### JFK Calls For More Exporting

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy today urged American businessmen to promote export markets for their products to help stem the flow of dollars abroad and improve domestic economic conditions at the same time. The Chief Executive spoke at the start of a special conference called by the White House and the Commerce Department to explore methods of export expansion.

### Sen. Symington Defends Treaty

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Stuart Symington, (D-Mo.), the nation's first Air Force secretary defended the nuclear test ban treaty today on one of its most debated points — the ability of U. S. missile sites to survive atomic bombing.

### Malay Youths Stage Protest

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (UPI)—Holding Malaysian youths today burned and stoned Indonesian diplomatic offices in retaliation for attacks on the Malaysian and British embassies in Jakarta, Indonesia, Monday.

### Loses Prize Cow

SWINDON, England (UPI)—The Royal Air Force sent a helicopter Monday to help Arthur Stevens, a farmer, search for Emma, his missing \$5,000 prize cow.

Members of the Cabinet, including Treasury Secretary Douglas Dillon, Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz, and Commerce Secretary Luther H. Hodges, together with Kennedy's chief trade negotiator, Christian A. Herter, also spoke. "I know that all of you — and many other American businessmen — recognize the need for a more aggressive export policy and are resolved to meet it," Kennedy said. "You recognize that, for almost any American business, life can begin anew at the ocean's edge."

The President in his prepared remarks reminded his audience repeatedly that the competitive advantage held by the United States in export trade following World War II had disappeared under the growing economic strength of trading partners and the development of regional associations such as the Common Market.

He pointed out that the United States once dominated world markets because her businessmen were known for aggressive pricing policies under which lower prices led to higher volume and larger profits. "The New World was a land of competitive pricing," he said. "The Old World was the home of cartels and rigid price maintenance."

The situation today, however, is that exports of other nations have expanded more rapidly than U. S. exports because, as the President put it, "their businessmen have become better competitors, because European producers, unlike American producers, respond to excess capacity by reducing prices in order to maintain production rather than reducing production to maintain prices."

## Sanford Native Joins Herald As Sports Editor

The Herald announced today the appointment of Julian Stenstrom as sports editor. Stenstrom, a native of Sanford, served as sports editor of The Herald in the late 1930's and for about a year following World War II. He attended Stetson University from 1947 through 1950. After his graduation he became director of the laymen's program of the Florida Baptist Convention. During the Korean conflict Stenstrom served as head of the radio and television division of the III Army's public information department at Fort McPherson in Atlanta.

Following his release from the service in 1951 he was chosen executive secretary of the California Baptist Foundation, a post he held until 1960 when he became executive secretary of the Fresno State College Bulldog Foundation, an organization that provided academic scholarship funds for athletes.

Stenstrom, his wife, Beatrice, and their son, Ricky, returned to Florida in August of this year. They reside at 370 Lake Kathryn Circle in Casselberry. In addition to his service as sports editor of The Herald Stenstrom is also a civics instructor at South Seminole Junior High School in Casselberry.

**JFK On TV** WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy will go before the nation on radio and television tonight to appeal for public support of his proposed \$11 billion tax cut.

**Accord Reached** PARIS (UPI) — France and West Germany appeared today to have reached agreement on blocking any East-West pact that would confirm Soviet territorial conquests in central and eastern Europe.

**5 Cubans Held** MIAMI (UPI) — Five more Cuban exiles were arrested Tuesday by narcotics agents, including the alleged kingpin of a multi-million dollar narcotics operation that was exposed last Saturday.

**UN Starts Work** UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (UPI) — The U.N. General Assembly got down to the business of its 18th session today. Its opening meeting Tuesday was marred by an anti-Castro demonstration.

**Money Debate** WASHINGTON (UPI) — Senate leaders indicated today that debate on the huge \$17.4 billion defense money bill probably would begin immediately after final ratification of the nuclear test ban treaty.

**Agreement Near** SAIGON, South Viet Nam (UPI) — U. S. and South Vietnamese officials were reported near agreement today on a major shift in military strength to the Mekong Delta south of Saigon, where Communist pressure is growing.

**New Ruling** WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Defense Department, in a new ruling certain to be a blockbuster, has forbidden military units from participating in any event where audiences or facilities are segregated, or admission is denied to Negroes.

## Kelly Called Inexperienced

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — State Atty. Gen. Davis, St. Petersburg, testified in absentia today that he did not consider Circuit Judge Richard Kelly experienced enough to preside over a major trial.

The Senate, trying Kelly on charges of judicial tyranny and abuse of power, permitted the prosecution to read testimony given by Davis to a House committee whose investigation led to Kelly's impeachment.

Davis is in the hospital with a blood clot. Meanwhile, there were indications that the prosecution may be getting ready to wind up its case shortly in the eight-day-old Senate impeachment trial of the Republican Circuit Court Judge.

State Rep. William O'Neill, one of the prosecutors, promised the Senate an estimate some time today of how many more of the 60 witnesses under subpoena will be used.

He said some may not be called.

NEW YORK (UPI) — The four surviving Dionne quintuplets disclosed today that their childhood was painfully unhappy and blamed their parents for failing to treat them as separate identities and expose them to ordinary experiences.

In a bitter autobiography appearing in the current issue of McCall's magazine—less than a week after the birth of the Fischer quintuplets in South Dakota—the Dionnes said their childhood was riddled with a sense of guilt inflicted by their parents.

They said their parental home in Corbett, Ont., was "the saddest home we ever knew." Annette, Marie, and Cecile are now married and have a total of nine children, and Yvonne is a nun. They are 29.

## New Quints Thrive; Four Dionnes Bitter

ABERDEEN S. D. (UPI) — The Fischer quintuplets kept getting healthier today and their mother was so heartened she began yearning for her other five children at home.

Mrs. Mary Ann Fischer, 39, her short, curly red hair glistening and her lips lightly brushed with lipstick, expressed her joy Tuesday as she shyly met with newsmen for the first time since she gave birth to four girls and a boy Saturday.

Two of the quintts had gained so much strength today that their doctor increased their food intake.

Dr. James N. Herbus, the general practitioner who delivered the five, said he had increased the amount of formula that Mary Catherine and James Andrew were getting by 1 cc.

He said all five tots were doing fine.

Mrs. Fischer was pushed into the basement cafeteria of St. Luke's Hospital in a wheelchair for the improvised news conference. She wore green slippers and a pale blue housecoat.

NEW YORK (UPI) — The famous sisters, who entitled their biography "We Grew Up In Trouble," said their mother was convinced she had been singled out by God for a "miracle" but feared the world would think of her and her husband as animals because of the multiple birth.

## Negro Leaders Ask Meeting

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The announcement came shortly after Negro leader Roy Wilkins urged the President to meet late Thursday with seven Birmingham Negro leaders on the new racial crisis there resulting from the church bomb-deaths of four children.

The Negro leaders, most of them clergymen, wired the chief executive Monday asking for "an immediate conference." The White House said today the meeting had been set up for 5 p. m. EDT Thursday.

Because Kennedy was busy preparing several major speeches, including one on tax reduction to be delivered to a nationwide television audience tonight, he was unable to set up the racial conference any sooner, a spokesman said.

## Fred R. Wilson Law Library Is Dedicated

City and county officials, attorneys and other dignitaries filled the circuit court room this morning when a dedication ceremony was held for the Fred R. Wilson Memorial Law Library in memory of the late attorney.

Among those present were Mr. Wilson's children, Mrs. W. D. Leahy, of Guatemala City, Guatemala; Mrs. Dan G. Mitchum, Milwaukee, and Robert S. Wilson, New York City.

Mrs. Mitchum presented to the library a portrait of her father which she, herself, painted recently.

The library, adjacent to the third floor court room, had been named the Seminole County Law Library but the 1963 Legislature, at the instigation of the local legislative delegation, passed an act naming the facility for the late city and school board attorney.

A. Edwin Shindler, who had been closely associated with Mr. Wilson, traced the lawyer's life from the time of his birth at Irons, Ky., through his schooling and adult life. Mr. Wilson served as attorney for the city for 20 years and for the school board for 21 years. He had been a practicing attorney for more than 50 years.

Judge G. Vernon Mize Jr., as chairman of the law library trustees, was in charge of the dedication. Kenneth McIntosh introduced the guests and dignitaries. Joseph M. Maraceo read the resolution naming the library and unveiled a bronze plaque dedicated to Mr. Wilson.

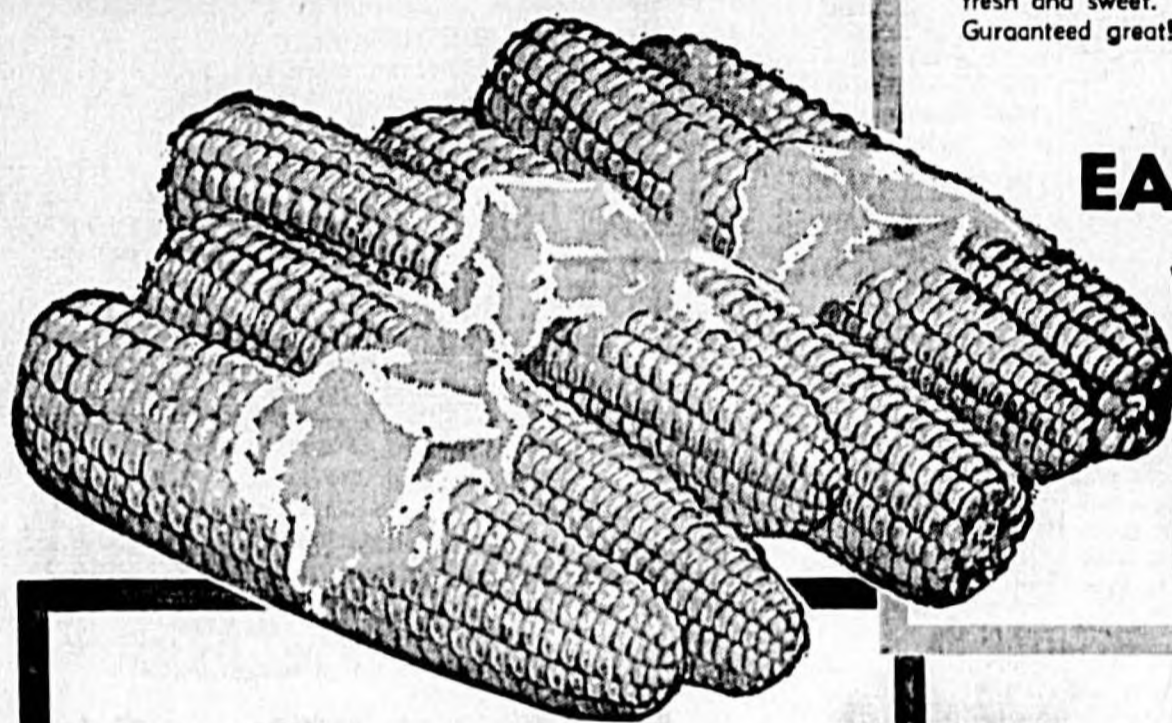

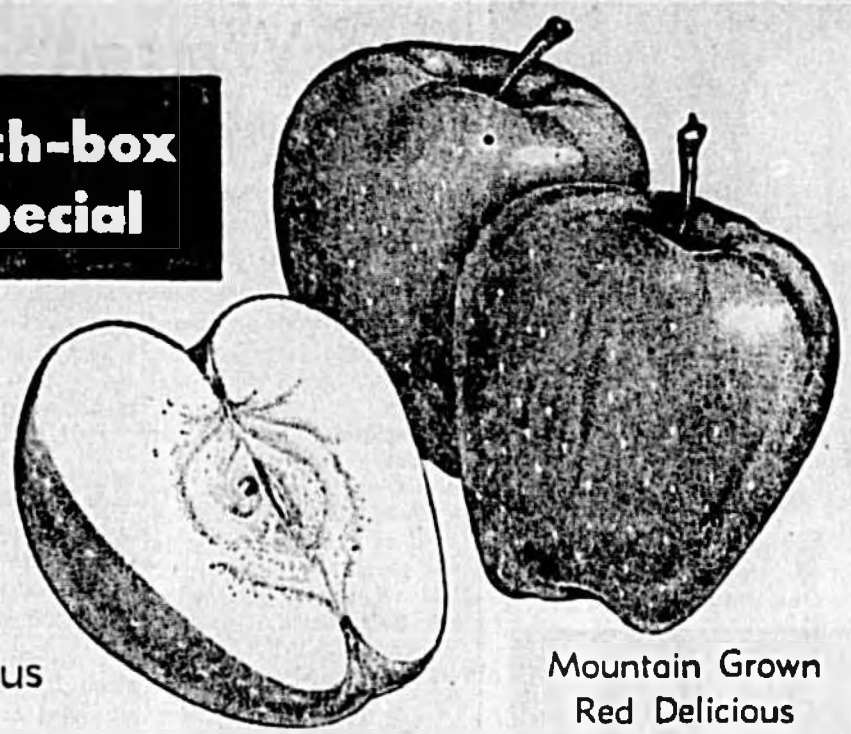

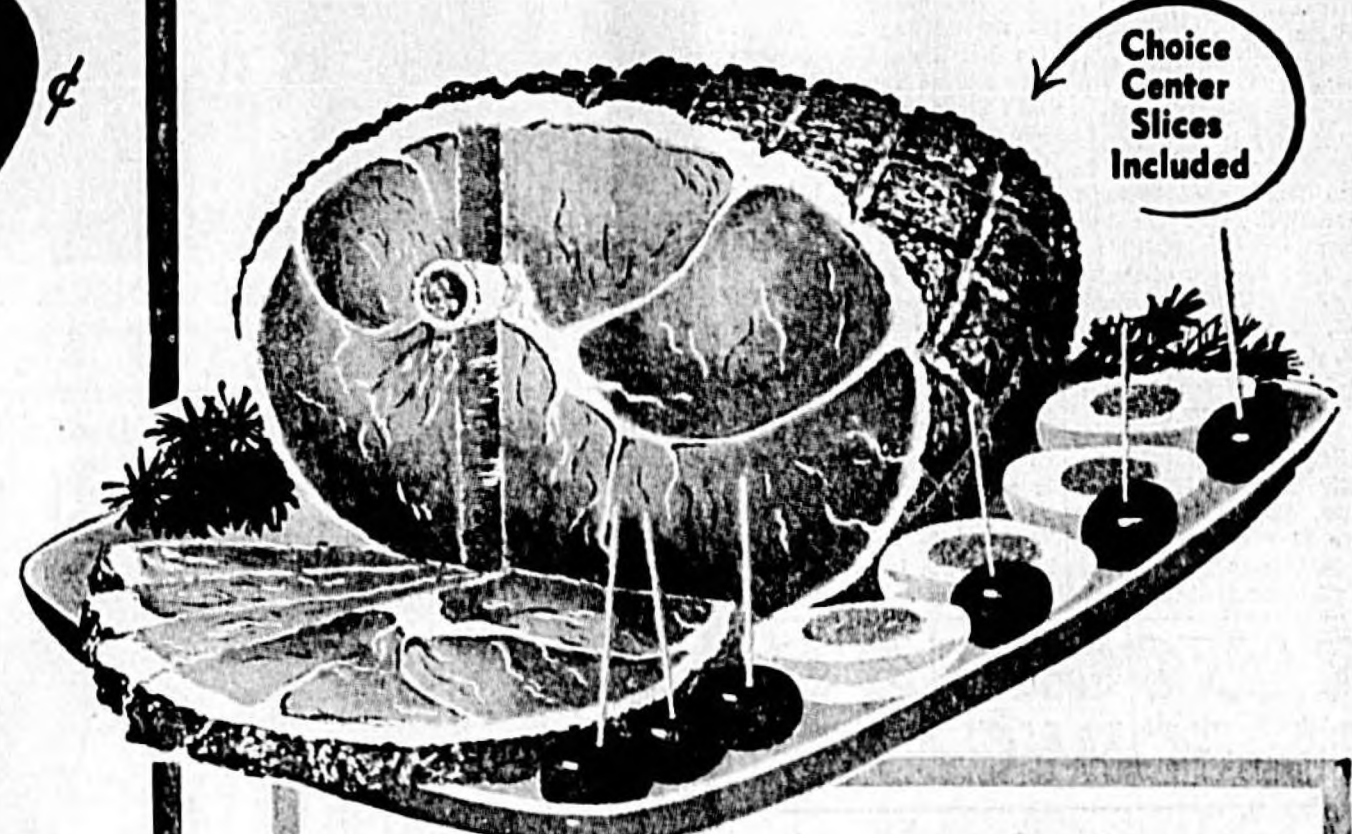

## Supreme Court Faced With Knotty Question

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The knotty question of whether a constitutional amendment can strip an elected official of his job in the middle of his term has been put before the Supreme Court.

The case grew out of adoption in Charlotte County of an amendment providing that the county school superintendent shall be appointed by the school board rather than elected by the people.

Florida law does not require superintendents to have such a degree.

Some elementary school children already have college experience.

Roy Hill, superintendent of the San Bernardino County Schools, said the program turned out to be "a most interesting way in which to meet the needs of gifted youngsters."

University officials, elated over the enthusiasm of the youngsters and the overall success of the whole program, indicated that it will probably be continued in the fall.

They said that the same major areas will be covered with the possibility of additional subjects being added.

The home nursing service will be available to the following: Those returning from the hospital and needing care in the home; those acutely ill in the home, and those with a long-term or chronic illness.

A registered nurse will visit in any home in Seminole

County and stay long enough to carry out the doctor's orders, make patients comfortable, or give instructions to a member of the family for continued nursing care.

The purpose of this program is to provide bedside nursing care in the home regardless of race, creed or financial status encompassing health promotion, the care and prevention of disease and disability and rehabilitation. It also involves teaching,

counseling and emotional support as well as the care of illness and is an integral part of the total health care, planned and administered in combination with related medical and educational welfare services.

Elderly citizens, who make up a large segment of the state population, will especially benefit from this home care.

The visits will be on a fee for service basis with fees

adjusted according to ability to pay.

Dr. Leone believes that in addition to the humanitarian benefits the new program will be of real economic value.

He reports, "Our welfare bills are rising with no promise of reduction, but with this new plan they can be reduced."

"It is hoped each community, through its individuals and organizations, will seriously consider the need and

formulate its own plan for helping this worthy project."

Interest has been shown in the program by the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce and it has the support of the Seminole County Medical Association.

A survey has revealed a definite need, but for a community nursing service to succeed there must be broad citizen participation in the promotion of the program.

There have been nearly 200 cases of animal bites reported during the first eight months of this year in Seminole County, according to Val Robbins, county sanitarian. The many unlicensed, unvaccinated canines running loose in the city and county pose a constant threat in that they are potential carriers of rabies. "Man's best friend" can quickly change into a dan-

gerous foe, and it is duty of every dog owner to have his pet protected against rabies for his sake as well as other animals and humans. There were an equal number of cat and dog bites reported last year in the state and Robbins advises all cat owners of the importance of immunizing their pets as well. "Health officers all over the United States are trying to eliminate rabies from the country but until we can

## Tito Seen As Super-Salesman For Red Peaceful Co-Existence

But, the fact is that the Warsaw alliance was never more than a front for putting the armies of Moscow's East European satellites under Russian command. When the Warsaw Treaty was first signed by the Russians and their East European satellites, including Communist East Germany, in 1955, Khrushchev described it as a counter part to the Free World's North Atlantic alliance. But the Warsaw alliance never approached even remotely NATO's international significance. Moscow did not succeed in persuading a single independent European nation to sign the Warsaw Treaty.

However, the Soviet premier obviously hopes to isolate West Germany and eventually destroy NATO by dangling the dissolution of the Warsaw pact alliance as bait at the diplomatic bargaining table. A nonaggression pact would also give Russia's colonial empire, reaching to the river Elbe, recognition by the West, to convince the Poles, Czechs, Romanians and Hungarians, that the Free World considers them in the Russian orbit and is no longer interested in their freedom.

This at a historic moment when the Red empire is cracking due to the bitter quarrel between Khrushchev and Red China's Mao Tse-tung. It is considered highly unlikely even by neutralist diplomats in the UN that Tito, for all his professed independence, will persuade President Kennedy to fall into Khrushchev's trap. But some members of the Kennedy administration are apparently convinced that a nonaggression pact of the type favored by Khrushchev and his newfound ally Tito would be a logical implementation of the nuclear test ban agreement.

get and keep our dogs vaccinated the possibility of rabies must be considered with every bite," Robbins said. Dr. James H. Steele, public health veterinarian of the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare, offers the following advice if you or your dog is bitten: Wash the wound thoroughly with soap and water at once. Rabies cannot be transmitted unless the infected saliva becomes established in the bite wound. Second, confine the biting dog so that he is available for observation. If he is a stray or is acting strangely, try to have the dog penned to handle him. (The City of Sanford has a part-time dog warden and posted that the county has no facility as yet for impounding dogs.) Third, report the bite immediately to a doctor or veterinarian, who must notify the dog control authorities. If you cannot reach a doctor right away, call your local health department. Teach children not to pet strange dogs and keep away from dogs when they are sick. In order to deserve your dog's loyalty you should have him revaccinated as often as the veterinarian advises. If your dog seems sick, or has been in contact with a dog suspected of rabies, take him to the veterinarian. Suspect rabies when a dog is dull or uneasy in behavior, when his bark changes tone, when thick saliva collects on his mouth, when he tries to eat wood, earth or clothing. A dog does not have to look or act "mad" to have rabies. The "dumb" type of rabies in which a dog slinks away and dies in a paralytic coma in some instances may be more dangerous than the "furious" type, in which he attacks everything in his path, because the individual does not realize the animal is rabid. Keep your pet away from stray dogs or wild animals who may attack him and keep him off the streets if rabies is reported in your area. Ignoring these precautions may result in an agonizing death or a treatment consisting of a painful and costly series of at least 14 inoculations for yourself or a loved one. Special rabies vaccination clinics have been scheduled by the Sanford-Seminole Jaycees for Saturday, Sept. 28, from 2:30 p.m. at the Jaycee Building on French Avenue, Lake Mary Elementary School and the American Legion Building on Highway 17-92 for your convenience or this immunization may be given by any of the veterinarians at their offices.

## How To Beat An Old Bugaboo

We've saved mathematics until now, because for many students it's the toughest subject in school. The feeling seems to be that anybody can learn to pass English or history, but that you have to be especially suited for mathematics, that you have to have a special kind of mind.

This is not true. You don't have to be special to get through the average math course. If you're having trouble, chances are you're studying the wrong way. Which brings up the question: What is mathematics? What does it try to do?

Mathematics is a logical, contentless, but often very meaningful system of thought. Let's take a simple example: 2 plus 2 equals 4. That is always correct, but do you know why? 2 plus 2 equals 4 because mathematicians say so!

In other words, mathematicians have defined "2 plus 2" as "4". That's why they can't be wrong; there's nothing to be wrong about. So actually, the statement "2 plus 2 equals 4" says about as much as the statement, "a big book is a big book."

We can say, then, that mathematics is contentless. But once we have these always-correct contentless laws we can apply them to our daily lives and often we find them very meaningful. Nobody will argue that addition isn't useful and meaningful.

It's easy to see that mathematics is logical. If we say that 1 plus 1 equals 2 and 2 plus 2 equals 4, we have no choice but to say that 1 plus 1 plus 1 equals 3. There's no other way to do it. Any other way would be illogical. And mathematics insists on logic.

Essentially, then, mathematics is simply a set of symbols that somebody (centuries of mathematicians actually) invented. They also invented certain rules for manipulating these symbols. As long as you follow these rules, you can't do anything wrong. If you follow the rules (and there are not many of them), the world's greatest mathematician can't tell you that you're wrong.

By itself, mathematics has nothing to do with reality. Its usefulness comes from the fact that we can think about the real world in a mathematical way and thereby understand it better. Obviously, you wouldn't try to overview a math book. It doesn't work. To learn the rules of mathematics, you have to go step by step. You have to "read between the commas." You'll find that every rule in math is based on the one that directly preceded it. If you don't understand something, you can't hope that it'll come clear later on. You must understand each step before you can understand the next step. Take each page as it comes. Work through the page point by point. Work through any examples. You'll get into the swing of it easily. The most complex mathematical laws

are only repeated applications of the simplest laws. Thank of mathematics this way. It's the only course where you can really be sure of getting 100 on a test. If you follow the mathematical rules, you can't get anything but 100.

The trick is to go slow, to understand each point before you go on to the next and to see how each rule follows from the one that precedes it.

Take a look at the North hand only. Your partner opens one no-trump. If you play no conventions at all in response to a no-trump your best bet is to pass. You will only get into trouble if you bid.

Two hearts figures to be a better spot than one no-trump and ordinary Stayman players can get there by simply bidding two hearts. Two spades will be even better if your partner holds four spades and Jacoby-Stayman makes it possible for you to have your cake and eat it too. You respond with two clubs. Your partner may only rebid to two in a suit. If his rebid is

two diamonds you bid two hearts and he will pass. This gets you right where you would have been if you had responded two hearts directly. Actually he bids two spades and you have found the right spot.

You will make two spades even if you get the best defense, a spade opening and a spade return. You win the second spade in your hand, cash the ace and king of hearts and ruff a heart. Now you lead your last spade to dummy's queen and give West a heart trick. In order to hold you to two West must lead a diamond to his partner, who must return a club, whereupon they get two club tricks plus the spade heart and diamond already in their possession.

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### Ex-Lawmaker Seeks Release Of Cubans

MIAMI (UPI) — Former Oregon Rep. Charles O. Porter will fly to Cuba Friday seeking the release of 75,000 political prisoners from Fidel Castro's dreaded dungeons.

Porter said he will ask the bearded premier to release the prisoners "on humanitarian grounds alone."

"We have nothing to offer, nothing to bargain with," he said Tuesday.

Porter, a Eugene, Ore., attorney who served in Congress from 1957 to 1960, will represent the Association of Relatives for Freedom of Cuban Political Prisoners, Inc.

Mrs. Consuelo Villaverde, president of the Miami-based group, said several association members will accompany Porter to Cuba.

Porter said he has met Castro several times and has discussed the mission with New York attorney James B. Donovan, who engineered the December 1962 release of the 1,113 Bay of Pigs prisoners.

The United States would "presumably" allow the prisoners to come to this country, Porter said. He added he felt most of them would prefer to remain on the Communist island with their relatives.

Porter indicated the State Department in Washington had given him clearance for the trip, but not its wholehearted support of the plan.

### Car Prices Due To Hold Steady

DETROIT (UPI) — The cost of new cars probably will remain steady during the 1964 model year.

Chrysler Corp. announced Tuesday it would generally hold the price line on its new models for the fifth straight year. Other auto firms were expected to follow the lead of Chrysler, which was the first to announce prices for the second straight year.

Ford, General Motors, American Motors and Studebaker will announce their prices within the next two weeks, probably within hours of introduction at dealers' showrooms.

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# Gesundheit

Science is wonderful. It hasn't produced a cure for hay fever, but it can tell you right down to the individual pollen just how miserable you are.

In many cities, exposure of greased slides is made daily during the hay fever season. Slides are then viewed through a high-power microscope, and the number of bits of pollen in a specified area give the pollen count for the day.

Temperature, humidity and the pollen index produce a witches' brew

of information to give the victim a clear picture of just how wheezy things are.

Shots, pills, trips to pollen-free areas and air conditioning are boons to many hay fever victims. But one fellow we know has the problem licked completely. He sold his radio and asked his wife to clip the pollen count out of the paper before he could see it.

He hasn't sneezed once this season.

## Algae To Angler --

Just as farmers have boosted and reboosted the nation's crop production by using modern fertilizers on their fields, so can lake owners fertilize nutrient-poor lakes to increase the fish population.

Ohio State University researchers have found that the proper fertilizer can stimulate the entire life chain

from the lowly algae up to the final fish.

Nutrients from a single application of fertilizer can be trapped in a lake basin for as long as seven years supporting large populations of algae and small plankton animals upon which fish feed.

Sounds like good news to all fishermen—professional or sport.

## Political Notebook

WASHINGTON (NEA) — Three hundred big business leaders from all over the country are expected to attend a White House Conference on Export Expansion this week.

If they can solve in two days all the balance of payments deficit problems assigned to them, it will be the nearest trick of that or any week. But they'll try.

The two working sessions of the conference, Tuesday afternoon and this morning, will be broken up into 11 groups of 20 to 30 businessmen each. One government expert will be assigned to each panel to get any information wanted and to explain existing government policies and legislative proposals.

But the big idea is to have the businessmen themselves come up with new ideas which might be the basis of revised foreign trade policies. Existing policies haven't worked.

The good side of the situation faced is that U. S. exports have increased 80 per cent in the last 12 years. In 1951 they totaled \$14 billion. In 1962, they were \$20.9 billion and for the first half of 1963 the annual rate was \$21.5 billion.

But this growth rate isn't considered fast enough. For a large part of this increase was foreign aid. And in the same period the U. S. balance of

payments deficit has increased by \$30 billion. It averaged \$1.5 billion a year, 1950-56, but was \$4.2 billion in 1962, with \$4.5 indicated for 1963.

The 11 areas the conference panels will explore for possible remedies, and the group chairmen are:

Tax policies—William E. Knox, Westinghouse, New York. Labor's stake—George Meany, AFL-CIO, Washington. Trade promotion—Roger P. Sonnabend, Hotel Corp. of America, Boston. Foreign investment—Percy L. Douglas, Otis Elevator, New York. Financing—W. Cordes Snyder, Blaw-Knox, Pittsburgh. Market research—R. A. Steudel, Sherwin Williams Cleveland. Government representation abroad—James M. Roche, General Motors, New York. Small business—Thomas C. Ballagh, Ballagh & Thrall, Philadelphia. Education and publicity—Charles Rumrill, Rumrill Co., Rochester. Trade negotiations—Carl J. Gilbert, Gillette Co., Boston. Antitrust aspects—Alonso B. Knight, Borg-Warner, Chicago.

The high caliber of these panel heads indicates this is to be a working session and not the usual Department of Commerce lallyhoo over its trade fairs, centers and missions.

Each panel will write its own report on the afternoon of the second day. They will

be summarized for a general report and press conference conducted by Secretary of Commerce Luther H. Hodges.

President Kennedy, followed by his Secretaries of State Rusk, Treasury Dillon, Agriculture Freeman and Labor Wirtz, addressed the opening session.

Trade czar Christian A. Herter will talk about his troubles in negotiating new tariff agreements with Common Market and other countries at the first luncheon session. House Committee Chairman Owen Harris, D-Ark., will speak at the second.

Vice chairmen and working heads of the conference will be Neil C. Hurley Jr., Thor Power Tool Co., Chicago; Fred C. Foy of Koppers Co., Pittsburgh, and Thomas B. Watson Jr., IBM, New York.

What prompted my visit was the sale by auction of the Capitol's furnishings, which included some valuable antique pieces, particularly in the rest rooms.

I wanted to see if I could pick up an antique "standing room only" sign cheap.

When I arrived, the auctioneer was holding forth in the "ladies' salon" on the "Dunbar Room." I didn't get the connection.

Four cast marble drinking fountains with cherubs on the pedestals sold for around \$200 each. "Any arrangements for a plumber you'll have to make yourself," the auctioneer announced.

Eight brass poles from which velvet ropes once were

suspended sold for \$7 apiece. I asked one of the losing bidders what he had wanted with them.

"Well," he said, "they ought to make good hitching posts."

"Do you own some horses?" "No," I live in an apartment," he said.

Unfortunately, the "standing room only" signs weren't put on the block while I was there. But I felt richer for the experience.

## Worry Clinic

Daniel asks for more facts about the thalidomide scare, so read this case with double care. And then scapbook it, for the FDA makes wild charges for the sake of rating newspaper headlines, but cowardly ignores some of the most devastating chemicals now being sold to pregnant wives.

CASE Q-451: My son Daniel did a great deal of biological research while in Dental College as an assistant of one of the world's most famous biochemists, namely, Dr. Joseph Muhler.

Dr. Muhler had pioneered much of the stellar work on the influence of trace chemicals, such as Fluorine, on human teeth.

"Dad," Daniel asked one day when he was at home over the weekend, "what is your attitude about the thalidomide scare?"

You readers may recall that our Food and Drug Admin-

stration let thalidomide be used throughout America for an additional year after it was challenged.

Then it suddenly jumped on thalidomide and tried to gain sensational publicity for the Washington bureaucrats by all the newspaper headlines possible.

This is standard practice for the FDA. You may thus recall the FDA had done the same thing a few years earlier with reference to cranberries.

It frightened Americans just before Thanksgiving by taking cranberries off the market on the charge that they were contaminated with poisonous chemicals.

Then, after they had sabotaged the fall cranberry market, they lamely retreated and admitted you could have eaten a truckload without any significant ill effects!

This bureaucratic attack on American business and agricultural firms is intolerable, especially by the headline hunters of the FDA.

For they simply shifted from cranberries to thalidomide, but only after a year's prodding.

And even then they failed to face up to the facts in an honest manner.

For example, tranquilizers are demanded by neurotic patients who are often so jittery that they are chain smokers and drinkers, too.

Any pregnant wives who were so keyed up that they would go to a physician to obtain tranquilizers, are thus very likely to be absorbing other toxins that cause deformed babies.

For example, earlier research has shown that cigarets will also produce deformed offspring. The same seems true of alcohol, too.

So thalidomide users may thus have been heavy cocktail drinkers and smokers.

Suppose we designate thalidomide as "X." Cigarets would be "Y" and alcohol would be "Z."

If you thus have three unknowns in an equation, such as "X, Y and Z," then you cannot learn the value of "X" until you have also found the values of "Y" and "Z."

Meaning what? Namely, that neurotic pregnant women may have been using tobacco and liquor in addition to thalidomide!

So let's have a scientific analysis for a change, instead of this typical FDA "witch hunt" for the sake of newspaper headlines.

We American media and dental surgeons are still waiting to hear the honest facts.

Thus far I have not seen any evidence that the other two unknowns, namely "Y" and "Z," were eliminated before thalidomide was thoroughly analyzed for its own influence on human embryos.

The Florida Automobile Association of America also opposes the road, which it termed "a 11 million dollar mistake."

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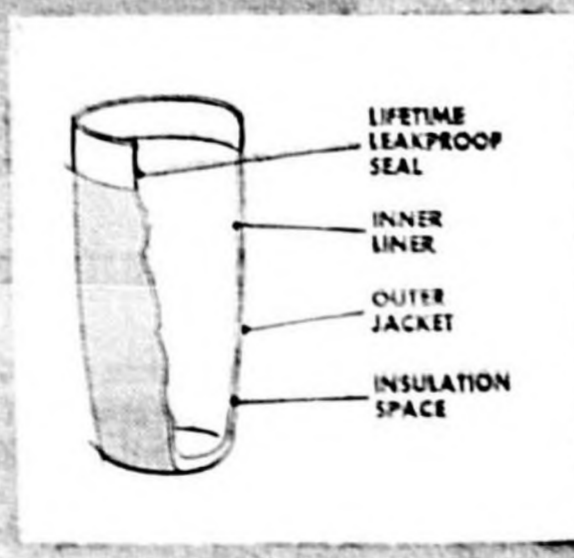

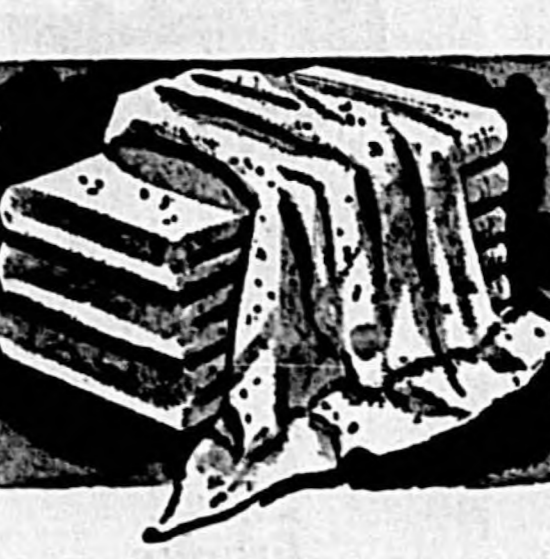

### Force Won't Assure Rights, RFK Declares

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy said today that "people can't be led by bayonets" and federal troops never can be a means of enforcing civil rights in the South.

The cabinet officer's remarks, made in commenting on the violence in Birmingham, were seen by some as an indication that President Kennedy would not intervene with federal troops in the racially-torn Alabama city.

Seven Negro leaders from the Deep South were meeting with the Chief Executive this afternoon to urge the dispatch of federal troops to Birmingham.

The group, headed by the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., contends that troops are needed to keep order in the city in the wake of last Sunday's bombing of a Negro church which killed four young girls.

The attorney general, interviewed on nationwide television "show NBC's Today" said "only a change of heart can bring about the changes needed in the South."

He said communications between whites and Negroes in Birmingham had broken down and must be restored before any steps can be taken toward easing the situation.

### Russia Proposes 18-Nation Summit Parley

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (UPI)—Russia today proposed a summit conference of 18 countries in Moscow next year to work out a "general and complete disarmament" treaty and discuss relaxation of international tension.

Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko, in a policy speech to the General Assembly, also called for a U. S. Russian agreement not to send nuclear weapons into space.

He proposed that the 18 countries invited to participate in the current Geneva arms talks—France declined the invitation—convene a new conference next year at a convenient site to be decided.

He said Russia would welcome "the heads of governments or state" of the conference members in Moscow for such a conference.

In a speech reflecting the "Moscow spirit" which followed last month's signing of the partial nuclear test ban treaty, Gromyko used the polemics for which he is noted only to lash out at West Germany.

While a student in the School of Arts and Science and Architecture at U. of E. Leonard took for his thesis the proposed biology research center on the Gainesville campus.

His design of the center complex interested Frank Jenkins, professor of architecture at the University of Manchester, a visiting critic and lecturer at U. of E. Jenkins also apparently noted Leonard's straight A average during his higher education.

Leonard, who received his BS degree only last May, was queried by Jenkins about the professorship at Manchester. The official flourish came through just recently and Leonard sailed last week for England.

His mother, Mrs. Leonard, explained this morning that his year at Manchester may be the start of a program of exchange of students and professors between the two universities. A University of California student was selected by Jenkins last year.

Leonard, a graduate of Seminole High School, collected Indian objects while in high school and has one of the finest collections of American Indian artifacts. He also paints landscapes in water color.

Mrs. Leonard said today her son plans to visit the architectural centers of Europe and will work toward his master's degree. He hopes on his return next September to enter Harvard graduate school for his master's and then combine the practice of architecture with teaching.

### Knowles Urges Action For City Library

Apolly on the part of Sanford's and Seminole County's reading public was hit today by City Manager W. E. Knowles in a talk on the "Library Situation" before the Jaycees at the Civic Center.

"Serving a population of 20,000," Knowles stated, "the municipal library of Sanford must face the fact that it is not an economic venture to be self-sufficient. Small libraries can't profitably go

it alone but they can constantly strive to grow more efficient."

Recalling that the City acquired the old postoffice building under the Federal Surplus Property Act of 1941 "providing it is used as a public library for 20 years," Knowles explained that this building with 1425 square feet of space will double the existing library area.

"The city's comprehensive plan, a \$15,000 work, had recommended a downtown site for a new library within a block of the old post office," the City Manager stated. "This plan cited the need of a building with 10,000 square feet of area and an estimated cost of \$150,000. The City of Sanford has neither the building with 10,000 square feet of area or the \$150,000."

"Furthermore," continued Knowles, "the public does not seem to have the interest to

express themselves one way or the other . . . We now have a point of stagnation with no action either to use the old Post Office building or to build a new library. The funds for the renovation of the building and to furnish it, ready for use, was \$17,000 and it was removed from the library's appropriation. It now rests with the public's desire. Have you made yourself heard on this issue?"
