

Communists Sink U. S. Patrol Boat

SAIGON (UPI)—Communist gunners bombarded and sank a U. S. Navy patrol boat 20 miles south of here, possibly machine-gunning five men in the man crew, American military spokesmen said today.

The crew of the stricken craft, located off the straits and captured, were described as missing.

The incident took place Sunday night when the light craft, similar to a World War II PT boat, was patrolling the Demme River looking for Communist gun-runners.

Communist PT gun runners intercepted the stricken craft, forcing it to surrender. The crew of the boat, including a pilot, were taken to a Communist camp. The Americans held on the Communist camp but attempts to salvage the boat failed and it sank.

Da Nang Battle Won By Ky As Rebels Give Up

DA NANG (UPI)—The battle for Da Nang ended today in apparent victory for Premier Nguyen Cao Ky's government when rebel troops in the Tin Hoa pagoda surrendered and marched out with their hands up.

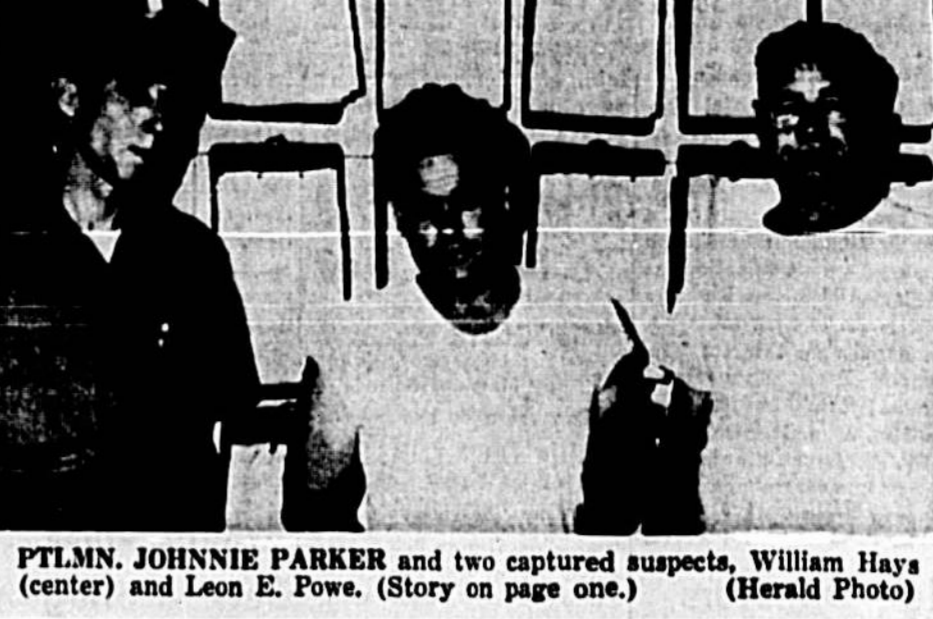
Fighting in the last hours of the battle died away almost as suddenly as it had begun, although a grenade burst or the starburst ripple of a burst of gunfire could still be heard from time to time.

Among the last casualties of the battle were three men who were slightly injured by a grenade as they left the pagoda Sunday night. They were AP correspondent Robert Foss, British freelance photographer Timothy J. Page and Alan Tiele of Paris Match.

UPI photographer Steve Van Meter, a former paratrooper, was killed off a wall by the blast but suffered no injuries. Resistance at the pagoda—the main rebel fortress here—collapsed four hours before the expiration of a surrender ultimatum handed to the insurgents by Ky's forces.

Military police who searched the building after the surrender found no trace of the rebel military commander. Wood which the monks had stacked in the temple courtyard, vowing that they would burn themselves to death if government troops attacked, stood abandoned and unburned in the yard.

Although Da Nang appeared to be firmly in the hands of Ky's forces, rebels still held the city of Hue, 80 miles to the northwest. Government forces

LBJ Optimistic Despite HCL Hike

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson appears optimistic about the health of the nation's economy—a sign an anti-inflation tax increase may not be needed.

While emphasizing he did not want to "create any false impressions" in advance of a decision on raising taxes, Johnson told a news conference that the public "usually finds we should get a better price for the things we sell and have a lower price for the things we buy."

Johnson also announced that he would rather have the nation's economy "grow a little faster" than have it "grow a little slower."

Johnson said he was proud of this prospect because it reflects lower overall government costs in the face of higher expenditures for the Vietnam war.

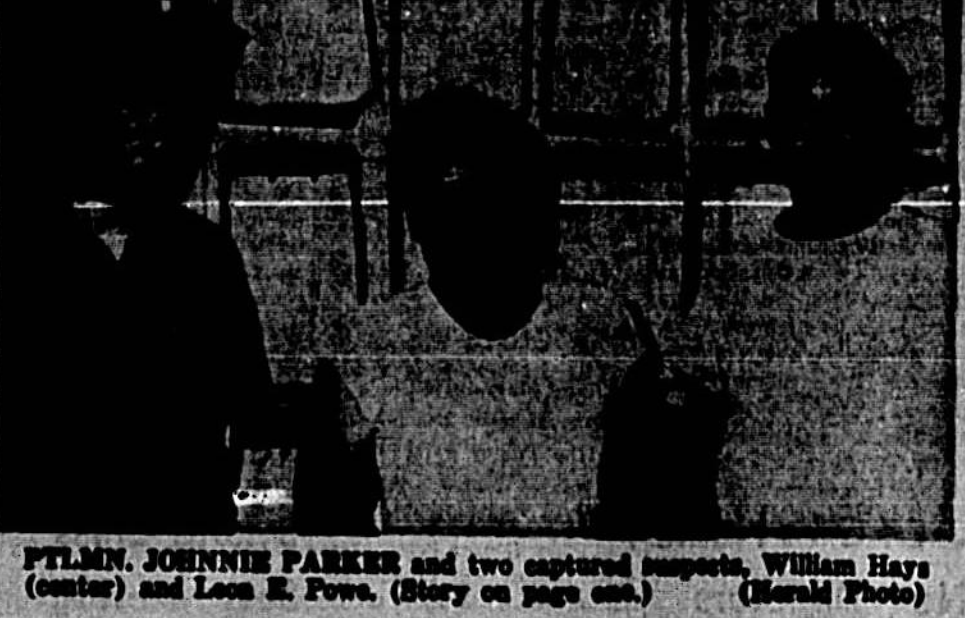

California Girl Wins 'Miss USA' From Blondes

MIAMI BEACH (UPI) — A tuck-shy California beauty who shot down tradition and the blondes will represent the United States against 60 foreign beauties in the Miss Universe contest here in July.

Marie Judith Ramsey, 21, once a foreigner, herself, decided herself out in a form-fitting swimsuit and a gold brocade gown Saturday night and won the Miss USA title before a national television audience.

The brown-haired, brown-eyed beauty, who fled Hungary in 1956 with her family during the Hungarian revolution, thus became the first non-blond to win the title in its five-year history, the contest against 60 girls.

Marie, who was dry-eyed and rapidly composed about the whole thing—even when the crown and roses were presented to her—travels to New York Wednesday and also will travel to Brazil before returning here to vie for the Miss Universe title.

As Miss USA, she is assured of a place among the semi-finalists in the Miss Universe pageant.

The 25-28 University of California junior majoring in physics picked up \$5,000 in cash and a \$5,000 personal appearance contract for the coming year as the Miss USA winner.

"I may take my parents to Hawaii," she said, possibly posing in the surf for photographers. "Also I'll continue my education. I want to get my doctorate."

Her wide mouth broke into a ready smile, displaying molars and a sparkling smile. A Sophia Loren nose, she said she would like to carry on research in high-strung physics and hasn't the slightest intention of seeking a theatrical career.

She said she would like "maybe three" children but has no particular husband in mind.

There is a boy friend at Berkeley "but I don't know how special he is yet."

Marie was born in Tversted, Denmark, where her father was a member of the Hungarian Army of Occupation, she later moved to Hungary with her family.

As for the escape during the Communist smashing of the Hungarian uprising: "We took a train to a little town, then walked for eight hours through the snow. When we went across this place in the border and kept walking until we found some Austrian police, Marie said.

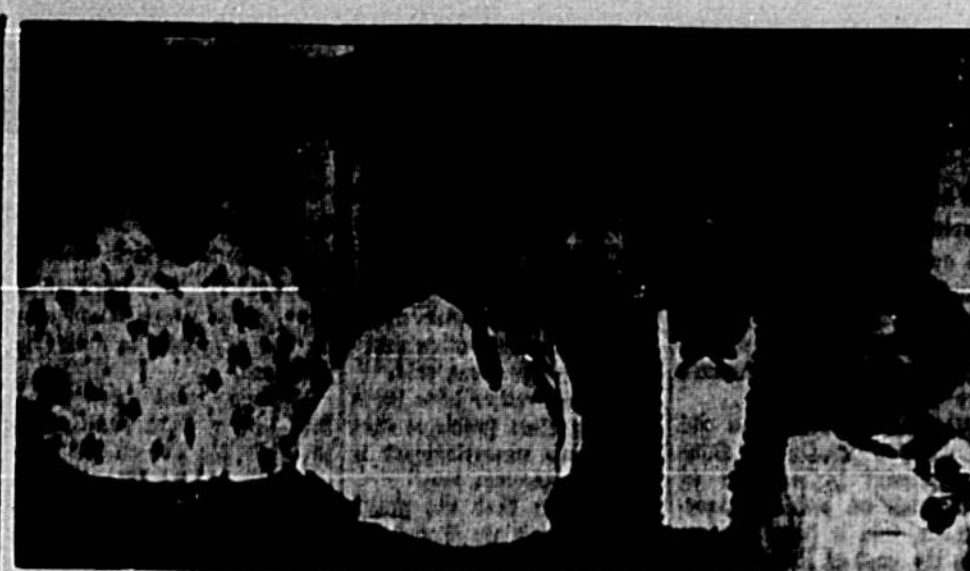
She speaks Hungarian, German, Spanish and English.

The newly arrived college student is free. He calls his own shots and, within the mildest constraints, does as he wants. This is an abrupt change from life as a high school pupil. At the extreme, a good high school pupil may become a lachrymose, sentimental, and disvalued — or he may become all wrapped up in one subject, one issue or one person and lose out on the broad experience and training that college should provide.

Under the best of circumstances the new student will find himself modifying and strengthening his personality. He is an adult now. An adolescent's manner is no longer suitable. College is necessarily a period of profound personality change.
