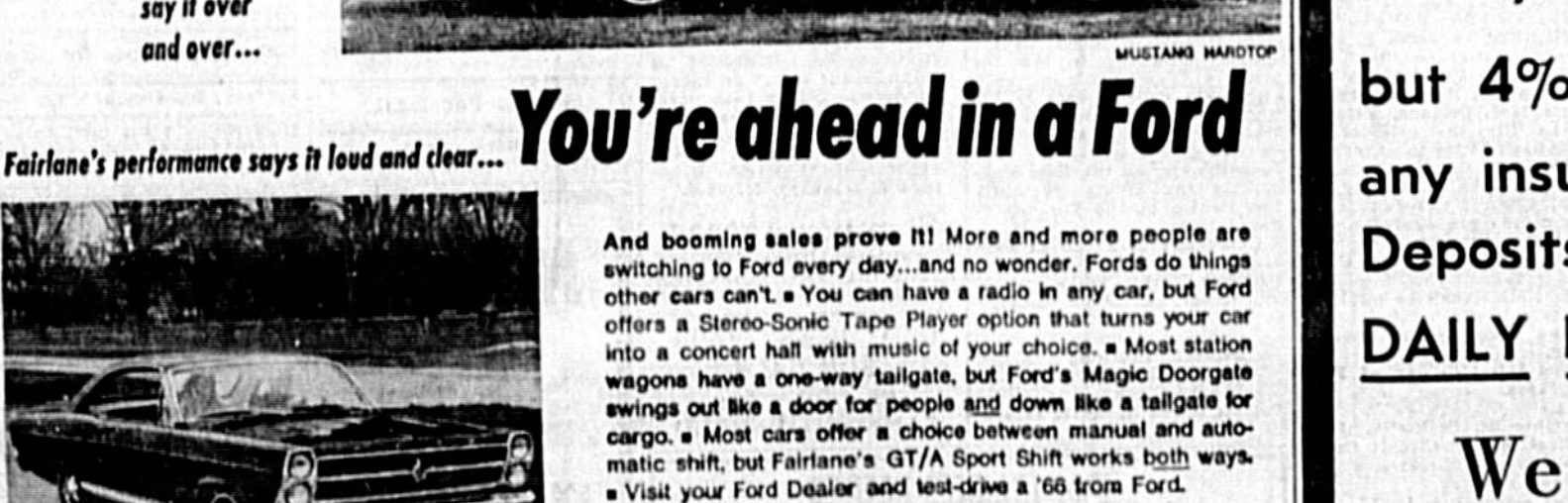

REV. N. A. WATSON, pastor of Springfield Baptist Church, is most interested in our community and its youth.
This reporter asked him if he would say something to parents and children as to their responsibilities to each other. Without hesitating, he agreed. This is what he said:
'Parents, what will your children be in the future? They will be what you help them to be. Children are God given gifts who did not come into the world by chance. There is a purpose for their being here. The purpose for which they were born are: (1) a normal life under normal circumstances, (2) citizens of the country in which they were born, and (3) a dedicated life to God, their maker, redeemer, and Lord.
'Parents, it is your duty to see to it that your children have a normal life which they can develop in a wholesome manner. Such can be accomplished only through love and affection. Teach them to love and appreciate the community in which they live. You are responsible for whatever your child does, whether it is good or bad. They are headed for degradation if you fail to set a good example for them to follow; teach them, love them, and guide them.
'I appeal to you — take time to learn your child's behavior. Learn to communicate with him. It is imperative for you to know his world, and not yours if you intend to reach him.
'To the children: Young people, how will you stand up and stem the tide in this space age? Can you meet the demands of the space age in the future at the rate you are going? Let me beg of you. Slow down, and see where you are headed. Let first things come first. Take law and order for example: There are those who enforce the law for the good of society. How much do you respect those who represent the law? How much do you respect those persons who are in authority over you, and are trying to help shape your lives for the future? How do you respect your principal teachers, and others? These dedicated individuals are constantly trying to help shape your life in order that you will become a useful citizen. Many of you are at the crossroads of life. Which road will you take? The one down to defeat and ruin where you will be the foot mat for others; or will you travel the high road — the one that leads to a fruitful life.
'Only you can make this a better world in which we live. You have a better world in than we of the eighteenth century. Why not accept the chance while you can. Remember, obedience is better than sacrifice. Obey your parents and superiors, and you will inherit the great promises of God.
'Where will you go from here? Will you miss the stage of life that is before you or will you build concepts and integrity on a sandy foundation. Such will come tumbling down as soon as the wind blows or the rain falls. Let your foundation be made of solid rock.
'Where do you go from here? In his deep base voice he concluded by saying, "Will you leave high school and go to the orange grove, or to some remote spot where there will be weeping and wailing. Why not try to live by the tenets of the Bible, which are helpful to man."

Lord Nelson Takes A Fall

DUBLIN (UPI) — Irish extremists blasted the statue of British naval hero Lord Nelson off the top of its 121-foot tower column in the heart of Dublin today and sent police racing to smash a British monument on a tip that it also would be bombed. An ear-shattering explosion ripped across the towering city shortly before 2 a.m. and sent the Nelson memorial — a symbol of British rule — to many Irishmen — crashing down amid hundreds of tons of masonry. The explosion shattered show windows, twisted traffic lights on O'Connell street — Dublin's main thoroughfare where the 1916 rebellion was fought — and bent iron pedestrian railings along the sidewalk. No one was injured in the blast.

Under the new agreement, the battalion will be replaced by an Australian task force of 4,800 personnel.

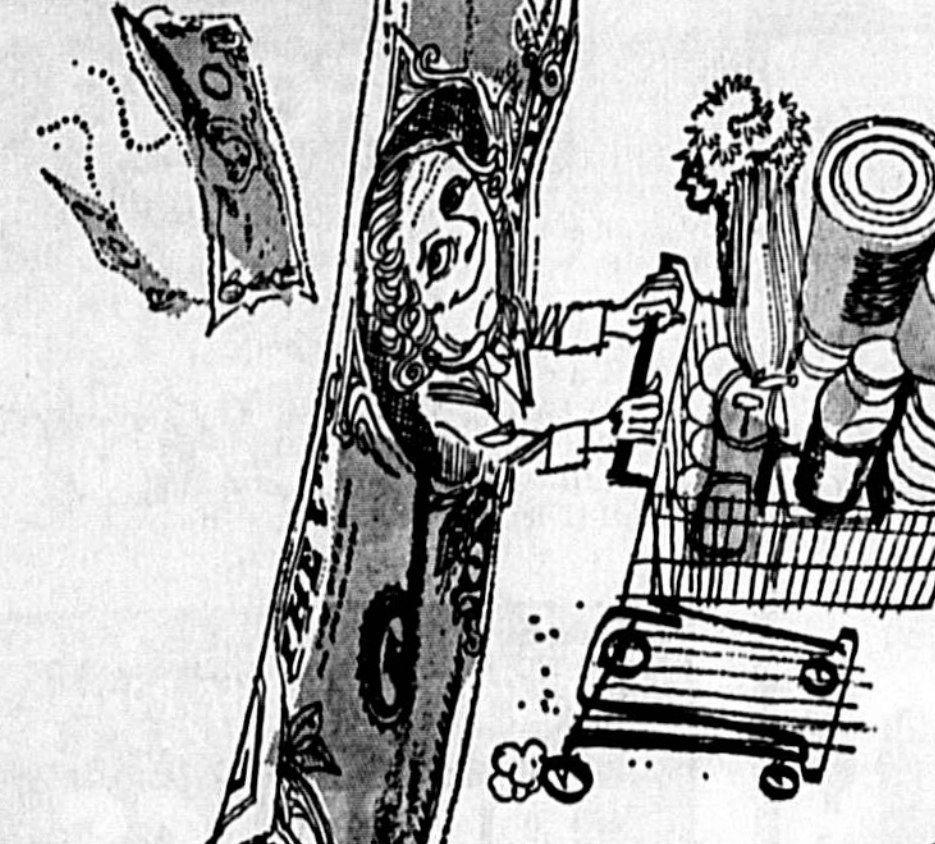
