B-29 Winging Toward U.S. In Try For Record

Giant Bomber Leaves Orly Field In New Attempt To Crack N. Y.-Paris Record

PARIS, Oct. 16, (AP)—The Army's long-distance flyer, the Pacuan Dreamboat, is roaring toward Westover Field at Chicopee, Mass., and what may be a new transatlantic speed record.

The giant aircraft left Orly Field, Paris, at 3:38 A. M., Eastern Standard time. Just prior to taking off on the 9500-mile trip, however, the pilot of the Dreamboat commented—"I'm not going to push it."

The ceremony at this morning's takeoff was not repeated in the fashion of yesterday, but official Army records nevertheless listed the split-second departure of the B-29. Observers expressed the belief that the Pacuan Dreamboat would make the flight in approximately 11½ hours, an average flight rate of about 316 miles per hour.

The present record is 14 hours, 39 minutes, and is claimed by a TWA Constellation for a Paris-to-New York run a year ago.

Operators' Want Styries Action In Maritime Walkout

NEW YORK, Oct. 16, (AP)—An operators' demand that they be allowed to select ship masters without regard to union membership has stymied settlement of the 16-day old maritime strike.

Most of the nation's portugals are tied up today, but negotiations will be resumed to end the dispute. The latest hitch occurred last night at a conciliation meeting between east and Gulf coast operators and the AF of L Masters, mates and Pilots.

The union tentatively approved wage rates contained in a new operators' proposal, but the union heads balked at a stipulation that operators retain their right to select masters, "without regard to union membership or non-membership." Union President Capt. Harry Martin said the MMF would study the proposal, but he said the answer would be "no" in today's negotiating session.

Dania Murder Case Remains Unsolved

FORT LAUDERDALE, Oct. 16, (AP)—Sheriff Walter R. Clark today admitted he is up against a stone wall in efforts to solve the double murder of a young couple whose bodies were found on lonely Dania Beach exactly one week ago.

The sheriff says two sailors have been absolved of any connection with the Dania Beach murder, but they are being held in Broward county jail after admitting the armed robbery of a Pompeian couple Friday night.

Sheriff Clark obtained an Army-type mine detector and will comb the sands along Dania Beach tomorrow in an effort to locate the .32 calibre pistol used to kill Lawrence O. Hogan and Miss Elaine Eldridge of Fort Lauderdale.

Hirohito Calls On General MacArthur

TOKYO, Oct. 16, (AP)—Emperor Hirohito called on General MacArthur today without any imperial flourish in view of the announcement of his coming. The Emperor dropped in just about the same time as Japanese war-time ally, Germany, were stalking to the scaffold in Nuremberg jail.

There was, however, no talk of such grim events. Hirohito spent an hour with MacArthur, thanking him for the recent food distribution which has eased living conditions for the Japanese. The Emperor added his thanks to MacArthur for his help in drawing up Japan's new constitution—the constitution which strips Hirohito of all his political power.

Jobs Without Jobs

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16, (AP)—The OPA has a 500,000-man army without a master who is fit—but that doesn't mean there are no jobs. But other agency officials say those unemployment agents will not be demobilized immediately. They are to be put on the trail of price-fixing violators in other fields such as automobiles.

Cards Down Sox In Final Series Contest, 4 To 3

Slaughter Scores On A Double In Eighth For Winning Tally

St. Louis, Oct. 16, (AP)—The never-dies St. Louis Cardinals won the 1946 world series yesterday with a thrill-packed 4 to 3 victory over the Boston Red Sox.

The victory maintained the Cardinals' record of having never lost a seven-game World Series, and it was Boston's first World Series defeat in six contests.

The Redbirds shoved over the winning run on relief pitcher Bob Feller in the eighth inning when Harry Slaughter drove a single into centerfield. With two out, Harry Walker, who has been a Cardinal standout all year, sent a screaming double to left and Slaughter raced over with the winning run. It was a daring place of base running, with Slaughter racing over the plate as Johnny Pesky, never thinking he would make such an attempt, hesitated in his throw home.

Harry Brecheen, who had twice headed the Red Sox for decisive Cardinal victories when they needed them most, played a hero's role again yesterday. Brecheen came to Dickson's aid in the eighth inning with men on second and third with no out. He got the first two men but gave Don Dimaggio one down the alley and Dimaggio doubled to knock in the tying run. Brecheen then retired Williams.

When the Red Sox threatened in the ninth with two straight hits, Brecheen settled down to get three Red Sox batters in a row to retire the side and clinch the Cardinal victory.

It was Brecheen's victory, but stout-hearted Little Murray Dickson must come in for a share of plaudits. Dickson was picked for a run in the very first inning and some thought it might be a repetition of the third game, when he lost the verdict on Rudy York's firstinning home run.

Abattoir Plans Meet Approval Of Farm Bureau

Resolution Passed Favoring Completion And Operation

A resolution favoring completion and operation of the Central Florida Quick Freeze and Lekker plant with abattoir according to the rules and regulations of the sanitary code of the City of Sanford and the State Board of Health, was passed by the members of the Seminole County Farm Bureau at their annual meeting at the Court House Monday evening. It was announced today by County Agent C. H. Dawson.

It was also voted to call this resolution to the attention of the City Commission, which was meeting at the same time at the City Hall.

"The former stated that this plant is of direct importance to the growers of livestock for killing of stock and putting it into the freezer," said Mr. Dawson. "It was pointed out that approval of such an abattoir by the State Board of Health is based on whether or not smells or noise would affect the interests of adjacent property owners."

The Bureau left up to the Board of Directors the election of a president, vice president and secretary, and it was announced that action on this would be taken soon. The Bureau voted to sign a petition for a referendum on a Soil Conservation District.

BERLIN, Oct. 16, (AP)—Some Germans in the street in Berlin today denounced Hermann Goering's suicide "killed the myth of Nazi bravery."

"The founder of the concentration camps, where death was handed to millions, could not face the gallows himself."

Motor Boat Inspection Service To Be Given By Coast Guard Auxiliary

The inauguration of a short-district-wide program of courtesy motor-boat inspection was announced here today by Wm. J. Toll, commanding officer of the local Coast Guard unit.

Begaining the weekend of Oct. 19 and 20 and continuing through the following weekends stations will be set up in each community in which there is a Coast Guard Auxiliary Flotilla.

In outlining the inspection program, Mr. Toll stressed the fact that it is a courtesy inspection in every sense of the word. It is not official in a formal way and violations of regulations or shortages required safety equipment will not be made subject of reports to the Coast Guard. However, if violations are found, the boater can then correct them and thus perhaps save himself from a fine when a month later his boat may be boarded for an official inspection, he added:

"During the war," Mr. Toll said, "the boarding of vessels for the enforcement of the Motorboat Act—a duty of the Coast Guard—was suspended. As a consequence there are thousands of vessels on which safety devices demanded by regulations have deteriorated or disappeared. Many boats have changed hands and the new owners have not affected proper transfer of titles or assignment of numbers or are not conversant with the provisions of the Motorboat Act. Many of the Auxiliary feels, do not realize the importance and the advantages of having the safety equipment in proper shape. It is to help correct these conditions, to advise and counsel with new yachting enthusiasts and to discover dangerous points where it is too late, that the

Road Building In Monroe, Oviedo Is Authorized

Herndon Says Others Will Be Built When Funds Are Available

BURCH ENDS COURSE

Pvt. Joseph H. Burch, son of Myrtle Burch of 619 Celery Avenue, has completed an eight-week motor vehicle operators course at the Common Specialist School Medical Training Center, Brooke Army Medical Center, Fort Sam Houston, Tex.

TALLAHASSEE, Oct. 16, (AP)—

Observers today were standing by to see if State Senator Edwin G. Fraser of Macclenny will face a court battle over his nomination for State Comptroller.

The State Democratic Executive Committee yesterday dealt Fraser a smashing blow when it gave the nod to Fraser over Clarence M. Tolson of Orlando, who had the Governor's unqualified endorsement.

Fraser, who was supported by a powerful anti-administration Senate bloc, has expressed a belief the nomination will not be contested. He says it was a clean-cut victory with the assistance of loyal friends, and he believes the opposition is now convinced.

Speculation continues, however, on whether the administration faction might institute court action to test Fraser's eligibility for office. A front page article in the Jacksonville Journal suggested that Fraser is barred constitutionally from holding the office because he was a member of the 1945 legislature which raised the comptroller's salary from \$1500 to \$2000 a year.

Fraser, however, said the newspaper report is political propaganda. He confided there is a "saving clause" in the 1945 act which would permit him to hold the office at the old salary of \$1500.

Senator Declares He And Taft Did Not Maneuver To Break Down Price Controls

Senator Kenneth Wherry of Nebraska today lashed out at President Truman on grounds of falsehood. He charged Mr. Truman was wrong when he said Wherry wrote the so-called profiteering amendment to the OPA bill passed by Congress last summer. He also accused the President of maliciously charging Wherry and Senator Taft with maneuvering to break down price controls.

Wherry said in an Associated Press reporter, "I challenge the truthfulness of the President's statements that the so-called profiteering amendment was the Wherry amendment. The one which was passed was an administration amendment. If the President didn't want it, he didn't need to take it because it was brought in by the administration."

Wherry added, "The decentral of meat amendment carried in the Report 46 to 26 on decentral of dairy products, the vote was 32 to 27. Those votes were right at a 2 to 1 majority. How can the President mistakenly charge Senator Taft and me with breaking down OPA when those amendments passed 2 to 1 and with the administration in control of both houses?"

Wherry went on to say that the black market was responsible for failure of OPA control of meat. He said Mr. Truman decontrolled meat because he was afraid the next Congress would abolish OPA entirely. Wherry added that the President decontrolled meat now because the breakdown of meat regulations was hurting Democratic chances in the coming elections.

Meat came into the nation's principal markets in considerable volume today. Even hogs were not expected in any appreciable numbers until the latter part of November arrived in larger amounts than a year ago. While 12 principal markets of the nation totaled 85,000 hogs today, compared with 103,000 a week ago.

Cattle shipments of livestock were not expected to make much of an impression until next week because of the slower method of cattle car loadings.

The dozen leading markets cattle on sale totaled 62,900 today, compared with 31,816 a week ago, and 50,400 a year ago.

Sheep came in about the same levels as before, since there had been no ceiling controls on live sheep.

The same dozen markets totaled 31,800 sheep today, 31,863 a week ago, and 31,300 a year ago.

Pigs were generally steady in early live sales at yesterday's record-breaking levels. The early top at Chicago was \$26.00, but most hogs were being held for higher Monday. Yesterday's top was \$27.50 with the average at \$26.60 a hundred pounds compared with Monday's average of \$18.20 and a year ago average of \$16.77.

Cattle prices are steady to some what lower with few sales concluded in early rounds, and sheep were considered fully steady.
