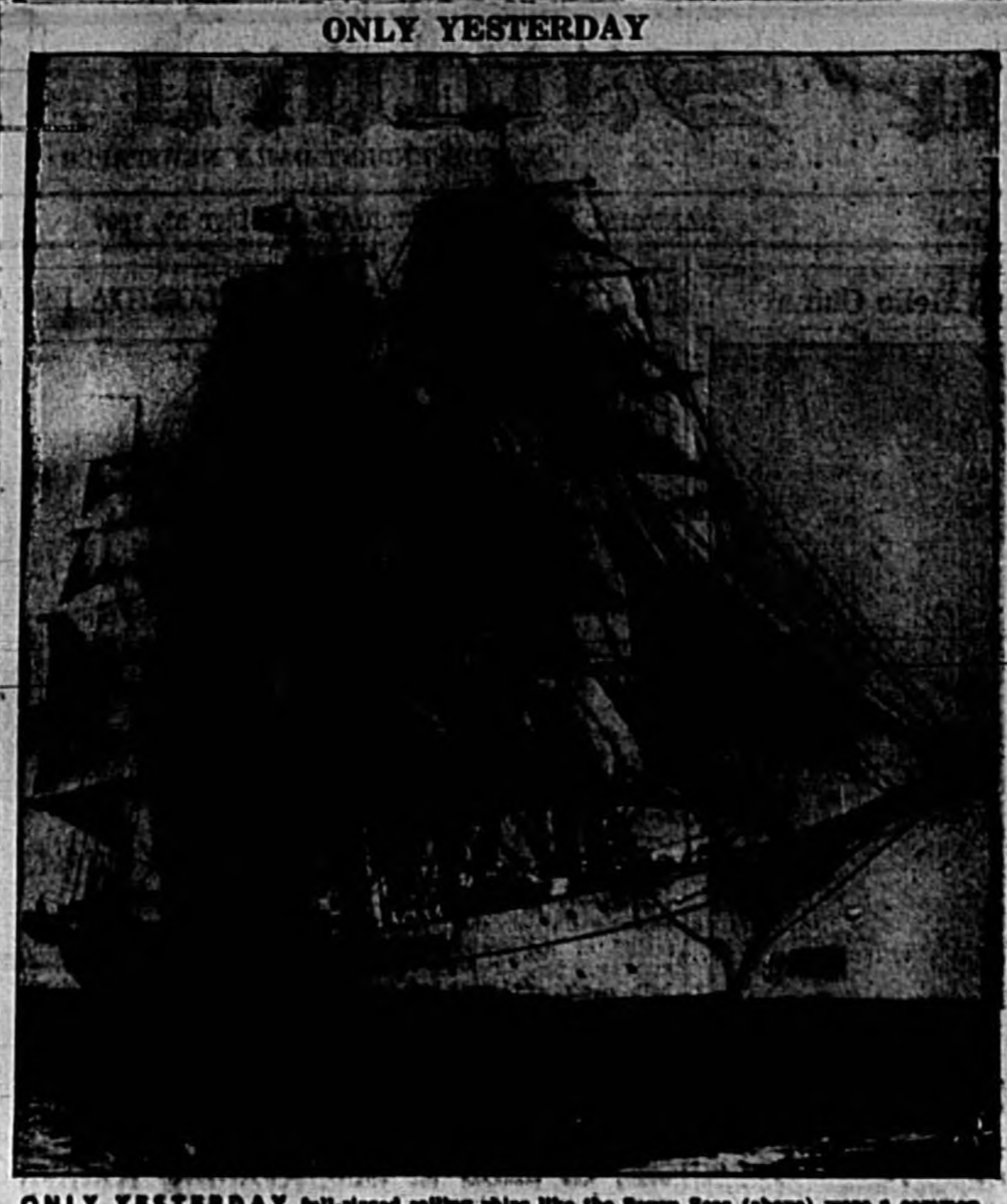

U. S. Closes Port Of Shanghai To All American Ships Except Navy Vessels

(Continued from page one) United States Dollar liner, President Hoover, left Shanghai yesterday, in which 10 Americans were wounded and offered to make any reparations that Washington might demand. They explained their military airplanes mistook the American ship for a Japanese army transport and hoped desperately that the United States government would take a lenient view of the "accident."

2. A Japanese military spokesman charged formally that the non-aggression agreement between China and Soviet Russia, announced Sunday in Shanghai and Moscow, contains secret annexes providing for military assistance to China. Japan's hope was to smash China's army beyond hope before this assistance can become effective.

3. China hoped that Japan will antagonize Great Britain further by her delay in rendering the formal apology which London has demanded for the shooting of Sir Huxley Knatchbull-Hugessen, British ambassador to China, by Japanese military aviators. The Chinese thought there was a chance that Britain will induce the United States to join with her in pressure on the Japanese which will force them to drop their invasion of this country.

4. The Japanese appeared to be winning slowly on all the major fighting fronts. In the vital area northwest of Peiping, the Japanese had cleared the area between the Nankow pass and Kalgan and most of Chahar province and were driving into northern Shansi and eastern Suiyuan provinces. Southwest of Peiping-Hankow line they claimed to have driven the Chinese back along a line about 25 miles from Peiping.

Bishops Support Campaign Against Would-Be-Miracles

VATICAN CITY, Aug. 31.—(AP)—The Vatican and Italian bishops are coming down heavily on the would-be miracles who sometimes arouse the masses of the faithful in Italy to unrelenting fervor. The excommunication of Father Raphael Codipietro in July for faking a miracle has been followed by a declaration of the Bishop of Belluno, Monsignor Giuseppe Cattaroso, denouncing a group of girls whose stories brought tens of thousands of people to the shrine of Voltago.

The Girls' Story The girls said they had seen an apparition of the Virgin, were able to touch a golden rosary she carried, but that she disappeared when they tried to cut a corner off her blue sash.

Result: trains running to the shrine of Voltago were insufficient to carry the crowds hoping to see the vision.

The bishop investigated and declared: "The girls' affirmation are not only not corroborated by facts, having any soever supernatural character, but they are vitiated by many elements which absolutely eliminate real apparitions of the Virgin. Therefore I forbid the clergy to take part in or to favor the pilgrimages of the faithful."

To Correct Abuses All this is in consequence of the decree issued by the Holy Office in June instructing bishops throughout the world to correct abuses in forms of Catholic worship. Prelates say that the Catholic Church freely admits the possibility of miracles, but is very sceptical in any way countenancing supposedly miraculous occurrences.

Stringent Investigation Two miracles must be attested and proved for canonization. They are examined with meticulous unknown in civil or criminal law cases. The hearing may go on for generations. Proponents are opposed at every turn by a canon lawyer known as "the devil's advocate." Cardinals examine this evidence in scores of sessions before passing on it.

Cone Asks Increase For State's Cripples

TALLAHASSEE, Aug. 31.—Governor Fred P. Cone said yesterday he would ask the Federal government to increase its allotment of funds to supplement Florida's \$90,000 annual appropriation for crippled children's clinics.

He said officials originally hoped to receive \$90,000 from the United States Social Security treasury, but the amount was trimmed to about \$37,000.

SMALLEST ITEM IN THE FAMILY BUDGET

Sports World Marveled At Fight Farr Gave Louis

Louis Failed In All Rounds To Deliver Deadly Blow; Farr Given Great Ovation At End

Tommy Comes Back After Tough Seventh Round To Force Louis In Defensive Shell For Four Rounds

YANKEE STADIUM, NEW YORK, Aug. 31.—(AP)—Tommy Farr, the Welshman, who wasn't supposed to have a chance, took everything but the decision last night from Joe Louis in a heavyweight championship fight that upset expectations of going the full distance of 15 rounds.

Louis had no real difficulty getting up a margin on points that gave him the unanimous decision of Referee Arthur Donovan and the two judges but the Brown Bomber's first defense months ago from Irish Jimmy Woodcock found him up against much tougher opposition than he had anticipated. Farr not only stunned the experts who had unanimously picked him to become a quick knockout victim, but thrilled a comparatively small crowd, estimated at no more than 30,000 in paid attendance by the game and dramatic fashion in which he repeatedly carried the fight to the hard-bitten champion.

Louis finding Farr troublesome as well as durable throughout the 15 rounds, failed to score even a single knock-down and was actually in retreat as the final bell found the blond challenger charging the champion and swinging hard with both fists.

Louis fired his biggest punches sans without being able to do any thing more than stop the challenger's rushes, for him occasionally and inflict a series of heavy punches about Tommy's eyes and nose.

The challenger suffered a gash under his right eye as early as the third round. By the fifth, blood was streaming from cuts under both eyes. Near the close one of Joe's short left hooks started a stream of crimson from Farr's nose but these appeared only to be minor mishaps in the fighting life of the 33-year-old Welshman, who has never been fazed in his entire career.

Louis came closest to scoring a knockdown in the seventh round. Here the champion, who had spent most of the first six rounds spearing Tommy with left hands, really got down to business. He blasted Farr's head with both hands. Tommy gave ground, while the blood dripped from his face, but his knees refused to buckle and his spirit refused to be broken by the punishment he was absorbing.

Auto Fatalities Show Increase Over 1936

CHICAGO, Aug. 31.—(AP)—Motor vehicles killed 2270 more persons during the first seven months of this year than in the same period of 1936, the national safety council reported yesterday.

An increased motor mileage in July was accompanied by an increase in traffic fatalities and 2420 persons died on streets and highways.

The traffic toll reports from 43 states showed, jumped five per cent for the month and 12 per cent for the seven-month period. Fatalities during the period totaled 20,670.

Woosung Falls Into Jap Hands

Warning Is Issued To Neutral Shipping To Avoid Japanese

SHANGHAI, Sept. 1.—(AP)—A terrifying series of great new fires roared in Shanghai tonight, kindled by the opening of naval guns and aerial bombs of Japan's big offensive against all of China.

The blaze, one of them in the Soochow Creek area facing the American-occupied sector of the International Settlement, formed a magnificent background for the military drama.

Twenty-one Japanese destroyers and cruisers pumped shells into the Changhai and Kiangwan sectors of Shanghai's north end. Japanese war planes rained bombs on Chinese positions.

Woosung, Shanghai's historic defense post at the wide river bend where the Whangpoo meets the Yangtze already was in Japanese hands but the hard-pressed Chinese were fighting on with unmatchable courage and tenacity holding firmly to many important positions.

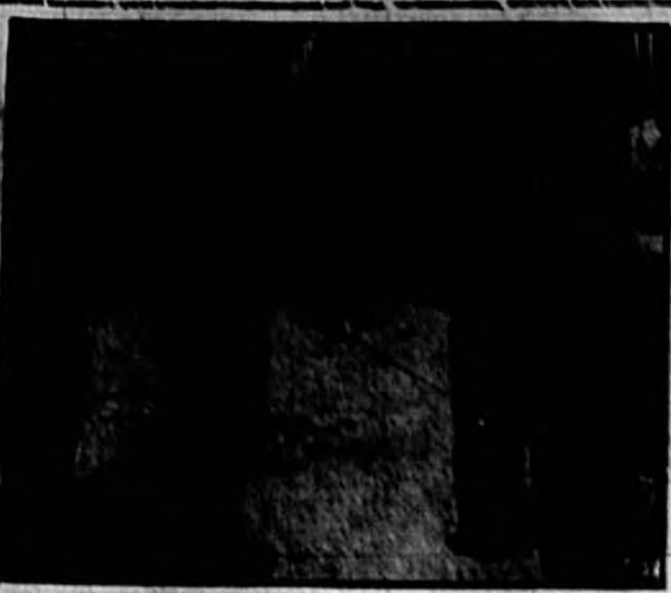
The Shanghai curtain rolled for the Japanese offensive which is to extend all over China found American and British naval commanders considering the possibility of uniting their protective strength to force a way to sea for their refugees.

That consideration was the result of Japanese naval warnings to all shipping to steer clear of the Japanese warship concentrations crisscrossing both the Whangpoo and Yangtze.

Shanghai demolished the American-mortarized Wing On Company mills at Woosung. The mills had been flying the United States flag.

An open route to the sea is demanded in Shanghai because with the International City hampered by fighting the Yangtze and Whangpoo are the only hope of escape.

Gulf Coast Tick Menaces Cattle In Gulf States

Entomologists Warn Against Pest Which Aids Screw Worm

The Gulf Coast tick, the deadly ally of the screw worm in attacks upon livestock, has made its appearance in states along the southern Atlantic and Gulf coasts, according to entomologists of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

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When the seed tick has emerged from the egg, it crawls upon a nearby bit of vegetation and lies in wait of a passing animal. If the animal, called a "host," does not come near it for 120 days, the tick dies. If a host is found, the seed tick feeds upon its blood and drops to the ground in about five days.

After molting, the tick is in the nymphal stage, and again crawls to vegetation to await another host. The nymph may live for several months. If a suitable animal victim is found, the nymph feeds upon it and drops back to the ground in six or seven days.

HYDEPARK, Sept. 1.—(AP)—Summer White House officials said today the United States government would rely on existing naval vessels in the Far East to evacuate Americans still in the danger zones of the Sino-Japanese conflict.

The announcement was made following a conference, between President Roosevelt and Admiral William D. Leahy, chief of naval operations at the Roosevelt home. Officials said the President and the naval officer went over "the whole problem" in the situation.

Since closing the port of Shanghai to American merchant ships following the bombing of the Dollar Line President Hoover, consideration has been given to augmenting the naval flotilla there to take out several thousand refugees still in the area.

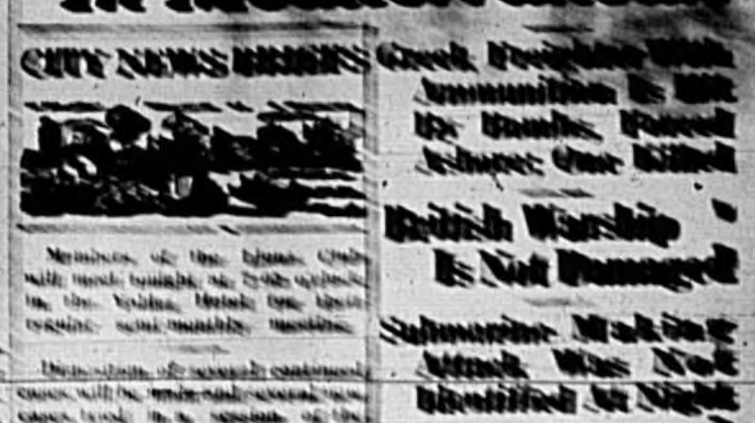
