SALT Progress Reported From Vance In Geneva

GENEVA, Switzerland (UPI) - Secretary of State Cyrus Vance and Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko reported further progress today towards concluding a basic strategic arms limitation treaty. The two men, who met twice Thursday and again for two and a half hours this morning, fixed a fourth session for this afternoon. Vance Thursday offered the Soviet Union a controversial compromise for dealing with the sensitive issue of Soviet Russian missile codes, which threaten to become an impediment to achieving a SALT treaty. Gromyko apparently resisted the compromise.

Pope To Mediate Dispute

Pope John Paul II said today both Chile and Argentina had accepted his offer to mediate a Chile-Argentina border dispute that has brought the two nations to the brink of war. The Vatican also announced that the Pope will travel to Mexico next month for the opening of the 3rd Latin American Bishops Conference at Puebla, the Vatican said today. It will be his first trip outside Italy since taking over from the late John Paul I and the first papal trip outside the country since the late Pope Paul VI visited the Far East eight years ago.

Police Station Strafed

ROME UPI - Terrorists strafed a police station in Florence today only hours after a Red Brigades commando squad attacked the headquarters of a prominent politician in a growing spate of pre-Christmas violence.

S. Korea Freeing 5,378

SEOUL, South Korea UPI - South Korea today announced a sweeping amnesty that will free 5,378 prisoners, including the nation's major political opposition leader, Kim Dae-jung. The announcement of the amnesty that will free 107 political prisoners on Dec. 27 coincided with a major government reorganization carried out by President Park Chung-hee.

Iran Troops Rout Protesters

TEHRAN, Iran UPI - Army troops used jeeps and clubs to scatter several hundred students and professors demonstrating in front of Tehran University today. Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi worked to find politicians willing to join a new civilian government.

China Paper: Human Rights

HONG KONG (UPI) - The Chinese Communist Party newspaper, People's Daily, is warning party and government officials they will be thrown out of office if they continue to restrict human rights. "The people have the right to discuss Communist or government cadres who forget the flesh and blood ties between our party and the masses and the fact that our party has become the ruling party through the power of the masses," the paper said Thursday.

Egypt Minister In Brussels

Egyptian Prime Minister Mustafa Khalil arrived in Brussels, Belgium today for a weekend of U.S. initiated talks with Israeli Foreign Minister Moshe Dayan aimed at breaking the stalemate peace talks. There was talk of a new Camp David-style summit.

The need is as great as it is," he said. The surveying is necessary so that construction materials can be purchased. The money for materials - \$2,500 total at this time - must be obligated before Dec. 31. The work to be done includes patching holes in floors, repairing windows and doors, roof work - those items, needed to weatherize the homes.

For those homes that need additional work - and, most do, said Westworth - as much of that will also be done, according to whether the homeowner can afford to pay for materials. Shelly Cox, SCA's program planner, who is in charge of this project, estimated by the end of the 12 months, a total of 50 homes of the hundreds on the waiting list, will be fixed.

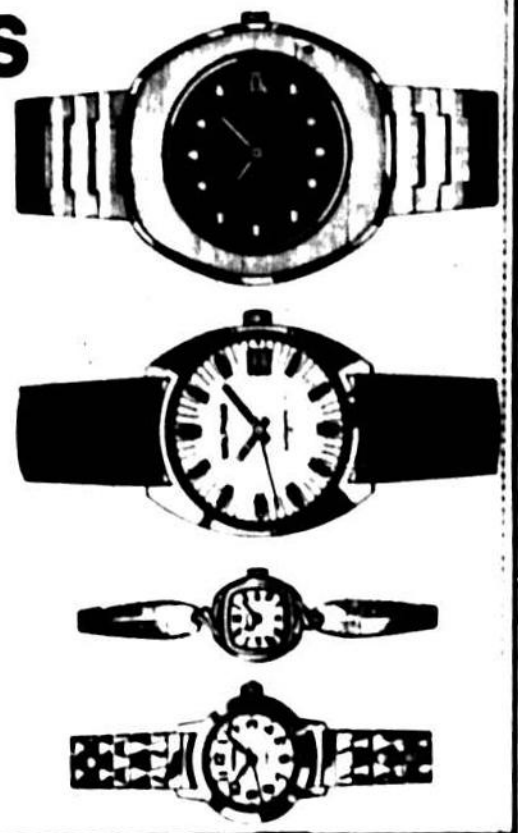

'Tis The Season To Be Stubborn?

Score one for Sanford Mayor Lee P. Moore. Seeing that chances are slim for the Seminole County Commission reelecting and giving a key to the courthouse to Art Beckwith Jr., clerk of the circuit court, he has come one better: he has awarded Mr. Beckwith, a Sanford resident, with a key to the entire city.

That's the true spirit of the season and we commend Hizzoner for it.

Sorry we can't say the same for the county commissioners.

They seem to be regressing. Stumped for plausible, sensible, rational explanations for their stubborn refusal to give Mr. Beckwith—and other constitutional officers—keys so they can do the public business they have been chosen to do, the commission instead has fallen back on wisecracking, sarcasm and paranoia. It's puzzling.

Take, for example, Chairman Bob French's explanation (?) for his vote with the majority against Mr. Beckwith's request.

"If something were stolen or damaged in the courthouse, how would responsibility be pinned on anyone if everyone had keys?" he asks. "This may be a philosophical approach rather than a reasonable reason," he concedes.

We agree... whatever he means.

And there's Commissioner Bill Kirchhoff. In his usual fervid wisecracking manner, he has suggested giving "all constitutional officers' employees keys, which would end courthouse security, but be in the Christmas spirit."

To that we can only echo Commissioner Sandra Glenn's response: "Whooop-de-do!"

What is this obsession with security? "I want to make sure people in the courthouse are protected," he declares. From what? We ask.

We have a suggestion: If the commission is truly interested in courthouse security, it follows that no one should have a key. What the lawmakers should do is to leave a window open on a rotating basis and let only those who are sure they're not known which windows are open when.

That would certainly solve any security problem they feel exists.

Mr. Kirchhoff, the courthouse custodian, also has expressed pride that Seminole County appears to be the only county in the state to deprive its constitutional officers access to their building.

What's wrong with Seminole County being the only one to do something? he inquires.

Nothing, we concede. But surely Mr. Kirchhoff's fertile imagination could come up with a more constructive example of "wisecracking?"

Like maybe a business-like, mature county commission.

For many, the whole key matter probably seems silly. For Art Beckwith—and us—it has become a matter of principle. What's right is right. Sure, he can secure a key from someone anytime he wants. But that's not the point. He wants to be officially acknowledged (as do his colleagues such as Camille Bruce, supervisor of elections) who cannot get a key—for what he is: a proven, trusted, respected public servant.

The key is only a symbol.

The only thing left to be done now is for the commission to honor Mr. Beckwith, Mrs. Bruce and all other constitutional officers wanting keys.

We suggest that the veteran commissioners—French, Kirchhoff and Williams—follow the lead of their less-experienced but clearer-thinking colleagues, Commissioners Glenn and Robert Sturm in honoring the key request.

And they might even look to Sanford's Mayor Moore for guidance.

Let's lock up the subject once and for all. There's still time before Christmas—in at least before the New Year.

ANGLE-WALTERS Ethical Debt Retiring

WASHINGTON (NEA) — President Carter's strict moral code and an unrelenting barrage of "let cut" campaign contributions in an era of political reform have complicated the Democratic Party's efforts to wipe out its massive 10-year-old deficit.

Determined to distribute the debt, even at the cost of generating unfavorable publicity, the Democratic National Committee (DNC) late last year sought a special exemption from the federal law governing campaign financing.

That statute limits individuals to yearly contributions of \$1,000 to each candidate, \$5,000 to each multi-candidate political action committee and \$25,000 to the national committee of political parties.

In addition, individual donors may give no more than \$25,000 annually to all candidates and committees involved in contests for federal offices—senate in Congress, the presidency and the vice presidency.

But because most of the DNC debt was incurred in connection with the 1980 presidential campaign, before the current law was passed, the Federal Election Commission early this year waived the contribution limitations for the Democrats.

With authority to solicit unlimited amounts throughout most of 1979, the Democrats have collected only slightly more than \$200,000, leaving a deficit of approximately \$1.4 million to be paid before fund-raising begins in earnest for the 1980 presidential and congressional campaigns.

That's a marked improvement over the autumn of 1979, when the decade-old debt reached its peak of \$2.3 million. But Democratic fund-raisers have a long way to go if they are to strike the goal of balancing the party's books by mid-1981.

The names of the major donors to the special debt-retirement fund have not been previously published, but here's a list of the last of the "let cut" in American politics.

The most generous contributor by far has been Law Waterman, the Beverly Hills, Calif., board chairman of RCA, Inc., a major telecommunications conglomerate. He gave \$250,000.

Ranking behind him are two \$100,000 donations: Richard O'Neil, a Miami Vice, Calif., investor, and John McMillan, the Salt Lake City, Utah, publisher of the Westwood Tribune Co., the firm planning to build a gas pipeline from Alaska to the "lower 48" states.

Joseph Kastler, a Miami, Fla., real estate developer, has given \$100,000, while \$100,000 contributions have been received from co-ordinator Helen Ruddy and her husband, Jeff Wald, the Communications Workers of America; and Columbia, Ga., businessman John Adams.

Current pledges include an additional \$60,000 from the Communications Workers, another \$15,000 from Adams, \$20,000 from the United Auto Workers and \$10,000 from Mississippi food distributor John F. Paulson. Some 200 individuals bring the total pledge to about \$600,000.

The Democrats' inability to move more rapidly in obtaining their debt can be attributed, in part, to the reluctance of wealthy donors to be publicly identified at a time when the spirit of reform has made "let cut" more unpopular than ever.

 WASHINGTON (UPI) — It is not too late. Thanks to an ancient Vedic tradition called "jama shopping," there still is time to find appropriate presents for the holiday season on your Christmas list.

Once you have been sufficiently frantic, you can discover gift items you didn't even know existed. Following are a few examples of the type of presents you can only come up with after you have lost control.

Auto Error Traffic Light Detector — Attaches to front grill of most cars. When connected to bars, the sensor picks up green light rays before they are visible to the naked eye. It then causes the horn to beep at the driver ahead.

Home Video Cassette Eraser — Works in conjunction with the home video cassette recorder. While the latter is taping television programs you want to see again, this device is erasing programs you didn't want to see the first time.

ROGER'S FINGER OF FATE

NEW YORK (UPI) — Roger Staubach's right index finger resembles one of Wm. Westcott's, and you ought to see the way it's used.

Poor Wm. He was from the old school, the kind of catcher who'd take a foul up on one of his fingers without blinking an eye. So bad would it be that he'd generally shake off the whole thing, rub the finger on his uniform or, get back down on his haunches and send out another sign to the pitcher. He was tough. You look at his finger and you can see where he caught more than a thousand games in his time.

Staubach doesn't catch the ball, he throws it. From all appearances, though, that right index finger of his would give you the idea it's the other way around. The finger is curled over, like so many baseball catchers' are, and you can easily see where it was stretched up.

"I broke it in the Super Bowl game a year ago and reworked it five weeks ago when I hit it on a helmet after releasing the ball," says the Dallas Cowboys' high-class quarterback, just certified as the NFL's leading passer for the second straight year.

Mike Butler, Green Bay's big, strong second year defensive end, happened to be inside that helmet when Staubach hit it. Although his finger bothered him during the next few games, Staubach played anyway. Last Sunday in the Cowboys' meeting with the Jets, Staubach missed only his second game in 10 years.

Staubach could have played in that game, but he and Dallas Coach Tom Landry both felt two weeks' rest would help heal his finger. The Cowboys aren't scheduled to play again until Dec. 31, when they'll face either Atlanta or Minnesota, depending on the outcome of this weekend's wild card meeting between the Falcons and Eagles.

"Roger's finger is better," says Landry. "With this week off and next week off, he'll be one hundred percent going into the playoffs."

Staubach agrees.

"My finger is okay right now," he says, holding it up so anyone who wants to inspect it, can.

For all his durability, Staubach is anything but a safety-first player. He knows the value of not returning to the field if he's hurt, but isn't the least bit shy about running with the ball when he sees the right opportunity.

Without question, Staubach is the acknowledged leader of the Cowboys. Seldom have I seen an athlete in any sport who has the regard and respect of his fellow players as much as Roger Staubach, and he certainly has earned it by his character as well as by leading the Cowboys to three Super Bowls and two world championships since taking over as their starting quarterback seven years ago.

Staubach had to be patient waiting his turn behind Craig Morton and Jerry Rivalta, but he's aware of 20-year-old Danny White anxiously waiting to move in. Every chance he gets, Staubach helps White and is genuinely sympathetic and understanding of his eagerness to play.

"Danny White is really a first-class NFL quarterback," says Staubach. "He's mature, he's got good speed and he'll be pushing me more and more. That will be fine because it'll result in me staying on my toes. He's capable of being a regular quarterback in the NFL, really."

That shouldn't be taken to mean Staubach is about to take a back seat and turn over the regular quarterback's job to White. "I think I've got a few more good years left," says the Cowboys' 10-year man. "I'm only 30 and I've already gotten myself for the off-season and the off-season is when I know I can maintain a high physical level for a number of years yet."

Saying that, Staubach passes. He reflects a moment or so in what seems to be some self-analysis.

"I still do a lot of stupid things," he says. "But fewer than I used to."

Roger Staubach has a way of being tough on himself. The fact is nobody can ever remember him doing many stupid things even from the very beginning.

"I broke it in the Super Bowl game a year ago and reworked it five weeks ago when I hit it on a helmet after releasing the ball," says the Dallas Cowboys' high-class quarterback, just certified as the NFL's leading passer for the second straight year.

Mike Butler, Green Bay's big, strong second year defensive end, happened to be inside that helmet when Staubach hit it. Although his finger bothered him during the next few games, Staubach played anyway. Last Sunday in the Cowboys' meeting with the Jets, Staubach missed only his second game in 10 years.

Staubach could have played in that game, but he and Dallas Coach Tom Landry both felt two weeks' rest would help heal his finger. The Cowboys aren't scheduled to play again until Dec. 31, when they'll face either Atlanta or Minnesota, depending on the outcome of this weekend's wild card meeting between the Falcons and Eagles.

"Roger's finger is better," says Landry. "With this week off and next week off, he'll be one hundred percent going into the playoffs."

Staubach agrees.

"My finger is okay right now," he says, holding it up so anyone who wants to inspect it, can.

For all his durability, Staubach is anything but a safety-first player. He knows the value of not returning to the field if he's hurt, but isn't the least bit shy about running with the ball when he sees the right opportunity.

Without question, Staubach is the acknowledged leader of the Cowboys. Seldom have I seen an athlete in any sport who has the regard and respect of his fellow players as much as Roger Staubach, and he certainly has earned it by his character as well as by leading the Cowboys to three Super Bowls and two world championships since taking over as their starting quarterback seven years ago.

Staubach had to be patient waiting his turn behind Craig Morton and Jerry Rivalta, but he's aware of 20-year-old Danny White anxiously waiting to move in. Every chance he gets, Staubach helps White and is genuinely sympathetic and understanding of his eagerness to play.

"Danny White is really a first-class NFL quarterback," says Staubach. "He's mature, he's got good speed and he'll be pushing me more and more. That will be fine because it'll result in me staying on my toes. He's capable of being a regular quarterback in the NFL, really."

That shouldn't be taken to mean Staubach is about to take a back seat and turn over the regular quarterback's job to White. "I think I've got a few more good years left," says the Cowboys' 10-year man. "I'm only 30 and I've already gotten myself for the off-season and the off-season is when I know I can maintain a high physical level for a number of years yet."

Saying that, Staubach passes. He reflects a moment or so in what seems to be some self-analysis.

"I still do a lot of stupid things," he says. "But fewer than I used to."

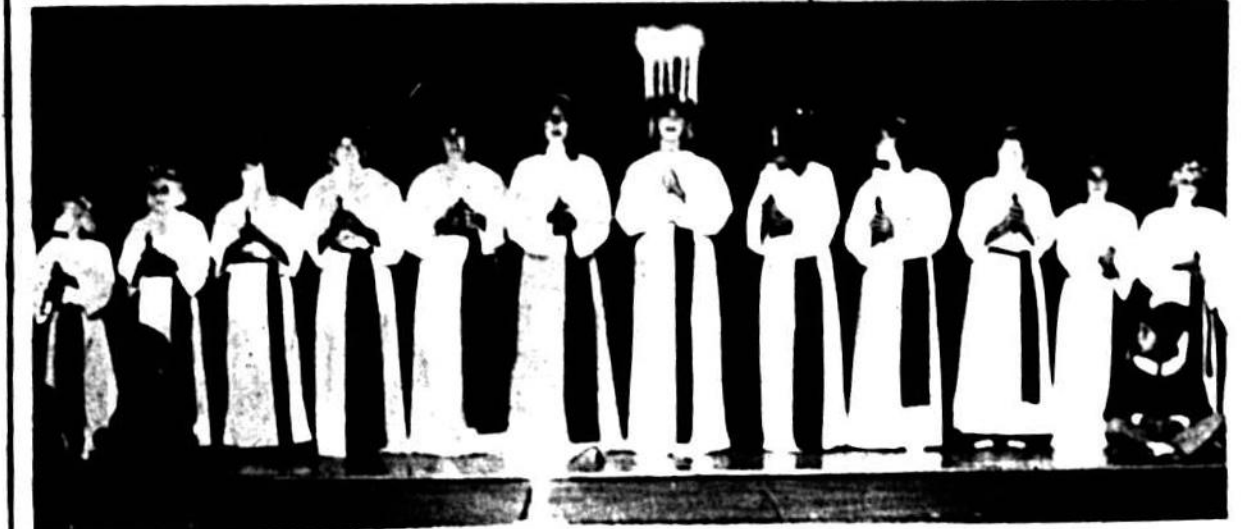

The 'Lucia' Legend

More than 400 Scandinavians and their descendants packed the hall for the Hagar Viking Club of Central Florida Christmas party at the Altamonte Civic Center.

Many club members wore their national dress, adding a colorful touch to the celebration.

Highlight of the evening was the Santa Lucia procession. Lights were lowered and into the darkened hall came a lovely young lady, Darlene Roberts of Orlando, wearing a white dress, a red sash, and a crown of evergreens and candles. She was followed by a dozen similarly dressed handmaidens, each carrying a lighted candle.

The Santa Lucia legend is celebrated in Sweden each year on Dec. 13, where families are pleasantly awakened by a "Lucia"—usually the eldest daughter who serves coffee and traditional buns and cookies while dressed in a white robe and wearing a crown of lighted candles.

The legend dates back to Sicily where Lucia was born and raised in the Christian faith, but was betrothed to a wealthy

pagan suitor. By refusing him, she was forced to reveal herself as a Christian and her rejected suitor had her brought to trial as a Christian accused of witchcraft.

She died a martyr's death at the stake on Dec. 13, 304 A.D. Legends say her eyes were put out during her persecution, but were miraculously restored.

The legend became popular in Sweden because Santa Lucia's feast day on Dec. 13 was once the shortest day of the year on ancient calendars.

Further development came as a result of a famine in the Swedish province of Varmland.

The celebration of Santa Lucia's feast day and the return of light after a dark winter has been recorded in Stockholm as early as 1655 and has been an annual event with Swedes ever since.

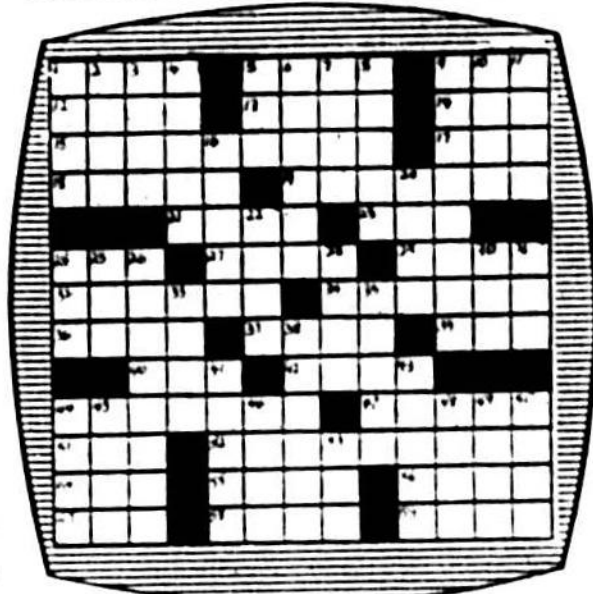

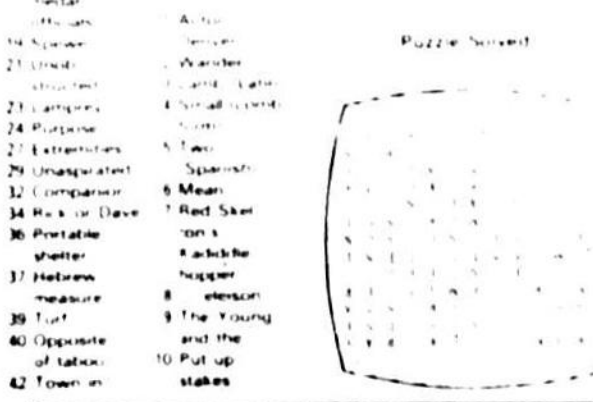

The stockings are full, the gifts are wrapped, and you're curled up in front of the fire. To top off the magic of Christmas Eve, tune in to some very special Christmas television programs.

Tops on the list is a rebroadcast of ballet superstar Mikhail Baryshnikov's choreographed version of "The Nutcracker." Set for Christmas Eve on CBS, the classic Tchaikovsky ballet stars Baryshnikov as the toy Nutcracker-turned-prince and American Ballet Theater star Gelsey Kirkland as the fanciful Clara.

Tchaikovsky's ballet is set in turn-of-the-century Russia. It's the night before Christmas, and Clara's family is together for a party. As the gifts are unwrapped, Clara receives one very unique present from her uncle, a Nutcracker. As she falls asleep with her gift in her arms, Clara's fantasies take over the stage. Her Nutcracker becomes a handsome prince, and she is a lovely princess.

The role of Amahl is sung by Robert Sapolsky, a 14-year-old Manhattanite whose ringing boy soprano has impressed audiences at the Metropolitan Opera.

Teresa Strata, one of opera's ranking sopranos, plays Amahl's mother. Enlisted as the three kings were Nico Castel, Giorgio Tozzi and Willard White. Jesus Lopez-Cobos conducts the Philharmonic Orchestra of

I, of course, am proud to be numbered in that tasteful company. And I am delighted to be able to report to my colleagues in the club that Miss Palmer is a softly glamorous and discreetly elegant as ever.

She frankly admits to being 62. The World Almanac says she was born in 1914, which would make her 64, but why quibble? She looks smashing. There are 30-year-olds who don't look anywhere near as young and vibrant as she.

Maybe it's the good Swiss air that does it. She has been a Swiss resident for some years now.

Maybe it's the fact that she rarely acts any more.

"I acted for 40 years," she says, "and that was another life."

Maybe it's the fact that she has found happiness with a husband named Carlos Thompson and a career named writing.

"But I had left out some incidents in my life from "Change Lobsters," she says. "It was something very personal, and it didn't involve any important names, so I just left it out. But I felt it would make a good novel."

Thus, "The Red Raven," a novel which she makes no bones about telling everyone is really autobiographical.

Utilities Franchise: PSC Matter

Two utility companies will square off at a public hearing before the Public Service Commission (PSC) next Thursday to determine which of them will provide sewer and water to the Apple Valley area.

The public hearing, set for 10 a.m. in the community room of Florida Savings and Loan on SR 68 in Altamonte Springs, comes on a petition by Southern States Utilities Inc. for permission to service about 100 acres in Apple Valley.

Certification (that's what PSC and utilities prefer calling a franchise) to serve the area, however, already is held by Sanlando Utilities Co.

The hearing, according to PSC legal representative Harold A. McLenn, will deal with a question not ordinarily posed by such matters, namely, Southern Utilities' contention Sanlando should not have been franchised to serve the area in 1979 or 1971 because no need for service was shown at that time.

According to McLenn, that is one part of the criteria originally considered by the PSC before certifying a utility.

In this case, however, Sanlando received its original certification for the Apple Valley acreage in question from the Seminole County Commission when it had jurisdiction over utility franchises, and so such need for immediate or near-future service was required for a utility to get a franchise.

In 1971, according to McLenn, the PSC agreed to accept jurisdiction over existing utility franchises in Seminole County and those applied for in the future.

Sanlando already had its franchise when that happened, and whether a need to serve the area had been shown or not, PSC had to accept, according to McLenn.

"We can do it cheaper than Sanlando"

Whether Southern Utilities' contention that issuing the franchise without showing a need at the time conflicts with PSC criteria and should cause revocation of that franchise will be determined after the hearing, according to McLenn. But he noted it isn't likely.

Almost directly related to that question is whether a need exists now and whether Sanlando is prepared to meet that need.

According to Southern Utilities' representative, there are several developments in building in the 100-acre area and the service is needed now.

"And to that end, we are prepared to provide that service and we feel we can do it cheaper than Sanlando," asserted Charles Swain, a vice president with Southern Utilities.

Swain said his company can provide the sewer and water service cheaper because Southern Utilities already has lines in the area to which additional lines can be hooked.

So, the PSC will also have to consider whether Southern Utilities' ability to provide the service for less money is a valid claim and a proper subject to consider in deciding whether to issue the utility franchise in this case in deference to Sanlando's existing franchise.

Sanlando representatives feel the matter is clear. Sanlando, they argue, has the franchise and is prepared to serve the area.

"We're going to operate as we've supposed to under the law and provide that service. We stand ready today to do just that," said Hal H. Kantor, an Orlando lawyer representing Sanlando.

The important question to be resolved then, are Sanlando's franchises in 1971 if no need for service was shown, despite the fact the county commission issued that franchise with or without a need being shown?

Can Southern Utilities provide the service for the developer or developers cheaper than Sanlando's?

And if it can, should it be a factor for PSC in determining if Sanlando keeps the franchise and is permitted to serve the area if it stands ready to do so?

The 100-acre Apple Valley area in question is located in South Seminole County west of I-4 and east of Forest City.



Sorry...Wrong... Right...No Number?

When is a telephone directory not a directory? Many area customers of Winter Park Telephone Co. and Southern Bell are finding out the hard way.

A pseudo-telephone directory distributed to some, but not all, telephone customers in the Metropolitan Orlando service area has "muddled the waters" and is causing a lot of confusion, according to Harold Harbert, chairman of the board of Winter Park Telephone Co.

The metro-book put out by General Telephone Directory Co., a wholly-owned subsidiary of General Telephone and Electric Corporation, is not an official directory, Harbert explained, and does not contain a complete listing.

This fact is costing phone users who received the unofficial directory and, assuming it to be their new phone directory, tossed out their old one. Then when they attempted to look up a number that has not been included and can't find it, they call the operator for assistance and are charged for it.

"We have had a lot of repercussions from it, but there is nothing we can do about it," Harbert said. "Bell is having the same problem."

"As far as we are concerned," he said, "the official directory will be distributed in January and then maybe things will get back to normal."

Among the areas listed in the Winter Park Telephone directory, but not found in the General Telephone Directory, are Sanford, Winter Garden, Windermere and Lake Buena Vista.

Tom Hunt, manager of the Southern Bell Telephone office in Sanford, said that although he has had no complaints here, the book has caused a lot of problems for the company in the Orlando area.

"When we're responsible for putting a directory together we are going to make sure it is as timely and accurate as we can make it, especially now that there is a charge for calling for assistance," Hunt said. "However, neither Southern Bell or Winter Park is going to have to absorb the cost for assistance calls directed to by inaccuracies in the General Telephone Metro Directory when they can use our book to look up the correct number." Hot Meals Saved

The 15 people who were scheduled to be dropped from the Meals on Wheels program Jan. 1, 1979 will now be fed—some way or another.

The Order of the Eastern Star has promised to continue preparing the food for the 15 homebound elderly people who may be dropped from the Seminole Community Action (SCA) Meals on Wheels program.

Grace Perry, director of Meals on Wheels said Saturday she will know for sure by Wednesday whether the recipients will be dropped on orders from the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services.

If the program is dropped, she said the Eastern Star "is prepared to continue feeding the people until we can get the funding from another source."

The message was conveyed to Mrs. Perry this week from Eddie Robinson, district deputy mayor of the Eastern Star.

When federal funding for 30 meals daily in another Meals on Wheels program in Seminole County was shifted from Seminole Community Action to the Seminole County Federation of Senior Citizens Project OASIS in October, 21 persons who had previously been fed under the SCA program were dropped for various reasons.

When Mrs. Perry became director of the SCA Meals on Wheels program in mid-October, she included those 21 persons with the 40 persons already being served under another federal-state funded Meals on Wheels program operated by SCA. However, she received orders early this week from HRHS to drop 18 of those 21 or jeopardize the program since funding would run out.

Voices From Nowhere In D.C.

'I Hate This Season Worst Of All'

WASHINGTON (NSA) — It is 6 a.m., across the way from the Treasury Department, and two worn men pull paper coats from their backs to greet the dawn. Herman Moore stands up to greet.

Eddie Henness looks at the throats of a gray December sky. "Oh," he says, "I hate this season worst of all."

Holidays, he says, "There is a significant number of people in the nation's capital who are definitely not dreaming of a White Christmas this year."

They are the homeless poor, wretched economic orphans who must live in the streets, and Yuletide or not they have little spirit for sleeping in slum.

Herman coughs, spits, and shakes his head with a yawn. He is still wrapped in his makeshift plastic scraps from a construction site, and O.D. patches from a forgotten war.

Eddie has not yet moved at all. They both avoid looking down the police who come to chase them into the cold streets.

"Cigarette?" Herman asks.

"I'm out," Eddie replies.

"God."

For a time they just sit and rub their faces. Herman says he has been here for 10 years.

Eddie says it's too cold for him. They argue. They talk. That, slowly, the clouds from their coats, and roll the rag about their shoulders. It is 6:15 now. The homeless day is starting and the two men must be on their way, somewhere.

The production of every White Christmas is not known. City authorities believe there are hundreds of homeless people here, and poverty warms up there may be as

many as 4,000.

Jimmy Carter's nearest neighbors are among them. Scores of temporary, transients and permanent derelicts have taken up residence on the sidewalk benches and hot air ventilators close by the White House.

Some are drugged with booze; others are merely jobless, many are sick and a few may well be dying.

Dying? Medical authorities believe 11 of Washington's street people have frozen to death in the last three winters, including four who died of exposure during the chill that introduced 1977.

More recently, a derelict — trying to keep warm — sat himself on fire and burned to death.

Herman Moore says he has been nudged by kids, pushed around by cops, but always with broken bones, and forced by hunger to eat from garbage cans.

And of all the torments, winter is quite easily the worst.

The season's days are not so bad, because street people may drift in and out of the warmth of the city's public buildings.

But all night every night, cold and derelicts have been driven to corners, alleyways for the available shelter.

Some of the shelters are provided by the city.

But well-meaning as they are, the shelter programs reach only a portion of the homeless. Some of the derelicts do not qualify for the city assistance, others do not know about the private sanctuaries.

What's more, a few of the street people say they are too proud and independent to accept such help.

Therefore many of the vagrants fend for themselves, seeking refuge where they can.

They live in abandoned buildings, or they bury themselves under the snow and old newspapers.

The last place of all, they say, is atop the steel girders that cover the heating exhausts of sumptuous capital architecture.

So it is that people are sleeping on steam vents at the Corcoran Art Gallery, two blocks from the White House.

Across town, derelicts at the Kennedy Center build tents to catch the hot air.

One old man, named Willie, says he has been living for nearly 13 years on a grate outside the State Department.

And there are Herman Moore and Eddie Henness.

Age 64 and 67 respectively. They are walking along Pennsylvania Avenue now. Time 9:25. Temperature: 25.

One is a late-stage alcoholic.

The other once wanted to be an artist. They are unknown. Their only meal today will be at a Mission house.

Herman says if it snows this Christmas he is going to break a window and go to jail.

Eddie says he is going to get drunk.

But he that, however, they will of course exchange gifts. Herman is going to give Eddie his love, and, if so, Eddie will give Herman the back of his head.
