Postal Deficit Faces President's Solution
WASHINGTON, July 9. --

(NS)—A postal deficit more serious than has hitherto been calculated, confronted the administration today and brought President Hoover and his advisers squarely up against the question of increasing rates or decreasing service.

As shown for the first time at the postoffice operated at a loss of \$25,000,000 for the fiscal year just ended on June 30, this is exclusive of the \$43,000,000 which is due the railroads for back pay, and which would bring the total "red ink" figure for 1929 to \$137,000,000.

"Eighty percent of the men and women in any given American community merely live in it," says George Stuart, a Pennsylvania newspaper editor. "All tasks of a public nature are performed by a mere one-fifth of the people, a faithful few, exhibiting a fine spirit of sacrifice and a willingness, make a sincere effort to carry the burden which the others, with arms akimbo, look on, rarely to praise, frequently to criticize."
