# Fired Employee Admits Sleeping On Job

A fired police dispatcher in an appeal to the Winter Springs City Council for reinstatement employees along in the nearby law department ready room while on duty and watch television at day and are neither represented nor fired.

She had been employed by the city as a dispatcher for nearly two and one-half years before she was fired.

In addition, Mike Taylor submitted copies of two written communications for her work that she said she had received from dispatch supervisors and a copy of a memo issued by the chief dispatcher citing her duties and those of the other dispatchers. She said the memo specifically designated a dispatcher other than herself to do all things. Yet, after the memo was issued, a letter was placed in the city's criticism file for failing to do properly, she said.

Commissioner John DeBattistis pointed to a work evaluation sheet on Mike Taylor's performance on the job prepared by Chief Goverich in November, rating her as excellent, above average and average in all areas, but not.

She admitted that she had admitted by being out of the dispatcher's office a week and a half and had not done any work during that time. She said she had not been to work for a week, starting this in when the department was in a state of confusion.

Goverich presented to each commission a list of the information from Mike Taylor's personal record, showing a record of 100 percent on all work.

The list of work records, however, did not include a copy of the communication for the missing Mike Taylor's commission.

The council agreed that a decision on her requested reinstatement should be made at a 7 p.m. hearing prior to the regular council meeting, next week.

## Contract Talks Open With Teachers Asking Pay Hike

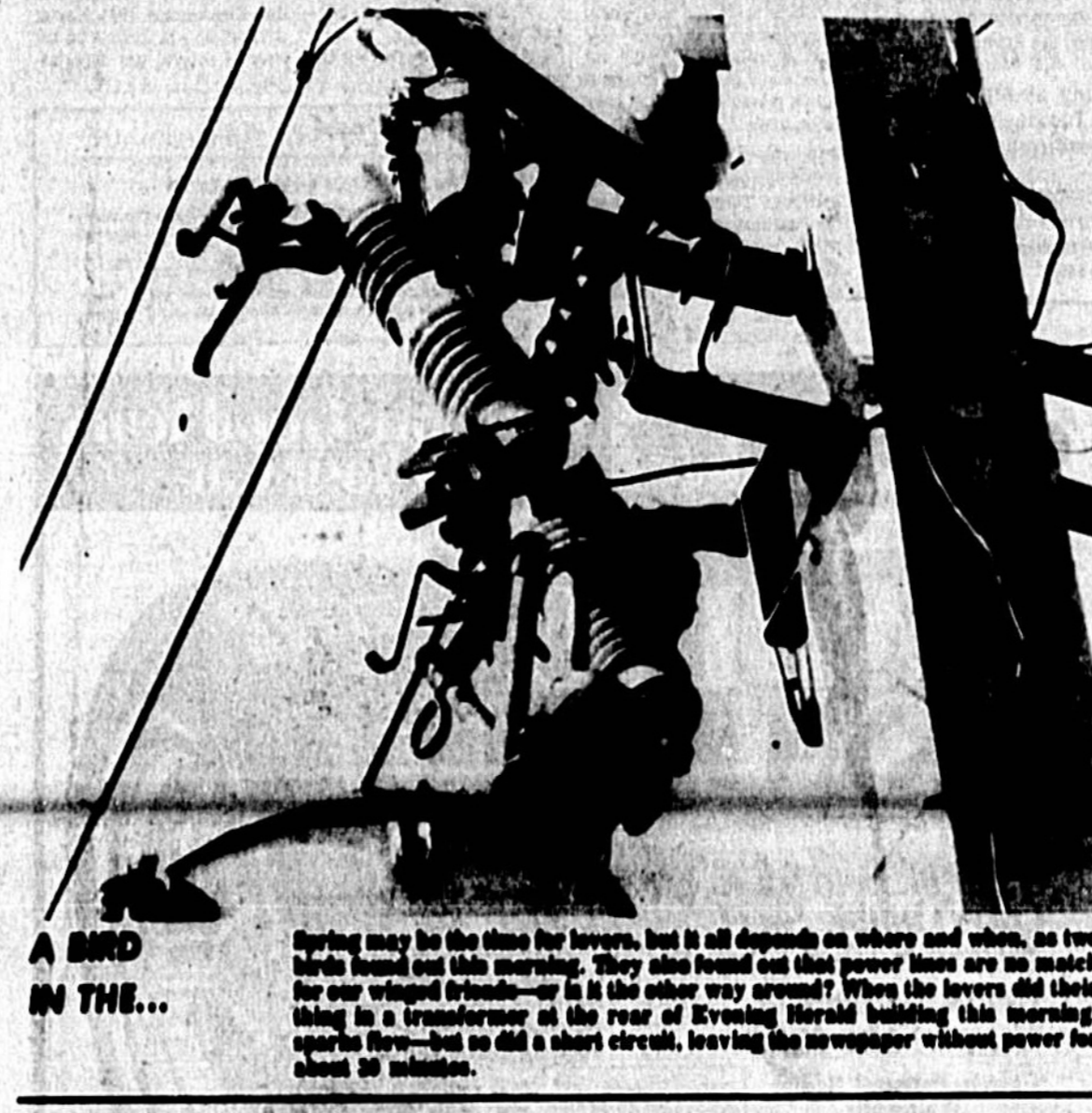

## Winter Springs Attorney Fired, Quits, On The Job

Gary Massey is city attorney of Winter Springs today even though he was fired by the city council last week and submitted his resignation to Mayor Fred Pineda Tuesday night.

"Massey will continue to serve until such time as I appoint legal counsel and the appointment is approved by the city council," said Pineda. The mayor said he is proceeding with all possible haste to find a replacement. But he wanted there to be some legal question regarding the council's authority to fire the city attorney.

The council last week on a vote of 4-1 fired Massey. Commission John Daniels, who spearheaded the move to fire the attorney, said that statement by Massey indicated he had not been giving the city the best legal advice.

Charles Pellerin, Bart Logan and Thomas Cryan — who had voted to cast him from office. Only Commissioner John DeBattistis voted against the firing.

"But, the attorney said that would have cost time, confusion and money. He said he had tendered his resignation to the mayor. 'I am here,'" he said, "because the charter provides that the city shall have a city attorney."

"I want the citizens to know the import of the action you have taken," said Massey in the council.

Daniels, who had tendered his resignation for Massey's dismissal last week when the attorney was not present, said Tuesday night he had been an oral appointment. "I was not aware that you wouldn't be here," Daniels told the attorney.

"The I don't see where you should have been appointed. We all have a vote a matter of time," said Daniels, adding statements made by Massey the week before had been the climax to the agreement between the majority of the council and the attorney.

"I would have to have a judge tell me I did something illegal," said Daniels, adding he thought Massey was a very good attorney. He said he had been a member of the council for 10 years and had seen many attorneys come and go. He said he had never seen one who had been so good as Massey.

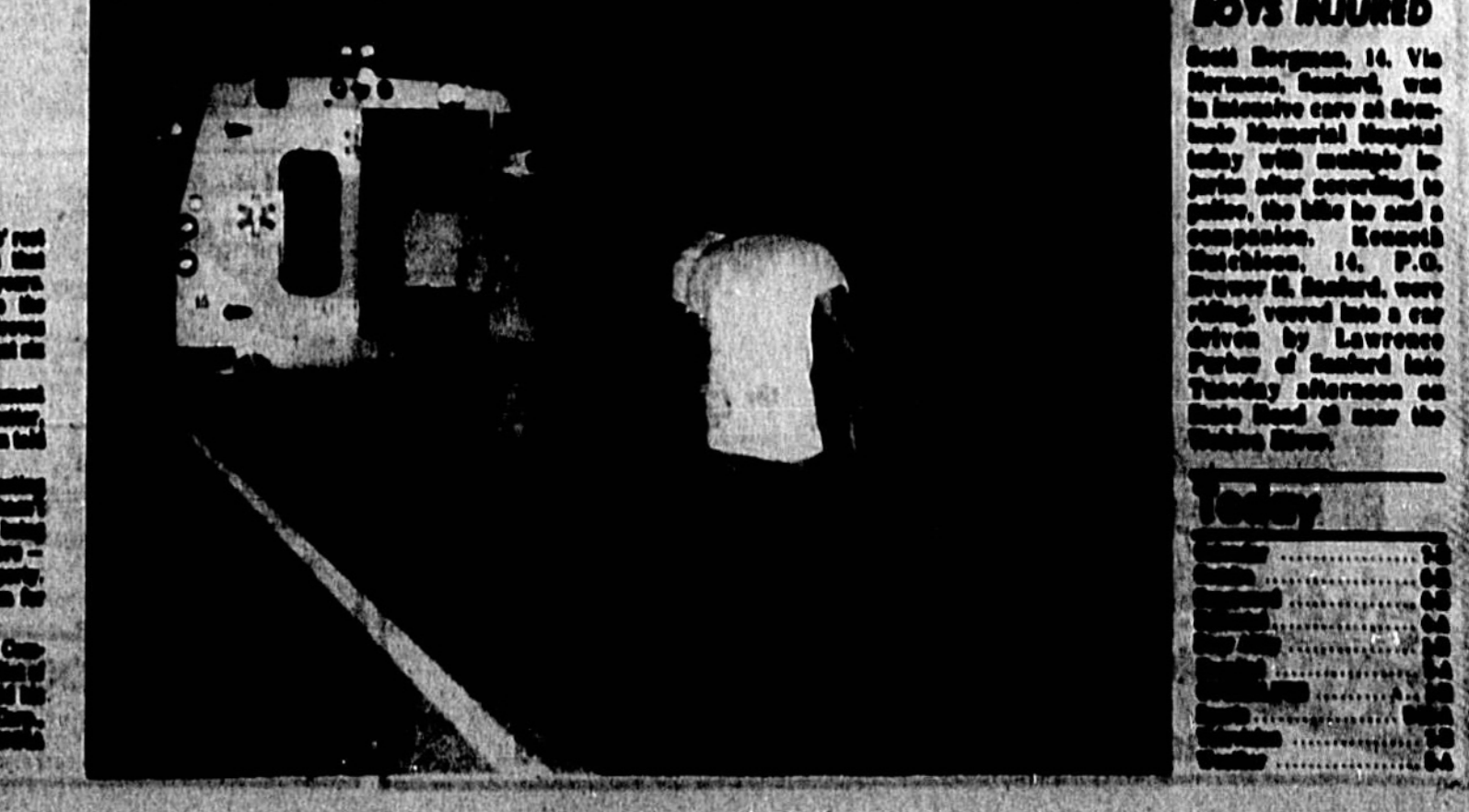
## One Tree Will Go, The Sign Will Stay

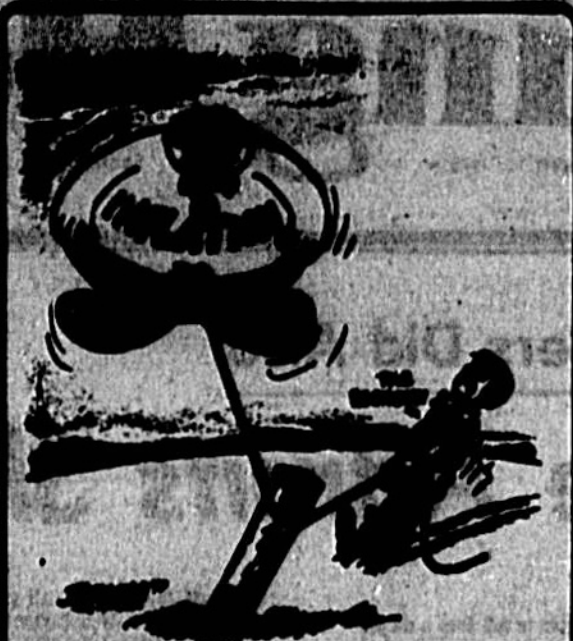

**Rx For Health Plan**

Sen. Edward Brooke is now again pushing national health insurance, but this time the Massachusetts Democrat is trying something new. Instead of arguing for a national health insurance plan by which the government would pay everyone's medical bills, at a cost of more than \$100 billion annually, he now proposes a plan in which private health insurance plays a significant financial role.

Sen. Kennedy has not specified how significant that role should be. But what is important is that he concedes that private insurers have a vital part to play.

The new plan suggests close agreement between the Democratic leadership in Capitol Hill and the White House, which could produce a national health insurance law with a greater chance of passage than the more extreme Kennedy proposal of the past.

Mr. Carver himself has correctly opposed the idea of complete government financing of health care for all.

Opposition to total government financing is well-based. It would require higher taxes, increased federal borrowing, or both; inflation would be aggravated.

However, because the government would be paying the bill, it could exercise control over the practice of medicine, the operation of hospitals and the delivery of health services. The predictable result would be raised medical costs and reduced medical services.

The requirement for national health insurance rests on the need to bring quality medical care within reach of most Americans.

Such a plan should limit the government to a modest role—to paying, for example, on the insurance premiums of the most impoverished.

It should provide Americans with a choice among insurance plans—including the choice of not subscribing to any plan.

It should give incentives for the health-care industry to spread loss evenly.

At the same time, it should not deny coverage to the millions who are already insured or to the millions who are not.

In every way, Mr. Carver will announce the principles underlying his own health insurance plan, which, we trust, will be similar to those we have outlined here.

Thanks to Sen. Kennedy's willingness to rely on private insurers for national health insurance, Mr. Carver has an excellent opportunity to enact a landmark health program that could be one of the more enduring monuments to his administration.

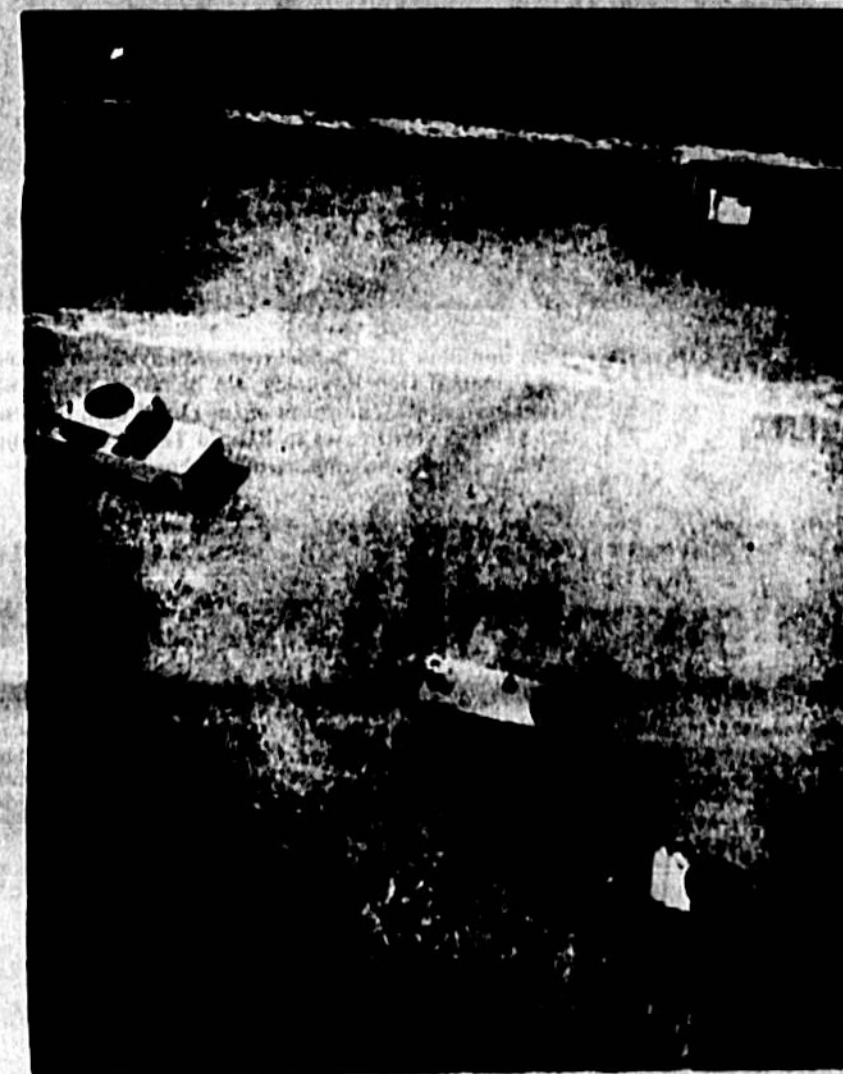

## Drugs In Our Schools: Dog Will Be Used To Sniff Them Out

Although Volusia County has spent several weeks reviewing the possible use of drug-sniffing dogs in its schools and has not yet reached a decision in the matter, Seminole County's school board has.

The Seminole County School Board Wednesday night voted 8 to 0 to permit the use of a police dog to sniff out drugs in students' lockers, the teachers' lounge and gymnasium and administrators' cars. The idea came about through School Board Chairman Pat Tolson who said the dog had sniffed out Volusia County's schools and decided the county should put the drug-sniffing program into effect.

A committee of Volusia County principals is studying the county's proposal and will make recommendations at a later date, according to a spokesman for that board. While members of the program have not been notified there, Volusia County is considering using the dogs to sniff out drugs in student lockers and cars only, board members said.

The program was originally discussed in Volusia County several weeks ago, when a board member there learned of a dog program in Houston, Texas.

Several students have opposed the program in Volusia County.

according to the spokesman. However, responses from parents have been supportive, and the officials.

In Seminole County the program may lead to student arrests, school administrators said. County School Board Chairman Tom Hotal has not yet worked out details of just how far the program will be carried.

The original proposal to use the dog for sniffing lockers was expanded at the suggestion of school board member Duke Hotal. "I expect also that the dogs should be used in teachers' lounge and cars and administrators' offices and cars," he said.
