Five Schools Closed

School closings, power outages, conservation and concern about citrus crop conditions were the outgrowth today of Seminole County's bout with the continuing cold

The Seminole County school superintendent's office reported five schools could not open today because of lack of heat and water: Casselberry Elementary, Seminole Middle, Bear Lake Elementary, Eastbrook Elementary and Rosenwald EMR Center. There was a complete power outage at those schools, officials said. A decision on whether to reopen the schools will be made Thursday

The unusual low temperatures and the demand for electical power has put a great strain on power utilities, according to officials of the Florida Power Corp. The firm has reported the supply of electricity it can generate exceeded by the demand of its customers. The utility had to cut off power for one or two hour periods early today in some neighborhoods to conserve the available supply, according to Ann Maynard, public information coor-

Some 20,000 customers in residential and commercial areas were affected by the brown-out. Selected industrial

Hundreds of urgent calls to power company officials from residents reporting power outages overloaded telephone circuits Tuesday night and this morning in Seminole and Volusia counties' Southern Bell officials reported today. They are urging residents to stay off the phones, assuring them that the power company knows the

sers were also affected by the conservation measure. "We ask that our customers conserve anyway they can and help us," said Mrs. Maynard.

Florida Power's customers. This measure would help the utility maintain a balance in its supply, added Mrs. This weather has placed the biggest demand on the utility it has ever had, surpassing the air conditioner

demand during the summer of 1973, according to Mrs. She said Florida Power's capacity is 3,600,000 kilowatts and 3,745,000 kilowatts were used Tuesday. Because the

company's generators are interconnected with other power companies it used power supplies from the others to boost its capacity, she said. Other companies also had breakdowns, she added. Florida Power and Light (FPL) in Sanford reported some power outages early today.

The Celery substation near state road 46 in Sanford went out about 9:14 a.m. and returned to power at about 10:20 a.m., according to Scott Burns, manager. The outage affected Geneva and Chuluota. Burns noted that FPL's total output was in excess of 8,300,000 kilowatts around the state.

Crop conditions did not change much from Tuesday's status, according to Reggie Brown, Seminole County extension agent at the county agricultural center. "Any speculation as of now would be pure speculation.

We really can't tell until 10 days after the freeze," Brown said. "The citrus fruit will definitely be injured. There could be possible injury to the trees and maybe the vegetable crop. Vegetables are reasonably tolerant." He added if the temperature dips to the low 20's it could Floridians as far south as suturban Miami were greeted





she and Mrs. Lila Whitley kept their savings in Mrs. Whitley's residence instead of a bank. Mrs. Whitley, 76, lived alone in a small white frame house at 304 Willow Ave. On Jan. 11 a friend, concerned that Mrs. Whitley hadn't been seen all day, called police. Officers found the elderly resident dead in the house.

Sadat Revokes Food Hikes

After Fatal Street Riots

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) - Egyptian President Anwar Sadat revoked price increases on food, gas and cigarettes today after riots in which police fire killed one child.

The Egyptian government ordered a 14-hour curfew for Cairc, Alexandria and Suez City at the southern end of the Suez Canal as rioting and clashes raged across the city for the second day. Public transport came to a standstill, shops and factories were closed and government employes stayed home.

Jobs, Not Dole, **Best Answer**

"It is better to teach a man how to fish." the proverb goes, "than to give him a fish."

Put in terms that are more relevant today, it is far more productive to teach a man or woman a marketable skill through which he or she can earn money and achieve independence than to put him or her on an outright dole that amounts to economic

The dole does not work, for either the jobless individual who merely derives marginal subsistence from it or for society, which loses a potentially productive member because of it. It is long past time to find other ways to help the un-skilled.

F. Ray Marshall, President-elect Jimmy Carter's choice for Labor secretary, indicates a refreshing willingness to try to find those other ways. He says that the government should shift emphasis from outright welfare to apprenticeship and job-training programs that will give the unemployed the skills they need to find em-

"Some of the current programs aren't serious," Marshall said. "They are just incomemaintenance plans which leave the participants with no skills when the program is over."

No one gains, in other words: the participant is still unemployable, the government still has a ward that another program must support, and the burden on taxpayers keeps growing.

Mr. Marshall, who is a former chairman of the University of Texas economics department and now director of the university's Center for the Study of Human Resources, presumably has "never met a payroll." Still, in his first official statement Mr. Marshall showed a more practical grasp of the realities of unemployment than did another academic, Michigan State University economist Charles Killingworth.

On the same day Marshall was named, Mr. Killingworth called for an \$8 billion expenditure for public-sector jobs. He spoke under the sponsorship of Rep. John Conyers, D-Mich., who added that Mr. Carter favors "job creation" as an economic stimulus. We hope that Mr. Marshall, not Mr. Conyers, speaks for the President-elect.

The role of government in our society is to foster a climate that encourages the growth of industry, and encourage people to acquire the skills that industries can use. Only the economy's private sector, however, can create the meaningful and productive jobs that people need in numbers that will reduce the unemployment rate significantly.

Dr. Walker Born A Bit Too Soon

WASHINGTON - Presidential inaugurations are nothing if not occasions for eccentrics to flower. People have attended the ceremonies impersonating clowns, kings, Abe Lincoln, Napoleon, even Hitler. And then there was Dr. Mary E. Walker - a century ago she came to some of the parties dressed as a man.

It seems Dr. Mary always wore male attire. She once donned tuxedo and top hat to astonish Chester A. Arthur at a White House reception. Besides this she was unsympathetic with the bewilderment she wrought. When a Chinese minister inquired why she wore pants, she retaliated immediately by asking him why he

Who was Dr. Mary Walker? A great lady in advance of her time, some say. Others feel she was an aberration and fool. In any event, as the nation pauses to change its governmental gears. it is as good a time as any to remember one of the mostly forgotten faces that helped shape the outrageously diverse republic of this inaugural

Mary Walker was a small, slender and obscure physician from rural New York, come to Washington to do her patriotic part in the Civil War. It was still a century before women's liberation, and the military authorities tried to direct the woman into the nursing corps. She'd have none of it, demanding instead a surgeon's job, and not in Washington but out where the war

There was much consternation and gnashing of teeth in the War Department, not to say the medical profession, but Dr. Mary was sent to Tennessee, with the rank of lieutenant, to become the first assistant surgeon to serve in the Army in time of combat. She wore the male uniform, of course, right down to the underwear. 





IN BRIEF Scientists Find Organism That Caused Legion Deaths

NATION

ATLANTA (AP) - It took thousands of tests, dozens of researchers and scores of chicken eggs to find the still-unnamed killer that claimed 29 lives in Philadelphia last summer. Almost six months after reports of mysterious deaths started trickling to in creasingly alarmed Pennsylvania officials scientists at the Center for Disease Control declared Tuesday that the cause of Legionnaires' disease was a bacteria-like organism never before isolated.

Carter' 52, confessed Tuesday night that he felt "a little sad" about leaving his hometown, but was for the move. Ford, who came to Washington as a freshman congressman in 1949, plans to depart after Carter's swearing-in. He will fly by helicopter and presidential jet to California, where he has a date to play in the Bing Crosby golf tournament at Pebble Beach on Friday.

Montreal Avoids 'War'

MONTREAL (AP) — Montreal Mayor Jean Drapeau said Tuesday although the city's relations with the Parti Quebecois government are strained, the time has not come yet for a declaration of war.

He criticized provincial legislation passed in December forcing Montreal to assume \$2;5 million of the \$1 billion 1976 Olympics debt, but added the city is capable of dealing with it.

Thursday in a two-year comprehensive modernization of two of SHA's public housing complexes. On that day SHA will begin a survey of all 125 units of Castle Brewer Court on W. 10th Street and 30 units of Cowan Moughton Terrace between Avocado and Olive

Streets and W. 3rd and W. 5th Streets. The federal Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) requires local housing authorities to include tenant input in its comprehensive modernization program, because "tenants know best what needs to be done in their apartments," according to SHA Executive Director Thomas Wilson III

This is not the first modernization of Castle Brewer Court (built in 1950) and Cowan Moughton Terrace (built in 1956), Wilson explained. "Previously we have installed new roofs and gas heaters in Cowan Moughton and some new roofs and gas heaters in all units of Castle Brewer. and under an existing modernization grant we're improving on-site drainage in Castle Brewer Court," Wilson

The comprehensive program is an improvement over previous HUD modernization programs, which were usually "underfunded," he said.

"We always had residual problems. Under the comprehensive program, HUD will supply all the money needed in accordance with the approved plans. "Under the old plans, the local agency would apply to HUD directly. Under the new (program), we will develop a plan and a budget, and the city (commission) will apply

to HUD on behalf of SHA," Wilson said. The change was made by HUD to insure uniformity with local housing standards and objectives. The new program is funded from \$11 billion in federal

community development funds for the current fiscal year. Previous modernization programs were funded from public housing funds, "only a few hundred million dollars" this fiscal year, Wilson said. The program's goal is to "make the units more livable

for the tenants, less expensive to maintain and provide amenities which will improve the quality of living for our tenants," according to Wilson. Tenant priorities are likely to include: new kitchen cabinets, new bathroom and kitchen plumbing, additional

insulation, and gas ranges. Wilson said he expects SHA to have a plan ready for SHA commission review "around the first of April." After results of the tenant survey are tabulated, there will be an engineering and architectural survey to determine ways to save energy in the complexes. Tenants have recently complained of high energy bills, Wilson

"There is a very strong possibility that (Cheshire's) office will be turned over to the judiciary and become courtroom space or some type of judicial function," Kimbrough said. Cheshire appealed to commissioners on Tuesday for office space in addition to what the prosecutor
