





Support Local Stores

One of the most common excuses given for trading out of town is that certain stores do not carry certain articles of merchandise for which there may be a limited demand. And the usual reason given for this failure to carry certain articles is that the present volume of business does not werrant an increase in the variety of merchandise carried.

Here are two conflicting points of view which it seems to us could be reconciled to the mutual advantage of both the merchants and the public. It would certainly be to the advantage of the public. It would certainly what it wants in local stores, and thus avoid the long automobile the to some larger city; and it would surely help the local merchants if they could increase their stocks so as to meet completely local demands.

And yet it stands to reason that if a store like Cohen Brothers in Jacksonville were located in Sanford, it would surely go broke. If any store in Sanford indiscriminately bought all the supplies for its shelves for which there might be any demand at all, it would soon find itself losing money hand over fist and would have to close its doors.

The problem is one which requires a great deal of mutual consideration on the part of both the merchants and the public. The merchants should try to improve the size and quality of their stocks as much as they possibly can and still make both ends meet; the public on the other hand should not expect to find a John Wanamaker's in Sanford and should be as reasonable and considerate in their demands as humanly possible.

Local people might well take the attitude, in the interest of their home town's future growth and welfare, that they will reconcile themselves in large measure to the supplies which their own stores are able to carry; that they will anticipate future requirements sufficiently in advance to enable local merchants to order for them if the desired stock does not happen to be on hand; and that they will give the local merchants every possible preference before buying out of town.

If they will do that, they will find that the local stores will keep pace with the growth of their town; that they will improve the quality and variety of the goods they will improve the duality and variety of the goods they carry as their business increases; and that prices too will be lower as local business is stimulated. Better support of local stores is sure to result in better stores.

The problem of trading out of town is not an insoluble one, but it requires the wholehearted co-operation of everyone concerned.

Handbill Ordinances

Because the practice of circulating handbills as a substitute for legitimate advertising during the depression had become such a widespread nuisance that public opinion demanded something be done about it, a number of cities passed ordinances prohibiting any distribution of handbills, pamphlets or circulars whatspever. The Supreme Court has just held that such ordinances are unconstitutional.






