



Heating Oil Cost Up

BOSTON (AP) - Home heating oil prices have risen 44 per cent since last winter in the Boston area, and a consumer organization says they will go up nearly that much again before this winter ends. The average price of a gallon of home heating oil last week was 30.26 cents, compared with a winter average of 21.07 cents a year ago, according to the Boston Consumers' Council, For the average homeowner, who burned 1,600 gallons last winter, the heating bill will jump from \$337 last winter to \$484 this year. That's assuming he doesn't comply with President Nixon's request to turn down his heat, and that the cost of oil doesn't go up again.

Toilet Paper Shortage?

NEW YORK (AP) - A toilet paper shortage? That's what Rep. Harold Froehlich, a Republican member of the House from Wisconsin, says. Froehlich said a shortage of pulp and rising pulp experts could mean various paper shortages, including a toilet paper crunch, sometime early next year. He quoted an official of Sheraton International in Boston as saying that paper products from matchbooks to memo pads are "all in short supply.

Foreign Aid Fate Gloomy

WASHINGTON (AP) - Administration forces expect to lose a battle in the House on the huge foreign trade bill. The issue is a proposal to bar billions of dollars in essential U.S. credit loans for Soviet trade until the Russians relax their emigration policy. The move, opposed by President Nixon, is backed by a coalition of con-

Glenn Seeks Senate Post

CLEVELAND, Ohio (AP) - John Glenn, the first American to orbit the earth, has announced he will seek the Democratic nomination to the U.S. Senate from Obio

In 1964, Glenn withdrew from the race because of an primary by Howard Metzenbaum, a Cleveland usinessman. Metzenbaum lost the general election contest to Republican Sen. Robert Taft Jr. of Cincinnati. Glenn, 52, will be facing Metzenbaum again this time. The Senate seat that will be open in 1975 is being vacated by Republican Sen. William B. Saxbe. Saxbe had announced he would not run for re-election, then was chosen by President Nixon to be U.S. attorney general. He awaits onfirmation by the Senate.

Analyst Wins Battle

WASHINGTON (AP) - A. Ernest Fitzgerald, the Pentagon cost analyst fired after exposing a \$2 billion cost overrun, has returned to his old job. But he's not happy

That's because the Air Force, which restored him Monday as deputy for management systems, wants to transfer him to a new job - deputy for productivity anagement - which Fitzgerald says has no future. Fitzgerald was fired in January 1970 for exposing cost erruns in production of the C5 Galaxy Transport plane He waged a successful three-year fight with the Civil Service Commission for reinstatement.

Female Marine Commander

CAMP PENDLETON, Calif. (AP) - Col. Mary E. Bane, 44, has become the first woman in the 198-year history of the Marine Corps to be given direct command

Col. Bane became the Marines' first woman unit commander Monday, in charge of more than 2,000 men. Cel. Bane, a native of Normal, Ill., and single, said she was "overwhelmed" when she learned of her new post. The appointment came after a disclosure by Gen. Robert E. Cushman Jr., commandant of the Marine Corps, that women would be given all career opportunities of men, short of actual combat duty.

World News Briefs

New Venezuelan Presiden

candidate of the center-left Democratic Action party that ruled Venezuela from 1958 to 1968, appears to have won the presidency in Sunday's election. Perez was leading in logging official returns. Unofficial returns compiled by his party gave him 1,845,191 votes to 1, 390,129 for Lorenzo Fernandez of the Social Christian party, another centerleft group. The Social Christians had their own unofficial tabulation showing Fernandez ahead 1,462,123 votes to 1,358,776. But the Supreme Election Council's report of less than 5 per cent of the vote gave Perez 121,375 votes and Fernandez 102,971.

Trudeau Wins Support

OTTAWA, Canada (AP) - Canada's New Democratic party supported the minority Liberal government of Prime Minister Pierre Elliott Trudeau as expected and helped it defeat a Conservative motion of no-confidence based on the energy issue. The House of Commons vote was 135-117 on the motion, which accused the Trudeau administration of an "incompetent, inconsistent and vacillating energy policy." It was the 11th confidence notion won by the government with the help of the New Democrats since Parliament opened Jan. 4. Observers say Trudeau now can hang on until spring or early summer and may be able to hold off an election until fall

Taylor, Burton Reconcile

NAPLES, Italy (AP) - Elizabeth Taylor and Richard Burton returned to Italy, where their remance began 10 years ago, to begin their second reconciliation attempt

Miss Taylor, 41, recuperating from surgery to remove an ovarian cyst, emerged tiredlooking but smiling from the couple's 12-seat private jet Monday. She and Burton spent the afternron in their room at a hotel by the Bay of Naples, relusing to accept telephone calls from newsmen. Burton, 48, and Miss Taylor, whose celebrated elationship began in Rome on the set of the film "Cleopatra," were separated in July. They had a tearful reunion in Rome two weeks later, but two weeks after that the couple was seeking an amicable divorce.

Miss Taylor has been seen in the company of Henry Wynberg, a former car salesmon in Los Angeles.



Floyd Loses Try To Halt Council Hiring Swofford

Altamonte Springs Mayor-elect Norman Floyd Sr. failed this morning to gain a court order stopping the Altamonte Springs City Council from naming defeated Mayor Lawrence Swofford city manager and from taking any powers away from the mayor's office.

Floyd's attorney, Terrell Griffin and Mike Jones, a campaign worker requested Circuit Court Judge Tom Waddell to grant a temporary restraining order against Swofford and the city council without notice to halt the actions, anticipated in the news media reports for the past

Waddell said, however, the two lawyers did not present a sufficient case for a temporary restraining order without notification to the city council, calling the request an "extraordinary one.

He said sufficient irreparable harm would not be done by notifying the Altamonte Springs city council and Mayor Swofford before an order is considered.

"When you ask someone to restrain a governmental body," Waddell said, "the governmental body must be taking away a freedom."

Waddell granted Griffin and Jones an hour Thursday a noon for the request to be reconsidered. In the complaint, Floyd's attorneys pointing to television and newspapers stories said that Swofford or Councilman Dan Dorfman will be appointed city manager at today's 4:30

They said the action would be in "bad faith and is designed to cirvcumvent the will of the citizens of Altamonte Springs" . . . "would be redistributing the powers of an

elected office and changing the form of government." Noted in particular was Dorfman's announced intention of today removing the power to hire and fire from the mayor, returning it to the entire city council.

Mismanagement To Blame

Present Energy Crisis Is 'Oversold'

COPLEY NEWS SERVICE

An educator, economist and occasional consultant to the Federal Reserve Board and Council of Economic Advisors believes the energy crisis is being oversold. He says its gravity isn't sufficient to justify the kind of hysterical reaction triggered in Washington and Wall Street.

Dr. Milton Friedman, professor of economics at the University of Chicago, also insists that whatever energy shortage does exist is the "direct consequence" of government mismanagement

A man who once helped federal agencies call the economic shots, Dr. Friedman says the control of natural gas prices for example, never should have been invoked.

"In fact," he adds in an interview, "the general price controls introduced on Aug. 15, 1971, never should have been introduced. The Middle East war of course has worsened the situation, but we were heading for exactly the same kind of energy shortage problem before the Middle East war broke out again."

To Friedman the fascinating thing is that nobody seems to have asked this question: Why did the energy shortage problem arise in 1973, and not in 1963, 1953 or even 1933? Why now? Are conditions different now than they were in those

"If you read the news reports," Friedman observes, "the explanations given now for the present petroleum drought would have applied just as well 10 or 20 years ago. If it is a question of growing consumption of petroleum products or the oil interests, they've both been around for a long time.

"So why did they (the oil interests) decide to ci Cate a Crisis now:

The great difference now, the professor explains, is that there are price controls on petroleum products and other goods as well. And the controls on the other items are discouraging their production, putting them in short supply and aggravating in turn the energy shortage

Long Gas Shortage?

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) - President Nixon may think the energy crisis will end in a year but a spokesman for 65,000 gasoline dealers says he thinks the gasoline shortage will last at least three years.

"We are anywhere from 7 to 15 per cent short on crude oil right now, depending on who you listen to," Charles Binsted, president of the National Congress of Petroleum Retailers, said Monday. "Even if we got 100 per cent of last year's supply, we'd

still be short because you have a increase in gasoline use of 6 or 7 per cent a year. "And if we could get enough crude to meet the demand, we don't have the refinerics to process it. It takes about

three years to build a refinery. "So if we start now, we'd still be in the same position three years from now."
