Italian Brigade Leads In Attack On Biscayan Port

Seige Of Santander Is Seen As Crucial Campaign Of War

BIENAYE, Aug. 18.—(AP)—The insurgent army, described by the Spanish government as built around the Italian "black arrow" brigade and bolstered by 200 German planes, battered toward Santander today in what may prove the crucial campaign of Spain's civil war.

Columns operating on parallel highways into Santander, the governments last Biscayan stronghold and seaport, were reported within 25 miles of Santander's outskirts. That was the distance in a straight line northeast, but each unit faced the task of covering some 35 or 40 miles of curving highway flanked by the barbed wire and concrete fortifications of Santander's defenders.

Fifteen thousand loyalist troops, the biggest "catch" of Spain's 13-month old civil war, surrendered to Gen. Francisco Franco's nationalists last night when they were trapped in a pocket of the Cantabrian Sierrax, 30 miles south of Santander.

Franco's headquarters said the prisoners, comprising 29 divisions of Santandarians, Asturias and Basques, also surrendered huge quantities of war material.

The capture, described as "the most brilliant operation of the entire northern campaign," was believed by the insurgents to seal the doom of Santander because the seized battalions were "the cream" of the northern loyalist army.

Many of the prisoners were youths of 15 and 16 years who had been given guns and sent into the front lines in an effort to stem the nationalist drive closing in on Santander from four directions.

The surrender occurred near San Miguel de Arago, seven miles southeast of Reinosa, which was occupied by Franco's troops late Monday.

The loyalists were caught between two converging nationalist columns, one moving upon Santander along the Burgos highway, the other from Reinosa.

French Troops Are Rushed To Shanghai

PARIS, Aug. 18.—(AP)—A battalion of French troops from Indo-China is being rushed to Shanghai aboard the steamers Aramis and Sphynx and the Far East Naval Squadron is ready for action "if necessary," the foreign office announced Monday night.

The Indo-Chinese battalion probably will aid in the removal of about 1,000 French subjects from the French concession which was bombed Saturday by Chinese warplanes.

Chinese Ambassador Wellington Koc told the foreign office that there could be "no real security" until Japanese withdrew from the Whangpoo River.

Appropriation Bill Upped By 20 Million
