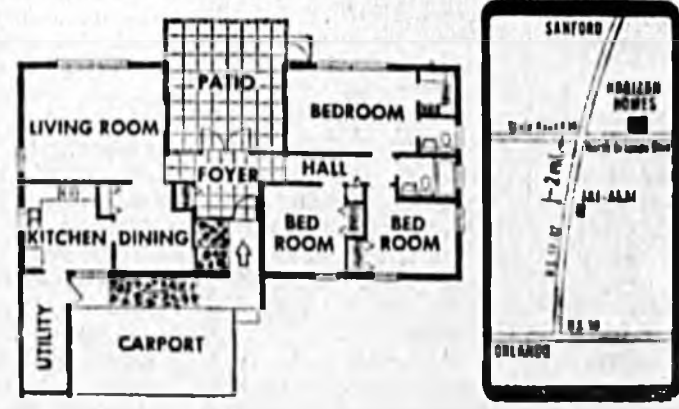

Without hesitation, I can emphatically say that my religion means everything that is worthwhile to me, and that it affects every phase of my life. I find it hard to picture myself without some Christian belief in these days of world tension, uncertainty and disunity.

For one thing, my religion has helped me to answer such basic questions as to the meaning of life, the meaning of death, and to face the unknown with courage, with calmness and unshaken faith.

At this point, it is only natural I should elaborate on my boyhood life as pertaining to religion and its meaning to me. Born to Christian parents, members of the Episcopal faith for several generations, I was baptized on November 23, 1912, at Trinity

Church in Toronto, Canada by The Rev. Canon Dixon. Later in life, I was confirmed at Holy Cross Episcopal Church, Sanford, by the Bishop of South Florida. My marriage took place June 24, 1938 at the Christ Church, Diocese of Atlanta, by The Rev. Warren. During boyhood at Holy Cross Episcopal Church, where I am presently a member, I served as acolyte, sang with the choir, attended the young people's group, and took part in many other church activities.

As an Episcopalian, I accept the Bible as the Divine Word of God. I believe in the Trinity, the Virgin Birth, and the Incarnation. I also accept the Apostle's Creed and the Nicene Creed. At least once each week, sometimes more, I attend services at Holy Cross Episcopal Church with my family. These services and prayers are all very familiar to me, because now, as when I was a boy, they are all taken from the Book of Common

Children's Home Society Schedules Meeting

Children's Home Society of Florida will hold its 59th annual meeting in Jacksonville on Thursday, April 12, according to an announcement today by William H. Jeter, President of the Children's Home Society of Florida.

"Culminating sixty years of service to Florida's neglected and homeless children, the Society provided service in 1961 to more children and families than in any previous year in its long history as Florida's only state-wide, non-sectarian adoption agency," Mr. Jeter said.

"1,347 children received direct help from the Society's branch offices last year and 714 children were cared for in the 176 private foster homes used by the Society as the temporary home of the children prior to their placement in permanent adoptive homes. There were 23 school-age children provided 6,723 days care by the Society's Children's Center in Jacksonville. 514 children were placed by the Society in permanent adoptive homes throughout Florida during 1961.

This was an increase of 30 percent over the previous high record of 395 placements made in 1960. The Society has now become the

second largest private adoption agency in the United States," Mr. Jeter stated.

"Only the California Children's Home Society is larger in terms of the number of children placed in adoption," Mr. Jeter added.

"As Florida's largest non-sectarian adoption agency, providing service in all 67 counties, the Society made 16 percent of the State's adoptions in permanent adoptive homes over the past five years," Mr. Jeter said. "Unrelated placements are those where no blood tie exists between the child and his adopting parents."

"On a state-wide basis, the number of children being placed in unrelated adoptive homes in Florida has increased at an average of 183 each year for the past five years," Mr. Jeter said.

"These total 9,118 placements for the five years, 1957-1960; data on 1961 adoption placements has not yet been released by official sources," Mr. Jeter explained. "Only 29 percent of those placed, or 2,625 out of 9,118, had the protection of placements in unrelated adoptive homes over the past five years," Mr. Jeter stressed.

"This points up the urgent need for a substantial expansion in accredited adoption agency services in Florida," Mr. Jeter stated. "The Society is making effort, with-

in its limited resources and facilities to meet its full share of this Florida problem," Mr. Jeter emphasized. "Of the children placed in unrelated homes in the recent five year period, The Children's Home Society placed 1,463, or 35 percent of the total placed by all licensed adoption agencies."
