

Van Ryn And Allison Are Considered Big Threat Of U.S. In Next Tennis Match

NEW YORK, July 8.—It was the hand of fate that traced a meadow of doom to Nobracourt, and when the fates were at its height and tony it raised an admonitory forewarning as a warning to France, gorged with most of the honors within the gift of international lawn tennis, that the inevitable famine lay in the offing. The warning was issued not on the soil of France, but devolved from the Davis Cup at a comparatively early date, or rather from America, the land to which the trophy must ultimately return. It was issued on the neutral site of Wimbledon, where our Saturday winners, Allison, the Texan, and Johnny Van Ryn, of New York, gained America's first major victory of recent years in International doubles.

Probably it would be asking the unreasonable to expect the American team of 1929 to lift the famous graft from what many Americans regard as the unassisted ground it now occupies. Tilden was one only American to reach the Wimbledon semifinals in the singles and he was beaten by French Cochet in straight sets. France, however, remains unchallenged in singles play this week over and probably can one will win in this department of the three matches necessary to the retention of the cup in this challenge round later this month.

But the wedge that will loosen the grip of rock and mortar to cause the cup to rock and fall in the year to come will follow immediately following was the victory of Allison and Van Ryn, highly inexperienced Americans, in the Wimbledon all-comers' finals. It marked the American pre-eminence finally established Europe—and France in particular—at its own game. I meant that no American double team had attained world dominance for the first time since Tilden and Johnston occupied their throne in the sheer brilliance of their individualism. It meant ultimate victory where many had looked for word to years of torture.

The doubles constitute the "old" match of the Davis Cup, during therefore, if the opposing singles players are a stand-up doubles combination the great conqueror. And for two or more years France's combination of Cochet and Burgos has had the double connected to it before it started but no more.

Its domination ended Saturday, to be more precise, at least 3 hours earlier, at which time no less than three American teams, namely Van Ryn and Allison, Tilden and Hunter and Lett and Hennessey, qualified for semi-finals. Meanwhile, the French trio, Cochet and Burgos and Landry and Boussus, had been run right out of the tournament America in consequence, we left the challenge round this year with the fighting chance that must be conceded to any team that has the "trap" or at least one match be forced to repeat it.

Weather Bureau In Spanish Village Is Blamed For No Rain

ZARAGOZA, Spain, July 7 (INS)—The peasants in the Moctay mountain region are facing a deplorable situation owing to the continuing drought that has visited them this year's crop.

Sinclair Spends His 53rd Birthday With Routine Of Prison

WASHINGTON	July 8 (INS)
Harry Ford Sinclair spent his 53rd birthday in a routine of prison	

behind bars in the big federal penitentiary and in the city streets.

Apparently the little lad born in Wheeling, W. Va., on July 6, 1876, and later becoming a capitalist with an enormous fortune within his command, never believed he would spend one of the half century days of his life in prison.

But Sinclair was on the job riding palls and attending the sick in the district jail infirmary. He has been doing just that for a few months now and will continue until early in November.

His birthday brought about the temporary return of secrecy that guards the noted prisoner's early stay at the jail. Superintendent Peck was away. Captain Campbell, in charge, refused to state just how the millionaire was observing his birthday beyond admitting he was working. "Will be allowed visitors today?" Campbell was asked. "I have been told to give out no information. You must see the jail commissioner," he replied.

Sinclair was sentenced to three months imprisonment for refusing to testify before the Senate oil investigating committee and six months for contempt of court in connection with the shadowing of a man trial here.

Ritter Says Bona Fide Guests Can Be Served Without Violation

property designed for the manufacture of liquor intended for sale in violation of statute, of which there has been no need.

It is consistent with the provision that one may have friends consider the possibility of having a still provided for the manufacture of liquor for the home use, or for the entertainment of bona fide guests, in a dwelling equipped, Judge H. L. Ritter, who was appointed to the federal bench at Miami, said in a statement in the Miami Herald.

The Volstead act is directed against the source of commercial supply. No penalty is provided in the act for manufacture or purchase of liquor for beverage purposes, nor is self-enforcing. It requires an act of congress to provide for enforcement. This act is known as the Volstead act. The enforcement procedure in this act is designed, as was the constitutional amendment, to prevent intoxicating liquors from entering commercial channels of distribution. The punishment for selling liquor for beverage purposes is the same as for制造 liquor for sale in a private dwelling.

"A search warrant cannot be issued except upon an affidavit by someone that from the private dwelling a sale of intoxicating liquor has been made. If no sales are made from a private dwelling out of the stock of liquor, it is lawful to keep, provided the possession is lawful as heretofore stated, no resident need appear in his home being searched, and if purchased a warrant should issue and the premises be searched, it is lawful to demand that the liquor be given up. The law does not prohibit the owner from giving up such liquor when demanded by law enforcement officers, however, it is unlawful to sell liquor for beverage purposes from a dwelling, even if it is a bona fide guest.

"Intoxicating liquor cannot be transported across state lines except in a vehicle or vessel, or in any conveyance from one place to another. The law, when applied to the carrier of transportation, may be violated. There is no provision in the Volstead act for transporting liquor, except as we have hitherto stated, where it is admitted to be kept in the residence. When a sale of intoxicating liquor is made in a building in the presence of an officer of the law, then there is no right to search the building. An officer may stay in the car, boat, or any other vehicle of transportation, and search the same if he has reasonable ground or probable cause before so stopping the vehicle, to believe that prohibited liquor are being transported.

"The Volstead act is directed against the source of commercial supply. It is principally concerned with preventing the sale of prohibited liquor. This statement may clarify the understanding so that the prohibition act may be intelligently discussed. The federal courts are not concerned with the regulation of manufacture, except as it is written in the law."

The law further provides that "It shall be unlawful to have or possess any liquor in
