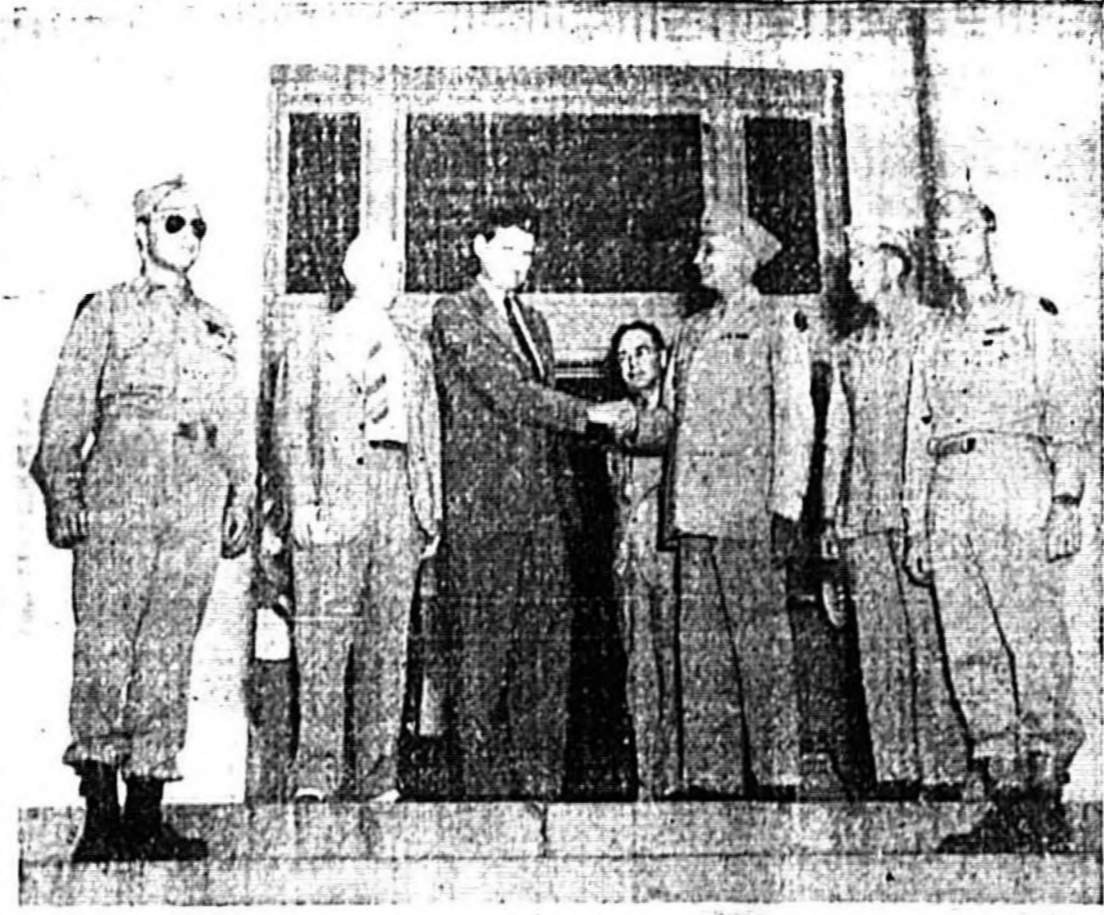

Cost of State Government Grows Considerably in One Hundred Years

GAINESVILLE, June 11, (Spe-
cial). One hundred years ago the
members of Florida's first Gen-
eral Assembly acted on the prin-
ciple of "the governor's best, who
governs best," and the manage-
ment of their appropriations im-
plied their conviction that "best
government is not least expensive
government." The second meet-
ing of the executive committee of
the House of Representatives, July
26, 1845 and Nov. 1, 1846, au-
thorizing the expenditure of
\$20 for pens, ink, paper, and ink
stands for the collection of all
of the members of the House of
Representatives of the State in
1845, and November 1, 1846,
Joseph L. Smallwood of Gadsden
County objected to such an ex-
travagant use of the taxpayers'
funds. His resolution, which
called on each House member to
furnish his own writing material
at his own expense was adopted
and Smith's defeated.

Later in the session the Senate
and House provided a salary of
\$1,500 a year for the governor
and compensation which ranged
from \$500 to \$800 for the heads
of the executive departments.
The legislators own salaries were
fixed at \$3 per day, and ex-
penses of ten cents per mile were
allowed them for travel to and
from Tallahassee. In the one
and one-half years, between July 20,
1845, and November 1, 1846,
almost 50 per cent of the entire
cost of government was allocated
to defray the cost of the legis-

lation, unemployment insur-
ance, and the numerous com-
missions and honors which protect
and benefit the citizens, were not
a function of the State. In a
haphazard way some of them
fell within the province of local
government, but the greater num-
ber were simply non-existent.

As the State grew in popula-
tion and wealth and as civiliza-
tion became more complex, neces-
sity dictated the assumption of
more and more duties by the
state; and as the services per-
formed by the state grew in
number and scope, the cost of
government was multiplied over
and over.

The past hundred years have
brought tremendous increases in
the sums paid to public officials.
The governor's salary has been
multiplied eight times, and the
attorney general's seventeen times.
One important body of public
servants, the members of the
State legislature receive little
more today than those similarly
employed in 1845, in one respect
their compensation is actually
less, for one hundred years ago
John P. Baldwin, the representa-
tive of Dale County, was credited
with 1700 miles of travel at ten
cents per mile.

Although State appropriations
are counted today in millions,
not thousands, the burden of
government is relatively lighter
than it was in 1845.

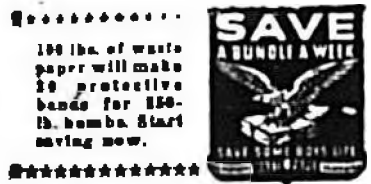

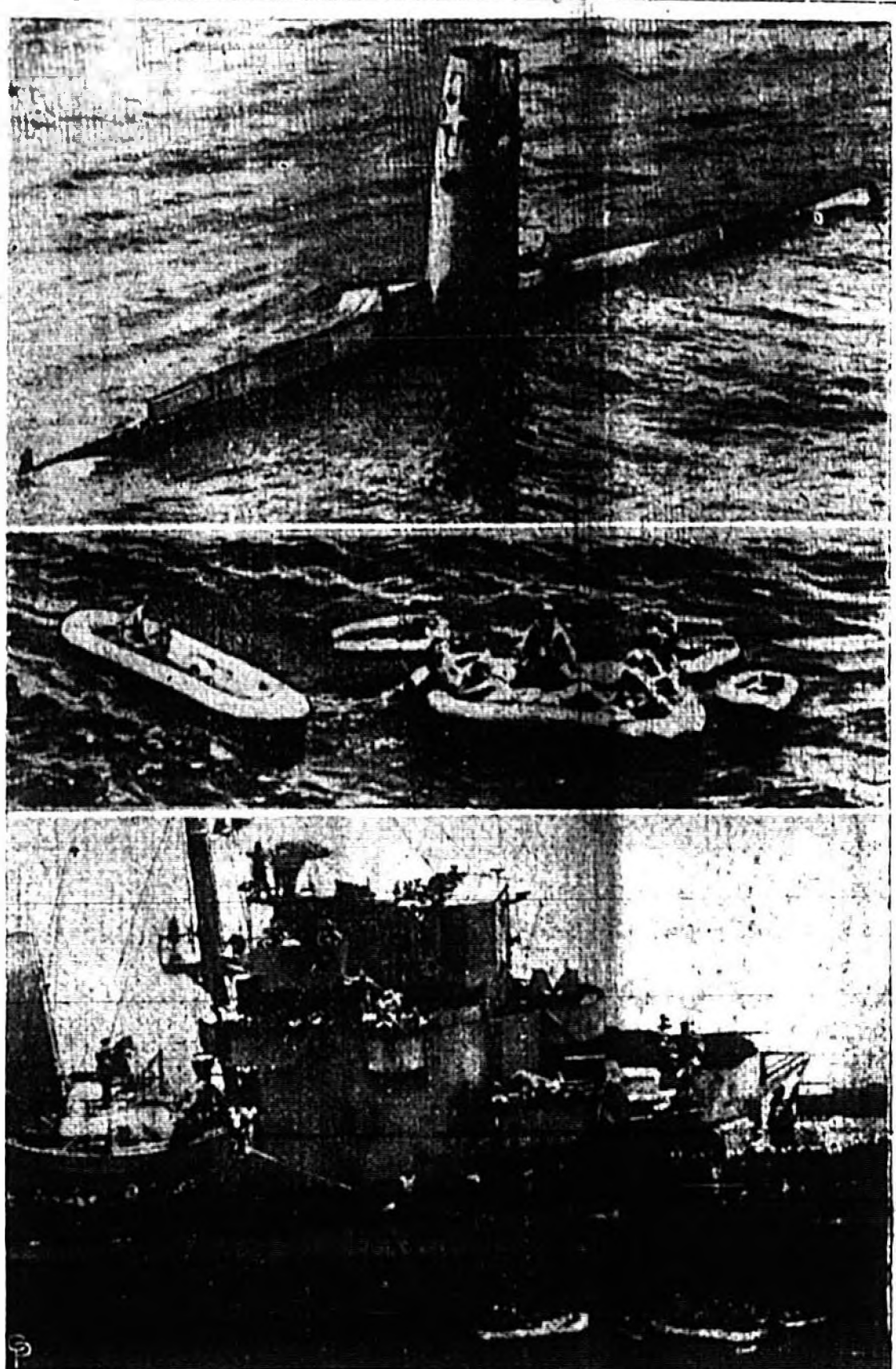
Deadlock Continues In Legislature On Reapportionment

ter under advisement, and referred it for further study to the Recreation Board of the City Planning Committee. This latter committee had previously appeared before the Commission with a request that a city recreation director be appointed for the summer months, and that the sum of \$600 be appropriated for recreational facilities. As a result Coach C. F. Kettles, of Seminole High School was named as city recreation director and the money for equipment was approved.

The Commission approved the employment of Mrs. Raymond Lundquist as clerk in the Water Department to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Miss Emma Temple.

In response to a recent protest of E. L. 2276 of the United Carpenters and Builders Guild requesting skilled labor parking by the hour to pay a city license tax as contractors, City Attorney Wilson gave what in his opinion was the definition of a contractor. As a result the Commission ordered that the occupational ordinance be amended so as not to include skilled labor working by the hour, as contractors.

A letter from Comdr. J. G. Sliney of the Sanford Naval Air Station was read, stating that approval of the Bureau of Yards and Docks had been obtained for construction work in connection with the 20 Navy trailers at the park at Fourth Street and Fresh Avenue. Work will include foundations for the trailers, to rest on, construction of two rest room buildings, complete with toilets, laundry and shower facilities. The trailers will be rented to service men and their wives. Construction work has already been started, the Commission was advised.

The following letter from the Sanford Tennis Club, in the form of a request signed by President Smith was presented to the Commission, which in turn, referred to the Recreation Board.

"In the interest of promoting tennis in the City of Sanford and providing playing facilities not only for those who are already here and desire to play, but are unable to do so because of a lack of suitable courts; and also for new comers in the service who, upon their return to Sanford in the near future will require additional recreational facilities, the Sanford Tennis Club respectfully recommends the following projects for immediate construction:

- (1) The tennis court in Fort Mellon Park should be reconstructed and levelled as to lay the court entirely in the same plane, and another court should be completely surrounded by a wire fence and protected by wind breaks.
- (2) The tennis court in the Eighth Street Park should be reconstructed, levelled and laid in the same plane with a wire fence completely surrounding it.
- (3) A unit of two new tennis courts should be constructed on the city property at Thirteenth Street and Palmetto Avenue, and completely surrounded by a wire fence.
- (4) All tennis courts built by the City or reconditioned by the City should be made of concrete of regulation size.
- (5) The electric light posts and lamps on the former tennis courts at the water works plant should be moved to the tennis courts to be constructed at Thirteenth Street and Palmetto Avenue.
- (6) A practice board should be erected at both the Fort Mellon courts and the Thirteenth Street courts.

Rockets

Rockets, at present playing an important role in knocking out Japan, were used as far back as 1232 by the Chinese in their war against the Mongolian tribes of Kublai Khan.

Long before the invention of the gun, men experimented in developing rockets, he says. Congreve, a British inventor, contributed much towards improving them.

During the Revolution, British rocket ships attacked Fort Mchenry at Baltimore, Mr. Botsford recalls. It was there Francis Scott Key witnessed "the rockets' red glare" which he put into the Star Spangled Banner.

After the outbreak of World War II the British rushed to completion a new and most effective secret weapon. It was a small combat ship armed with rockets. This rocket-firing ship, far more maneuverable than the battleship, cruiser or destroyer, can dart towards shore, spit out its lethal charges and race out to sea again.

For over three years our Navy worked to perfect a rocket-firing ship to excel all others. Today, we have the L. C. T. (R) whose salvos are equal to about two and a half times the fire power of a battleship of the huge New Jersey class.

Ready for Self-Consciousness

A good many men and women are self-conscious, especially when they are in the presence of someone who is more famous or wealthy than they.

Maybe you have never had this failing to contend with, but some of your friends surely have, so you will find an analysis of the condition and a suggestion for curing it interesting.

To begin with, self-consciousness is not a sign of weakness. It is a perfectly natural, perfectly normal matter. It does, however, mean an inferiority complex.

One woman, working for a bank in Chicago, was so self-conscious that she dreaded going to work each morning. She went to a psychologist about it and he outlined a program for her to follow for a month—a program filled to the brim with contacts with others.

Another self-consciousness victim, a man, began making canvasses of strange neighborhoods in the evenings, ringing doorbells and asking people questions in an opinion survey.

Inside of a few weeks, anyone, no matter how long he has been self-conscious, finds that this treatment of being more with people will have results. It will make the person more at ease and give him a peace of mind which no one who is self-conscious ever has.—Charles B. Roth in Your Life.

South's New Hope The decision of the Interstate Commerce Commission on Saturday, May 19, gives new hope and encouragement to agriculture and industry in the South.

This decision ordered a flat ten per cent increase in class rates (that is to say, in practically everything except large bulk shipments of raw materials) in the northern States and a decrease of ten per cent in the southern States and in the States east of the Rocky Mountains.

The Commission laid down the principle that there must be fair uniformity in the class freight rate structure of the whole Nation. Detailed rate adjustments will be made later pursuant to a study that is now in progress.

I started this fight in the Senate in 1938 with Senate Resolution 296 which I introduced and on behalf of which I spoke in the Senate. I introduced a bill to give fair freight rates to the South, S-1758 on March 9, 1939.

Before this decision was rendered by the Interstate Commerce Commission, a shipment of butter, eggs, dressed poultry, say one hundred pounds, from Dallas, Texas, to Chicago, a distance of 905 miles, would cost \$1.48 but to ship the same quantity of butter, eggs and dressed poultry from New York City to Chicago, would cost \$3.99 or 0.49 less.

To take another case: From Atlanta to Chicago is 731 miles—the first class rate is \$2.10. From New York to Chicago 907 miles the first class rate is only \$1.67. So the Atlanta shippers would pay \$0.43 a hundred pounds more, although the distance involved is 169 miles shorter.

This has helped the North and hurt the South and the West, for example, the North has only fifty per cent of the population of the country but it has sixty-one per cent of the Nation's annual income. We, in the South, however, have sixteen per cent of the population but less than nine per cent of the national income.

Nearly seventy per cent of all the people employed in manufacturing in the United States in 1940 were in the northern territory. In 1929 nearly sixty per cent of all the railroad traffic in manufactured and miscellaneous articles originated in this northern territory. To give you one more figure, of all the carloads of manufactured and miscellaneous articles which terminated in this northern territory, eighty per cent, or four-fifths originated in that territory, and only six per cent originated in the South.

The significance of that is this: we, in the south, were able to manufacture and sell to one-half the population of the United States centered in this northern territory, only six per cent of the carloads of manufactured and miscellaneous goods which they bought. We, on the other hand, manufactured less than half of the carloads of manufactured and miscellaneous goods which we bought in the South, whereas, the North manufactured over one-third of the goods we Southerners bought.

This is going to mean that our agricultural commodities will be able to get into Northern markets cheaper. It is going to stimulate industry in the South because we can compete with northern industry now on a fair basis. This is not going to hurt our raw material production in the South either. I am sure we will, in the long run, gain all the way around greatly from this momentous decision.

Great credit for this decision is due the southern Governors, particularly Governor Holland who carried on this fight for so long, and great credit is also due to our Florida's Railroad Commission for they have splendidly led this fight.

I wish President Roosevelt could have been living to have seen, too, the victory in this great fight.

Elliott Roosevelt Nicks Big Grocery Head For 200 Grand

NEW YORK June 13, (AP)—Arthur Ewing, general counsel for the Great Atlantic and Pacific Tea Co., said today the 200,000-dollar loan to Brigadier General Elliott Roosevelt from John Hartford, president of the A and P, was settled for \$4,000.

Mr. Hartford termed as substantially correct a story in west-brook Pegler's column syndicated by King Features that the son of the late President borrow 200,000 in 1939. Brig. Gen. Roosevelt could not be reached today for comment.

The citation for Mrs. duPont read as follows: Mrs. Alfred I. duPont of Delaware and Florida, president and founder of the Nemours Foundation for Crippled Children, guiding hand of large and varied enterprises, at one time a teacher in the public schools of California and Virginia, deeply interested in the children under her care, a gracious woman, whose Christian character, whose unselfishness, whose concern for the common good and for the welfare of others and whose generosity have served our country and the common good.

The citation for the Rt. Rev. Louttit read as follows: Chaplain Henry Irving Louttit, major in the Army of the United States, Bishop Suffragan of the Diocese of the South Florida, Graduate of Virginia Episcopal Seminary, former rector of Holy Trinity at West Palm Beach, a parish priest who has served faithfully his people and church, and a chaplain who has served devotedly and bravely our soldiers in this country and overseas, awarded the Bronze Star for heroism upon the field of combat in the Church.
