July 4th Pilgrimage To Jamestown Slated

JAMESTOWN, Va. (AP)—The freedom that most native-born Americans take for granted will be celebrated here Independence Day by some people who know what it means—first-generation citizens.

From all parts of Virginia and it's hoped, from other states as well citizens who started their lives in other lands will gather on this historic site to give thanks for the things July 4 stands for.

Led by a Richmond dentist who came to America 31 years ago "to get myself an Indian," these former aliens will make a solemn pilgrimage to the spot where the New World's first permanent English colony was established in 1607.

The dentist, Dr. Rudolph H. Bruni, hopes the pilgrimage will make all Americans more conscious of their heritage of liberty. It will be 179 years on Monday since the Declaration of Independence was adopted by the Continental Congress at Philadelphia July 4, 1776.

Though the pilgrimage is the brain child of foreign-born Americans, everybody is invited to make it.

"We think," says Dr. Bruni, "that most Americans don't fully appreciate the full significance of freedom, for after all, they were born to it. It is different for many of those who call this their home. You must remember that many of these naturalized citizens came from countries where liberty was merely a word."

Dr. Bruni is not a case in point. The Richmond dentist was 13 when he came to this country from Switzerland, another nation with a heritage of freedom. He had an uncle and three brothers in America. His child's mind was carried away by the glamour of the country and he visualized it as a land

Segni Continues Hunt For Support

ROME (AP)—Christian Democrat Antonio Segni—granted two days of grace by President Giovanni Gronchi—continued his quest today for support as Italy's next premier.

Segni was to have reported last night after four days of political soundings whether he could form a cabinet. Instead he told Gronchi he still was unable to say definitely and the President gave him until Saturday.

Segni has encountered obstacles within his own party and the Liberal party. He needs the latter to give his prospective coalition government the marginal support necessary in Parliament. The Christian Democrats alone have only 262 seats of the 560 in the Chamber of Deputies.

His own party has pledged support of Segni, but its right-wing "concentration," which forced Premier Mario Scelba's resignation June 20 still objects to forming a coalition with minor parties of the center bloc.

The Rightists want to try a one-party, Christian Democrat government, while Segni believes only a coalition is practicable.

The Liberals are hesitant to join Segni's government because they consider his advocacy of expropriation of land from big owners too advanced.

The Social Democrats and Republicans have indicated they will go along with Segni as premier. They are the other two center parties slated for the coalition.

State Nears End Of 'Fairly Good' Citrus Season

LAKELAND (AP)—Florida is drawing near the end of a citrus season which generally speaking has been fairly good.

By the end of the week about a million boxes of oranges and 600,000 boxes of grapefruit will remain. The U. S. Department of Agriculture has estimated Florida produced 86,800,000 boxes of oranges and 33 million boxes of grapefruit this season.

The 3,000,000 boxes of Florida lemons are played out several weeks ago.

Although no final figures are in, the average orange grower made money this season, but not as much as a year ago. The grapefruit grower apparently is a little ahead this season, but far back of returns received a few years ago.

One processor summed up the situation in his field by saying processors didn't make any big money this season but didn't lose any big money either.

First Arrest May Bring Test Of Shoplifting Law

JACKSONVILLE (AP)—It's hoped Florida's new anti-shoplifting law will put a crimp in such thievery but the first arrest under it probably will result in a test case, says David U. Tumin, special assistant state attorney general.

He told merchants at a chamber of commerce sponsored meeting they shouldn't be too quick to use the law. "Let's be 90 per cent sure that we've got a thief before we stick our necks out," he advised.

Tumin warned that professional shoplifters may deliberately cause a false arrest in order to bring suit and collect damages.

The law which goes into effect tomorrow, provides that a merchant or his employee may take a person into custody if he has probable cause for believing larceny has been committed.



Federal Power Is Big Question

WASHINGTON (AP)—Ben Moreell has opened a bag of tom cats. He is a retired admiral and chairman of the Hoover Commission's task force on water resources and public power.

Moreell did not say outright in his St. Louis speech what his task force's recommendations would be. Nevertheless, here are some of the conclusions he said he arrived at:

1. No new federal power projects should be built. There is no present or prospective need for federal power activities.

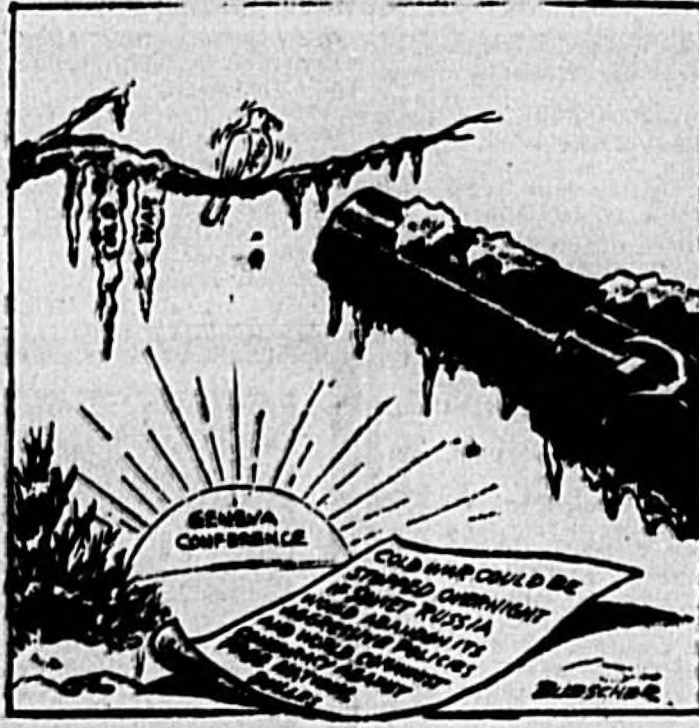
Kentucky Celebrates

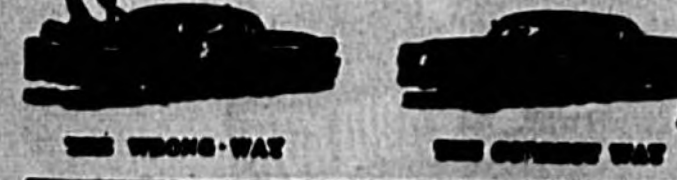

Ingredients: 1 package (12 ounces) frozen winter squash, 2 eggs, 1 1/2 cups milk, 3/4 cup firmly packed light brown sugar, 3/4 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg, 1/4 teaspoon ginger, 1 teaspoon cinnamon.

Method: Allow squash to stand at room temperature several hours to thaw. Beat eggs in a large mixing bowl until yolks and whites are combined. Add milk and beat to combine. Add thawed squash, brown sugar, salt, nutmeg, ginger and cinnamon; beat to combine. Ladle into 6 custard cups. Place cups in baking pan; fill pan with boiling water so water comes at least half way up custard mixture. Bake in a moderate (350 degrees) oven 1 hour—until metal cake tester or small knife inserted in center comes out clean. Place custards in pan of cold water immediately so cooking will stop. Chill. Serve in custard cups or turn out. There will be a little of the egg-milk mixture that has separated from the squash at the bottom of each custard cup. Makes 6 servings.

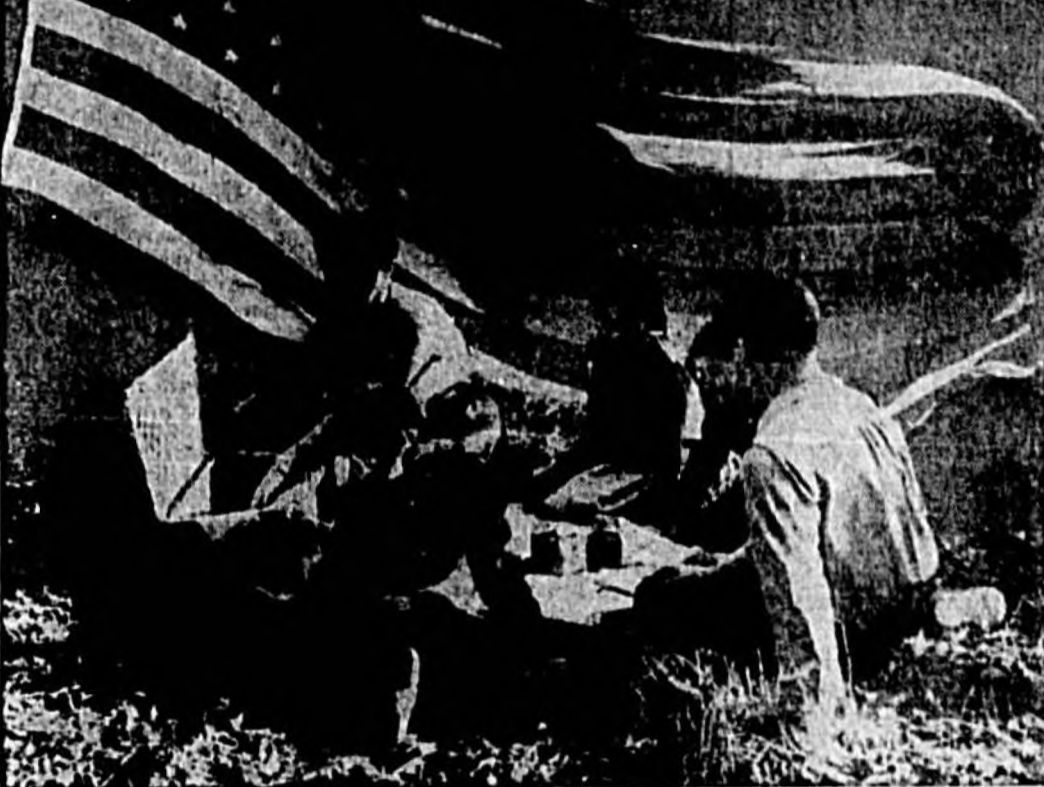
