



How closely tied together are the seven counties forming the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council was demonstrated Wednesday afternoon at a meeting at the Mayfair Inn.

Council members met with officials of various utilities, missile contractors, businesses and industries in seeking, and obtaining promises of moral and financial help.

Robert H. Doyle, council executive director, pointed to one phase of the close tie-in of the seven counties: Cape Kennedy gets its wa-

ter from Cocoa. Cocoa is dependent upon its supply from deep wells in Orange County. These wells are supplied by underground currents originating in Lake County.

The council was formed slightly more than two years ago to develop exhaustive analyses of existing problems and to project the thinking of a wide variety of experts on the future problems of the s seven counties.

It consists of representatives from Seminole, Orange, Velusia, Brevard, Osceola, Indian River and Lake Counties. The council is financed with

\$81,000 from the Housing and Home Finance Agency, \$125,-000 from the National Acronautics and Space Administration and with the counties n contributing on a per capital basis. This latter now amounts to 12 cents a person.

The group represents 75 eonimunities and a population total of 750,000 persons. This, said Doyle, is expected to double by 1975. "Our sister states are way

ahead of us," Doyle said, "in the planning field. This is a new experience for this "We are growing like Top-ey," he continued, "and with

George Washington's birthday anniversary prompts a thought:

Why do we make up fables to illustrate the greatness of our country's statesmen when their real lives are so much more impressive?

Why do we have to make so much out of the legend that Washington told his father he had, indeed, cut down the cherry tree?

It is fine, of course, that Washington was truthful. But it is a pity we must make up fables to illustrate his honesty. Washington should be remembered for other, greater deeds; for his real accomplishments. Born in Westmoreland County, Va., Washington dld not attend school until after he was 11 years

It was when he was a surveyor that Gov. Dinwiddie of Virginia wished to send a message to the French along the Ohio River valley and chose Washington to lead a small group of men on the 1.000-

old. Yet when he was only 16 he

started a career as a surveyor.

mile journey. Washington had adventures on that journey that were worthy of the Daniel Boone legend.

When the call went out for soldiers during the French and Indian War, Washington met the challenge and served bravely.

He was chosen a delegate to the First and Second Continental Congresses. It was the second in 1775 that he was chosen to lead an American army.

The army consisted of raw, untrained citizens. These men had come from their farms at the news of trouble. They were without uniforms and camp equipment. Their rifles were their own.

It was Washington's task to shape them into a fighting team. For seven years he fought not only the British, but apathy, defection and a wrangling Congress from 18 independent, sovereign, jealous states.

After the war, Washington was asked to preside over the convention which framed the Constitution. It was this same Constitution which provided for a president, and Washington was asked to be the first president of the United States. Which of these deeds, should he be remembered for?

He was not a military genius. No one claims he was. There is some argument as to whether he was a great president. He was not even a polished surveyor.

What, then, should he be remembered for?

George Washington should be remembered as a man who so loved his country that he was willing to serve it in any way he could, a man who spent his life in the public serv-

Truly it can be said of him that he pledged his life, fortune and his honor to the ideals of the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution, and his country.


"The blood bank, a nonprofit organization, is governed by a board of directors. No outside financial assistance is received and operations are carried on solely from laboratory fees. No volunteer help is used and all employes are paid.

"The greatest source of financial loss is when a mobile unit collects only 15-18 bottles of blood on a visit. At least 35 pints must be received to make a mobile unit trip worthwhile since on each visit there always is one dootor, one technician, two trained nurses and a mobile unit driver.

"Blood can come only from an individual. It cannot be manufactured. It is good only for 21 days. On the 22nd day it must be made into plasma. Therefore, there must be a constant source of donations to keep an adequate supply on hand.

"Age limits for giving blood are from 21 to 60 years. Those from 18 to 21 must have the consent of their par-


