

Quake Victims May Not Return

LAJES AIR BASE, Azores (UPI) — The islanders of nearby Sao Jorge escaped three days of destructive earth shocks without casualties, but many of the 1,500 who fled say they will never return, a U. S. Air Force spokesman said today.

This big U. S. Air Force base on the neighboring island of Terceira was a communications center for the rescue operation after the tremors began to jar Sao Jorge Sunday night.

Gale winds of up to 80 miles per hour kept rescue planes on the ground, but an international fleet bucked high waves to come to the aid of the islanders.

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Here's What Is Expected Of Tax Cut

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The administration is expecting big dividends from the tax cut. Among them: —\$20 billion more a year spending by Americans on television sets, automobiles,

shoes and other consumer goods.

—\$12 billion more invested each year in new industrial plant and equipment, new homes and new schools, roads and other public works.

—Between 2 and 3 million new jobs.

—\$3 billion more taxes for state and local governments.

—And, last but not least, \$12 billion more tax revenues for the federal government, canceling out the \$12 billion loss from the tax cut when it becomes fully effective.

Demos Look To GOP For Votes

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Senate Democratic leaders are ready to give Republicans "full credit" if they furnish needed votes to crack an expected southern filibuster against the civil rights bill.

Democratic supporters of civil rights legislation believe the cause may be lost if the GOP does not produce about 25 votes to help an estimated 42 or 43 Democrats shut off a filibuster. They feel the GOP is "on the spot" to aid in getting the two-thirds majority needed to gag debate.

If they continue in their old ways, they will save about 7 per cent of that and spend the rest or a little less than \$10 billion. But it won't end here.

The higher production of goods to meet this extra spending will mean more jobs, higher payrolls, bigger profits and higher incomes for farmers and professional and service people.

This added purchasing power will generate still further increases in spending and incomes in an endless, although diminishing, chain. Economists call this the "multiplier effect." When it's all done, the initial \$10 billion increase is expected to produce about \$20 billion more consumer spending.

Love And Hate

Time after time someone has asked me how to handle the emotions of love and hate. Certainly they are both to be found in our lives and yet we find so much in the Bible that says love for our fellow man is "a must."

It would be most helpful, at this point, if you would turn in your Bible to the thirteenth chapter of 1 Corinthians and read the entire chapter. Here such marvelous gifts are named. We find the chapter saying that even though we have great abilities, knowledge, faith, generosity, patience, kindness, humility, and many other good traits that they are to no avail without love.

If you would like to read other portions of Scripture, concerning the mandate of love, you can find them by using your concordance or some topical reference aid. I will give examples of some of the most outstanding passages.

We find that Matthew 23:33 make it clear that love is to be unselfish as it informs us, "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself." If we are disciples of Christ we will have love in our hearts as John 13:35 reminds us, "By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another."

The standard of Christian love is high, indeed. Christ gave His own love as the expression of the degree that our love should reach, and also the necessity of it, by saying, "This is my commandment, that ye love one another, as I have loved you." (John 13:34)

Our title also speaks of hatred and we find that just as love is enjoined that hatred for our fellow man is forbidden. Leviticus 19:17 says, "Thou shalt not hate thy brother." 1 John 2:9 reminds us "He that saith he is in the light, and hateth his brother, is in darkness even until now."

Perhaps some may be thinking, but how can all of this be in true, but how about the man who hates sin? Yes, he does, but it is the only thing that he does hate, and he never hates the sinner!

I am sure that all of us hear of the terrible things that people do to each other and the first reaction is that we simply could not ever love some of the malfeasors. The peculiar thing that the Christian discovers is that he must separate the sin from the sinner. The Christian should hate all sin but never the sinner! Our Lord gave the most perfect example of this when he had experienced the humiliation of being spat upon, having the purple robe hung across his shoulders in mockery of kingship, the crown of thorns placed upon his head, the lash of the whip on his back and finally the suffering of the cross. Even so, he was able to look down upon his tormentors and say, "Father, forgive them; for they know not what they do." Christ knew that there was a great difference between the sin and the sinner.

C. B. Lewis wrote about his reaction of hearing Christian teachers talk about hating a bad man's actions, but not hating the bad man, and he said that for a long time this seemed to him to be impossible. Later it occurred to him that there was one man to whom he had been doing this very thing and that man was himself. In his reflection he found that no matter how much he hated the bad things about himself he continued to love himself.

Let us remember that the Christian faith does not ask



us to condone sin. It wants us to hate it so much that we seek to do away with it in our own lives and seek to so present the good life that others hate anything that gets in its way, but hate of any person is wrong.

Such a love attitude gives an entirely new relationship in human dealing with one another. It makes for a different approach to our problems and most of all a different result.

God's way is always the way that works right. Let us be sure that we follow His directions and one of the best places to begin is in this matter of love.

Rev. Lyons Is Guest Of Catholic Women

Many old and valuable documents and records, several of which were placed in the cornerstone of the original All Souls Catholic Church on July 4, 1887, were read and displayed by Rev. Richard Lyons in a talk for the Church of the Nativity Catholic Women's Club during Monday evening's meeting of the group.

Father Lyons, pastor of All Souls Church in Sanford, spoke on the history of the Catholic church in Seminole County.

Items from the old documents included a program of events which had been scheduled for the Fourth of July, 1887.

The cornerstone laying ceremonies were listed on the program as well as a baseball game between teams from Sanford and Atlanta, Ga., which Father Lyons reported was won by the Sanford team. Other events, from early morning until well into the evening, also were listed on the program.

Also from the cornerstone was a copy of the public records which revealed that the present site of All Souls Church had been purchased by the Rt. Rev. John Moore in 1887 for \$2,600 from two brothers who lived in London, England.

One of the most interesting items shown was a local newspaper dated July 5, 1887, which reported the cornerstone ceremony by Rev. Felix P. Swinburn who was at that time pastor of the St. James Church in Orlando.

Father Lyons explained that during the 1880s, Father Swinburn celebrated Mass every other Sunday in the Sanford area either at Doyle's Livery Stable or at a private home.

The first Catholic school in the area was operated at All Souls in 1911 by the Sisters of St. Joseph. It closed after only one year because of the prohibitive expense involved.

The original wooden church was completely destroyed by fire in 1931 except for the cornerstones. Construction of the present church began in 1932 and was completed in 1937.

Families came to All Souls Church from Lake and Volusia counties, Oviedo, Longwood, Lake Mary, Lake Moore, Lake Jessup, Geneva and Chuluota.

Father Lyons commented on the phenomenal growth of the church during the past 12 years. In 1923 he celebrated two Masses each Sunday to serve the Catholic population of the same areas that today require 19 Masses on Sunday.

He concluded his talk by restating the Christopher Principle, "It is better to light one candle than to curse the darkness" and advising that each person can set in motion a series of good actions leading to a better world.

Council Stresses 7-County Mutual Ties

How closely tied together are the seven counties forming the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council was demonstrated Wednesday afternoon at a meeting at the Mayfair Inn.

Council members met with officials of various utilities, missile contractors, businesses and industries in seeking, and obtaining promises of moral and financial help.

Robert H. Doyle, council executive director, pointed to one phase of the close tie-in of the seven counties:

Cape Kennedy gets its water from Cocoa. Cocoa is dependent upon its supply from deep wells in Orange County. These wells are supplied by underground currents originating in Lake County.

The council was formed slightly more than two years ago to develop exhaustive analyses of existing problems and to project the thinking of a wide variety of experts on the future problems of the seven counties.

It consists of representatives from Seminole, Orange, Volusia, Brevard, Osceola, Indian River and Lake Counties.

The council is financed with \$81,000 from the Housing and Home Finance Agency, \$125,000 from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration and with the counties contributing on a per capita basis. This latter now amounts to 12 cents a person.

The group represents 75 communities and a population total of 750,000 persons. This, said Doyle, is expected to double by 1975.

"Our sister states are way ahead of us," Doyle said, "in the planning field. This is a new experience for this state."

"We are growing like Topsoil," he continued, "and with no rhyme or reason."

The area lost two major missile contractors to Miami and south Georgia because it could not offer the detailed information the firms needed, the director said.

"No one knew where we were going."

The exhaustive study of the group may best be determined by its analysis of future supersonic jetport needs.

Doyle said it is expected there will be three major jetports on the Eastern Seaboard. One, he said, will be located either in New York or New Jersey.

"The governors of the two states are now arguing heatedly over this," he said.

The second may be located at Dulles International Airport near Washington.

The third "could" be located in the area served by the council. "This," Doyle said, "would not only serve the Southeast but South America as well."

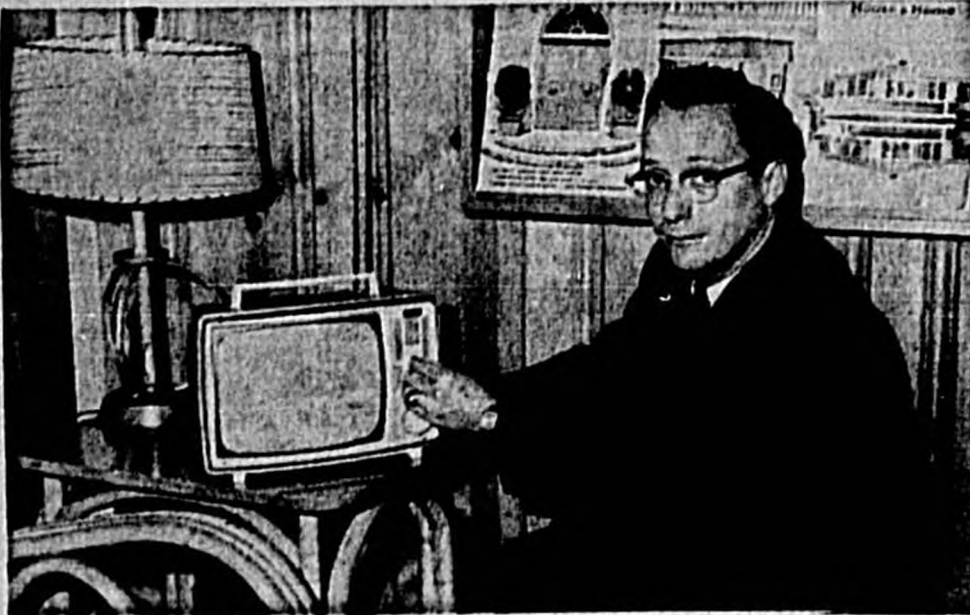

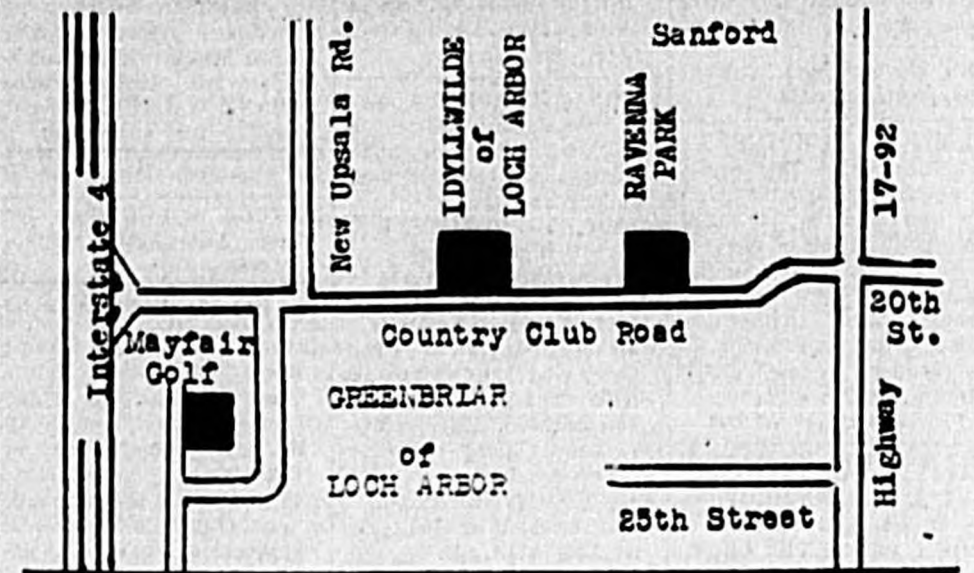

Time To Patch When Cracks Creep On Wall

Plaster walls, provided they are dry, may last forever. Yet, they are likely to develop cracks nonetheless.
These are often due to the settling of a house, a process that can go on for a long time. Or damage may result from an accident, such as children playing or someone moving furniture carelessly.
The best time to repair plaster walls is right before painting. Painting will not cover up the cracks. They'll only show through the paint. But painting is necessary after patching, since you will want to cover up the patched area.
Use patching plaster, available at hardware and paint stores. Check the instructions. Some plaster mixes harden more quickly than others. Mix only the amount you can use right away.
Before mixing, prepare the damaged area. Widen the crack enough so that you can get plaster in. Undercut the crack. This will keep the plaster from falling out.
Remove all loose plaster. If it crumbles easily it will not hold the patch.
Wet the surface thoroughly. This prevents the old plaster from drawing all the moisture from the new. Fill the crack with new plaster, but not clear to the surface. Make

sure the base of the opening is thoroughly filled — force in the material.
Allow the material to dry. Then apply the rest of the plaster, building up the patch so that it is level with the rest of the surface. Carefully smooth this with a trowel. If you work carefully, you should be able to run your finger over the area when dry without feeling any difference.
While you can sand the surface if it doesn't come out even, this practice will roughen ordinary patching plaster. If you are not sure of your technique use spackling compound which can be sanded easily.
Seal the new surface with shellac. This will prevent dull spots when you paint the wall.
Give the patched area an extra priming coat before painting.
Hairline cracks are often so tiny that they can be patched with a paste of white lead and turpentine. Use a cloth to rub the mixture into the crack. Wipe away the excess while it is still wet. Sand when dry.

"It's only natural that I return here to the old hometown to tell the best kept secret of the year—," Holland told a crowd of 2,000 friends and supporters.

"I have no political machine," the senator said. "But I do have a lot of friends."
Holland said he expects to

wage a vigorous campaign in the state between now and November. To date, he has no announced opponent.

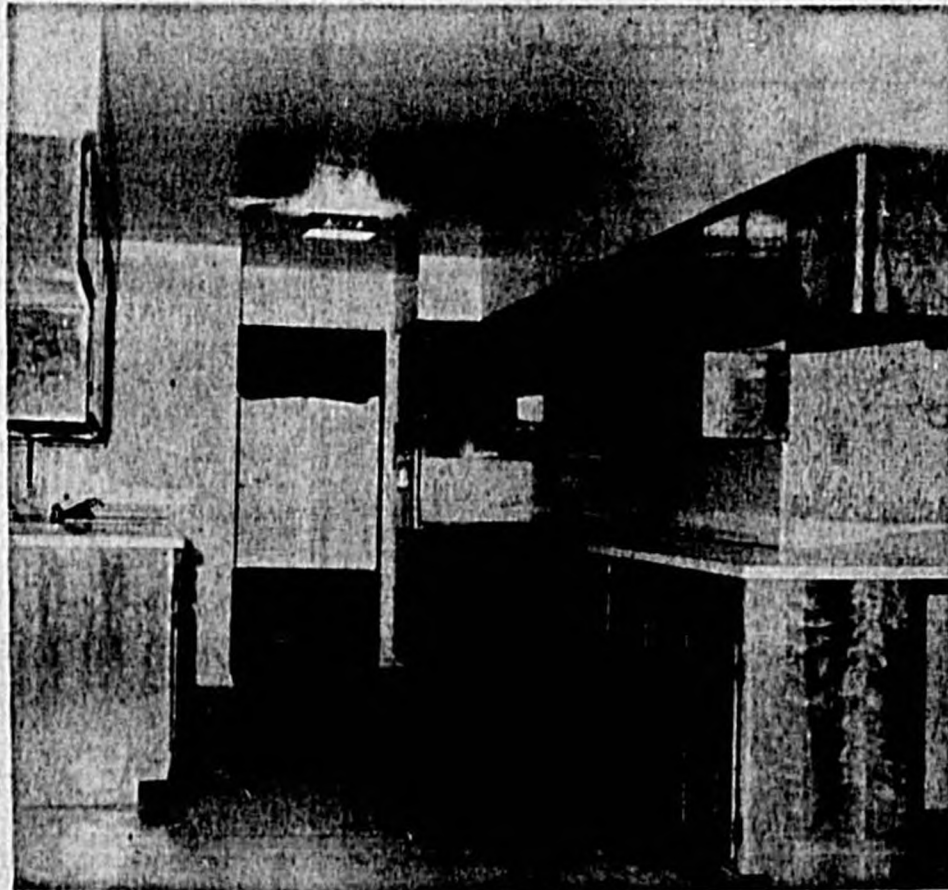

The scientist, D. J. Levy, inventor of the technique, says the process has already been used successfully in the design of antennas for space vehicles.

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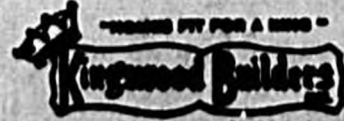
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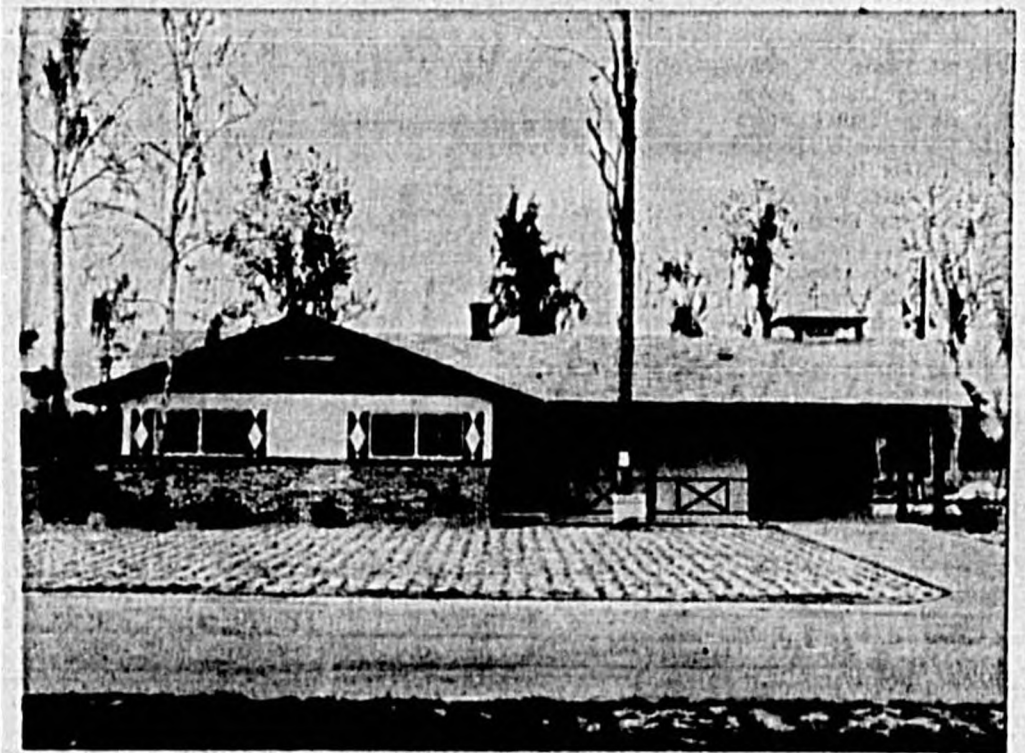
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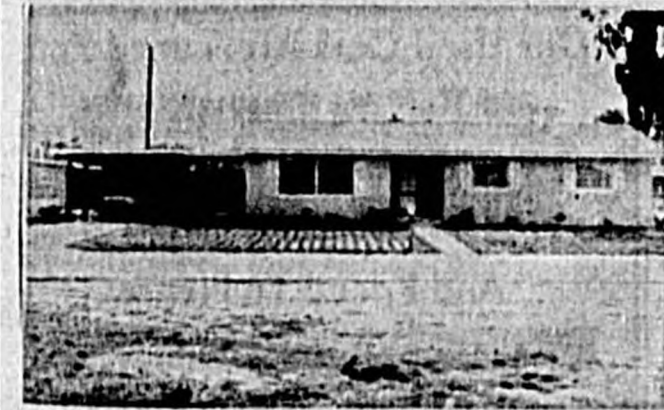
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
