### Disney Announces New Attractions

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP)—Two new hotels and a couple more fantasies will spring up in central Florida soon—and Walt Disney World is paying about \$50 million to make it happen.

"Pirates of the Caribbean" and "Tom Sawyer's Island" will be the latest creations designed to lure tourists to the huge Magic Kingdom, Disney World publicity supervisor Truman Myers said Tuesday.

He said the only item cost determined so far is about \$10 million for the "Pirates" improvement. Other individual costs will be fixed later.

Construction on the two hotels is expected to be completed by Christmas, 1973. One will be in a western style and the other a beachfront resort.

They have become necessary, Myers said, because of the unexpected demand for accommodations. Each will have about 450 rooms, bringing Disney World's total to about 2,400 rooms in four hotels.

Some 6 million visitors have toured Disney World since it opened last Oct. 1, Myers said. Officials had predicted about 10 million visitors in the first year.

Central Florida chapter, American Red Cross, has been given a quota of \$9,259 (\$405 from Seminole County) of a \$5 million emergency fund to aid in relief of the South Dakota flood victims.

Capt. O. D. Finnigan, USN-Ret., chairman of Central Florida Chapter, American Red Cross, was notified in a message from Robert Shea, American Red Cross vice president for disaster relief, that 6,000 families have been affected by the disaster in Rapid City, and estimated that 4,000 homes had been destroyed or seriously damaged.

Shea said the disaster had brought the Red Cross face-to-face with a critical financial situation, that the organization already has spent this year \$12 million in such disasters as floods in Texas, Kentucky, Washington and West Virginia, plus numerous tornadoes. These recovery operations have seriously depleted our ability to react in the future in case of other unknown disasters.

Captain Finnigan asked the Orange County United Appeal Board if it could respond to this campaign by assisting the American Red Cross in making this funds available to the United Appeal Board and executive committee will be meeting today to determine what they can do to assist the South Dakota flood victims through the Central Florida Red Cross chapter. Arriving at the meeting with the Board of County Commissioners with his tape recorder, Dr. Harold Miller, chairman of the Board of trustees of Seminole Memorial Hospital, said, "I have been misunderstood and misquoted so much that I thought I would record this, if you don't mind."

He initiated his address to the commissioners with the report that at the Monday night meeting of the trustees, he had asked that the board of trustees transfer the two adjacent remaining pieces of hospital property, of about one acre each, to the County Commission.

This motion failed and, in its stead, a motion was approved to ask the County to transfer title of the property on which the hospital is located to the Board of Trustees. "Our attorney said that, according to the Attorney General, all property should be in the name of the Board of County Commission."

Commissioner Sidney Vihlen asked, "Dr. Miller, just what did all that accomplish, really?"

Miller replied, "Nothing. Except to tell you (the commission) that it is none of your business what goes on at this hospital."

Vihlen said it would serve the interests of both boards to have the attorneys get together to work this out. Howard Marsee, acting county attorney, said that according to his personal research, at the direction of the board, the property should be in the name of the county.

Miller indicated he would prefer the attorney general's title, that the county should have title.

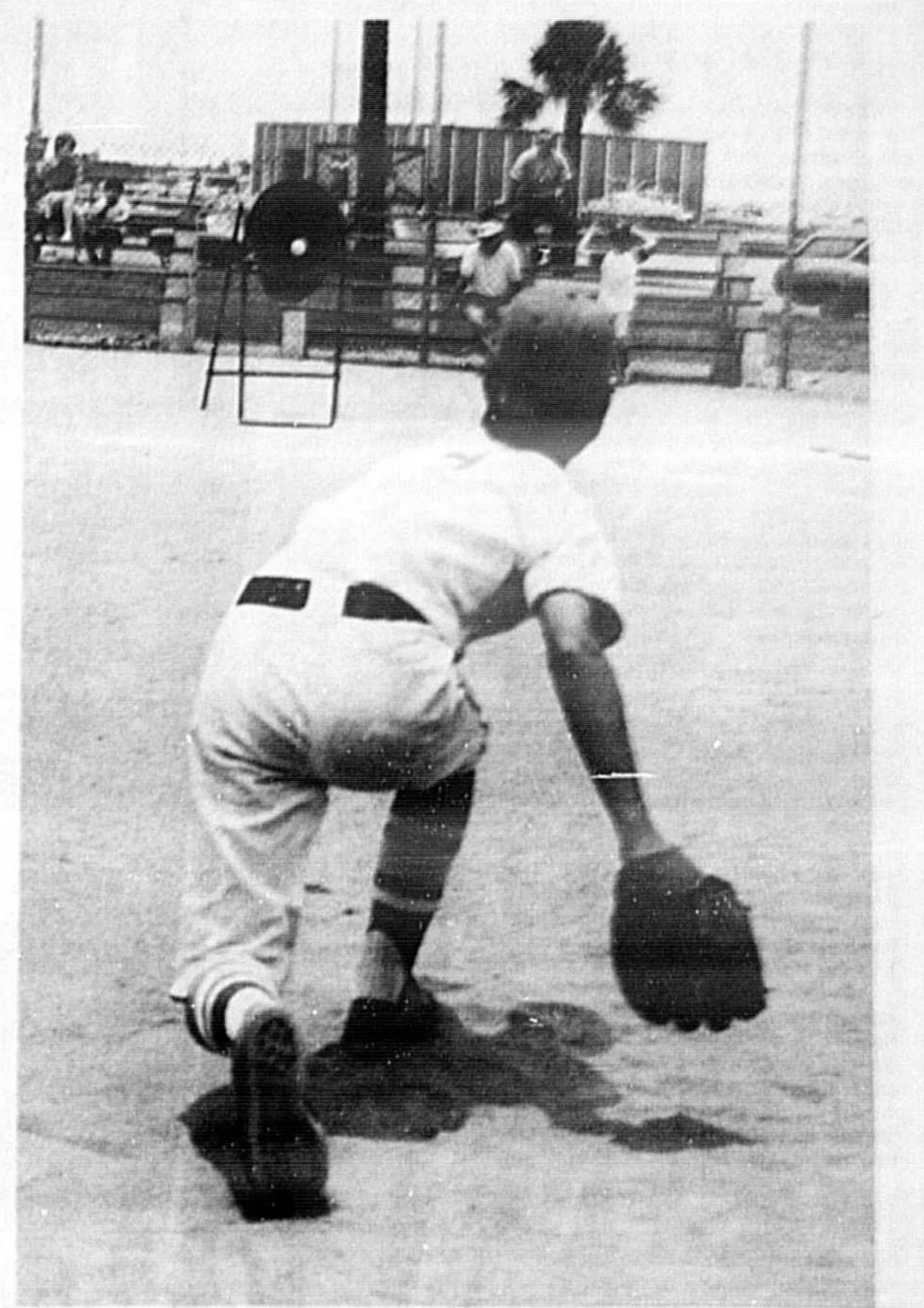
Moving the discussion into the real issue of the day, the sale of the hospital by the County Commission, Miller said, "There is no question that there is a better way to run the hospital than it has been handled in the last 20 years." He mentioned that these men, John Evans, John Schirard and Andrew Carraway had been members of the board for many years and still are active.

He said he favored the sale of the hospital as a "second alternative" to the creation of two hospital districts in the county. "I would not favor selling it to just anyone," he remarked, "I would prefer that it be sold to a non-profit group who would run it in a proper manner."

County commissioners made an unsuccessful attempt to have the State Legislature establish two hospital taxing districts for the purpose of reducing the responsibility of South Seminole residents to support the hospital.

"It is not a county hospital," Miller stated.

Dr. Miller stated, "It is not being used by all of the county." It has been said that only five per cent of the hospital's patients come from South Seminole. During last week's presentation by physicians however, it was reported that figure is going up each day. Miller said that "we should let the people who use it pay for it." In referring to the sale to a non-profit entity, Miller said that all groups are profit oriented, "even we try to make a profit at" (Continued on Page 3)

### Mistrial Declared By Court

Following over four hours of deliberation in the case of Albert Evans, charged with first degree murder, a seven-man, five-woman jury reported to Circuit Judge Thomas Waddell, that they were hopelessly deadlocked.

Judge Waddell declared a mistrial in the case.

Although the deliberations of the jurors are cloaked in secrecy, speculation in court circles are that the jury was unable to return a verdict due to divergent opinions as to the degree of murder, second or third.

Two Sanford police officers testified yesterday that Evans had said he threw the gun away and "did the deed" but they were hopelessly deadlocked.

Evans was tried in the April 15 slaying of Damon Jones, who was found at 1022 West 12th Street shot in the chest twice with slugs from a .22 caliber pistol.

The affray took place as a result of an altercation between the two men over a woman.

If it costs \$250,000 dollars to house 12 juveniles, it will surely cost \$750,000 to add the required space to the jail."

The need for increased housing is predicated upon an existing number currently in jail and the projected need necessitated by the passage of Article V.

Commissioner Sidney Vihlen asked what the City of Sanford plans to do with the municipal jail planned before the passage of the bill, now that the county is taking over its judicial system.

# Fatter Social Security Checks Aim Of Congress

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congressional efforts to fatten the Social Security checks of millions of voters before election day may be thwarted by a Senate deadline on welfare reform.

The dilemma took shape as the Senate Finance Committee wrapped up its work on a massive bill containing the hotly disputed welfare provisions as well as the Social Security increases most senators favor.

Many members of Congress are anxious for the Social Security boosts to be included in the checks recipients would get Nov. 3, four days before the presidential and congressional balloting.

But Social Security Commissioner Robert M. Ball says that can't happen unless the bill is signed into law by Aug. 10 because of the time it takes to change his computers.

With floor debate delayed until after a mid-July congressional recess for the Democratic National Convention, that gives the Senate less than a month to resolve a three-way split over the bill's welfare provisions.

But little argument seems likely on the Social Security measure, which would raise monthly payments 10 per cent across the board, expand Medicare to cover maintenance drugs, and provide a \$50 mil-

lion supplement for widows. Well over half the Senate is expected in favor of doubling the across-the-board increase to 20 per cent.

If both programs are kept in the same package, it seems unlikely that the legislation could reach President Nixon by Aug. 10 because of lengthy debate and the time it would take to reconcile the measure with the version passed earlier by the House.

For this reason, Finance Chairman Russell B. Long, D-La., said Tuesday there might be a move to split off the Social Security provisions, a difficult parliamentary maneuver.

At issue is the welfare program for Aid to Families with Dependent Children, which covers about 11 million persons. Nixon has recommended an AFDC reform plan which was largely approved by the House. It features a \$2,000 guaranteed annual income for a family of four and payments for the first time to the working poor.

The Finance Committee flatly rejected this plan and substituted one of its own called Workfare with strict work re-

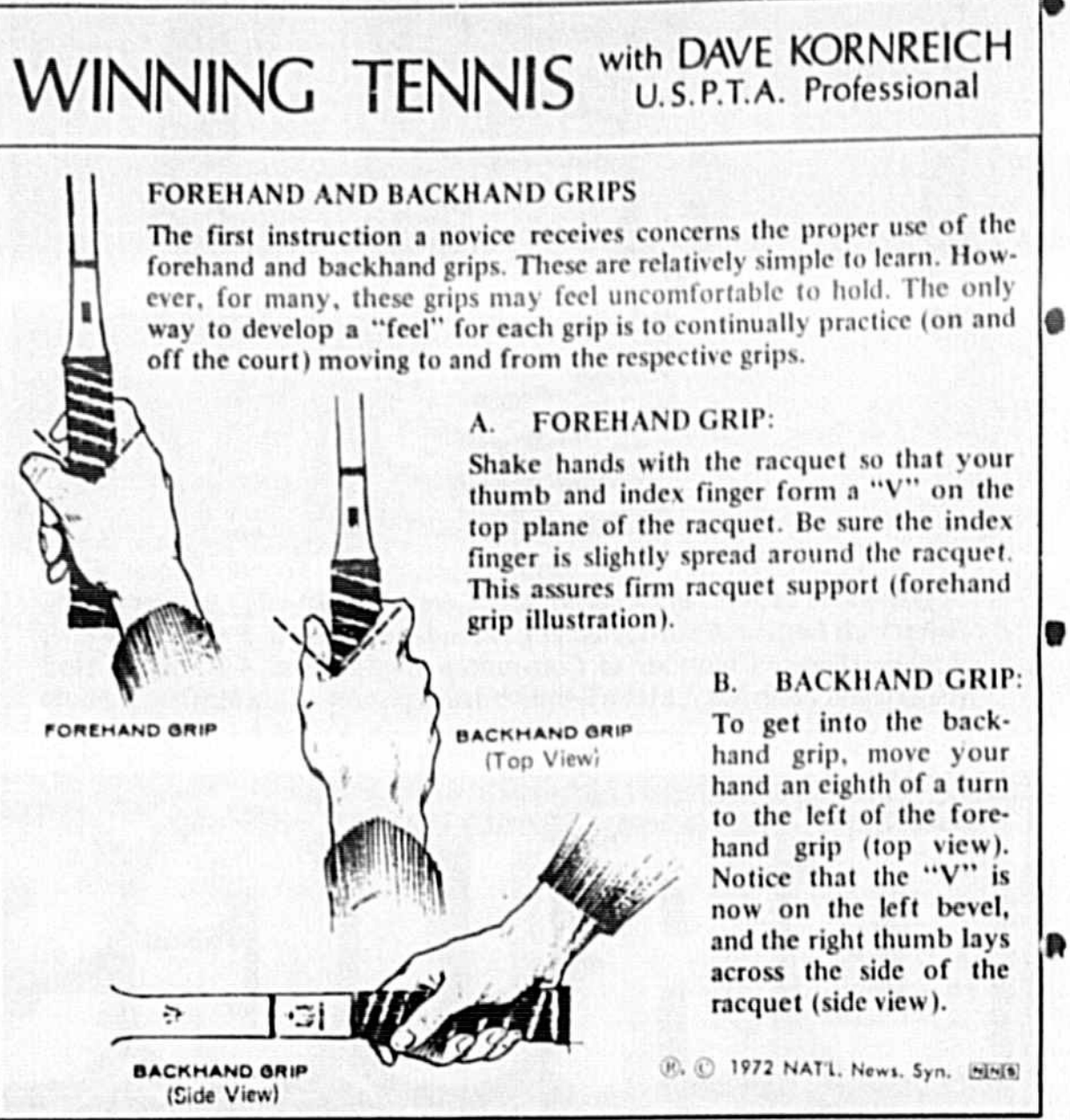

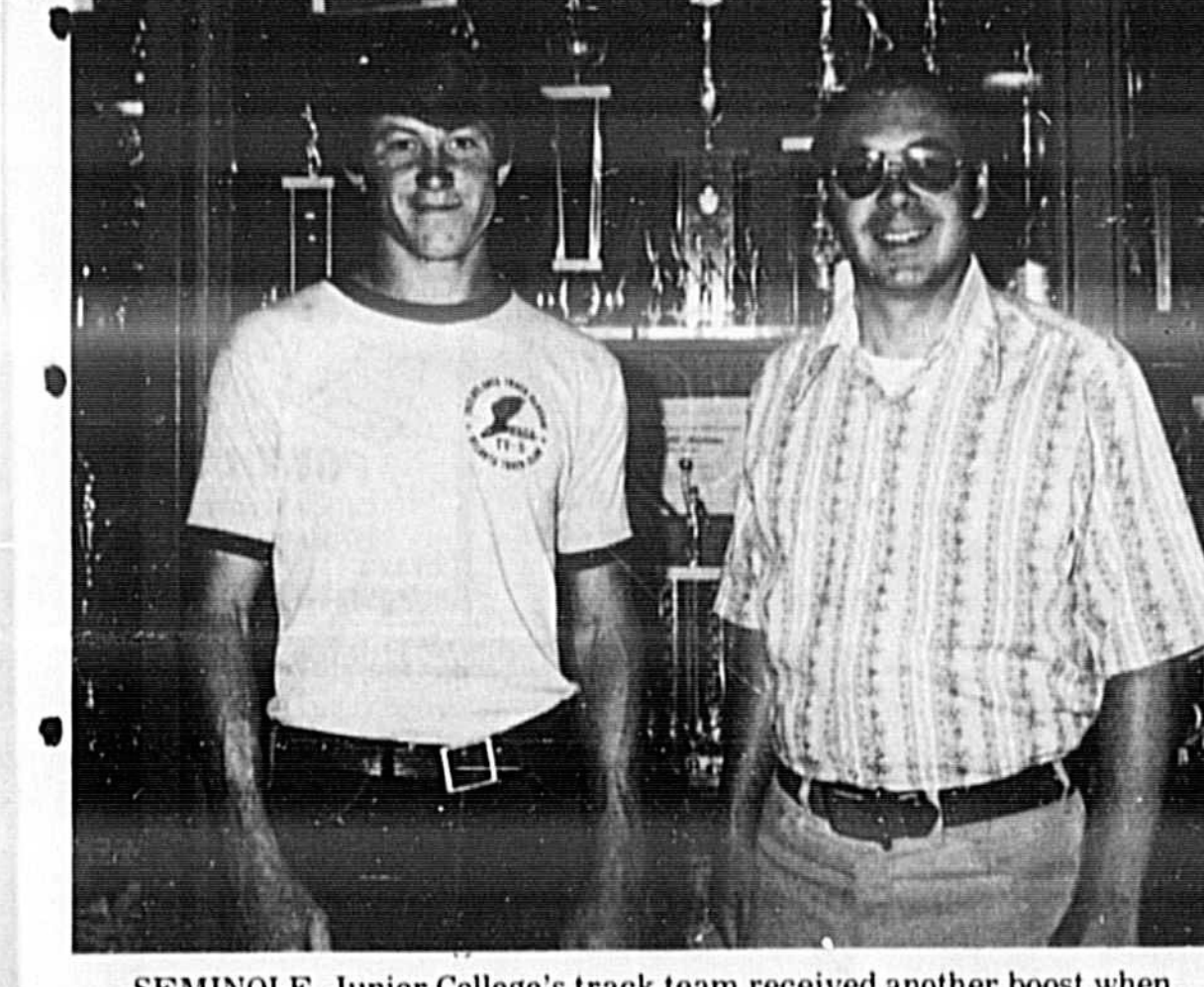

# Shanks Italian Way

Fans of Italian dishes can whip up their own Ossu Bianco and serve with spaghetti and sauce with little trouble. Baked Shanks Italian Style makes use of a still relatively inexpensive meat cut that offers a lot of flavor. Men especially like this dish and will enjoy adding it to their list of specialties. Serve with a hearty green salad and pumpernickel rolls.

**BAKED SHANKS ITALIAN STYLE**  
(Meat Ossu Bianco)  
4 meaty lamb shanks  
2 tablespoons liquid gravy seasoning and browning sauce  
Seasoned flour  
1/2 cup salad oil  
1 large onion, sliced thin  
1/2 cup diced celery  
1 cup sliced carrots  
1 clove garlic, mashed  
1 tablespoon chopped parsley  
1 can (2 lbs., 2 oz.) plum tomatoes  
1/4 teaspoon seasoned pepper  
1 teaspoon sugar  
1 large green pepper, sliced and sauteed  
Cooked spaghetti

Wipe the lamb shanks well on paper towels then brush all over with liquid gravy seasoning and browning sauce. Let shanks dry a little and reserve remaining liquid sauce. Roll the shanks in seasoned flour and brown on all sides in hot oil in a Dutch oven or heavy skillet. Remove shanks. Add to oil remaining in pan onion, celery, carrots, garlic and parsley. Cook over medium heat 2 to 4 minutes. Add tomatoes and seasonings to pan, mix well. Return lamb shanks and any remaining liquid sauce to pan, cover. Simmer over a moderately low heat until very tender, about 1 hour or more.

Have ready a serving platter filled with hot cooked spaghetti. Sauté green pepper and pour over spaghetti. Stir 1/2 cup warm red wine or hot water into sauce remaining in pan, then process in blender until smooth or press through strainer. Pour sauce over shanks and serve at once. Makes 4 servings.

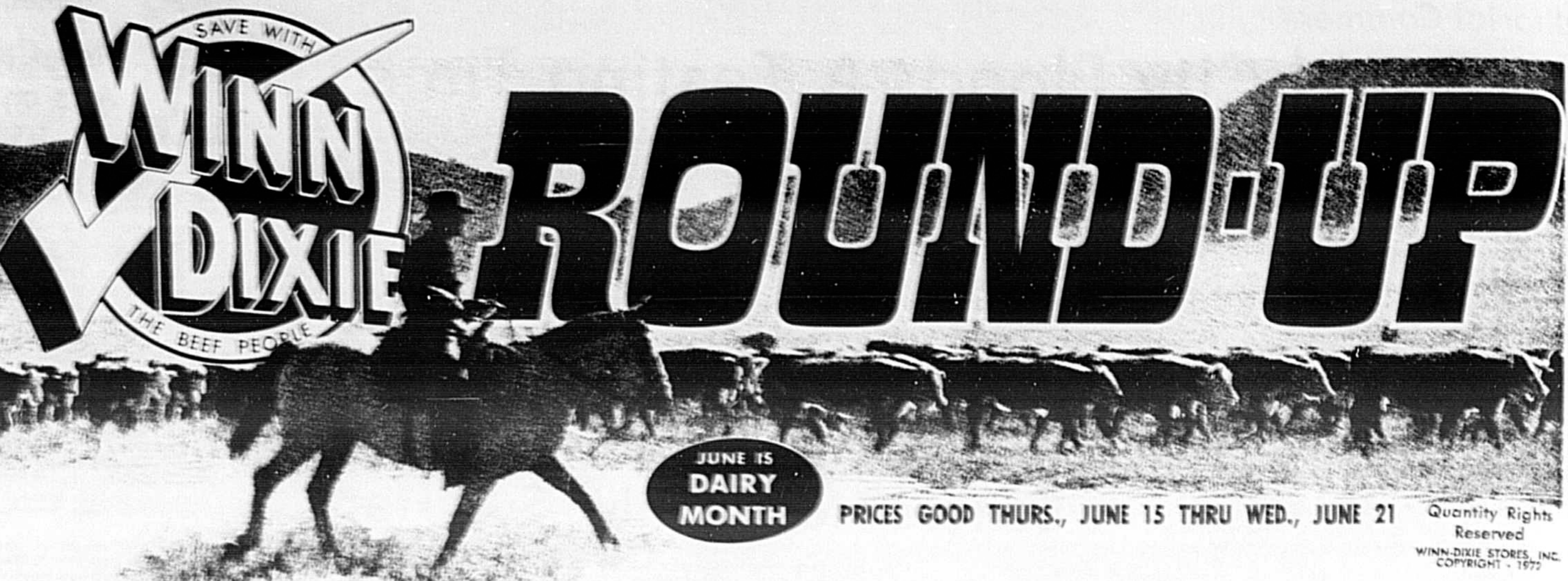

There's lots of molasses flavor in this Boston-type bread.  
1 cup unbleached flour  
1/2 teaspoon baking soda  
3/4 teaspoon salt  
1/4 cup sugar  
1 cup unbleached stone-ground whole-wheat flour  
1 egg  
3/4 cup molasses  
1 cup buttermilk  
1 cup raisins

On wax paper thoroughly stir together the flour, baking soda and salt; add the sugar and whole-wheat flour and stir again to mix well. In a medium mixing bowl, beat egg slightly; add molasses and buttermilk and beat to blend. Add dry ingredients and mix well. Stir in raisins. Turn mix a greased and floured loaf pan (9 by 5 by 3 inches). Bake in a preheated 350-degree oven until a cake tester inserted in center comes out clean - 1 hour; cover top lightly with foil if bread browns too much toward end of baking time. Turn out on a wire rack; turn right side up; cool. Wrap tightly for several hours or overnight so crust softens and bread is easy to slice.

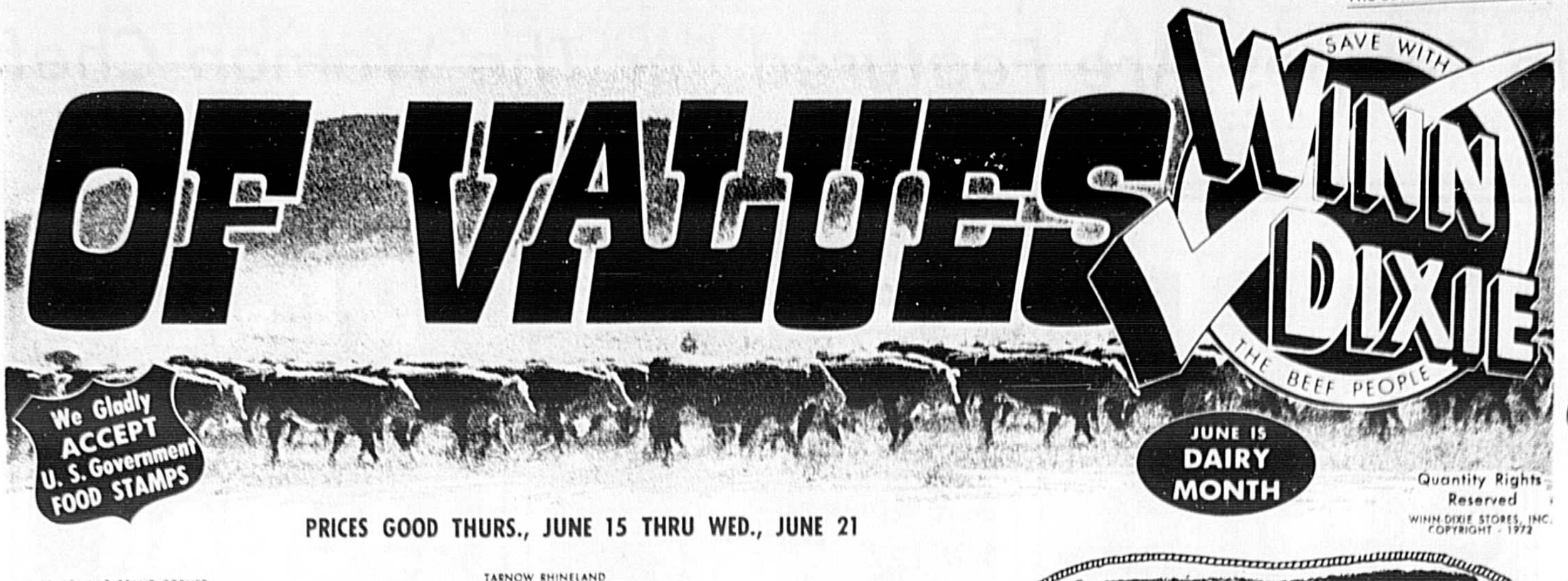

## Coco-Nutty Custard Pie

1/4 cup butter  
3/4 cup sugar  
1 egg, unbeaten

1 1/4 teaspoon lemon extract  
1/2 cup Florida cottage cheese

Sift together flour, baking powder and salt; set aside. Cream butter until light and fluffy. Add sugar gradually, beating well after each addition. Add egg and lemon extract. Mix well. Add cottage cheese, beating until smooth and blended. Do not overbeat. Drop from teaspoon 3 inches apart on greased cookie sheet. Bake at 375 F. for 10 to 15 minutes, until browned around the edges. Makes about 3 dozen.

Preheat oven to 400 F. Press finely chopped almonds into bottom of unbaked pie crust and return to refrigerator. Heat milk over medium heat until it just begins to boil. In a separate bowl, beat together eggs, sugar, salt, and vanilla. Gradually add hot milk, stirring constantly. Pour about 3/4 of hot custard into chilled pie crust. Place in oven and add remaining hot custard with a measuring cup. Bake at 400 F. for 25 to 30 minutes or until center is well set. Pie is done when knife inserted halfway between outside and center of custard comes out clean.

Remove pie from oven, cool. Place coconut on cookie sheet and broil until golden brown. Cool, then pile atop custard pie. Chill well in refrigerator before serving. Makes one 9-inch pie.

## Cheesy Squash Casserole

2 lbs. yellow squash  
1 lb. zucchini squash  
1/2 C. chopped onion  
1 Tbsp. sugar  
1/2 tsp. salt  
Dash of pepper  
1 C. water  
4 slices of bacon, fried and crumbled  
1 C. Cheddar cheese, grated  
1/4 tsp. marjoram  
1 well-beaten egg

Topping:  
1 medium tomato, sliced  
1 medium green pepper, sliced  
1/2 C. buttered bread crumbs

Slice squash and place in a large saucpan with the chopped onion. Add sugar, salt, pepper, and water. Cover and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and let simmer 20 minutes or until the squash is tender. Drain and mash. Combine the mashed squash with the egg, bacon, cheese, and marjoram; mix well.

Spoon the squash mixture into a 2-quart casserole, leveling across the top.

Across the top of the casserole, place 4 slices of tomato. Arrange a slice of green pepper on top of each tomato slice. Sprinkle the buttered bread crumbs around the edge of the casserole. Bake for 30 minutes at 300 F. During the last 15 minutes of baking time, cover the casserole with aluminum foil to keep the pepper rings from browning. Serves 6.

## Orange Cream Pie

1 envelope unflavored gelatin  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/3 cup sugar  
1 1/4 cups fresh Florida orange juice  
2 egg yolks  
2 Tablespoons fresh Florida lime juice  
Grated rind of 2 Florida oranges (about 2 Tbsp.)  
2 egg whites  
1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar  
1/3 cup sugar  
1 cup heavy cream, whipped  
9-inch pie shell, baked

Combine gelatin, salt and sugar. Beat together orange juice and egg yolks; add to gelatin mixture. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until gelatin is dissolved and mixture is slightly thickened, about 5 minutes. Remove from heat and stir in lime juice and orange rind. Chill, stirring occasionally, until mixture is just beginning to set. Beat egg whites and cream of tartar until frothy. Gradually beat in sugar, a little at a time. Continue beating until stiff. Fold egg whites into gelatin mixture. Fold in whipped cream. Blend thoroughly. Pour into pie shell and chill until firm.

# Portuguese Produce A Lively And Tasty Wine

of Portugal are fast gaining in popularity on the American market, and the Lisbon government is trying to help the trend along.

Portugal's Information and Tourist Trade Office, invited Carlos Lameiro, director of mammoth wine tasting at New York hotel. It was a thrilling affair, highlighted by a dazzling array of native wines. The wide variety came as a surprise to many who had believed that Portugal's cellars were limited to the traditional Port wine.

Among those on display was the sprightly Portuguese vinho verde, or green wine. Actually this wine can be red or white. The word "green" is used to refer to the youthful zesty quality.

Concerning Portuguese wine fanciers on hand for the event, I learned something new about the country's famed Port wine. Incidentally, it is called that and not just port wine. Because this name has been taken over by the United States and other countries, the true wine comes only from the Oporto and the Douro region of Portugal.

This noble wine, whose origins go back some 2,000 years, usually ranges between 19 and 21 per cent alcohol. Brandy distilled from grapes grown in the Oporto region is added to halt the fermentation when the wine has reached the desired sweetness or dryness, depending on what the vintner is aiming for. The ratio is one part brandy to five of wine.

The wine is then shipped in casks to mature in cellars on the outskirts of Oporto, a slow process. It takes at least eight years, plus constant loving care for Port to become worthy of its ancient name.

To really enjoy this fine wine, try a glass after a real Portuguese roast, built around a fish such as Caldeirada a Frigateira, or Riverboat Stew.

RIVERBOAT STEW  
1/2 cup Olive Oil  
24 hard-shell clams, scrubbed thoroughly  
1 green pepper  
2 medium onions, finely chopped  
3 medium tomatoes, blanched, peeled, seeded and chopped  
4 cloves crushed garlic  
1/4 teaspoon Paprika  
Bay Leaf  
Bouquet Garni  
Salt, Pepper to taste

3 pounds assorted filets of fish (cod, haddock, bass, coad etc.)  
1 dozen shrimp, shelled, cleaned and deveined  
2 cups vinho verde  
4 triangles bread toasted and 1/2 cup fresh chopped parsley

Cover bottom large kettle with thin coating of olive oil. Add clams. Top with 1/2 of the vegetables. Season. Top with remaining fish and remaining vegetables. Season again and add wine. Bring to boil and cook gently for about 25 minutes or until clams open and fish flakes when tested. Add remaining oil and cook 8 minutes more. Place two toast triangles on bottom of each soup dish, ladle stew over toast and garnish with parsley.

Serves six persons and is good with a cold bottle of vinho verde.

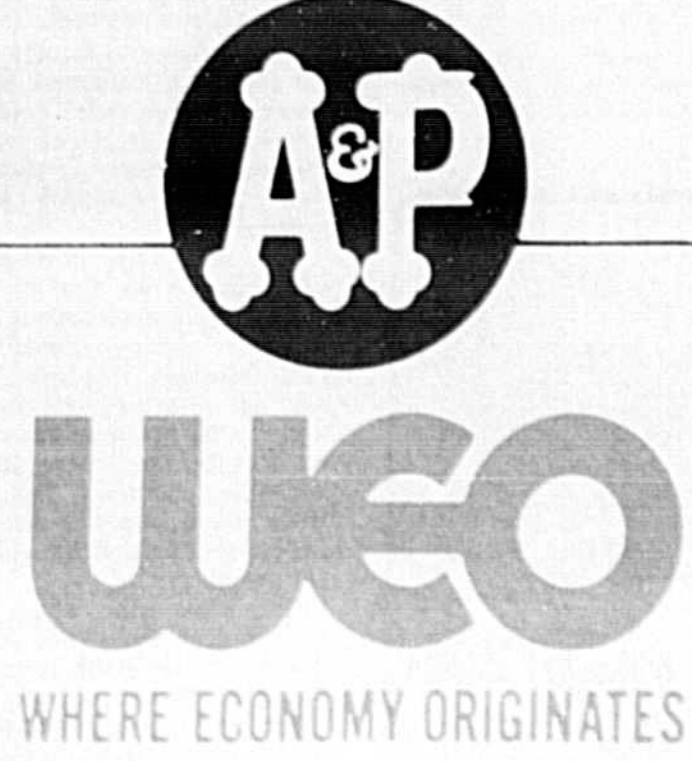

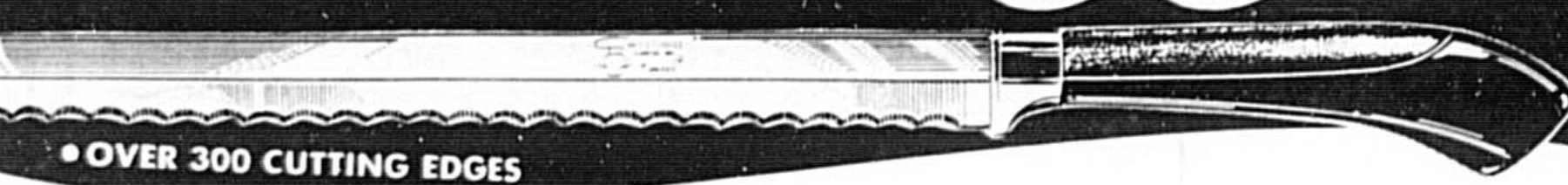

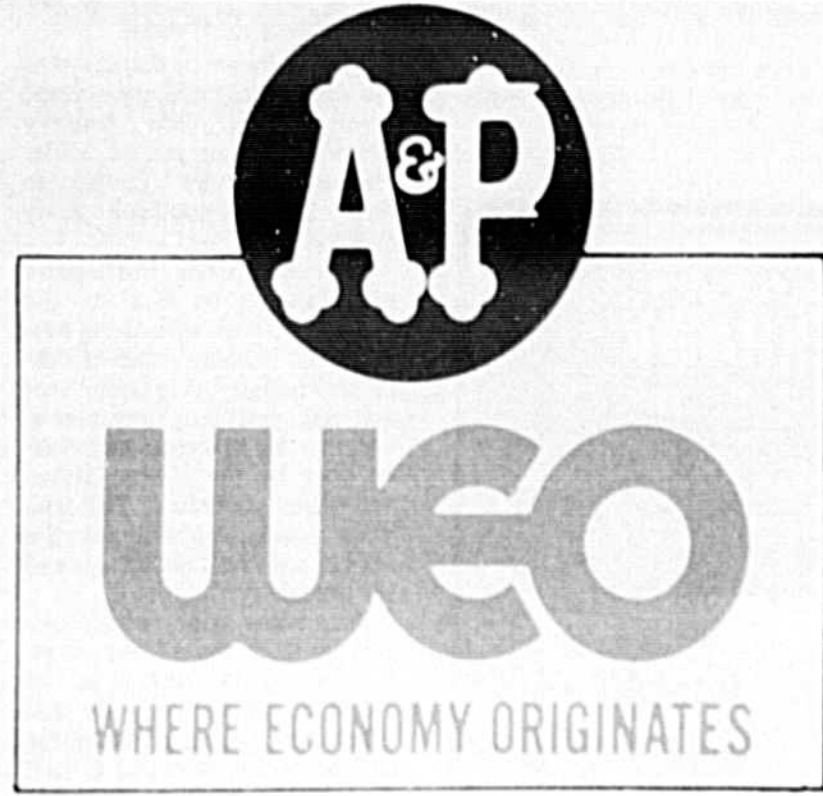

## Salad a la Tropics

A character familiar to those who grew up in the '40s and '50s is back. It is Chiquita Banana, extolling the healthy and tasty assets of bananas for all ages. Only this time the tropical fruit authority must watch her weight, a problem not faced by the animated characters who sang the calypso ditty years ago.

**CHIQUITA FRUIT SALAD**  
Fill a summer salad bowl with the fruits in season—

seedless grapes, strawberries, melon, oranges and bananas. Serve with low calorie dressings.

**LO-CALORIE FRUIT DRESSING**  
2 tablespoons sugar  
2 tablespoons flour  
2 teaspoons dry mustard  
2 teaspoons salt  
1 cup plus 2 tablespoons water  
2 medium eggs, beaten  
1/2 cup freshly squeezed lemon juice  
2 tablespoons elder vinegar

In top of double boiler thoroughly combine dry ingredients. Gradually add water, blending until smooth. Stir in remaining ingredients. Place over 1/2 inch gently boiling water. Stir constantly and cook 7 to 8 minutes until thick and smooth. Cover and reduce to very low heat. Cook 5 minutes, stirring as needed. Chill before using.

**YOGURT DRESSING**  
2 teaspoons lemon juice  
1 tablespoon salad oil  
1/2 cup plain yogurt  
1/2 teaspoon paprika

**Dash Tabasco pepper sauce**  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
Pinch of garlic powder  
Combine all ingredients in a jar and shake well. Cool.

**The working bride should consider a main dish salad for summer supper. Try this Italian-style chef's salad: Toss together torn up lettuce and fresh spinach. 1 baked 9-inch pie shell  
1 cup (1/2 pint) heavy cream  
1/2 cup peanut butter  
4 squares semi-sweet chocolate (4 oz.)

**MUSHROOMS WITH CASHWENUTS**  
Prepared quickly in a large skillet.  
1 pound (fresh mushrooms or 2 cans (each 6 to 8 ounces) sliced mushrooms)  
2 tablespoons butter  
1/2 cup minced onion  
1/2 cup coarsely chopped cashew nuts  
2 tablespoons minced parsley

## 'Chile Con Queso' Is A Dunk

Look into Mexican cookbooks and the chances are you'll come upon recipes for Chile con Queso (Green Chile with Cheese). This is a savory dip that the Mexican cookbooks suggest you serve with corn chips or tostillas (fried quartered corn tortillas) at cocktail time or with refried beans and tortillas at brunch. Offered this way, Chile con Queso is extremely popular in the American Southwest and in California. New York cooks sometimes serve the dip with vegetables, raw or parboiled. When the weather is warm

Chile con Queso tastes good with iced tea. To make the tea add 8 to 10 tea bags (tags removed) to a quart of cold tap water. Cover container and let stand at room temperature or in the refrigerator for at least 8 hours or overnight. Squeeze tea bags as you remove them and stir the tea. Pour into ice-filled glasses. Makes 5 to 6 servings. Amounts may be doubled. Using cold water prevents the tea from clouding.

**CHILE CON QUESO**  
(Green Chile with Cheese)  
2 medium tomatoes (peeled, seeded and chopped)  
1 can (4 ounces) whole roasted green chilies (drained, seeds removed and chopped)  
1 tablespoon instant minced onion  
1/2 teaspoon seasoned salt

# TV viewer feels left out in cold

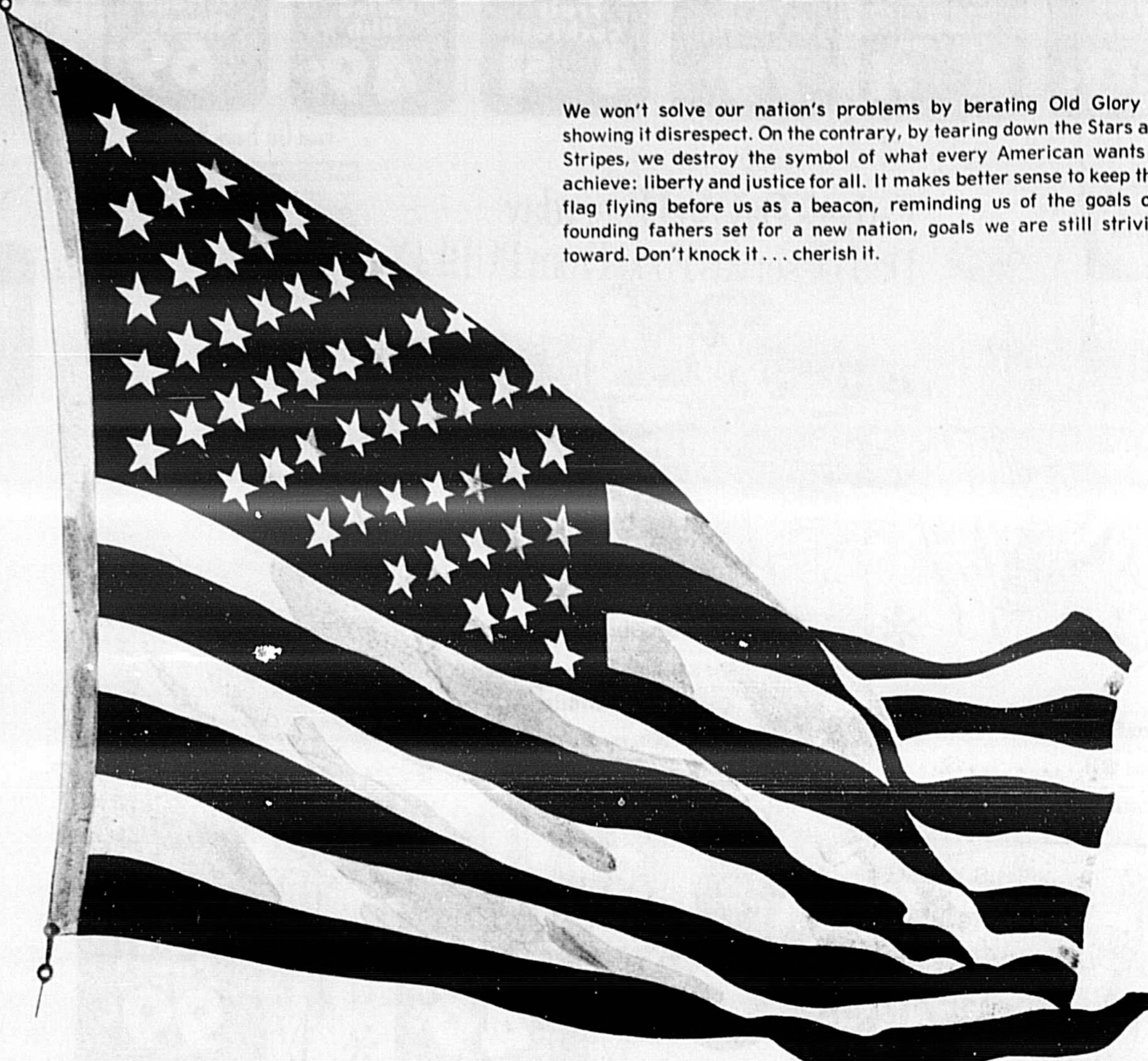

A nagging disturbance that something is terribly wrong with the evening news on television has suddenly been crystallized and confirmed, alarming-ly by a prominent psychologist who recently conducted an exhaustive study on the psychological effects of today's free-form television news on the viewer.

Dr. P. Lucifer Diddlethacker, a noted expert on media influence over the masses, discussed his most recent findings in an article published in the *Natamas Medical Journal*.

own fascinating chitchat. Naturally, this makes the viewer feel they've forgotten all about him."

Dr. Diddlethacker argues that today's ad-libbing newscasters are having such a ball joshing with each other on the air, the viewer subconsciously feels rejected. The result, he says, is often mass disillusionment, loss of self-importance and guilt.

"Today's viewer," explained Dr. Diddlethacker, "easily develops a growing sense of guilt because the men broadcasting the news are always chuckling among themselves and he, the lonely viewer, can never figure out what's so funny." Dr. Diddlethacker said this can cause the viewer to question his own sense of humor.

"It is not uncommon," the psychologist writes, "for today's viewer to watch the evening news and ask himself, 'How come they're laughing and I'm not?' He feels frustrated, even inferior, as his inability to get as big a kick out of the news as the men reading it."

The respected psychologist revealed that he had his wife lock him in a room where he was forced to watch 500 hours of local television news in the last year. This and extensive interviews with other viewers led him to believe that serious psychological damage is being done by the local television "informal wisecracking" presentation of the news.

"More and more," writes Dr. Diddlethacker, "the viewer of television news has the feeling there's a nifty party going on and he's been invited."

Dr. Diddlethacker said today's so-called "news teams," who gather around little tables and chitchat, leave the impression that their attention is directed toward each other and not the viewer. Dr. Diddlethacker provided the following comparison between the opening of a local television news show in 1965 and one from 1971

# Part Sealed In Private Talks Allies To Study NATO Principles

COPENHAGEN, Denmark (AP)—Denmark, France and their allies to undertake a study of a possible new declaration of principles for the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, an informed source said today.

The study, urged by the Nixon administration, would be made by the permanent NATO council in Brussels.

The agreement was said to have been sealed in private talks between U.S. and French officials attending the semi-annual session of the NATO foreign ministers ending today.

On Thursday, Foreign Minister Michel Jobert of France had questioned the value of any new statement of principles, U.S. officials had been seeking a final statement that would declare a need for what Henry A. Kissinger has called a "new Atlantic charter."

Informed sources said the last-minute U.S.-French agreement caused some surprise when it was brought into a drafting committee working on the final statement of the two-day meeting. All countries accepted the draft, the sources added.

Officials were also reported to have agreed that all 15 NATO nations will be represented July 3 at Helsinki for the first meeting of the conference on European security and cooperation. It will bring together ministers from 34 countries—East, West and neutral. Some of the NATO countries had hesitated because the Soviet Union has not yet been pinned down to a date for a conference on force reductions in Western Europe.

It was hoped that this will be settled during the visit to Washington next week by Soviet leader Leonid I. Brezhnev for the first time. Brezhnev for a

## State Pays Lawyers For Convention Trips

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—The state Board of Architecture paid more than \$3,500 in legal fees and travel expenses to send two attorneys to three national conventions in one year, Auditor General Ernest Ellison said today.

Ellison said the board paid \$2,281 for travel expenses of the two to conventions July 13-18, 1971 in San Francisco, April 20-23, 1972 in Hilton Head, S.C., and June 27-July 2, 1972 at Seattle, Wash.

The board also paid legal fees to its Jacksonville attorney of \$725 to go to Hilton Head and \$600 for the Seattle convention.

Board President Harry Burns of Tallahassee said it was necessary to send the attorneys, James Rinaman of Jacksonville and Selig Golden of Gainesville, because the board has reciprocal agreements with other states to allow their architects to practice in Florida.

This requires all state to have uniform architecture licensing tests and "the only way we can keep current is to be very active in the national association," Burns said.

In the audit for July 1, 1971 to June 30, 1972, Ellison said also the board bought \$3,816 worth of new furniture while it had \$1,855 worth of furniture in a warehouse where it had been paying storage for nearly two years.

Burns said he was unaware this had been done but would look into it.

He also said he was unaware why the architecture board failed to include with the audit the usual detailed reply to Ellison's questions and also would look into that when Director Herbert Coons Jr. returned to govt.

## By 90-Year-Old Widow Dope Hold Denied

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—A 90-year-old widow of a policeman, insists she's innocent of narcotics possession charges.

"I just don't want to die before I clear my name," says Mrs. Kelly of last weekend's bust that occurred as she walked to a playground to pick up a neighbor's child.

"The officer came up to me and told me to put up my hands. He had his gun out. I thought it was a joke and I laughed. But he searched me all over..."

"He found \$16 in my purse and he said I'd been selling two bags of dope. I said the six dollars were from my Social Security and the ten belonged to the lady that has the water ice stand."

Mrs. Kelly was arrested by Patrolman Herschel Vandiver after police said she dropped something and began to run.

Vandiver reported he picked up three packets containing a powder believed to be heroin, which has not yet been analyzed.

"I never saw it," Mrs. Kelly says. "The police told me some women reported me as a suspect. But they never showed me the accusers, and I have a right to face them, don't you think?"

Neighbors in the blue-collar neighborhood where Mrs. Kelly lives in a 72-a-month second floor flat are coming to her support.

"I'd trust Kelly with my life," says one young mother of seven. "She's everybody's mother and granny on the block."

Mrs. Kelly says she outlived her eight children and it gladdened her that they don't have to live the kind of world we're living in."

Mrs. Kelly says she does a lot of babysitting, and that many young people come to her apartment to watch television.

"You think these people are hardworking and honest. But maybe the police caught one or two with drugs on them. Maybe they thought I was giving them the stuff."

Heaven have mercy. I was a nurse for many years. I hate dope. I know what it does to people. I've been telling the kids on the block to stop buying poison."

## Economy Slowdown In South

ATLANTA (AP)—Economy in the Deep South is beginning to show signs of a slowdown, according to the Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta.

However, the bank says in its latest report on the region's economy that the slowdown is only a "pause."

The report by the bank covers the 6th District, made up of Florida, Georgia, Alabama, Tennessee, Mississippi and Louisiana.

The bank's economists said their conclusion is based partially on the following:

—Softness appearing in both residential and nonresidential construction during April. "The value of contract awards was at its lowest level in 10 months."

—The flow of deposits in institutions such as savings and loan associations, and some weakness, but these institutions have not slowed mortgage lending.

—After more than 30 months of steady gains, nonfarm employment dipped slightly in April. All the states showed declines except Florida. The unemployment rate moved up to 4.7 per cent.

—Consumer installment credit at commercial banks slowed during April, while banks were making more use of borrowed funds to offset weak gains in customer deposits.

—Prices for farm products rose less rapidly during April but most crop prices increased through early May because of heavy rains and record floods in the Mississippi Valley.

In both robberies, a clerk was assaulted by one of three men who entered the store. A customer entered the store Thursday while the robbery was in progress and was beaten and threatened with a knife held to his throat, according to Kunkler.

Store clerk, Karen King, 22, of Apopka, told Kunkler that while the men entered the store and went to different sections of the building. One man, with a gun in his hand, jumped over the counter, demanding the money and striking Miss King in the head and face.

The man, described as 24-26 years of age, approximately five feet, 11 inches, 200 pounds, was armed with a .32 or .38 caliber blue steel revolver. He ordered Miss King to get money from the safe, but she told the

robber that she didn't have a key.

Miss King was made to lie face-down on the floor, and about that time J. R. Armentrout, 35, of Casselberry, walked into the store and one of the men walked up to him and placed a knife to his throat. According to Deputy P. J. Higgins, a struggle ensued before both Miss King and Armentrout were forced to lie face down on the floor while the three men left.

The men took the store's cash drawer containing almost \$400 and also took \$19, a watch and car keys from Armentrout. Both Miss King and Armentrout were threatened by the men according to Higgins.

The robber who jumped over the counter told Miss King, "Shut up or I'll kill you right here," while the man who put a knife to Armentrout's throat told him "I'll kill you. I'll kill you," during their struggle. The third man, 35, struggled with Armentrout.

Some children in the area of the store told authorities they saw three men run to a purple Pontiac GTV, driven by a fourth man. The car raced away east-bound on Old Palm Springs Road and then east on SR 434, witnesses told Higgins.

## Lottery Trials Reset

Trials for three men arrested May 9 on lottery charges in a raid at Altamonte Springs have been rescheduled for the week of July 9 at Sanford.

Clayton Thomas, 58, Altamonte Springs; and Tommie Anderson, 33, and Willie Charles Campbell, 37, both of Apopka, are charged with aiding or assisting in a lottery, possessing lottery tickets and transmitting lottery tickets.

State and county agents raided a house near Club 68 after a two-month undercover investigation. Court records allege Thomas was the "banker" for a lottery operation and the other two men were "writers and pickup men."

Thomas has a record of Central Florida lottery arrests dating back to 1954 and three convictions with sentences totaling 29 months in jail, according to court records.
