

Celery Feds Are Primed To Tackle New Smyrna Team

Russell McCracken Brings Big Squad To City Tomorrow

The Celery Feds of Seminole High School went through their last practice this afternoon for their game tomorrow with New Smyrna. The game starts at the usual time of 8:00 P. M.

The squad has appeared to have more spirit this week than any time since the season began, the victory over St. Augustine apparently having done a great deal toward reviving the lagging spirit of the team.

One factor that will work against the Seminole gridder is the loss of three regulars from the practice this week due to their

having been called to National Guard camp last Sunday. The three are Robert Stansland, Jimmy Renaud, and Charlie Leavitt.

Captain Leonard L. McCracken said he would have to send to Key Stone Heights tomorrow afternoon to get the boys and then would have to send them back after the game or early Friday morning.

Out of the game with St. Augustine last Friday were Danny Altman and Dub Epps and Jimmy Renaud. All three will be ready to go tomorrow, McCracken said.

The Seminole coach refused to predict victory over the New Smyrna eleven of Russell McCracken, former assistant to McCracken for two years, but said he thought the boys would win the best games of the year.

Live Oak Team To Meet Big Ten Foe In Gainesville

For the second week in succession, the powerful Swannock High Bulldogs, the only undefeated and untied team in the Northeast Conference, will face a non-loop foe Friday night at Live Oak, meeting the Mallets Thanksgiving Day at Live Oak.

The only other conference foe left on the schedule of Coach C. L. Duncan's high-geared Swannock eleven is Klerinus High of St. Augustine. The Bulldogs will play the Mallets Thanksgiving Day at Live Oak.

Swannock will be a top-heavy favorite to defeat the Ancient City boys and cop their first Northeast Conference crown with a record of six wins and no defeats.

The Swannock-St. Paul's tilt, postponed October 27 and tentatively set for Tuesday night, December 5, has been cancelled.

Three intra-conference games are slated for Friday night, New Smyrna Beach invading Sanford, Leon of Tallahassee visiting Daytona Beach, and Deland journeying to Leesburg.

The New Smyrna Beach eleven unbeaten in three conference tilts

but tied by Leesburg, is being coached this season by Mac McCracken, who was an assistant mentor last year at Sanford.

Other games this week involving conference teams pit Ocala against Andrew Jackson at Micanopy, Klerinus against the Stars D. and B. School in an all-St. Augustine struggle, Palatka against Starke at Palatka, and Lake City against Cross City at Lake City.

St. Paul's and Esquia have open dates, the game scheduled between St. Paul's and St. Joseph's Academy of St. Augustine having been postponed indefinitely.

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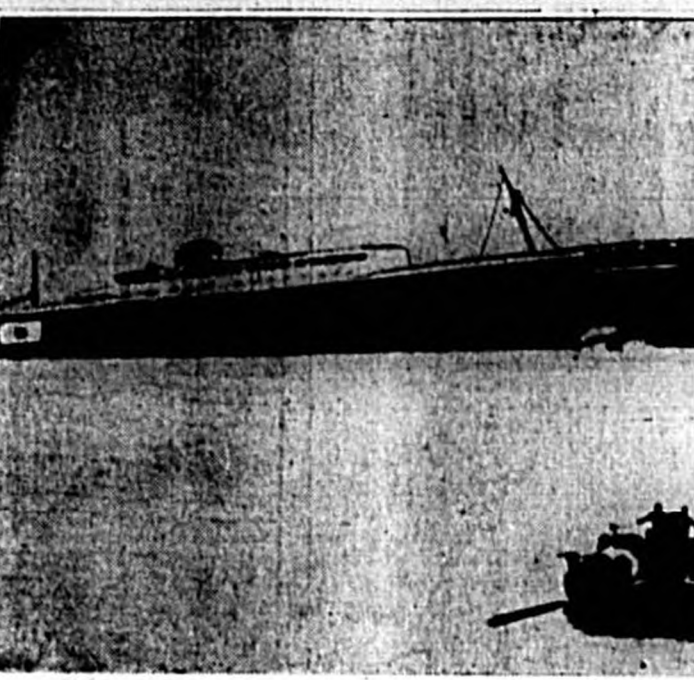
Half Nation Eats Turkey For Dinner

Roosevelt, Expresses Hope World Will Soon Be At Peace; Is At Warm Springs

Thanksgiving families in 25 states sat down today at the "first table" of the nation's dual Thanksgiving. Joining in President Roosevelt's expressed hope that the world soon will be at peace.

The "second table" will not be served until next Thursday in states whose governors declined to follow the President's decision to advance the holiday a week.

High Cost Of War Related To British

Losses At Sea Off East Coast Of Britain Mount With Further Sinkings

Air Raiders Are Unusually Active

Germans Taunt English Over Deception In Radio Trick

Great Britain learned today from the chancellor of the exchequer, Sir John Simon, that the war is costing her \$23,580,000 a day while maritime losses, particularly off the mine-strewn east coast continue to mount.

Newest naval casualty was the British destroyer Gipsy which struck a mine and was beached. Forty men were listed as missing.

Sanford Works As President Observes Early Thanksgiving

Turkeys had little to fear in Sanford and the rest of the state today as Florida and 26 other states decided to observe Thanksgiving on the traditional last Thursday in November which is next week.

Main indication that Thanksgiving is being observed today by part of the country was flying American flags along the streets of the City, closed doors of the Post Office, and both of Sanford's two banks. Otherwise there was little to indicate that this was "Turkey Day."

British Admiralty Announces That "Wild" Mine Sunk Destroyer Gipsy

LONDON, Nov. 23.—(AP)—The Admiralty announced last night that a "wild" mine had sunk the British destroyer Gipsy, seventh of the North Sea region that has become a graveyard for British and neutral shipping because of Germany's alleged indiscriminate sowing of mines in violation of international law.

The Admiralty's announcement said the Gipsy struck a mine "and subsequently was beached" but eye-witness accounts said that immediately after the explosion the vessel settled on the shallow sea-bottom within plain view of the shore.

The 40 men estimated to have been lost with the Gipsy, beached off-shore with bridge and spar deck awash, were reported brought to more than 1,500 of the number of lives lost by the British Navy in the sinkings of the seven warships.

The Gipsy was the second British destroyer to be sunk by a mine, the loss of another with one life lost having been announced on Nov. 14.

Fritz Kuhn Admits Lying To Shield Florence Camp

NEW YORK, Nov. 23.—(AP)—Fritz Kuhn admitted yesterday he had lied to shield a woman he once called his "Golden Angel" and then said he gruffly cleared his affection for her had changed quickly under the day-long embarrassment of hearing his awkwardly indited love letters read out to a grinning courtroom.

For he realized, as well as the next man, that those letters obviously had come into the prosecution's hands from the "Angel" herself—Mrs. Florence Camp, a divorcee.

Hundreds Feared To Be Dead In Quakes

ANKARA, Turkey, Nov. 23.—(AP)—Hundreds were feared killed and many villages destroyed by violent, intermittent earth shocks over a 24-hour period throughout Anatolia, in the western section of Turkey.

Six villages were reported leveled in east Anatolia. Deaths were high, especially in Erzingan, where weather increased suffering among hundreds of homeless.

ANTI-TRUST INDICTMENTS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23.—(AP)—The Justice Department announced yesterday that a federal grand jury in New York had indicted a trade association, seven corporations and 12 individuals engaged in sand and gravel industry on charges of violating the Sherman Anti-Trust Act.

Bagwell And Williams To Present Case In Favor Of Project

Ralph Bagwell and Fred T. Williams will leave Saturday for Washington where a hearing before the board of army engineers on behalf of the St. Johns-Indian River Canal is scheduled for Monday.

Included in the party will be John W. Campbell of Palatka, George Gillis, Arthur N. Keller, Howard Helots, George T. Blume, and Col. Gilbert A. Youngberg of Jacksonville.

The hearing is scheduled for 9:00 o'clock Monday morning. Mr. Bagwell said advice reaching Sanford indicated that Senators Claude Pepper and Charles O. Andrews and Congressman Joe Hendricks will be present.

Pepper Predicts Neutrality Law Will Save U. S.

TALLAHASSEE, Nov. 23.—(AP)—Senator Claude Pepper predicted last night that neutrality legislation enacted by the last session of Congress definitely will keep the United States out of the European war, which he believed is a long one.

Pepper, who returned home here for the Thanksgiving holidays, described the European war as a "conflict for mastery of Europe and for mastery of billions of people."

Locke Is Indicted For Stealing Tree At Big Tree Park

Denmark Montgomery Charged With Fatal Shooting Of Woman

Elis Locke was indicted yesterday by the Seminole County Grand Jury for the alleged theft of a large cypress tree from the Big Tree Park at Longwood. The indictment charged him with "stealing from the land of another and taking and carrying away of the same."

A grand jury also indicted Sheriff C. M. Bond arrested Locke several weeks ago when it was discovered that the cypress had been removed.

The Big Tree Park is already one of Seminole County's greatest attractions and is expected to be more so when a \$30,000 WPA improvement project is completed. The project includes a fine new road to the Big Tree.

Scientists Find Skeleton Remains Near Marineland

MARINELAND, Fla., Nov. 23.—Scientists conducting an extensive study of the Marineland ancient shell mounds discovered today the human skeleton remains of a prehistoric man which is believed to be one of the most unusual "finds" in the history of Florida archaeology.

Under the supervision of Dr. Vernon Lammie, the prehistoric houses, designed more elaborate than the bottom strata of a large mound. Closely resemblingly tight long sleeves, and waitlines were usually draped instead of belted. "Washerwoman" dresses had skirts that could be shortened to day length or dropped down to instep. 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bling eye features, the well-preserved remains are easily recognized by even a layman to be "extremely unusual."

The upper jaw and teeth protrude almost directly away from the face. The hair line is low and creates the "shaggy" appearance so often identified with the caveman type. The cranium is full with a slight crease running from forehead to the base of the skull and the eye sockets show definite signs of the prehistoric period.

"It is one of the most unusual skulls I have ever seen," stated Dr. W. J. Winter, of the Carnegie Institution. "I am most anxious to follow a complete study with the hope that something of great scientific interest can be learned."

The Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D. C. was rushed pictures of the discovery and word was received from Dr. Max Stirling, Chief of the Bureau of Ethnology, and considered a foremost authority, that the interesting subject had been turned over immediately to Dr. Thomas Stewart, assistant curator of the Division of Physical Anthropology, U. S. National Museum, for his comments.

"Finding of the body in the lower strata of the mound," said Dr. Lammie, indicates, with other comparisons, that the "man" is over 1,000 years old. Because of the features of the skull, I feel confident in saying the discovery is one of the most important Florida finds in recent years."

Florida Cattle Owners Rapidly Improving Stock

Better Pastures And New Practices Are Big Aid To Industry

By CLYDE BEALE
GAINESVILLE, Nov. 23—

Florida's cattle industry is on the march. From the gently rolling land of Alachua county to the Das mountains plains of Highlands county, and other southern counties, cattlemen are working with vim and initiative to make their industry second to none in the country.

Representatives of federal and private financing agencies, the University of Florida College of Agriculture, Agricultural Adjustment Administration, railroads and other agencies and numerous other first-hand information on the remarkable progress that has been made when they recently went on an extensive tour of cattle and range in the north central and southern sections of the state.

Persons on the tour saw hundreds of sleek, fat cattle and thousands of acres of fine new pastures. "This tour," said Walter J. Sheely, Extension animal husbandman, "would convince anyone that the Florida cattlemen have realized the importance of improved breeding practices and good pastures."

The cattlemen are following the advice of workers of the University of Florida College of Agriculture to improve their herds by improved breeding practices as shown by the fine black Angus cattle on the Simonton and Edwards ranches in Marion county, the Herefords on the Roseberry farm in Marion and the Williams ranch in Polk and the Brahman on the Parlin ranch in Ocala.

Mowing machines have been brought into play on ranges in Marion, Ocala, Polk, Hardee and Highlands counties. Giant hay mowers, choppers, and other heavy implements, powered by tractors, have been used in Highlands, Glades, Hendry, Charlotte, and other southern counties to rid land of saw palmetto, scrub oaks and other undesirable growth so that carpet, napier, bermuda, and Para grass could be planted.

Thousands of acres of muck and sand-muck lands, once covered by rank, tough growth of palmetto, now have good grass sods. J. Williams, president of the Florida Cattlemen's Association, exhibited a large number of sleek Hereford-napier cross cows on a carpet grass pasture at his Polk county ranch and explained that they had never had feet other than grass.

While mowing machines cut mature Para grass by the ton to be hauled to a new section he was developing for pasture, Jesse Durranco, Highlands county cattlemen, explained that he was planting 40 acres of new pasture a day.

Areas cleared of palmetto and saw myrtle and planted to carpet grass were shown persons on the tour by cattlemen in Glades, Hendry, Charlotte, and Highlands counties. Instead of the useless underbrush that formerly grew on these ranges were covered with good grass and grazing cattle.

County agents, who had charge of the tour in their respective counties, and many cattlemen pointed out that the great development of pastures now going on in the state would have been impossible without the assistance and cooperation of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration.

The tour was sponsored by the Florida Cattlemen's Association and directed by Mr. Sheely. Its purpose, according to Mr. Sheely and Mr. Williams, was twofold: "We wanted to show cattlemen what other members of the industry are doing to improve their herds and pastures and we wanted to convince private and federal lending agencies that the Florida livestock industry is worthy of financial support and cooperation from them."

Florida Shark Becoming Real State Industry

TALLAHASSEE, Nov. 23.—Scientific research is transforming the Florida shark from a pest into a valuable commercial asset, Dr. L. L. Rusoff, assistant professor of animal nutrition at the University of Florida, told members of the Florida Academy of Sciences here today at Florida State College for Women.

The Florida shark industry has grown in three years from a \$5,000 infant to a thriving business already bringing \$100,000 into the state annually, he said.

Not only that but Florida shark liver oil tested at the University of Florida has been found to be from 4 to 16 times as rich in Vitamin A as ordinary cod liver oil, he said.

Dr. Rusoff gave two papers on "The Shark Fishing Industry of Florida" and "The Vitamin A Content of the Liver Oil of the Florida Lemon Shark" at the annual session of the fourth annual convention.

He said the "avenues to Florida shark and shark livers, the source of Florida waters, is being formed into one of the most valuable industries, a new source of health and wealth."

Commercial shark fishing is an old industry in Florida, he said, stating that the Ocean Leather company of New York, N. J., had caught sharks for over 20 years for their hides and fins.

The shark fin is made into highly prized leather which is used in the manufacture of shoes, luggage, notebooks, belts and other necessities. The fins are used to make shark fin soup, a rare delicacy among the Chinese.

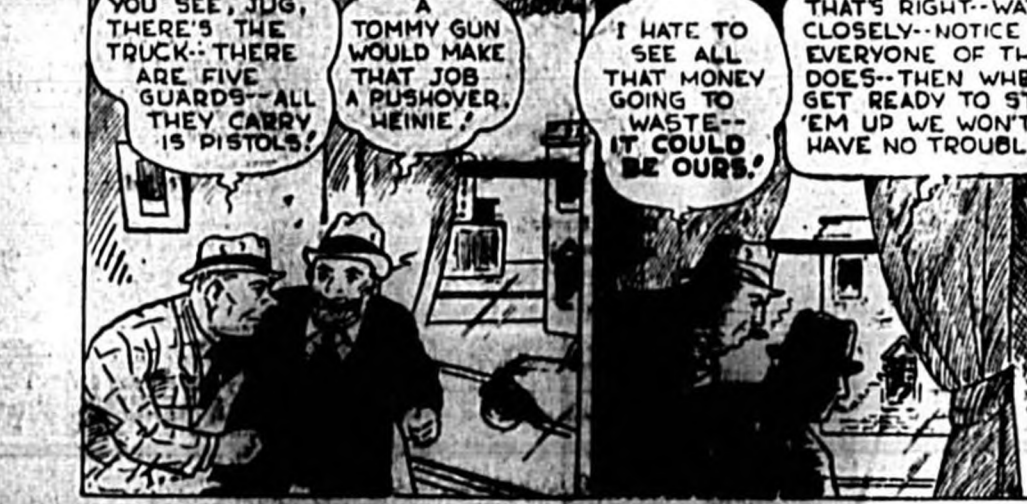
