WATERWAYS CONVENTION MEANS BIG THINGS FOR THE WHOLE STATE OF FLORIDA

Unless the disturbances in Central America and the West Indies necessitate the employment of a large number of ships naval vessels will be sent to Palatka Fla. at the time of the convention of the Mississippi to Atlantic Inland Waterway Association November 17-18th and to Jacksonville Fla. at the joint convention of the Mississippi to Atlantic Waterway Association and the Atlantic Deepwater Waterways Association November 19-20 and 21st.

A point of interest in this connection is the fact that Palatka is almost in the center of the Peninsula of Florida and emphasizes the fact that naval vessels are not confined to the use of the 1500 miles of Florida seaboard. Both associations named are endeavoring to secure the construction of a canal across the Peninsula of Florida.

Pinalas county has won in the decision of the supreme court in the case of Hillsborough county against Pinalas county for a mandamus to compel Pinalas county to pay Hillsborough county \$75,000 in settlement of accounts standing between the two sections at the time of the division. Hillsborough's suit was denied on the ground that it was the wrong method of procedure. The decision also reverses the order of the circuit court by Judge F. M. Robles at Tampa granting the suit. It is generally thought that the case will now be opened again in the circuit court. This would inevitably result in an order from the court to audit the books and ascertain the justice of the claim. Such a procedure must result in the first time upon the point of the case.

ORANGE COUNTY BONDS

Carry by a Large Majority to the Amount of \$600,000

With only six of the twenty precincts in the county unreported the vote recorded in yesterday's election to authorize the issue of \$600,000 for the construction of a system of hard roads in Orange county was 756 in favor of the issue and 202 against a majority of 554 for bonds. The unreported precincts are all small and even if their entire vote was recorded against the issue there would still be a safe majority in favor of it.

Of the fourteen precincts recorded there were only three that gave majorities against the proposed issue. These were Zellwood Ocoee and Gottha. The Zellwood vote was 15 to 19 against; Ocoee 15 to 21 against and Gottha 8 to 23 against.

The majority in the Orlando precincts was so large that the issue would have been carried if most of the other precincts had voted in opposition to the issue. The two town precincts gave a clear majority of 467 in favor and 80 against.

Both precinct elections were held at the court house. The corridors were lined with voting booths and the scenes were active during the greater part of the day. Orlando Sentinel.

New York Nov. 13. The National Housewives' League already claims encouraging results in the campaign begun yesterday against the high price of eggs. Mrs. Julian Heath, the president of the league, and eleven other women spent all day yesterday canvassing the city to learn what effect the league's "ultimatum" had had and they asserted today that all of the stores had cut off at least a few cents from the prevailing high prices.

In some places the best storage eggs were selling as low as 33 cents a dozen against 37 cents the low figure for Saturday. In some of the higher-priced stores, however, fancy eggs were priced as high as 75 cents a dozen.

TRAINMEN WIN LONG FIGHT GRANTING LARGER SALARIES

SEVEN PER CENT INCREASE GAINED BY ARBITRATION

HIGH COST OF LIVING

After months of arbitration of the demands of the trainmen of fifty-two eastern railroads for higher wages the board of arbitration last night made known its findings in favor of the men. The average increase allowed is 7 per cent and will amount to about \$6,000,000 per annum. The report is binding and final and it has averted what threatened to be the greatest tie-up in the history of railroading.

In its award the board mainly ruled against the employes on four out of five points submitted as reasons why the increase should be granted and found for the railroads the increased cost of living. Since 1906 when last an increase was granted the arbitrators found the cost of living has increased 7 per cent.

Tallahassee Fla. Nov. 13. In a formal statement to the press issued this morning State Senator F. M. Hudson of Miami who has been spoken of as a possible candidate for United States senator to succeed Senator D. U. Fletcher announced that he would not make the race. Mr. Hudson indicated however that he will be a candidate for governor in the 1915 primaries.

The senator said: "I presume that my silence on the subject has led my friends throughout the state to the conclusion that it was not my intention to be a candidate for the United States senator but as I have recently had renewed requests for a statement of my intentions I wish to announce definitely that I do not expect to enter the contest. Before any formal announcements were made for that office I was urged by leading Democrats of the state whose opinions no man could lightly disregard to enter the race. I took the matter under consideration quietly investigating but not soliciting your support. Investigations made in my behalf and the support voluntarily tendered me leave no doubt in my mind that if I were seeking an opportunity to enter the contest I have ample encouragement to do so. But I am not seeking and have not sought such an opportunity. My personal inclination was against the undertaking and nothing could have induced me to offer for the place in the absence of the conviction that by so doing I could render a real service in advancing the highest principles of Democracy. I do not see that my candidacy would serve such a purpose under such circumstances. My personal advantage is not a matter to be considered in this connection.

"I may as well say frankly that if I consult my personal inclination when I submit my name to the voters of Florida it will be for the office of governor."

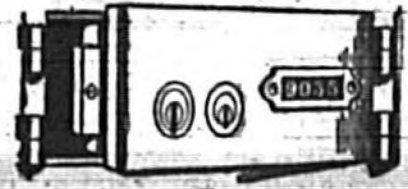

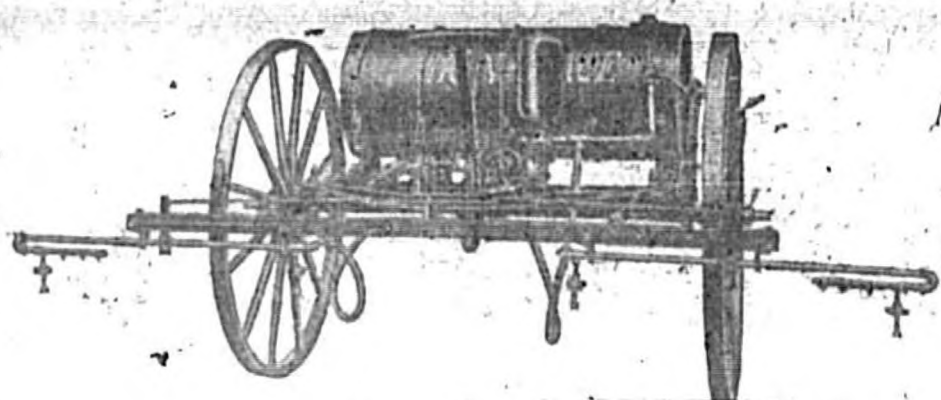
