## Squatters' rights for the chairman

County headquarters was buzzing with rumor on Monday. Quiet little talk about what's going to happen next.

Win Adams had his personal belongings packed. At midnight he was out of office - no longer one of the five county commissioners.

Adams walked down the hall to say so long to Commission Chairman Randy Morris.

"Are you ready to move?" Adams asked.

Morris, wearing a dress shirt and blue jeans, nodded.

Adams had no office at all - and Morris might have a new one early this afternoon. If Carlton Henley, who replaces Adams as District 4 Commissioner, is appointed chairman today, Morris will move to another office on the third floor.

These housekeeping moves are trivial when compared to the reorganization of the Board of County Commissioners and of the leadership on key committees such as the Metropolitan Planning Organization and the Economic Development Council.

The power base of the commission shifts from Morris, Adams and Daryl McLain to Henley, Grant Maloy and Dick Van Der Weide. Maloy and Van Der Weide championed Henley's campaign against Adams. At 1:30 this afternoon, Henley will take his oath of office.

The fireworks will follow. "Anything's liable to happen, but what everyone expects is that Henley will be appointed chairman," Morris said. "That seems to be the consensus. He'll get nominated. In theory, all five commissioners could get nominated."

Morris has been the chairman for three of four years. He put the county's plans into action and was the most visible and busiest of the commissioners. This did not enable him to overwhelm Bob West in the District 2 primary. Nor does it prevent Henley or perhaps Maloy to be the new chairman.

"This position is usually rotated," Morris said. "I was appointed my first year but Van Der Weide had it the next. I got it back and kept it. I don't expect to be asked this time."

## City will study effect of county's adult code

LONGWOOD - The Longwood city commission will study what effect the Seminole County Decency Ordinance will have on the city's adult entertainment ordinance before deciding to adopt or reject it.

There are no adult entertainment businesses in the Longwood city limits. The city's adult entertainment ordinance does not permit the sale of alcoholic beverages in an adult entertainment business, or the advertising of these businesses on road sides. The county's decency ordinance does not address the sale of alcohol or advertising.

## Nude dancers to cover up

CASSELBERRY - Although Club Juana owner Mike Pinter calls Seminole County's new Public Decency Ordinance "a pain in the bottom," he says his dancers will be covered up today.

At the same time Pinter and

two other adult club operators have filed a lawsuit in Seminole County Court, against the county, Sheriff Don Eslinger and the City-County Investigative Bureau.

The owners of the Casselberry clubs want a judge to throw out the nudity ban, which goes into effect today, because they say it is unconstitutional.

Sheriff's Office officials say they will begin to enforce the ordinance today as fairly and equally as possible across the board.

Deputy County Attorney Lonnie Groot delivered the ordinance to Tallahassee, where it has been signed by the state secretary. County officials believe the ordinance will hold up

in the courts - and are prepared to fight all challenges from the adult entertainment industry.

Jim Veigle, the owner of Rachel's in Casselberry, calls the "government's attempts to regulate lawful individual behavior, such as going to adult clubs," a violation of the First Amendment. Please see Clubs, Page 3A

the University of Kentucky's Medical Center in Lexington, and is listed in fair condition. Watts was the high school Homecoming King in 1995, and a four-year starter on the football team. He also participated in weightlifting.

"I had him for biology and environmental science classes," Assistant Athletic Director Jay Getty said. "He was a very hard working, respectful student. He was tremendous on the campus, his hard work on the field carried over into the classroom."

The surgery on Monday lasted approximately 90 minutes, University of Kentucky Medical Center spokeswoman Vicki Franklin said. Glass rocks, dirt and dead tissue were removed from Watts' forearm during the surgery.

Dr. James Lovett, a plastic surgeon at the UK hospital, repaired some tendons and closed a 30 centimeter wound, Franklin said. The cleaning will be repeated today, and as often as necessary to prevent infection.

"It depends on what we find," Lovett said. "If after doing the procedure tomorrow we feel we can leave it closed, we will."

No other injuries were found, Franklin said.

Watts was driving a truck with two passengers on a deer-hunting trip on Sunday, according to wire reports. The truck flipped on the rural highway, killing both passengers. Arthur Steinmetz, 19, a defensive lineman, and Scott Brock, 21, were pronounced dead at the scene, wire reports said.

Watts is a 6-foot-3, 271 pound three-year starting center for Kentucky. About two dozen teammates visited Watts in the emergency room Sunday night, according to wire reports.

"You think they're men and then you see them in situations like this," Kentucky's director of media relations Rena Vicini said, according to wire reports. "And then you see them in

situations like this, and they're really just kids."

The accident occurred the day after Watts had been honored on Senior Day with his parents in attendance, and Kentucky (7-3) defeated Vanderbilt 55-17 at Kentucky's Commonwealth Stadium.

Pulaski County Sheriff Sam Catron said the accident happened just before 7 a.m., about 60 miles south of Lexington, according to wire reports.

Catron said the 1985 Chevy truck in which the men were traveling drifted onto the shoulder of the road. Watts apparently got the truck back on the pavement, but overcorrected, sending it across a two-lane highway, according to wire reports. All three men were thrown from the vehicle, Catron said.

Watts walked to a nearby farmhouse for help, according to wire reports.

Kentucky Athletic Director C.M. Newton said he had been given no indication that alcohol was involved in the accident, according to wire reports.

Watts is an avid outdoorsman, who loves fishing, hunting, and listed alligator wrestling as his hobby in the team media guide, according to wire reports.

only clubs, are generally unsuccessful and end up costing enormous sums of tax money for legal fees and enforcement efforts by police.

"We can't outlaw everything that's offensive or annoying to one group of people," Veigle said. "Those same things may not be offensive or annoying to another group."

Not so says Carlton Henley, who is being sworn in today as a county commissioner and who is expected to also be named the county chairman. "I firmly believe that communities have the right to set their own standards."

The entire county - not just the adult clubs - will be bound to the rules of the new ordinance. The law requires anyone 10 or older to adhere to minimum standards of dress in public. What one wears in the backyard is his or hers decision.

"Obviously, the ordinance is directly aimed at the adult entertainment industry," said Hunter, who has run Club Juana for 35 years. "It's intended to hurt us, maybe put us out of business. For the girls, this is their livelihood."

The new law requires that one-quarter of the busts be covered and one-third of the buttocks. Those who had danced nude will now wear at least a French-cut bikini. Pinter said the Club Juana dancers will do so until the lawsuits are settled.

Veigle said Monday that the dancers at Rachel's may continue to dance nude, subjecting them and the club to arrest. The misdemeanor violations are punishable by as much as \$500 in fines and 60 days in jail.

Chief Deputy Sheriff Steve Harriett said Monday that the Sheriff's Office had a duty to uphold the law that was approved by the voters in the county on Nov. 3.

"We'll do so until advised to the contrary by some higher authority," Harriett said. "Deputies won't carry tapes or rulers to measure dancers. They've been instructed to use good common sense."

In the past courts have ruled that nude - or exotic - dancing can't be banned entirely because it is a protected form of expression under the First Amendment. At the same time the Supreme Court has ruled that communities can regulate the conduct in their jurisdictions.

Winter Park attorney David Wasserman said the general nature of the county's ordinance was "a sham."

All but one of the Orlando-area television stations led their late news programs with reports from the Seminole County night clubs and they figure to be on the scene live tonight when the cover-up gets underway.

"We have an excellent city ordinance," commissioner Paul Lovstrand said. "Our's is excellent when it comes to advertising and alcohol. If we can find that ours is better, stricter, then I'm in favor of opting out of the county's decency ordinance."

The county's public decency ordinance is in effect starting today. City Administrator Greg Manning said he is concerned about possible challenges to the county's ordinance.

"I think our ordinance has been proven and tried," Manning said. "Most cities are waiting to see what the challenges to the county will be. The people of Longwood voted for this because we wanted certain standards."

City attorney Richard Taylor said he is concerned about how the county's ordinance, patterned after the St. Johns County public decency ordinance, would be enforced. He said the city's current ordinance is patterned after the Orange County adult entertainment ordinance.

Lovstrand said St. Johns County has not had any trouble enforcing their public decency ordinance.

"It is better to have a hard to enforce ordinance than none at all," Lovstrand said. "Because the county had no dress code, we became a magnet for these businesses."

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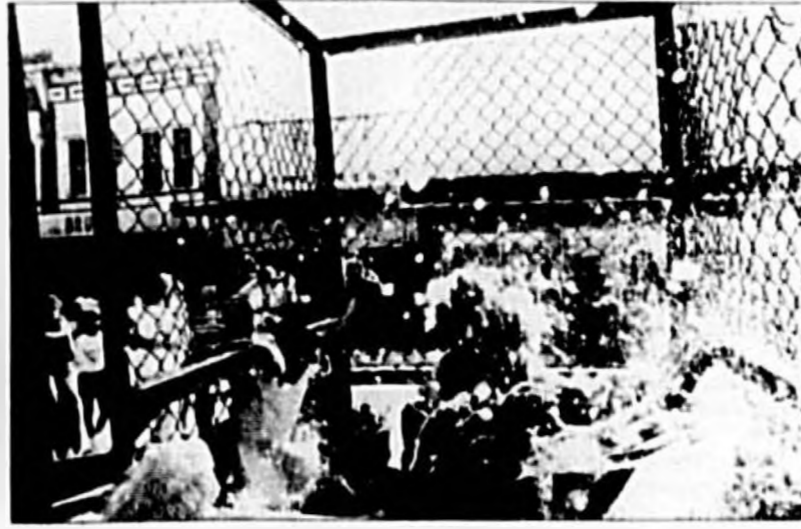

## Prevent home fires

As our weather cools off, the American Red Cross of Central Florida is reminding area residents to use caution and protect themselves from deadly home fires, which are more prevalent during the winter months.

Below are a few statistics regarding home fires:

- Fires kill more people each year than any other type of disaster and are the fifth leading cause of intentional deaths nationwide.
- More than 1 million burn injuries a year require medical care.
- More than 90,000 people with burns stay in a hospital for an average of 12 days.
- Fires cause 66 percent of all deaths from burns.

These simple precautionary measures are provided by the American Red Cross, a leader

in disaster preparedness and relief.

- Have your chimney inspected by a professional prior to the start of the winter season. Creosote build-up in a chimney can cause a fire. Use a sturdy screen on fireplaces. Burn only wood, because paper and pine boughs can float out of the fireplace. If stockings are hanging above a fireplace, do not use the fireplace.
- Place space heaters at least three feet away from anything combustible, including wallpaper, bedding, clothing, pets and people.
- Never leave a space heater operating when you are not in a room or when you go to bed.
- Don't leave children unattended with space heaters.
- Don't use space heaters to dry clothing.

## The Bucs need nice Dungy to be the bad guy

**SANFORD** — Don't start hanging For Sale signs on Tony Dungy's lawn yet. Buc fans still see a young, motivated coach who can whip a defense into one of the best in the NFL. But he's also the main cause of the Bucca boys' struggles this season.

There's absolutely no reason this team should be a 1-0 at this point in the season.

Normally an NFL coach is a scapegoat for a team's problems. He gets the blame when 45 players don't come together and meet expectations, but Dungy has to shoulder an awful lot of the blame this year for his team which has fallen woefully short of some Super Bowl expectations.

Dungy has carved his reputation as being a patient guy with the patience of Job. That was great two years ago when the Bucs were just trying to avoid another 10 loss season. Back then, the most important thing was to bring some stability to a team that had struggled longer a decade and had Sam Wyche as coach. Dungy stayed with quarterback Trent Diller and the patience was rewarded with a playoff berth last season.

But Diller wasn't the reason for the rebound. He had a nice mistake free season, but running backs Mike Alstott and Warrick Dunn powered the offense which didn't need to score very often with the Tampa Bay defense.

But this year, Dunn and Alstott haven't had the same kinds of seasons.

Teams are realizing that they can key on the Tampa Bay running attack and put the game into Diller's hands.

Advantage, opponent.

Diller simply isn't getting the job done and netting his backup Steve Walsh.

The answer could be third-stringer Scott Mitchell who has yet to take an NFL snap in his five-year career.

Word from the Bucs is that Milanovich still hasn't figured out the Bucs offense and only stays on the team because of his versatility as a backup punter.

Whatever the reason, Dungy has to run out of patience and pull the trigger on Diller. At 4-6, the Bucs can still reach the playoffs, but not with the current offense.

What was Dungy thinking during Sunday's horrendous 29-24 loss at Jacksonville?

The Bucs allowed a field goal to cut their lead to 24-23 with just three minutes to go.

Jacksonville had only one time out.

A first down ends the game and the Bucs are back to 5-0.

On first down, Alstott got stuffed. Time-out Jacksonville.

The only time out the Jaguars had left was the two minute warning and the defense was tired.

For some reason, the Bucs decided to pass on second down.

Offensive coordinator Mike Shula made the call, but Dungy has to take responsibility. The pass attempt fell incomplete.

Clock stopped.

On third down, the Bucs were forced into an obvious passing situation and Diller didn't come close to completing the throw.

The drive took 30 seconds when a first down would have ended the game.

You know what happened next. Tampa Bay played. Fred Taylor took the first play from scrimmage 70 yards for a touchdown, and the Bucs trailed again.

Now Tampa Bay had to go 80 yards in just 17 seconds for the season-saving win over?

Forget it. He was picked off and the Bucs sea son was as good as gone as Taylor was a minute before.

Now the Bucs must go 500 over the next six weeks to finish with less than 10 losses.

Maybe they will give Diller another shot next week when he says he would.

But this is the NFL, and sometimes you have to be a realist.

It would be a shame to make a change before the season ends though.

# Oviedo Pop tots pound Palatka

**PALATKA** — The Oviedo Junior Midgets crushed Palatka in Pop Warner Football League playoff action, 42-6, at Putnam County Veterans Memorial Stadium Saturday.

"We executed and we played smashmouth football," said quarterback Lee Sloan.

The Lions controlled the game from the first possession on and the defense refused to yield on every play, neutralizing Palatka's running game.

This win propels the Lions to the

second round of the regional playoffs, and marks the furthest any Oviedo team has ever advanced in Pop Warner football.

"They've done an outstanding job all year, and they're a great group of kids," said coach John Girard.

The Lions' first possession ended in an interception after a nice drive, but came back with a vengeance on the next series as Jared Wharton blew past defenders on a 35-yard touchdown run.

Jordan Gibson kicked the two point conversion (league rules award two points for a kick, and one for running or passing the ball

into the end zone) to give Oviedo an 8-0 lead.

Following an interception by Oviedo's Joey Diaz, the Lions again drove down the field and Brett Joyce plunged for a one yard touchdown run.

After each team had the ball four times on offense, Oviedo had accumulated 16 points while Palatka had yet to get its initial first down.

Neither team scored again until the fourth quarter when William Harrison broke loose for a 33-yard touchdown gallop.

The final score came on a 12-yard pass from Sloan to Diaz.

The offense dominated. Sloan had passes of 25, 30, and 50 yards on the day. Wharton ran all over the field throughout the game, and the offensive line controlled the line of scrimmage.

Defensively, the Lions swarmed Palatka every single play. Pete Harrison, Robert Santillana, Zac Jarzynka, Anthony Sanchez, Steven Solana, and Matthew McCran frustrated, devastated, and decimated the Palatka offense.

Oviedo improved to 12-0 with the victory and will continue its dream season this Saturday in Orlando at Dr. Phillips High School against the North Jacksonville Panthers.

# Diverse Dorazio displays talents

**LONGWOOD** — Nick Dorazio has experienced a strange odyssey through the Lyman High School athletic program.

He started in 10th grade playing soccer. Then as a junior last year, he played basketball.

This year it was back to soccer with the addition of volleyball.

Somehow, he has succeeded at all of those sports, but this year, he may make his biggest impact yet.

Start with volleyball.

Dorazio had played beach volleyball, a decidedly different game than the indoor version the high schoolers in Seminole County play. All he did was shatter several of Lyman's all-time volleyball records in a season which included over 500 assists including an incredible 53 in a district game against DeLand.

Dorazio took up volleyball as an afterthought.

"A friend of mine who I played beach volleyball with asked me to play because we were short on setters," Dorazio said. "I just figured I would give it a try."

He started as the fourth setter on the team and didn't even play early in the season under first year coach Gina Bonaventure.

Once he got his chance, it came naturally and by the end of the season, the Lyman offense was centered around Dorazio.

"It's a lot easier to jump in a gym than it is on the beach," Dorazio said. "It was rough at first and I got frustrated, but everybody came together as a team by the end of the season."

Teammate Mario Rivera registered over 200

kills off of Dorazio's sets and Stewart Cragel also had a big year at the net.

Lyman finished 12-14 on the volleyball season, but Dorazio's return to the Greyhound soccer team could prove to be even more enjoyable.

The Greyhounds have a brand new coach in Steve Lyons, taking over for coaching legend Ray Sandrich, and should be considered one of the favorites in the district and Seminole Athletic Conference races this season.

"The new coach works us hard," Dorazio said. "He's really into training but he's also got a lot of motivational skills to work with us."

Dorazio is expected to start at goalie this season, taking the place of graduated Shane LaPlaca. Dorazio gave up soccer last season to play for the Lyman basketball team, but the Greyhounds needed him this year and he's hoping it's like riding a bike.

"I'm not nervous about seeing my first shot," Dorazio, who will make his first start when the Hounds open the season next week. "We have a lot of talent and I think we can win districts."

Dorazio will have to have a strong year in the net, and Lyman's scoring load should come from Jason Diebler and Jon Baldwin. Most of the team returns from last year's team which went to regionals. Star forward Mark Lewis has graduated and is playing at Florida International University, but this Lyman team could still go a long way. Along with Oviedo and Lake Mary, it should be a three-team battle for county and state supremacy.

For Dorazio, it would be a great way to finish his interesting career at Lyman. He's experienced almost everything.

Except a state championship.

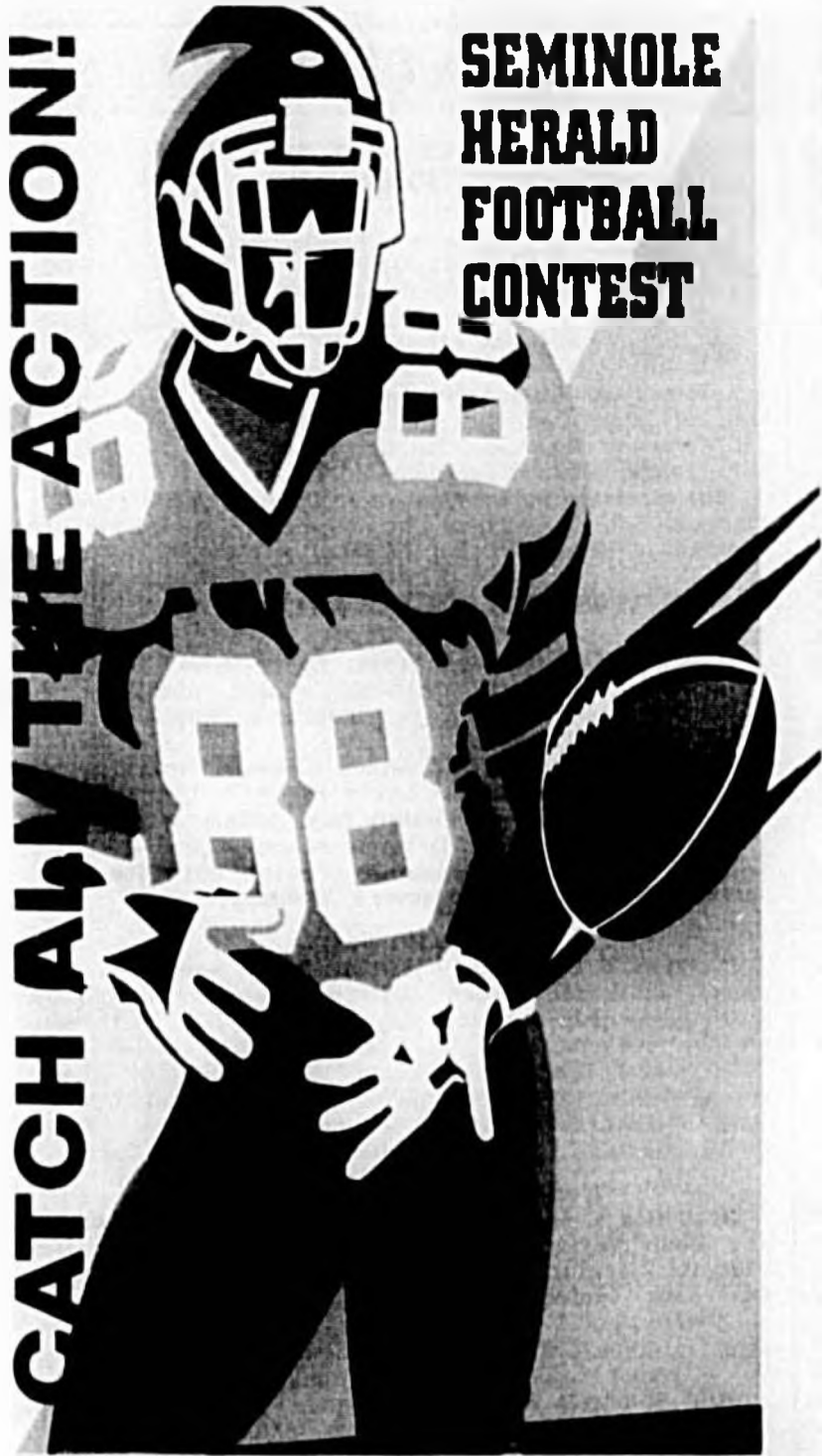
the second inning to take an 8-1 lead and the rout was on.

# Coconut oil is safe in lotions

DEAR DR. GOTT: Many skin lotions contain coconut oil. I know that this oil contains cholesterol. Will using such products raise the level of cholesterol in my blood?

DEAR READER: The coconut oil in skin-care products is safe to use. By and large, the components of moisturizing lotion do not penetrate the skin and enter the body. Coconut oil is added to these products because it smells good; it is not absorbed into the body.

Coconut does not contain cholesterol in significant quantities. When eaten, it can raise cholesterol levels in some individuals, however. The reason for this is not known. Nonetheless, people on low-cholesterol diets should avoid eating tropical oils, such as coconut and palm oil.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I am 76 and suffer from reflux and reduced motility of my esophagus. My doctor has me on Zantac, with good results. Is it inadvisable for me to take this drug the rest of my life?

DEAR READER: For the reason you are taking it, Zantac is a safe drug to use indefinitely. Because the quality of your life with the medicine is vastly superior to the quality without it, I think you can continue the Zantac for at least another 10 or 20 years without worry.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Following a bout of pneumonia a year ago, I have been chronically tired. I was once a healthy, active person; now I'm a wet rag. A dud. What can I do?

DEAR READER: Like any illness, pneumonia can leave a patient weak and fatigued. However, this normal reaction usually lasts for only a month or two.

Apparently, your resistance is not up to par. Therefore, you should find out if some hidden, underlying disease is the cause of your chronic fatigue. For instance, diabetes, HIV infection and certain blood disorders can reduce a person's immunity to disease or lead to chronic weakness. Ask your doctor for a thorough physical examination to identify lingering infection or any other factor that may be affecting your health.

DEAR DR. GOTT: How do I get rid of the "love handles" on my back? I'm about 20 pounds overweight, but I

watch my diet. Years ago, my aunt used to try to flatten out my sister's fat deposits by rubbing them with a rolling pin.

DEAR READER: I doubt that the

rolling pin technique was very successful. I'd rather see you lose 20 pounds. You should ask your doctor for a weight-reduction plan. Once you've lost the weight, the "love handles" should shrink.

If not, you might consider liposuction. Your physician can refer you to a plastic surgeon who is familiar with the procedure.

The primary purposes of a rolling pin are 1. to roll out dough, and 2. to wave around the house, like a circa 1950s cartoon, to re-establish female pre-eminence.

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## WIN AT BRIDGE

### The flood started with Georges

At about the same time Hurricane Georges was dumping incredible amounts of rain on so many unfortunate people, the annual flood of bridge books started. The first book was the biggest. It is simply called "Bridge" (Black Dog & Leventhal), edited by Gloria Hale and Nancy Starr.

The good points are twofold: excellent value for money (almost 650 large pages in a hardback edition for a list price below \$40) and a wealth of information and instruction. The bad point is that it contains only material previously published by Batsford in Britain (which you find out only by reading the copyright page). It is the majority of 11 books and one reprint, most of which

have been reviewed in this column previously. (Some sections have been removed to avoid duplication.)

Of the 12 books, six relate to bidding, three to declarer play, and three to defense. Here, South is in three no-trump. West leads the spade four; five, king, three. Back comes the spade jack. Should South duck or cover? Why?

If East started with the doubleton K-J of spades, declarer must duck. But if East has the K-J-10, South must cover to block the suit. (If East has K-J-x, South is doomed. If spades are 4-4, South's play is irrelevant.) The key is West's lead, a fourth-highest four. As declarer holds the three, if West is an Honest Englishman, he will have at most a five-card suit. So, the right play is to cover the jack with the queen.
