Sanctions imposed against the public schools of Seminole County by the Florida Education Association are expected to be lifted again today, William Jenkins, president of the Seminole Education Association, told The Herald.

Sanctions, only recently lifted, were reimposed when the School Board last Thursday defied Laver and Jenkins. Jenkins, who had participated in the teacher walk-out, from administrative positions in classroom duties.

Sanctions connected with the last one are still being fought. Although the SEA meeting was canceled today, some new settlements sending some teachers back to work.

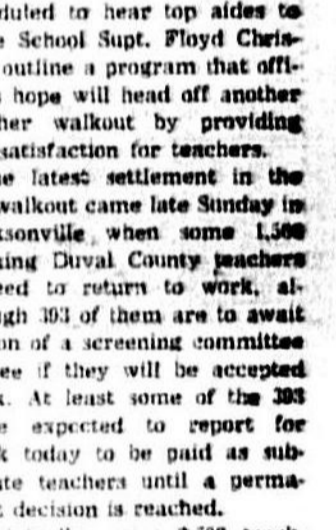

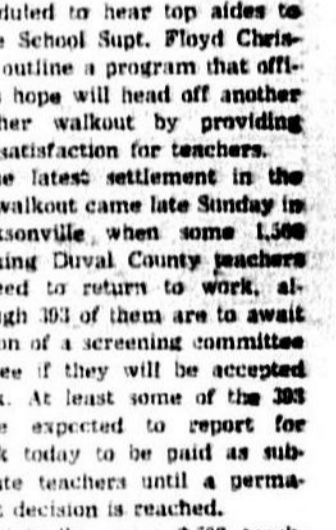

Some 1,000 of that county's 1,300 teachers remained out of classrooms after last week's three-week statewide strike.

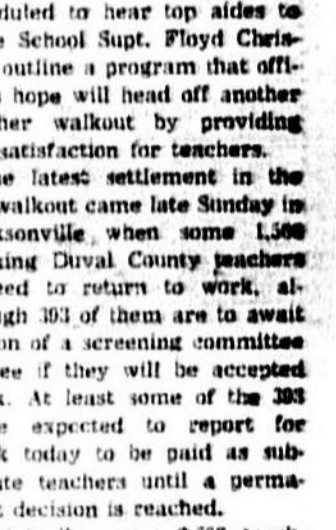

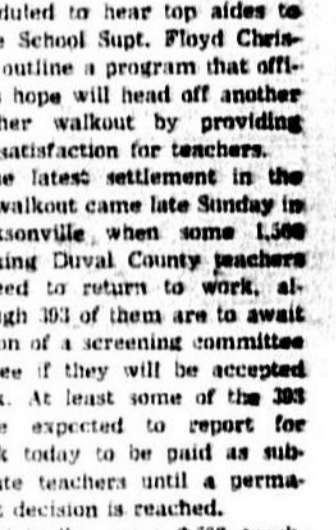

Guidance department at Seminole High School is sponsoring a "College Night" program for the junior class and their parents.

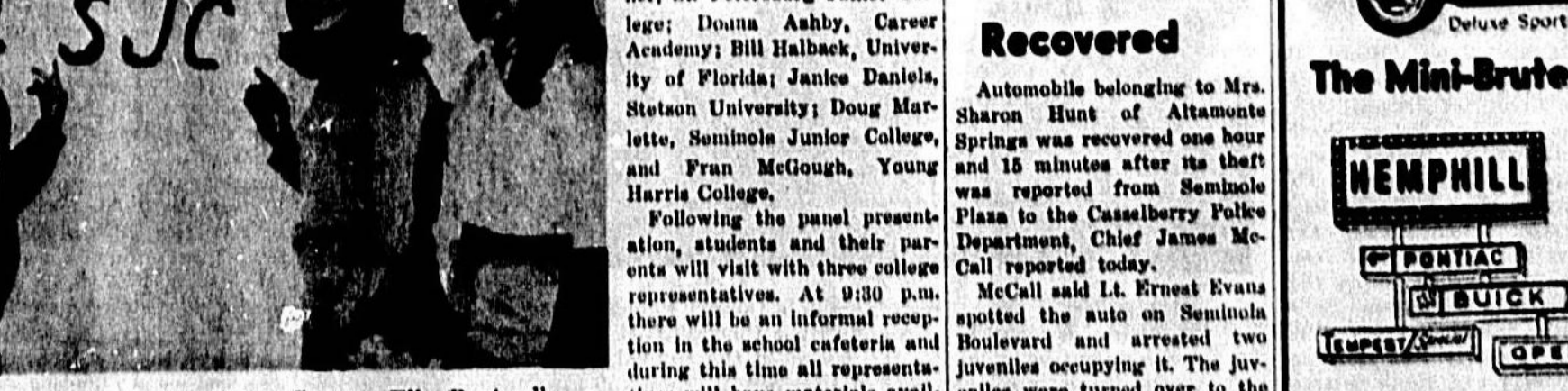
It is to be held on Thursday at 7 p. m. in the high school auditorium.

## 'Loner' Slays Seven People

IRONWOOD, Mich. (AP) — A seven-year victim of a rifleman's two-hour shooting spree died Sunday and two persons remained in "very serious" condition. Six persons were killed in the rampage Saturday through Sunday in western upper peninsula community.

Changed in the slaying is Eric Pearson, 36, a muscular outdoorsman described as "a skillful hunter and a loner" who worked as a janitor in a nearby ski lodge.

Pearson was scheduled to be arraigned today.

Mrs. Helen Pulista, 42, of Ironwood, died Sunday night in Grand View Hospital.

The victims all were shot with high-powered hunting rifle. Ogemunc County Sheriff Chester J. Pritchard said Pearson had been drinking heavily and was incoherent when captured by patrons of a tavern, where one man was slain and a woman wounded.

The tavern was the last stop on the rampage. Authorities said the slayer first visited a modern, one-story home about a mile away, where four persons, including a mother and her daughter, were killed in the living room.

A 12-year-old girl, trying to hide in her bedroom closet, was wounded when a bullet was fired through the door. A trail of blood was left throughout the home.

The killer then went to another home, killing one man and wounding his wife. The next stop was the tavern.

"He just walked in the door and started shooting. He didn't say a word," said one customer.

The slayer's first bullet in the tavern struck and killed Rudolph Maurin, 56, of Ironwood, who was sitting near the door on the second stool from the end of the bar.

As Maurin slumped to the floor, Mrs. Pulista's husband, Axel, and another patron, John Niemel, of Ironwood, lunged for the gunman.

"The rifle, an automatic .30.06, discharged again and Mrs. Pulista fell mortally wounded.

The customer, said Pulista went for the rifle while Niemel threw the killer off balance and clubbed him with a whiskey bottle. He grabbed from the gunman's pocket.

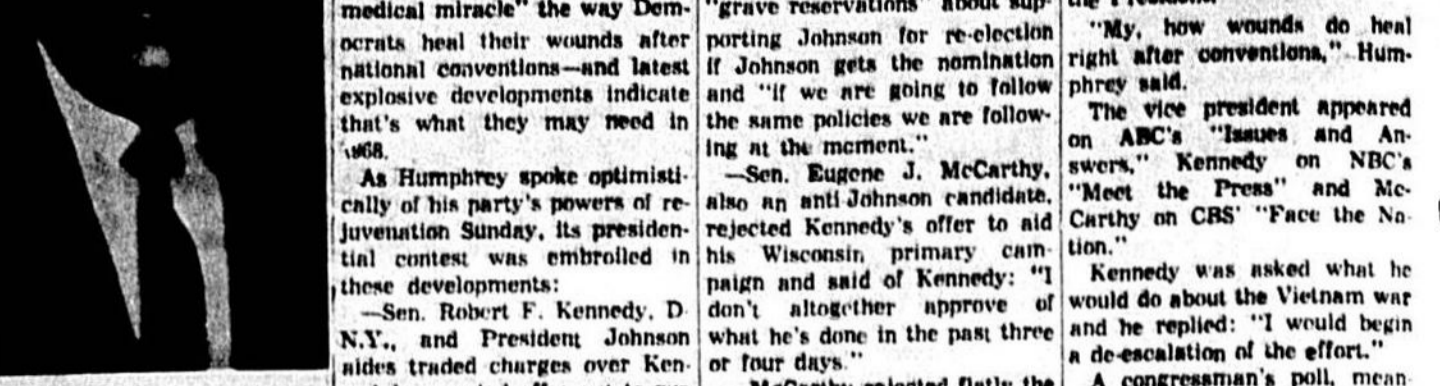

# HHH Optimistic On Split By Demo Candidates

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey says it is a "modern medical miracle" the way Democrats heal their wounds after national conventions—and latest explosive developments indicate that's what they may need in 1964.

"I think that's beyond imagination," he said.

Humphrey spoke optimistically of his party's powers of rejuvenation Sunday, its presidential contest was embroiled in these developments:

—Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, D-N.Y., and President Johnson aides traded charges over Kennedy's reported effort to run for president if Johnson appointed a blue ribbon commission to revise Vietnam war policy.

A high administration source called Kennedy's proposal "a political dead end."

Kennedy said the White House witnessed its credibility gap by disturbing the proposal.

—Kennedy said he would have "grave reservations" about supporting Johnson for re-election if Johnson gets the nomination and "if we are going to follow the same policies we are following at the moment."

The vice president appeared on ABC's "Issues and Answers" Tuesday on NBC's "Meet the Press" and McCarthy on CBS' "Face the Nation."

Kennedy was asked what he would do about the Vietnam war and he replied: "I would begin a de-escalation of the effort." A congressman's poll, meanwhile, showed McCarthy favored over Johnson in Wisconsin where the nation's second primary comes April 2.

McCarthy got 4.8 per cent and Johnson 34.7 per cent of the Sunday San Francisco poll. Kennedy was 1.8, and Johnson 3.2.

—Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy, also an anti-Johnson candidate, rejected Kennedy's offer to aid his Wisconsin primary campaign and said of Kennedy: "I don't know what he's doing in the past three or four days."

McCarthy rejected flatly the idea of becoming Kennedy's vice-presidential running mate. "I think that's beyond imagination," he said.

But Humphrey announced he will personally campaign for Johnson in state primaries, said the Democratic convention will select Kennedy as its presidential nominee.

On the Republican side, New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller promised his "most earnest and careful consideration" of whether to declare himself an active presidential candidate.

Johnson accepted the commission proposal.

Kennedy put it this way: "I made it clear that if (the commission) were more than a public relations gimmick, if it both the President's announcement of the commission and its membership signified a clear-cut willingness to seek a wider path to peace in Vietnam, my declaration of candidacy would no longer be necessary."

But the administration source said "grave doubts" of the wisdom of his post course and that was why this reappraisal was necessary.

The source said Kennedy wanted to be the nominee if Johnson accepted the commission and presented to Clifford a list of other possible members.

Johnson immediately rejected the proposal, the source said, on grounds it smacked of a political deal, cast doubt on his Vietnam policies, might encourage North Vietnam to think U. S. resolve was weakening and furthermore represented an attempt to usurp presidential authority.

Newweek magazine quoted a White House aide as calling the proposal "the damndest piece of White House blackmail" he had ever heard of.

Kennedy, saying he was governing by the traditional rules of confidence supporting White House conversations are no longer respected by the White House itself," charged.

## LBJ, RFK Feud

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Robert F. Kennedy and the Johnson administration have exchanged politically explosive charges over the New Yorker's proposal to stay out of the presidential race if U.S. policy in Vietnam were revised.

High administration sources labeled as an ultimatum Kennedy's proposal that President Johnson appoint a blue-ribbon panel to work on policy revisions. They said Johnson snubbed it as a totally unacceptable political deal.

Kennedy acknowledged Sunday he proposed the commission, but called published reports on it distorted and blamed that on White House leaks to news media.

Charged Kennedy, who entered the race for the Democratic presidential nomination on Saturday, "I don't believe the American people no longer believe the President and the White House: why the credibility of our political leadership has been so critically eroded and why it is clear that the only way we are going to change our policy in Vietnam is to change administrations in Washington."

In a 1,300-word statement, Kennedy said he told Secretary of Defense Clark M. Clifford Thursday that his candidacy would be necessary if Johnson accepted the commission proposal.

The promise came after a Sunday meeting with Oregon backers in his New York City apartment. Rep. John Delaney, co-chairman of the Oregon Draft Resistance Committee, said the governor gave no hint what his decision will be.

Delaney also said California Sen. Ronald Reagan may be an active candidate in the Oregon primary.

Reagan has had a staff in the field for a number of months now, setting up in Oregon. Delaney said. "I would be very much surprised if they are not doing this as an empty exercise."

## Storms Buffet North

A late winter storm which dumped heavy snow from Montana to Utah and Colorado pushed eastward early today and wrecked the warmer great plains and Midwest states with thunderstorms, hail and strong gusty winds.

Locally heavy amounts of rain soaked the eastern seaboard.

Thunderstorms erupted across the extreme eastern portions of South Dakota and Nebraska. Showers were also reported in parts of Iowa, Minnesota and Wisconsin.

Hail one-half inch to one inch in diameter pelted Sioux Falls, S. D., late Sunday night and early today.

Wind gusts averaging 40 to 45 miles an hour whipped blowing dust in areas from Oklahoma to Nebraska. Gusts of 65 miles an hour lashed Hastings, Neb., late Sunday night.

Snow continued to fall over the Rocky mountains to southwestern Wyoming. Livingston, Mont., reported snow (about an inch) and areas near Salt Lake City, Utah, reported as much as six inches had fallen since the storm began Tuesday night.

Stockmen were issued warnings in Montana, Wyoming, the Dakotas, Nebraska and northwest Kansas where snow, rain and sharply falling temperatures were considered dangerous for sheared livestock.

A twin-engine plane cleared for a routine landing Sunday at Rapid City, S. D., was suddenly buffeted by gusty winds, witnesses said, careened on a wing and burst into flames. All nine persons aboard—six of them female high school cheerleaders—were killed.

A disturbance off the New Jersey coast continued to dump heavy rains from Eastern Virginia to Maine.

Early morning rain amounts included 1.4 inches at Providence, R.I., and 1.8 inches at Boston.

New York's Central Park was hit with a record 24-hour rainfall of 4.8 inches. It broke the previous record of 3.2 inches set in 1874.

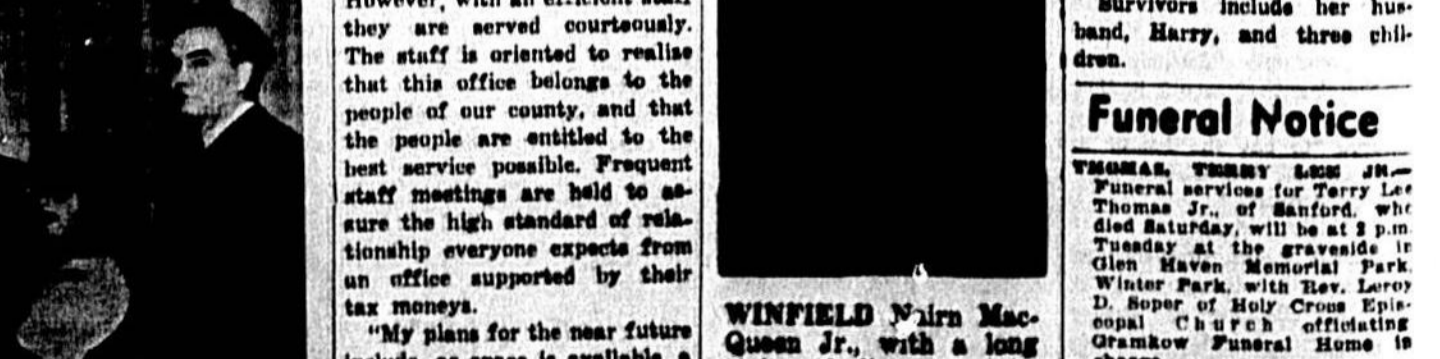
## Troy Ray Announces For Re-Election

Survivors include her husband, Harry, and three children.

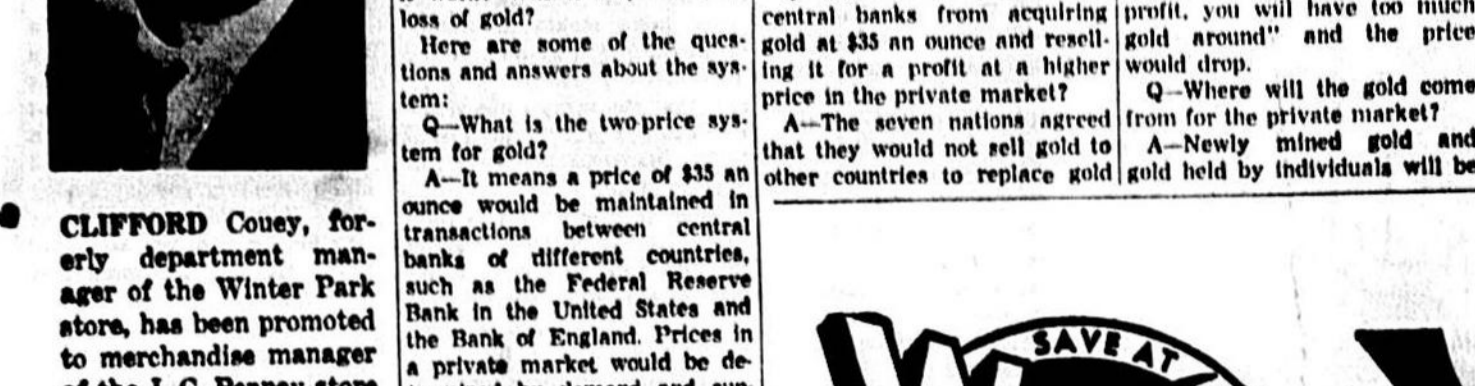

## Credit Calculator

MANHATTAN, Kan. (AP) — A Consumer Credit Calculator developed by two Kansas State University professors is attracting nationwide attention.

Dr. Richard L. D. Morse and Mrs. Alice Rasmussen of the University's Department of Family Economics designed the calculator to help the annual interest percentage rate for consumers who are comparison shopping for credit.

The calculator is a series of simplified actuarial tables presented on a one-page form. It will quickly disclose that a 6 per cent car finance quotation actually totals about 11 per cent for a 12-month contract.

It also helps provide dollar amounts of interest over a given period, even on a sliding percentage interest basis, thus yielding total cost and annual interest rate.

Spokesmen at K-State said the calculator is now being used by credit unions, high schools, colleges and universities.

# Move With Care

Old hands are always at a premium when educational changes must be made. This is especially true when they must be moved after a period of controversy.

Here in Florida and in Seminole County our immediate concern—classroom changes—is the matter of public school education left to the discretion of the superintendent of the county and to be conducted by the Florida Education Association.

Members of the education appropriations committee, without Governor Claude Kirk's signature, have approved funds for higher salaries and other special aids to education and opened the door for many teachers to return to their classrooms.

Yet there exists a basic principle of administration which has produced an unexpected situation in our county as the Seminole County School Board has decided that school principals and assistant principals are—by the nature of their appointment—an arm of the administration.

Seminole County is on the verge of needed expansion in the physical educational facilities. Improvement in the professional quality of teachers will be necessary. The county board is very anxious to provide themselves more effective with their people has already taken place.

The Florida state-wide teachers' strike, first in this section, has served as an excellent example of how things could be no schools without the teachers. And it may have been necessary that the more aggressive educators have convinced themselves that such a confrontation as we have witnessed and are experiencing is needed to update educational processes.

It has also demonstrated a fact which seems to have been overlooked. Public schools are operated by the government. They are the responsibility of elected officials; legislators on the state level, school boards on the county level. The school boards are to schools without the teachers. And it may have been necessary that the more aggressive educators have convinced themselves that such a confrontation as we have witnessed and are experiencing is needed to update educational processes.

We feel, however, that a return to more basic educational needs, that both conscientious school board members—and we place our faith in this respect, and true educators take a long look.

Our state and our county will have their future greatly influenced by what takes place here in the next period of time. And, even more to the point, so will our students, the young men and young women who must be armed with knowledge to confront the years ahead.

## Presidential Advantages

WASHINGTON (AP) — It could be a mile early to start writing off Lyndon Johnson as President even though headlines in the wake of the New Hampshire primary shrieked of "vulnerability" and "defeat."

For one thing, it's a little hard to see how anybody can lose an election when he isn't on the ballot, especially when he comes up with 48 per cent of the vote on a write-in basis—as Johnson did.

But this is even more important: When the man involved is president of the United States he has big advantages built into a big power base that comes with the office. And he can use them to the hilt in primary and general election campaigns.

There is a flow of names that can whisk him anywhere at 600 miles an hour—for speeches, dam dedications, the unveiling of monuments, convocations, and on and on.

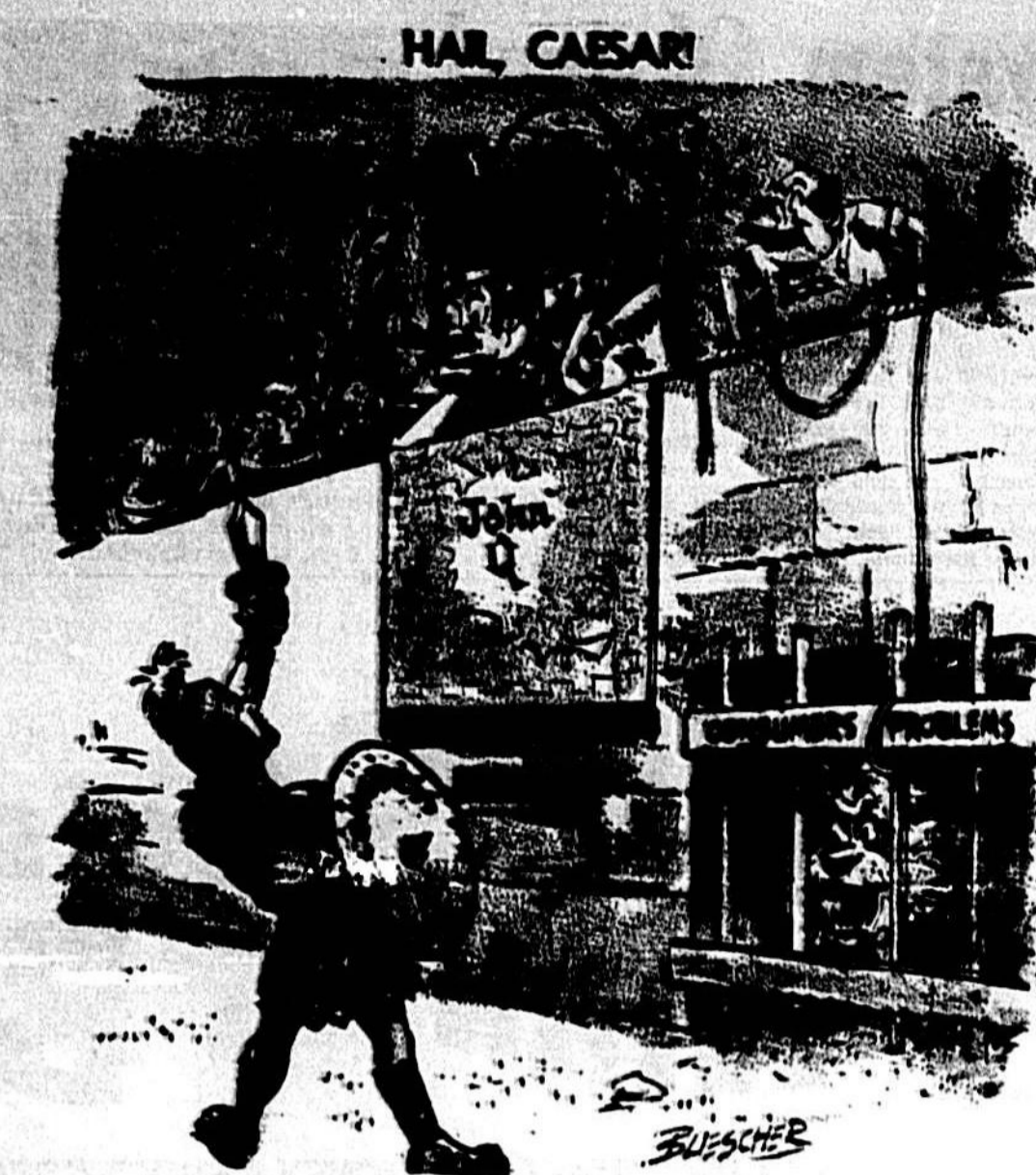
All along the way, if there's any adverse word at all, the crowds will turn out. 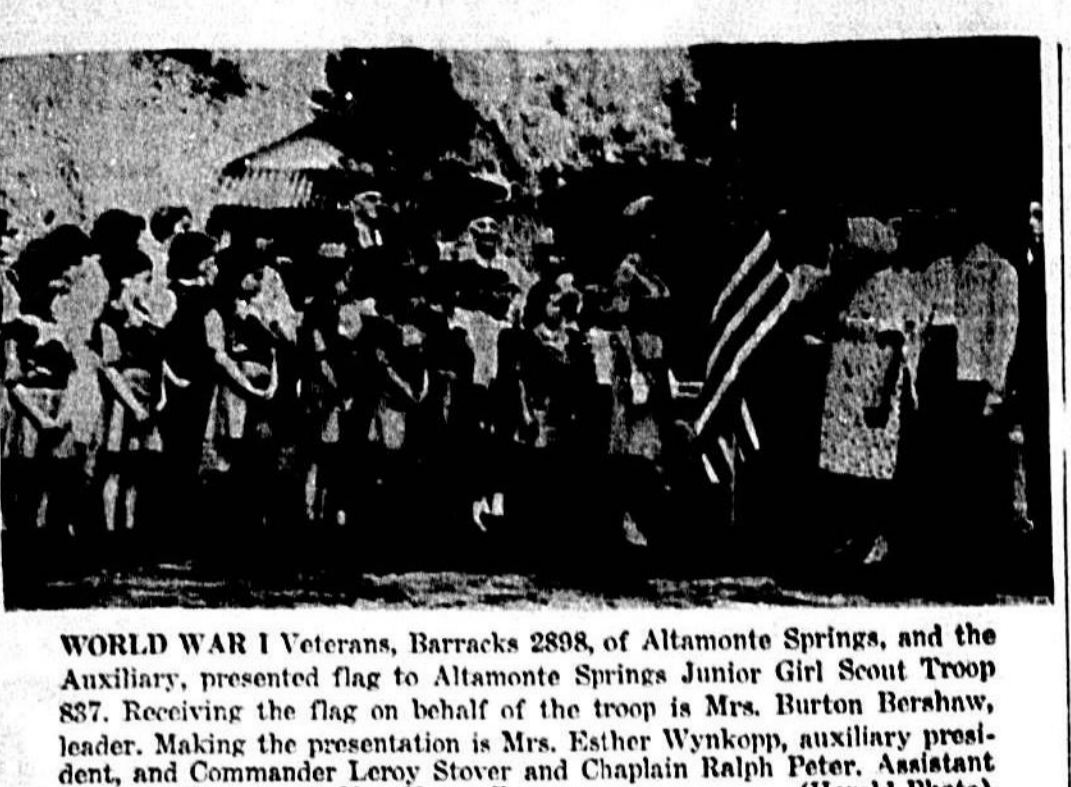

Sources said the President has decided on a "moderate increase" in U. S. military manpower in response to an appeal by Gen. William C. Westmoreland, American commander in Vietnam, to raise the 525,000-man ceiling previously set.

Westmoreland was reported to have requested up to 526,000 men after the massive Communist Tet offensive which began at the end of January.

The Johnson administration has claimed the Viet Cong forces suffered a major military setback in the resulting fighting. But U.S. officials acknowledge that Viet Cong offensive three U.S. and allied operations of balance and pinned down major combat forces to defensive positions in South Vietnam's bigger cities and towns.

Last week, Westmoreland launched the first major allied offensive since the Viet Cong army attacks, with American forces sweeping out from Saigon.

Rep. Paul Findley R., Ill., announced meanwhile that 137 more troops, it is understood, to give U.S. and allied forces a greater capacity to carry on offensive operations. Even so, large numbers of troops will remain tied down to defensive duties in the cities and in South Vietnam's northern provinces opposite large North Vietnamese and Viet Cong forces near Khe Sanh and Hue.

Although Johnson is reported not to have reached a firm commitment on numbers, 35,000— a division plus supporting units—was the total being mentioned by Washington sources.

"They said any boost was likely to be spread out over several months. The administration also is reported to have agreed to speed up its plans to furnish South Vietnamese forces with modern light weapons.

Officials have said South Vietnamese provincial and local troops were augmented during the Tet offensive by Viet Cong units armed with large numbers of Soviet-designed automatic rifles.

### Europe Greet's Gold Agreement

LONDON (AP) — Europe greeted the Washington gold agreement with relief, but commentators and bankers termed it a temporary measure whose success would depend on cuts in American and British spending.

The agreement's basic point—the establishment of a two-price gold system—had been widely predicted in Britain and on the continent. The West German government advocated introduction of a free gold market last Friday, and Swiss bankers said they had urged the two-market system as the only way to stop the gold rush.

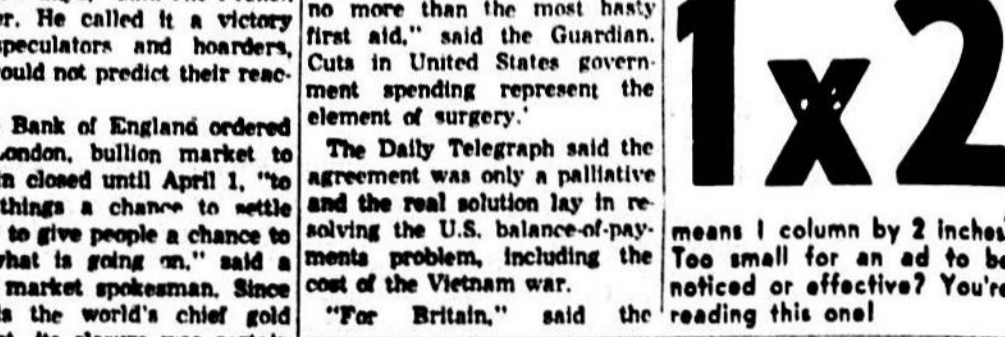
"Anything is better than the suspense and confusion of the last few days," said one French banker. He called it a victory for speculators and hoarders, but would not predict their reaction.

The Bank of England ordered the London bullion market to remain closed until April 1, "to give things a chance to settle down, to give people a chance to see what is going on," said a bank spokesman. Since this is the world's chief gold market, its closure was certain to restrict trading on the continent.

Gold trading also remained suspended in Canada while the Bank of Canada and the government assessed the implications of the new system. The central bank's governor, Louis Rasminsky, pledged Canada's cooperation with the seven nations of the gold pool.

Swiss bankers met in Zurich and decided to let their big banks organize the free gold market in Switzerland. One major question still unanswered was where the free market would get its gold. Prospective sources of supply included South Africa's newly mined gold, small hoarders and speculators who stocked up during the recent rush, and some central banks which might collect gold from other banks and funnel it into the bank door at a good profit.

"I've never played better than I did in the last round here," Sikes said. "I'm always a good driver, but this time I was right down the middle on every hole."

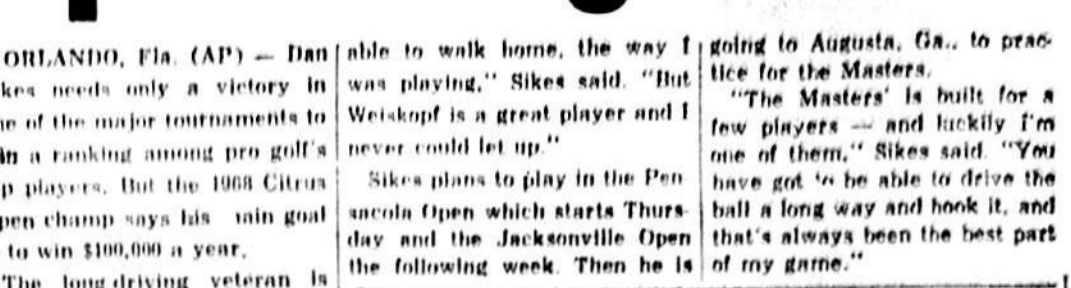
Sikes shot a 66 in the fourth round for a 72-hole total of 273, one stroke ahead of Tom Weiskopf.

The most popular outdoor recreational pursuit in America, boating, need not be hazardous notwithstanding the admission that man, on the water, is in an unnatural element. From the dawn of history man has had to use his ingenuity and resourcefulness not only to conquer the sea and other bodies of water, but to remain ever alert that these do not vanquish him.

If you would turn to boating, whether it be on the sea, bay, golf, pond, lake or river — you have a responsibility as skipper to practice good seamanship and the first requirement of which is the recognition of your responsibility for the care and protection of ship, crew and guests. Most accidents on the water are attributable to unsafe acts, or unsafe equipment.

The following is self repeated advice, but such reminders can never be tendered too many times.

Be shipshape. Stow everything in its proper place. Loose gear on deck is a hazard.

Carry adequate equipment. Above all, life-saving gear. Sufficient ground tackle, compass, charts, tide and current tables, flares, barometer, binoculars, first aid kit, oars, bailer, bilge pump. All of these are essential.

Practice the procedure for "man overboard." Know what to do in case of fire, collision or swamping. Fire fighting equipment is an absolute necessity. Tools and spare parts should not be ignored.

Watch the weather. Seek shelter in heavy weather. Head into waves at an angle. Carry a drogue or sea anchor, or improvising one. Know your boat. Don't overload — balance your load. Avoid sharp turns. Don't change positions in a small boat while under way. Don't move about suddenly (the highest percentage of drownings occur here). Practice courtesy, abide by the rules of the road. Keep a weather eye peeled for the swimmer, scuba diver, other vessels. These are but a few of the rules governing safe boating. Applying common sense to all phases of this delightful sport will solve many problems afloat.

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## Election Race Opens Formally Tomorrow

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Qualifying for election to the state Senate and House of Representatives opens here Tuesday but many of the familiar faces won't be signing up.

For some, public service has been too expensive. Other say they will go on to bigger things. Salaries for state legislators based on 60-day sessions every two years just don't fill the gap for lawyers and other professional men forced to attend frequent special sessions.

Senators and representatives are: \$1,200 a year, paid at \$100 a month. They also receive \$25 a day to live on for each day of a legislative session and \$300 monthly when the Legislature is out of session.

"We're just coming into a new phase in Florida government," said Senate President Verie Pope, D-Alt. Adding, "These people just can't afford to serve in government, coming into session every five minutes."

Among those on the Senate and House lists are: Sen. Edmond Geng, D-Miami, an attorney who is running for re-election, said working in Tallahassee "reduced my income 40 per cent; the first nine months of my income is spent on living expenses."

Sen. John Mathews, D-Jacksonville, also an attorney with seven partners, said constant sessions were expensive to his firm.

"Normally, I'm expected to produce \$20 an hour to justify my position in the firm," Mathews said, adding he couldn't meet that figure in 1967 and the firm had to turn down a lot of work.

The proposed new state Constitution calls for annual sessions and study is currently underway that could create full-time legislators.

# Sanctions Near End

"Everything is back to normal... or as near normal as it ever will be." This was the consensus this morning of William Phillips, Seminole school superintendent, and William Layer, president of the Seminole Education Association. Phillips pointed out that all county school superintendents in the state voted yesterday at Tampa to withdraw from the Florida Education Association.

Layer was confident the FEA will lift the sanctions against Seminole County schools, "maybe even today—but surely by the end of the week." FEA reinstated the sanctions last week when Layer, assistant principal at Lyman High School, and Rupert Jenkins, principal at Monroe Wilson School, were reduced to teacher rank by the School Board.

To forestall a potential all-teacher walkout yesterday, and because of the sanctions, the School Board reinstated Layer and Jenkins in an emergency session late Friday afternoon.

Meaning, some 315 Lee County teachers returned to class after agreeing to pay a \$100 fine each to the School Board (at Fort Myers) for their part in a statewide strike that still has more than 4,000 teachers off the job.

The unprecedented \$100 penalty, which one teacher called blackmail, were recommended by a citizens' committee and agreed to by both teachers and the school board.

"It was a matter of establishing the board price for getting your job back," said William Hammond, Lee County Classroom Teachers Association president.

He said teachers agreed to the settlement, "I think they consider it somewhat blackmail."

The Lee County teachers had remained out despite an announced end of the strike two weeks ago because of a differential reintegration of administrators and strike leaders.

A teacher spokesman said agreement to the \$100 fine came at the urging of nine out of work administrators.

It was pointed out that the financing of the port and its facilities is being done by public funding and it would not be proper for a single potential subscriber to dictate changes solely to lower its own cost of operation in the future.

It was pointed out that "preferential treatment" to a single "large" customer, could and would stir up "a real hornet's nest" with not only other potential users but also with the Interstate Commerce Commission, a railroad and longshoremen unions, among others.

Members of the Port Authority voted that the administrator and the chairman meet with the officials of the Merry Brook Company on its protest of the high quality of the port facilities and endeavor to dissolve the problems.

The engineering firm of Lockwood and Green has proposed changes and reallocations of costs which have changed the original figure of \$765,500 to \$905,500. This additional \$140,000 will have to be made up by the Port Authority, itself, as the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has refused to finance the original amount is the maximum it will finance. The Port Authority body also has a choice of certain alternatives to pare the cost down to the original figure. They plan to meet with HUD officials in Atlanta soon.

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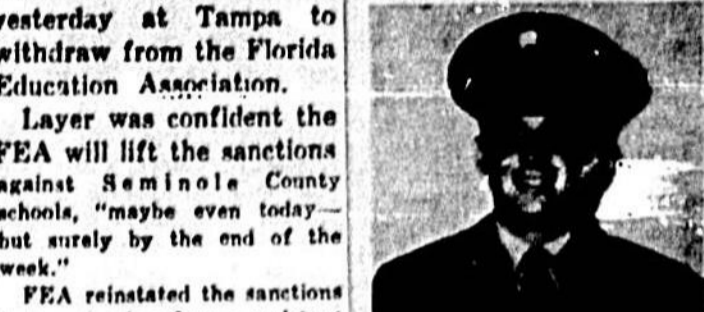

The court order prohibits the county from realigning the road if it is deemed right of way. Johnson pointed out there are numerous roads in the county which are not on their proper right of way.

County Road Superintendent J. C. Lavender was authorized to attend a public hearing in Tallahassee this Friday on vehicle inspections.
