The Ensemble Idea is a Safeguard Against Color Discords. Some observant dress authorities say that the "ensemble" idea was a perfectly logical and necessary outcome of the prevailing fashion for bright and varied colors.

So long as well-dressed women confined themselves—when dressed for the street—to dark browns, navy blues, blacks, beiges or even grays, they didn't have much trouble not striking color discords. Then came brighter and more varied colors. Well-dressed women began to wear colors on the street that they would have laughed at some time before—all shades of reddish brown, henna, plumage, etc., violet shades such as fuchsia, pansy and peonia, bright, vibrant reds—lacquer red, for instance—bright blues such as pencil blue, ball blue, a series of blues that seemed all more or less alike when separate but which swore like drunken sailor when in close proximity.

It then became apparent to a good many of us that a very large proportion of women in this country were if not colored blind at least sadly lacking in a fine feeling for color harmonies. They wore henna and petunia, henna and Lanvin green, purple and pencil blue. To be sure, those last-mentioned colors have been well combined but it assuredly takes the hand of an artist to do it properly.

Well, just to save women from a reputation of being absolutely lacking in color discrimination the dressmakers had to invent the ensemble idea. Only of course no one person invented it. It just naturally happened as so many things do in fashion, and the dressmakers found it very profitable, because it often meant that a woman, instead of buying a single frock, would buy a frock and a scarf and a wrap and a hat or instead of buying only a hat, she would also buy a belt and a pair of gloves, or instead of buying a pair of shoes, she would come away with a handbag besides.

And the ensemble idea is as important as ever. There are far fewer color discords where well-dressed women foregather than there were but they have by no means faded entirely from the view.

Some men carry their lunches to work with them out of choice—with no thought of economy about it. A man we know who is driven to his factory in a very fine car by a spick and snap liveried chauffeur takes his lunch with him, or rather the chauffeur gets a small lunch box from the cook every morning just before his employer is ready to start. This lunch box the chauffeur hands over to the factory owner's secretary, whose duty it is to see that the lunch in the box is laid out on a table in her employer's private office at the hour when he habitually has lunch. The restaurants in the vicinity of the factory could not possibly offer as good a meal as that lunch box holds.

Many mothers take pains to put up lunches for their children who go to school, not as a matter of

economy, but because they feel that these home lunches are more wholesome than the meals obtainable in the school lunch room.

Sandwiches are and anon the form in which to serve the luncheon because almost any sort of food can be eaten without need of fork or knife. Open your cook books to the section on sandwiches and see what a variety of forms the sandwiches may take. Here is one that calls for finely cut raisins mixed with cream cheese spread between slices of whole wheat bread and butter. Here's a sandwich that calls for a filling of boned and skinned sardines, mashed with hard cooked eggs, seasoned with lemon and spread between slices of rye or white bread. But there isn't room for more—just read up on sandwiches in your recipe books and see if you don't begin to wish that you had some daily lunch boxes to fill.

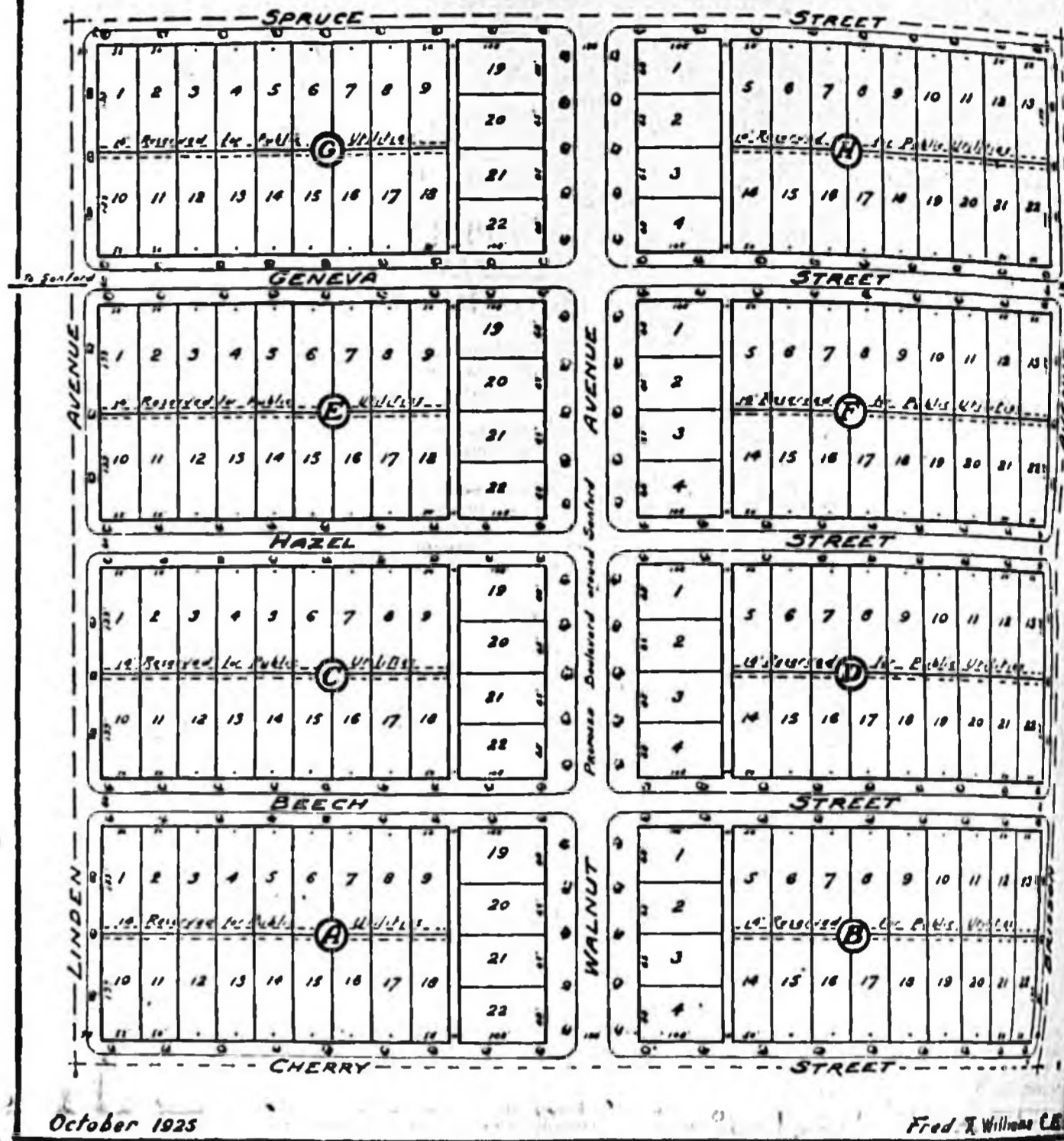

With the declaration that real and solid progress has been made in the development of American business, particularly in its relations with the government, the President said there was need for further improvement in transportation facilities by development of inland waterways; need for railroad consolidations; need for improvement of railroad terminals for more economical distribution of commodities in congested centers; need for still greater extension of electrification; need for re-organization of government and need for further effort against "all categories of waste which the Department of Commerce has enumerated and so actively attacked."

The American policy toward business, Mr. Coolidge asserted, had been to cherish the general structure of business while holding its avenues open to the widest competition so its opportunities and benefits might be given the broadest participation.

"While it is true that the government ought not to be and is not committed to certain methods of acquisition which, while partaking of the nature of unfair practices try to masquerade under the guise of business," he added, "the government is and ought to be thoroughly committed to every endeavor of production and distribution which is entitled to be designated as true business. Those who are so engaged instead of regarding the government as their opponent and enemy, ought to regard it as their vigilant supporter and friend."

In his discussion of the foreign debt problem, the President reaffirmed his conviction that loans should not be made by the United States or by American bankers when the money advanced is used for maintenance of great armies and navies.

"Loans," he continued, when used "in ways that are not productive, like the maintenance of great military establishments or to meet municipal expenditures which should either be eliminated by government economy or supplied by taxation, do not appear to serve a useful purpose and ought to be discouraged."

"Our bankers," he continued, have a great deal of responsibility in relation to the soundness of these loans when they undertake to invest the savings of our country abroad. I should regret very much to see our possession of resources which are available to meet needs in other countries be the cause of any sentiment of envy or unfriendliness toward us."

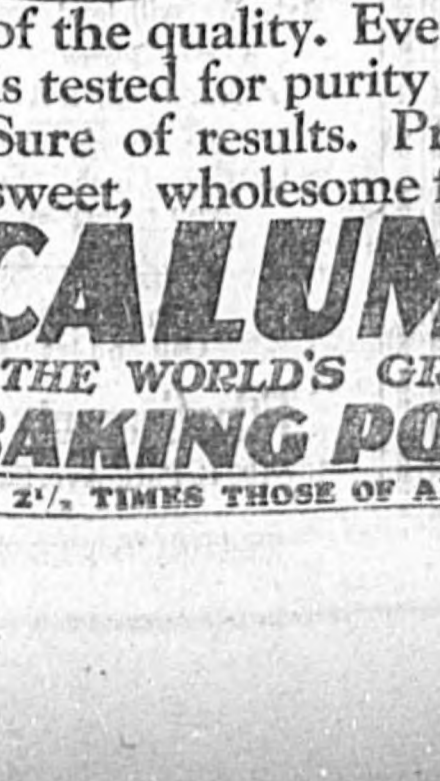

Woman Sentenced To Die In Chair For Killing Mate

ELIZABETHTOWN, N. Y., Nov. 20.—(AP)—Mrs. Fannie Soper, convicted of murder in the first degree for the killing of her third husband, Henry Soper, was sentenced to death in the electric chair by the Supreme Court, early this morning.

A jury largely of farmers, yesterday returned a verdict of murder, first degree, after having listened for 10 days to a trial which had attracted wide attention in the Adirondacks.

Sentenced to death in the electric chair is mandatory. If Mrs. Soper is put to death she will be the fourth of her sex from whom the state has exacted the extreme penalty. Mrs. Roxilla Druse was hanged in Herkimer, Feb. 28, 1837, for the murder of her husband; Martha Place who was convicted in New York county, was executed in Sing Sing prison on Mar. 20, 1899, and Mary Farmer, convicted in Jefferson county, was put to death in Auburn prison on Mar. 29, 1909.

He stated that the education of public sentiment against speculation of this kind and the whole-hearted support of the railroads would in time bring about the solution of the state's transportation difficulties.

OSCEOLA PLANS ROAD PROGRAM OF \$2,000,000

Chamber of Commerce Okeys Report of Committee That Passes Upon All Highways

KISSIMMEE, Fla., Nov. 20.—(AP)—Final report of the general committee, representing all sections of Osceola county, to determine which roads shall be constructed in the \$2,000,000 road building program for which a bond issue will be called, has been adopted by the local chamber of commerce.

The contemplated program includes 82 miles of new sixteen foot roads throughout the county and repairs to the Ocean-to-Gulf Highway from Kissimmee to the Brevard county line.

The program as adopted by the county and endorsed by the chamber provides for thirty-six miles of the Ocean to Gulf highway at Holopaw Junction through Holopaw and Menansville to the Indian River county line, where the Florida East Coast railroad leaves Osceola county and is part of a through road to Okeechobee City. Fifteen miles were agreed upon on the Lawe Wilson road, four miles on the Hilliard island road, five miles on the Marcoosee road, and eight miles to Kissimmee Park. Four and one half miles will be built through Center Park to East Lake, Tohopekaliga and along the lake shore to the city limits of St. Cloud. Ten miles will be built from the Dixie Highway through Osceola City on the pleasant Mill road.

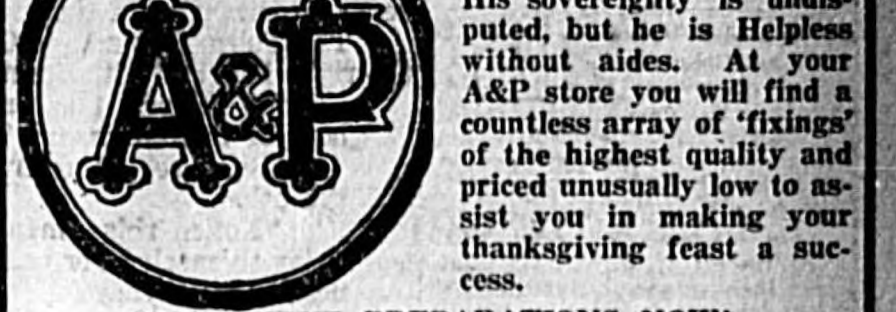

WALL OF CHINA IS LEGEND TRAGEDY OF A PIOUS WIFE

Place Where Great Chinese Railway Pierces Wall Is Temple Erected to Memory Of Pious Wife's Husband

CHINWANGTAO, Oct. 30 (AP).—Where the Peking-Mukden railway pierces the Great Wall of China at Shanhaikwan is a temple erected to the memory of a pious wife whose husband perished in the building of the structure.

Chih Huang-ti, the emperor who united all China, came to the throne in 246 B. C. It was Chih who built the Great Wall to keep the country together.

A woman from the south, so the legend runs, brought cotton-wadded clothes for her man, who had been impressed by the emperor to help build the wall. She was told that her husband had died, and that she could not have his body because it had been thrown between the brick facings of the wall and crushed there under tons of rubble and earth.

The scandal came to the ears of the emperor, who recognized, beneath his tyranny, that the conduct of the woman had been most orthodox. To regularize the matter, he directed that she had admitted to his household. First, however, he granted her prayer that she be permitted to select the bones of her husband for more deliberate burial.

The woman gathered up her husband's bones and walked to the end of the wall, abutting on the sea, from which the guards could stop her, she cast the bones into the sea and herself after them.
