40 Per Cent Shortage Seen As City Seeks Fuel Supplies

By BOB LLOYD Herald Staff Writer In the wake of a Florida Energy Committee report that there may be a 40 per cent shortage of home heating oil and diesel fuel next month, Sanford City Manager Warren Knowles met today with city department heads in efforts to further curtail city use of fuel. Knowles said Monday night that he couldn't say the city government won't have a fuel crisis in the next 60 days.

The report also stated a gasoline shortage of up to 30 per cent can also be expected in the first quarter of 1974. "The federal government is leaving cities and distributors hanging," Knowles said after reporting to city commissioners that he is attempting to negotiate purchases of diesel fuel and gasoline at "tank wagon" retail prices. Even with cutbacks now in effect, Knowles said the city will need 5,000 gallons of diesel fuel and 11,000 gallons of gasoline each month for city operations.

"They're waiting for federal action." Knowles said he was "shocked" when the State Department of Community Affairs office of fuel allocation suggested the city "shop around to all gasoline dealers and negotiate a price or else simply use local filling stations." City contracts for diesel fuel from Scovell Oil Company and gasoline supplies from Gulf Oil Corporation expire Jan. 1. Scovell has already applied for a diesel fuel allocation for the city but there are no state regulations providing allocations for gasoline for cities.

County, Cities Schedule Emergency Fuel Meeting

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Aluminum Home Wiring May Be Banned In County

A move to ban use of aluminum electrical wiring in homes is being considered by Seminole County Commissioner Sid Vihlen Jr., who Monday accompanied county staffers on a preliminary inspection of some of the 10 sites named by a grand jury report as containing hazards to life and property.

While preliminary electrical inspection at Cherry Wood Apartments, on south 17-92 revealed what Vihlen called "sloppy installation practices" he added the Clayton Builder's project did not appear to have any hazards to life as charged by the grand jury.

The apartment complex was one of 10 sites named in an Oct. 9 grand jury report blasting the building department, the electrical review board, and private contractors for sloppy and illegal practices but it did not specifically mention the dangers of aluminum wiring.

However, national publicity has focused recently on faulty installation of aluminum wiring as being responsible for many home fires.

After Oct. 9 series of hearings between dissenting inspectors, the commission, and the electrical review board, the commission revealed problems of bad workmanship to be more likely than actual illegalities. The commission subsequently voted to order an independent inspection of the sites named by the grand jury.

Monday, electrical engineer Ray Schud, a newly-appointed member of the expanded review board, Vihlen, review board chairman Buddy Eidel, and chief electrical inspector Cecil Hural began the inspection.

Other sites to be inspected are: Shadowood Village, Sportsman's Den night club, Fair Lanes Bowling Lanes, St. Hubert's School of Dance, Mayberry Club, Sterling Park, English Woods and Sweetwater Oaks.

If enough evidence of sloppy work is found to indicate a ban passed by the municipalities as well, Vihlen added.

Aluminum wiring is widely used in the county, according to chief building plans inspector Joe Chambers, who said aluminum is "safe if it's done right, but the trouble is that many contractors don't do it right."

Among the problems cited by Chambers are sloppy installations by electricians who force the soft and fragile aluminum wire into circuits designed for tougher copper.

The force used can lead to breaks in the aluminum wire, which can in turn produce a short circuit, and a fire.

While the use of aluminum has not become a problem until recently, because of the copper shortage, Chambers said an increase in the number of proper aluminum receptacles should increase the safety factor so long as the work is done properly.

The aluminum wiring controversy came to light recently when Rep. John Moss, D-Cal., called for a national ban on its use, citing 400 home fires in the past year which have been traced to the copper substitute.

Moss, a House power as a subcommittee chairman of the Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee, said as many as two million homes may be fitted with aluminum wiring, and that "virtually no consideration has been given to retrofitting to eliminate the hazard."

"It is apparent that voluntary efforts to meet this problem have been a failure," Moss added.

City Seeks New Fuel Supplies As Crisis Possibility Looms

The city has curtailed normal construction work that requires heavy equipment such as bulldozers, graders and dump trucks.

The city must have fuel for emergency generators to power water and sewer plants and for operation of utility repair and police and fire vehicles, Knowles said.

"You think its bad when the lights go out, but when the water is off for 24 hours there will be chaos," Knowles said.

"Shortages are occurring daily and the projected supply in the near future seems to be running at 75 to 85 per cent of the 1972 levels, the base period used for allocation purposes," the 58-page state committee report states.

Sen. George Firestone, D-Miami and committee co-chairman, said he hopes that reports of a possible 40 per cent shortage will convince Floridians that there is an energy crisis.

"When the lights are off it's too late to get the best prices," he said.

"I don't think the public has accepted a shortage yet," Knowles said. "Because the federal government hasn't said 'this is it.' Nobody's quite convinced."

The state report said a 25 per cent cut in fuel allocation could mean a 50 per cent drop in the state's 25 million annual consumption.

The report said a lack of fuel oil used in power plants could mean intentional blackouts a day or two per week, "the only technically effective way of obtaining curtailments of 15 to 30 per cent."

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25 Per Cent Gas Output Cutback Asked

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Nixon administration today proposed a 25 per cent reduction in gasoline production with priority delivery to emergency services, fuel production, public transportation and agriculture.

Under fuel allocation regulations proposed to take effect Dec. 27, business—including non-profit and government organizations—would get the same amount of gasoline they did one year earlier.

Other distributors would get whatever was left over, but in no case would receive more than 90 per cent of what they received a year earlier.

The regulations would govern bulk distribution of gasoline but will affect individual consumers by sharply curtailing supplies available at the retail level.

Energy czar William E. Simon, in proposing the regulations, also revised an earlier proposal for allocation of home heating oil and diesel fuel.

Under the new proposal, these fuels would go first to a top priority category of users, including fuel production activities and public transportation which would get all of their fuel needs, subject to a ceiling on increases.

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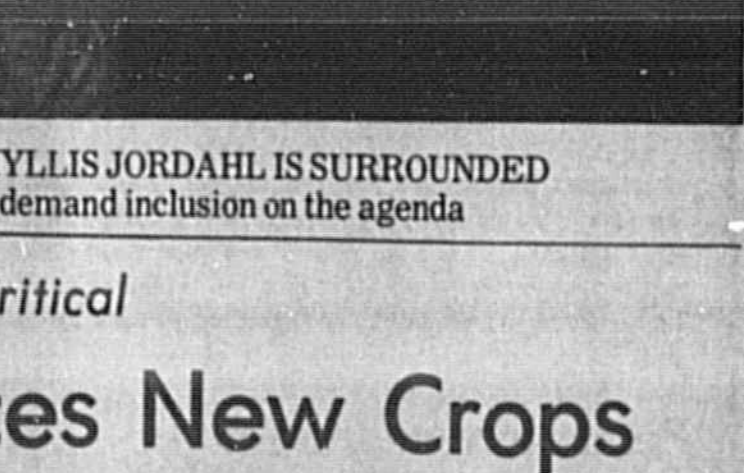
