



Let me tell you about my work. I am a 61-year-old Catholic priest ordained in 1935 and currently pastor of a parish church, St. Paul's, which has a little over 500 flocks, taking care of 21 ill-fated boys and girls aged 6 to 15 in the said Home which was founded by myself on Feb. 16, 1967, and I have been struggling against assignment to this povertytime, I have helped to develop several self-help systems for

poor adults, and particularly I have done all in my power to care for many ill-fated children as my own sons and daughters since I founded the charitable Home as they will be our hope of tomorrow. I have learned through this work that the growing children need so keenly someone as his or her own to give the child parental

love and care to make the child much happier, and love is more important for the sound spirit. However, I had a stroke last March and so my left side is slightly paralyzed. My health has been steadily declining since. Although I am not in confinement, my activities have been restricted to parochial work only, and I am deeply concerned about what I work I have started for the pitable kids. Salvation Army Drive Shows The Way

Chalk up another brilliant and convincing illustration of what Seminole County can do when united in an effort which has the common good as the goal.

We refer to the successful drive by the Salvation Army to raise \$240,000 (actually the sum subscribed is \$254,605) for a community service center in Samoru assigned to meet the needs of the Army as it fulfills its mission.

As in all such effective campaigns, the number of dedicated workers who made the victory possible is many. But the vigorous leadership and personal committment of two of Sanford's leading citizens, co-chairmen of the SA Advisory Committee, Harold Kastner and Dr. Vincent Roberts, actually turned the trick.

One of the maxims of organizing such a committee is to get the busiest and the most successful to fit the new endeavor into their own crowded schedules. Mr. Kastner, a leader in the produce field and known for his civic activities, and Dr. Roberts, outstanding in the medical fraternity and former city commissioner, met this traditional requirement.

Thus the celebration of "going over-the-top" which the workers put on with cheers and gusto, was more than justified when this greatly needed and long overdue improvement for the Salvation Army took place.

The history of the Salvation Army in Seminole County covers 42 years. It has struggled under many sincere and devoted commanders - Capt. Billy Lyons is the one who will move from the delapitated old building on Second Street to the new center when it is completed next year.

But it has been a losing fight in recent years as the real human needs which this Army was created to meet and which it never turns its back on without regret, have so multiplied in nature and so increased in amount that only crisis action was often possible.

In the past five years, 10,469 persons have been assisted. What is most significant, however, is that these were men and women who have had literally no where else to go for a helping hand or an honest word of guidance.

The new community center will, nowever, do much more than has ever before been possible to show the people in our county just how broad and how effective the Salvation Army can be when it has proper tools to work with.

Improved Boy Scout programs will be undertaken. Senior citizens will be offered new opportunities for enrichment of their personal experiences through fellowship. Retirees will be shown how retirement can be a time of action, not inaction, and their skills still be put to use. Transients have always been among those

Blue-Collars Are Target of Agnew By BRUCE BIOSSAT

Vice President Spiro Agnew has a specific major assignment in this campaign: to keep disenchanted bluecollar workers, mostly Catholics of ethnic background, from drifting back to their old home in the Democratic

Most polls show these voters have been leaning strongly to President Nixon. But he and his advisers are not complacent about them, and are well aware that Sen. George McGovern's managers have made recapturing the bluecollar people a main target project.

In light of the importance attached to this vote, it is interesting that both parties are asking their vicepresidential nominees to make the appeals. Sargent Shriver is, of course, carrying that burden for McGovern. Whatever McGovern's reasons, Mr. Nixon's are simple. He isn't going to do all that much campaigning until fairly late in the game, if his plan holds. And Agnew is both popular and effective with labor audiences. As the impeccably attired Shriver seems earthier than McGovern, so the natty Agnew is better than Mr. Nixon at getting down to the gut level.

So the prospect now is that Agnew will be visiting a lot of places where top Republican nominees don't ordinarily go-blue-collar areas in the big cities that used to be largely conceded to the Democrats.

In these forays, Agnew will in effect be telling the workers that they have no present Democratic home to go to, charging that McGovern is some kind of radical sport who has unsound ideas about welfare and taxes, favors amnesty for draft evaders, would go begging to Hanoi, and can't be trusted to stick with the programs

The vice president really will be drumming home reminders, since all polls suggest these issues already are paramount in the minds of the disaffected blue-collar people. And head-count polls presently show an almost unbelievable movement in these voting areas away from

The Nixon forces, still pretty new at approaching labor, are endeavoring to fashion their campaign with some sophistication. For instance, they are not treating the ethnic bloc as monolithic, but as a thing of many parts. In this regard, they are convinced that Mr. Nixon might make something like a sweep of the Italian Catho-

lic vote if he can just establish a big bridgehead for a starter. Republican polls in Rhode Island, Connecticut and parts of the New York City area encourage this hope. The President's advisers insist that if these Italian enclaves hold for him, it means he will get a good vote wherever Itale-Americans cluster in sizable numbers. It is felt they vote as an "ethnic community."

Agnew will be touching these spots, but also plunging into Polish and other Slavic bastions in such cities as Chicago, Milwaukee, Detroit, Cleveland.

His 1972 campaign role clearly is a far cry from 1968. Then he was put under tight wraps and kept to an absurdly limited schedule. Ironically, this happened to him after imitted several gaffes, the worst of which involved alleged racial or nationalistic slurs.

Time, however, changes many things. This year, Spiro Agnew is being sent forth to be a big man on the ethnic







DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (AP) - A supermarket holdup shooting and high-speed chase between two gunmen and 35 police officers Monday left three men in serious condition in a Daytona Beach hospital.

A Port Orange policeman, a drug company salesman and one of the gunmen were seriously wounded in the incident,

Volusia County Sheriff Ed Duff cited "cooperation among the area's police" as about 35 law enforcement officials flushed the two gunmen out of a wooded area near the sands of Daytona Beach. The two gunmen had attempted to holdup a suburban

supermarket in Port Orange. An exchange of shots outside the market wounded a patrolman and one of the bandits, In their escape attempt, the gunmen tried to commandeer the salesman's car, then shot him in the stomach when he re-

fused to cooperate. The gunmen used another car to flee the scene but wrecked the car and fled into a wooded area, pursued by police, Duff said. A helicopter zeroed in on the men and the police captured

them without a struggle, Duff added. The injured men were identified as Patrolman Ben Bailey of Port Orange, salesman Melvin Tuten of South Daytona and one of the bandits, tentatively identified as Jewel Douglas of

The other gunman, Joseph D. Cozzi of Miami, was being held in Volusia County Jail in DeLand on charges of armed robbery, assault with intent to kill and carrying a concealed

weapon.
A second police officer, a Daytona Beach motorcycle patrolman, was injured in the chase when his cycle collided with a police cruiser as he sped to the wooded area, police

"More than 90 per cent of the money has been recovered. The men dropped it as they ran out of the store," Duff said. "They told me to go to the office with them," said S. J. Alvarez, manager of the WinnDixie supermarket, "They were

During the holdup there were approximately 30 customers in the store. "Most of them didn't know there was a holdup going on," Alvarez added. "When the policemarcame to answer the call, the gunmen

fled," Alvarez said. "They went out the back of the store and we followed them." In the ensuing struggle, Officer Bailey was shot in the left

shoulder and one of the gunmen was wounded. "One of the gunmen went to a blue car and told the driver to take him somewhere. He refused and was shot in the gut," Sheriff Duff said.



Longwood Council Actions

By DONNA ESTES

The City Council, which has raised its individual reimbursed expenses from a sum of \$50 monthly to \$150 over the past two years, will not give itself another hike in the new fiscal year. At least no raise is included in the budget for fiscal 1972-73. And Mayor Kenneth Brown, despite the fact no member of the board indicated an interest in more money this year, warned that he would veto the budget if a raise

The amount tentatively approved in the new budget for Council-mayor reimbursement was \$10,800. Sums allocated for City Attorney S. Joseph Davis, Jr were increased. The monthly retainer paid to him was raised from \$100 monthly to \$300. In addition to the retainer, Davis is paid for each legal document he prepares. Budgeted for the city attorney in the new year was \$6,000.

Also increased was the sum paid monthly to the city's accounting firm, Fitzpatrick and Hartsock, up from \$100 monthly to \$200. Also to be paid to the accountant is \$500 for the annual audit of city accounts.

Junior Police Aid Sought

Donation by the city to the Seminole Drug Abuse Council is a proper one. But a donation to defray insurance costs of the city's Junior Police organization would open the door to requests for funds from other charitable groups. This was the position taken by Council Chairman Eugene Jaques at a recent budget session when Councilman William Klosky asked that \$130 be included in the budget for Junior

Klosky said, while he agreed to the drug action committee donation, he also believed funds designated for a purely city group of young people would benefit the com-

Mayor Kenneth Brown joined in the argument by noting the young people are a "vital segment of the community" and the Junior Police organization is attempting to instill respect for the things always held holy in the country - the flag, law and order etc.

Brown "Guaranteed" that the citizens of the city would endorse through voluntary donations the work of the Junior Police if requested to do so. Klosky pointed to the Junior Police as yet another effort

of the current Council to help the children of the community. Previously money has been allocated for three municipal mini-parks stocked with playground equipment. Tennis courts are to be installed at the sites, too. Finally given the tentative stamp of approval for the new year was \$1,000 for donations including a sum for the annual

Fire Fund Control Debated

Now that the fire department is under the control of the city since employment of a full time chief and a full time fireman has been approved, as well as funds for the volunteers, under which group's control are the funds in the

Mayor Brown raised the point at the budget work session. Pointed to specifically was a recent donation from the Orlando-Seminole Jai Alai Fronton of \$500. Should all disbursements be by the city or continue with the fire department? Brown asked.

Retirement Rule Slated

Mandatory state retirement for all city employes goes into effect at the beginning of the 1972-73 fiscal year on Nov. 1. A sum for the city's share of the cost, \$13,000 is tentatively allocated in the new budget on which the City Council has been working for more than three weeks. Additional items included in the department listed as

"others" are: dog catcher \$2,000; photo copying \$2,000; county tax collector \$500; dues \$400; cleaning \$1,200; advertising \$500; community promotion \$200; maps \$500; educational fund \$500; telephone \$500; property expansion presumably addition to the city hall to the east or construction of a metal fire hall) \$30,000; new equipment \$2,000; payroll taxes \$13,000; insurance \$15,000.

By GEORGE ESPER SAIGON (AP) - While fighting in South Vietnam tapered off to its lowest level of the sixmonth Communist offensive, hundreds of U.S. jets and five cruisers and destroyers heavily bombarded North Vietnam Monday, the U.S. Command an-

nounced today. Air Force bombers attacked for the first time in the war a newly built, major fuel depot at a key road junction 46 miles north of Hanoi, and pilots reported their bombs triggered explosion that covered an area the size of four city blocks.

The U.S. 7th Fleet disclosed that a task force of two cruisers and three destroyers led by the heavy cruiser Newport News exchanged heavy fire with North Vietnamese coastal
