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

## Centennial Of Plastics

It may be a little difficult to believe, but the plastics age is 100 years old this year. And it all came about because of a shortage of ivory for billiard balls.

In 1868, a young Albany, N. Y., printer and tinkerer named John Wesley Hyatt decided to see what would happen if he mixed certain chemicals together. The substance he came up with-Celluloid-soon found use in a wide range of products, from dental plates to shirt collars

It also incidentally created a revolution in photography - the roll film - and made the motion picture industry possible. The next great development came in 1909.

when Dr. Leo Henrik Backeland invented Bakelite, which could be heat-formed such practical items as electric iron handles.

Today, the types and varieties of plastics uses would take volumes to describe. Since 1946, the plastic industry's output has increased by 1,257 per cent and it employs nearly 200,000 men and women.


