Gang recruitment law

Circuit Court Judge Gene Stephenson will hold a hearing today on the constitutionality of Florida's street gang recruitment law. The hearing is scheduled for 2 p.m. today in Seminole County Juvenile Court in Sanford.

The street gang recruitment law makes it a third-degree felony to try to recruit a person into a street gang. Last February, investigators from the Sheriff's Office Gang Suppression Squad arrested three teenaged boys for violating the law.

Victor Boyd, 16, Thomas Savastano, 15 and Jeremy Estep, 15, are accused of beating a 12-year-old boy who refused to join their street gang last February. The beating occurred at the Regency Apartments on State Road 436 in Fern Park. The suspects are currently awaiting trial in Seminole County Juve-nile Court.

The street gang recruitment law is being challenged on the grounds that it violates the estitutional rights of freedom of speech and freedom of association. The challenge was field by the Seminole Public Defender's Office. The Seminole County State Attorney's Office will argue on behalf of the law.



Preserving property rich in history

Golden Rule Housing and Community Redevelopment Corporation is on a mission to save a historic property in Sanford.

The nonprofit agency, that provides affordable housing for low to very low income individuals, is seeking funds to purchase the Harria property which includes four parcels in the Goldsboro area.

The main house, located on 2nd Street off Sanford Avenue, was built in the early 1900s. Originally owned by the Stanley family, the property became the home of their daughter. Montez, who later married Frank Harris.

Montez Harris went on to become a teacher and then principal at the grade school for col-ored children located on the corner of Cypresa Avenue and 7th Street, and then called the Hopper School, according to Altermese Bentley, a Golden Rule board member.

Bentley, born in 1810 and a lifeiong Senford resident, remembers Harris as her third grade teacher in 1920.

"She was a very strong and positive person." Bentley said. "She modeled behavior for children and she taught me to be critical yet sensi-

Serving as unofficial historian for the Harris story. Bentley maintained a relationship with her old teacher throughout her life, never losing contact.


After Harris retired, she owned and managed a day care center on 3rd Street, which is also included in the parcel. in addition to two small homes on 6th Street. Harris's daughters Thelms and Beatrice bequeathed the parcels to the United Negro College Fund.

'The importance of preserving the home has historic significance which is inclusive." Bentley said. "Where the home is located would enhance the entire town."

Cynthia Hamilton-Smith, director at Golden Rule, said the homes are currently unoccupied. but the agency is concerned because of the vagrants and drug dealers who frequent the property.

"We don't want to see the house go up in flames," Smith said. "It is an emergency situation now."

TAMPA -- Two Seminole County residents. Breanne Anderson of Lake Mary and Rebecca Avrett of Sanford, have been selected to attend college this fall with assistance from a unique college scholarship funded by Florida division of American Cancer Society.

They are among 66 Florida students selected for this program who have battled cancer, and won. Pol Pot's crimes must be addressed

was forced to fice their native Cambodia. For seven days and nights, Noy's mother, father, five sisters and two brothers walked, on foot, from their tiny village to safe haven in the neighboring country of Thailand.

Though she was just a little girl then, Noy can remember her family's exodus from war-

refugees. She remembers exploding bombs. She remembers gunfire. But most of all, she remembers people dying all along the perilous

One of those who perished was Noy's frail young brother. The arduous walk, through fields and forests and finally over mountains. took a fatal toll on the lad.

Nonetheless, Noy considers her family lucky to have escaped Cambodia. Soon after they fled, their village was overrun by the Khmer Rouge army, led by Pol Pot, then known as "Brother Number One." Many of their friends and neighbors were killed or maimed. Those who survived were conscripted to Communist work farms.

It's because of that experience of 22 years ago that Noy, one of an estimated 150,000

native Cambodians living in the United States. is eager to see Pol Pot brought to justice, now that the tyrant has been deposed as leader of

the Khmer Rouge.

Many Americans may consider this strictly a Cambodian matter, one that does not concern the United States. But we are a nation committed to human rights. And of all the human-rights violations that have occurred over the past quarter-century, few can compare to the atrocities that Pol Pot visited upon his people.


That is why the United States must not stand idly by, watching developments in Cambodia from afar. This nation has a vested interest in seeing Pol Pot answer for his war crimes. Not just on behalf of the 150,000 Cambodian-Americans, but also on behalf of conscientious

Americans, but also on benair or conscientious Americans who oppose despotism, oppression and genocide in any part of the world.

As to Noy, it matters not to her that the tyrant who drove her family and hundreds of thousands of other refugees out of Cambodia is now old and enfeebled. Nor does it matter that he were huntilisted to the most of tense in a tense in the season in t he was humiliated to the point of tears in a recent show trial, denounced by his former Khmer Rouge comrades and sentenced to serve out the remainder of his life under house

She will not be satisfied, nor will most Cambodian expatriates, until Pol Pot is brought before a legitimate court where he would be tried and punished for his five-year reign of terror, from 1975 to 1979, during which as many as 2 million Cambodians died of disease, starvation, overwork, torture or execution.

Black and white birth rates the same

"Blacks have so many children." How many times have you heard that? If you're like most while Americans, the answer is: forever.

But it's not true anymore. That it is no longer true probably signals a major change coming in American society, mostly for the better. Consider first the dramatic turn in the data:

The total fertility rate (TFR) fell from 2.48 children per black woman in 1991 to 2.15 in mid-1996, a decrease of 13 percent, the lowest rate for blacks ever recorded. Over the same time frame the TFR for white women did not decrease, actually growing very slightly, from 2.00 to 2.01. The fertility differential between 2.00 to 2.01. The fertility differential between the races is now only about 7 percent, and closing rapidly. Give or take a tenth of a child, the rates are about even. (Source: National Center for Health Statistics.)

By contrast, back in 1980 the difference between white and black fertility was not 7 percent, but 30 percent. A decade earlier, the differential was 25 percent.

The rate of closure among teen-agers is even more dramatic. From 1991 to 1996 there was a 7 percent decrease in white teen-age birth

7 percent decrease in white teen-age birth rates -- and a 20 percent decrease among black teen-agers! (With an 8 percent drop among black teen-agers during the last year alone.) This is particularly important because about 75 percent of all teen-age births are illegitimate, with an even higher ratio for black teen-agers. Teen-age fertility, delayed now, should mean a lower ratio of illegitimacy in the

So far, this is very good news for blacks and for all Americans -- a great leap forward. The decline in black fertility probably reflects several diverse attuations. There has been substantial growth in the black middle class in recent years. Black median income has climbed faster than white income since 1990, although there is still a large gap. Black and white high eshed graduatest rates are now just altest at partly, roughly 90 percent by age 25. There were about 200,000 blacks with college degrees in 1950 and 500,000 in 1970. Today the number is 2.7 million. As a general rule, people in the middle class, with higher education, have lower fertility rates than less-

education, have lower fertility rates than less-educated people.
In some respects, lower fertility rates not only reflect middle-class households but also help claste middle-class households. After all, a sensetant moons with fewer mouths to feed yields higher per capita income.

Welfare reform has also played a role, in the early 1980s states began getting federal welfare watvers that demanded work from ablebodied persons on welfare. This had the effect of providing disincentives to out-of-wellock births, particularly among teen-agers. The passence of the branch 1886 federal profess.

reform law has made those disincentives more powerful still. Smaller families, more income and more

income per capita, higher educational attainment, and less illegitimacy -- that's not only all to the good, but likely self-perpetuating. Moreover, as white-black fertility rates approach parity, a certain sort of antiblack sentiment may diminish. For a long time these has been an incheste feer among tame there has been an inchoate fear among some whites that blacks will become an ever-larger proportion of the population. Actually, the percentage of blacks in the American population today (12 percent) is much lower than it was in 1850.

I do see one problem with the current situation. Blacks who have done well have even lower fertility rates than whites. As readers of this space know, I regard American fertility rates among the middle class as way too low. College-educated white women have a TFR of about 1.6 children per woman. It takes a 2.1 rate merely to keep a population constant over time. But college-educated black women have an even lower fertility rate than whites (1.5 children per woman).

in an important way, the very low fertility rate among college-educated black women is more disturbing than the near-similar white rate. We have all heard the (appropriate) pleas for black "role models." College graduates are likely to be able to give their children most of the advantages of good education and a stable home life. If those college graduates then have very few children, they are, in effect, lowering the number of role models for the next generation - just when another great leap forward should begin.

PSC orders MCI to seek customers due refund

TALLAHABSEE -- The Florida Public Service Commission (PSC) voted yesterday to require MCI Telecommunications, Inc. (MCI), to make additional efforts to locate customers still entitled to \$277.034.67 in refunds from overcharges for collect calls from prison facili-

The overcharges resulted when MCI charged more than the rate cap established by the PSC for operator-assisted intrastate collect calls from prison pay phones. (Intrastate calls are those that originate and terminate within the state.) MCI reported that it had been unable to locate the customers entitled to the refunds.

In addition, the PSC voted to order MCI to refund 890,565.88 in interest on the overcharges. and decided to hold in abeyfined 825,000 for failure to adoriginal refund order. MCI ad- 10. 1096. MCI would refund

AT&T must settle overcharges

TALLAHASSEE--The Florida Public Service Commission (PSC) voted yesterday to approve a settlement by AT&T Communications of the Southern States. Inc. (AT&T) to make direct refunds of \$513,042.20 to customers who were

overcharged for in-state long distance calls.

The overcharges resulted when AT&T billed in-state long distance calls at the 15-cents per minute tarified rate, rather than 10-cents per minute, as it had advertised in special promotion brochures. AT&T has agreed to refund the difference to the 79,000 customers who were overcharged.

AT&T will provide refunds for calls made between October. 1996 and March, 1997. In most cases, the refunds should appear on customers' bills as credits, and should be received by September 1, 1997. Affected customers should contact AT&T if they have not received their refunds by this date.

At the moment, Albright said, U.S. officials 'are exploring different ways to ensure that er trial there is. I and valid in terms of the international community." The problem is, the United States will have to figure out a way to get the Khmer Rouge to turn over Pol Pot.

This might have been an easier undertaking a month ago, before a coup forced First Prime Minister Norodom Ranariddh from power. Ranariddh had engaged in 'peace' talks with the Khmer Rouge, granting amnesty last year to one of its leaders, which in turn lead other guerrillas to defect to the government.

Ranariddh was betrayed by Second Prime Minister Hun Sen, who now presides over the government in Phnom Penh. Hun Sen previously worked in the Cambodian government when it was backed by Communist Vietnam (which helped drive the Khmer Rouge out of power). Neither he nor Khmer Rouge leaders will have anything to do with each other.

Only a remnant of the Khmer Rouge army remains, and they want to come in from the Cambodian jungles. But they can only do so if they work out terms with the Cambodian government. And one of the conditions of such an accord should be that the Khmer Rouge hands over Pol Pot, to be followed later by other Khmer Rouge war criminals.

What can force Hun Sen and the Cambodian government to work out such an arrangement with the Khmer Rouge? Simple. The United States should use its leverage to persuade the rest of the international community to withhold all nonhumanitarian aid from Cambodia unless the government goes along. Without such aid. Hun Sen's government will almost certainly collapse.

The objective in all this is not to destabilise the Cambodian government, but to bring a war criminal to real justice before he goes gently

Surgery is best bet for cataracts

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have cataracts that severely hamper my vision. My doctor wants to operate. Yet I have a friend whose doctor dissolves her cataracts with drops. I contacted a major state medical school to learn more about this new technique but they have never heard of it. Have you? DEAR READER: No, I haven't.

Cataracts are caused by clouding of the normally clear natural loanes through which we view the world. Ophthalmologists treat advanced cataracta by replacing them with artificial lenses. This is usually a safe and painless procedure.

My consultants assure me that there is no method using drops to cure cataracts.

Perhaps your friend is mistaken, as I am told many patients are. She may be receiving drops for glaucoma (a completely appropriate therapy) and may incorrectly believe that the medicine is for cataracts, which often coexist with glaucoma.

In case you end up following your doctor's advice, I am sending you a copy of my Health Report "An Informed Approach to Surgery." DEAR DR. GOTT: Should I use estrogen patches? I am 64 and in good health, except for the usual consequences of the aging process.

DEAR READER: Entrogen (a female hormone) is now recommended for post-menopausal women who want to reduce their risk of osteoporosis, beart disease and Alzheimer's disease. On the downside, the hormone is associated with a low but significant risk of uterine and breast cancer.

Estrogens are available by prescription in intravenous, intravaginal, and oral forms, as well as the patch. The oral and patch products are the ones most commonly used.

Whether you should be taking hor-mone supplements is an individualized decision that you will have to make in conjunction with your family practitioner or gynecologial.

The patch is very effective. Applied once or twice weekly (depending on the brand), it supplies the missing hormone. In most cases, another female hormone (progestin) must be given in a cycle with the estrogen This combination usually causes normal vaginal bleading, a complication that many women abbor.

Nunetheless, many women feel better on the patch, because their symptoms of menopause are relieved and they can be confident of the added health benefits.

Work with your doctors to determine if you are a candidate for dermal estrogen replacement.

DEAR DR. GOTT: On several occa-sions, you have advecated the use of Boundry! as a sale and inseparative sloop aid. However, your readers should be aware that it can worsen glaucoms and therefore should not be used by patients with this eye disease.

DEAR READER: Right you are. Thanks for writing. In some poop Bonadryl can increase the fluid pri sure within the cychall. Although not a preblum for the average consumer, this reaction could certainly worsen glaucoma - and, incidentally, may


