### Consumption Of Gas In Florida Drops

Tallahassee, July 23, (AP)—The effects of the war and gasoline and tire rationing clearly showed yesterday when comparative figures of Florida's gasoline consumption for June revealed a dropping off of 24.1 percent from the same month's total a year ago.

This year's June figures also fell short of May, 1942, when 26,959,721 gallons were sold returning to the State \$1,887,180.47.

## British Strike At Invaders In Fight In Egypt

### Armored Forces Consolidate Positions Won In Two Days Of Heated Battling

(By Associated Press) In Egypt, British armored forces lanced at the Axis on Alexandria's outlying defense line west of El Alamein today, while consolidating the positions they won on the northern and central sectors in two days of sharp fighting.

A shimmering dust haze kept places of both sides on the ground during the early hours today, but British flares were piled to rear into action when it lifted as they did yesterday when German planes, mostly dive-bombers, also returned to the fray after a 48-hour absence.

The RAF News Service revealed that United States Air Force heavy bombers and RAF mediums braved bad weather to carry out devastating raids on Axis fields Marshal Erwin Rommel's string of coastal bases before dawn yesterday.

British quarters emphasized that Rommel's supply routes taking such a pounding, the important tactic was to hammer home the attack at all points, keeping his available strength dispersed and on the defensive.

However, Rommel apparently had envisioned just such an attack and during the two weeks stalemate on the El Alamein front had dug in his positions, directly with the result that it was slow work reducing them.

A German communiqué broadcast from Berlin said that German and Italian forces with 400 tanks and 1,000 aircraft were engaged in fierce hand-to-hand fighting attacks by strong British forces which were expected to be repulsed by dawn today. The Germans claimed 1,000 Imperial prisoners, mostly New Zealanders and Indians, were captured and 131 tanks destroyed while Axis forces shot down nine enemy planes.

## Neutral Nations Warned To Fight For Their Liberty

### Hull, In Radio Talk, Outlines Specific Post-War Projects

WASHINGTON, July 24. (AP)—President Roosevelt today unfolded a blueprint last night of some of the measures to be taken for a better world when the war is won, including an international agency to keep the peace "by force if necessary," and "adjustment of frontiers."

At the same time he warned the remaining neutrals that their professions of neutrality were "absurd and suicidal" in the face of the world-wide conflict, and called upon all people who prize liberty to fight for it as their duty.

His outline of post-war projects was one of the most specific made by a responsible official of the United Nations and outlined the policies previously announced by Vice President Wallace and Undersecretary Sumner Welles among others.

His address was an address of the day, but it was over all national networks and for short waves to the world. The speech was eagerly awaited since President Roosevelt had held a press conference Tuesday.

He outlined the widely discussed period of transition at the end of the war during which the United Nations co-operatively must supplement and make more effective the action of countries individually in re-establishing a public order, in providing relief and in meeting the manifold problems of reconstruction.

"Beyond that, he said, we must be before all countries the great constructive task of Christian morality in forming and building human freedom. This task, he said, will necessarily call for both national and international action.

To prevent what he said was "plain that some international agency must be created which can by force if necessary force a peace among nations in the future."
