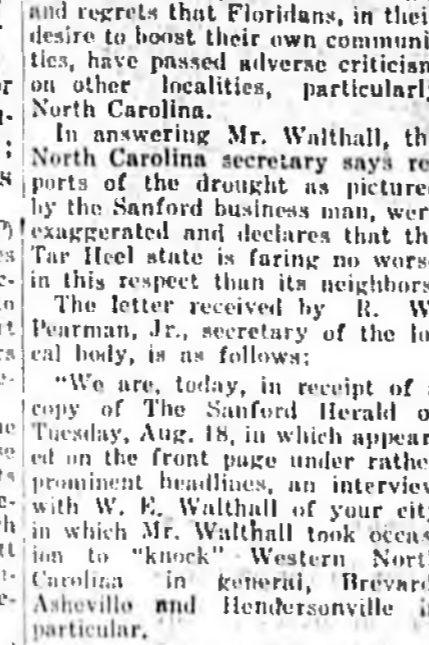

## SETTLEMENT OF LAND DISPUTE IS DANIELS' DESIRE

Old Settler Becomes Willing Prisoner on Trespassing Charge In Order to Bring Matters to Head at Once  
MAYNARD, Aug. 25.—(AP)—Capt. Jim Daniels, resident of Marco Island, fifty-one years, was in the Collier County Jail today, a willing prisoner in the effort to bring about a legal adjudication of the dispute over the strip of "lost land" on the island.  
Captain Daniels, who had filed a claim on the property held by representatives of Barron G. Collier, New York advertising man, was charged with trespassing as a result of his excursion today into the disputed area where he announced his intention of constructing a home.  
The territory over which the controversy has been waged for several years between Collier and the old residents of the island is not included in Government surveys of the section. Captain Daniels and his faction assert the land in question is the property of Collier, of Government and is, by right, open for homestead settlers.  
Nine deputies seized the old settler today when he cut a fence and he cut a fence and he crossed the line established by Sheriff W. R. Maynard, who has been supporting the claims of the New York advertising magnate. The posse was under the guidance of Barron G. Collier, nephew of Barron G. Collier, and son of the Mayor of the Everglades.  
The old settlers, who spokesman and leader is Walter Williams, seek by the arrest of their representative and the national court action which will follow to compel Collier to prove his ownership of the disputed territory.  
A decision against the Collier faction, Williams said today, will be followed by the irash on the disputed ground of other settlers who are waiting to file their homestead claims.  
Sheriff Maynard left the island for the first time in several weeks. He announced he would go to Tallahassee to confer with Governor Martin. Barron G. Collier is expected to meet the Sheriff in Tallahassee.  
The faction opposed to the Collier interests in petitions and mass meetings have called on the Governor to remove Sheriff Maynard, who has been active in protecting the Collier claims.

## Dismal Swamp Fire Threatening Other Nearby Farm Lands

NORFOLK, Aug. 25.—(AP)—Fire in Dismal Swamp continued to eat their way through lowlands of underbrush and grass Monday, but aside from sending great clouds of smoke skyward and threatening surrounding farm land, they had done little damage. In several places they had been brought under control.  
In only one section had timber been burned, but the fire in that area was under control of fire fighters tonight and there appeared to be little chance of its spreading. In another section, probably four miles away efforts were being made to check the fire as it crawled along the edge of a ditch bank. This is charge of the work said it could be held there.  
The larger fire now is on the property of the Camp Manufacturing Company, about 18 miles from Norfolk, near the Norfolk and Western tracks, where timberland has been burned. The other one is on cut over land of the Richmond Cedar Works, not far from Deep Creek, and the company's own cut.

## Army Personnel To Be Decreased Under New Cut In Budget

### FIGHT TO OUTLAW WORD 'OBEY' GETS STINGING REBUKE

Colorado Offers Protest To Removing Word From Ceremony; Modern Family Life Is Renounced in Statement  
NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—(AP)—Just when it had been considered that the word 'obey,' so objectionable to many blushing brides, would be stricken from the Episcopal marriage ceremony with little or no debate, a protest, coupled with a scathing denunciation of modern family life, is voiced by the bishop of Colorado.

### Proposed Action May Mean That 10,000 Will Have To Be Dropped From Army

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25.—(AP)—Indications are that the army's budget for 1927 will be limited to a figure that will require new reductions in its enlisted and commissioned personnel. Although no authoritative estimates have been made available, there is a general feeling among war department officials that from 7,000 to 10,000 enlisted men will have to be dropped in addition possibly to one or two thousand officers.  
Prospects of a budget reduction and its effect upon the national forces have been made the subject of various studies by the general staff. Their net result appears to have brought a conviction that if appropriations for the army are reduced, only one course is open for the war department—to order a corresponding cut in officers and men.

### Reduction Totals Over Seven Million

Belief that the enlisted strength will be curtailed by seven to ten thousand is based, in accordance with the current signs, upon the effort made by Budget Director Lord last year to reduce the existing pay allowance for enlisted men from a \$18,500 man basis to about \$11,000. Only the stiff resistance of Secretary Weeks to that purpose saved the threatened cut then and it has been indicated ever since that a new fight on the same front was impending this year.

### War Heads Miss Opposition That Weeks Might Give Proposal

Concern in the staff of this question has deepened with developments involving the illness of Secretary Weeks and his inability to carry on as secretary of war since early in April. It has been stimulated also by President Coolidge's repeated pronouncements in favor of "relentless economy."  
May Cut Budget \$7,000,000  
That General Lord will ask the war department to reduce its budget \$7,000,000 for 1927, as against \$11,000,000 for 1926, is believed likely although a few of the more optimistic departmental officials think the reduction will not be more than \$5,000,000.  
Not only has the army's authorized strength been pared down, but lack of funds for supply needs has brought the reserve stocks of many kinds to a point of actual depletion. The army no longer is able to live on its own war-time stores, supply officers declare, and they believe the 1927 budget should be increased to allow them to lay in normal emergency supplies.

DELAND, Aug. 24.—(P)—Construction of homes and business buildings in the city of DeLand are now aggregating an average of 501 per year or an increase of more than 1,000 per cent over last year, according to a survey by the Commercial Club. This is an increase of 5,000 per cent over the number recorded three years ago.

Two hundred and eighty three licenses to sell real estate in DeLand have been issued since the first of the year, and a real estate association has been formed with a large membership.

### Seaboard Seeks Right To Construct Several Lines in This State

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24.—(P)—The Seaboard All Florida Railway Company today applied to the Interstate Commerce for authority to construct a line from West Palm Beach through Miami to Florida City and from Fort Ogden to LaBelle, Electro and Punta Rasa through Fort Myers.

The entire proposal is being backed by the Seaboard Air Line in a move to develop its Florida lines to meet the growth and increasing needs of that state in setting out reasons for carrying out their plan. The application stated that the dependence of a "large portion of the population of the United States" for its perishable vegetables and fruits during the dormant season in ocher areas and for their refuge from sev-

erities of more northern winters upon the state of Florida make construction and acquisition of other lines necessary to public need and convenience.

The application sets out that new construction is immediately necessary because of increasing property values in Florida which may later make building of a new road impracticable.

### Two Irish Wireless Stations Scrapped And Sold For Junk

DUBLIN, Aug. 22.—(P)—The two great Irish wireless stations at Clifden, County Galway, and at Ballyhunion, County Kerry, are being dismantled and sold in lots or broken up for scrap. Clifden, during the Irish fighting, was destroyed by the irregulars, and though compensation for the damage was made dependent on its reinstatement, the owners preferred not to reconstruct, and sold it to a Sheffield firm of iron merchants. The most conspicuous feature

of the plant was four steel masts, each 325 feet in height, and each with its guy ropes weighing 100 tons.

The Ballyhunion station was originally erected as a possible rival of the station at Clifden and was bought over by the owners of the latter and never used. Its masts were of wood and were 525 feet high. Difficulty in disposing of it is caused by the fact that there is no transport by rail. The monorail railway connecting Ballyhunion with the general railway system at Listowel has been discontinued. When constructed it was supposed that its smaller demand for space for the track would lead to its general adoption throughout Europe but it found no imitators.

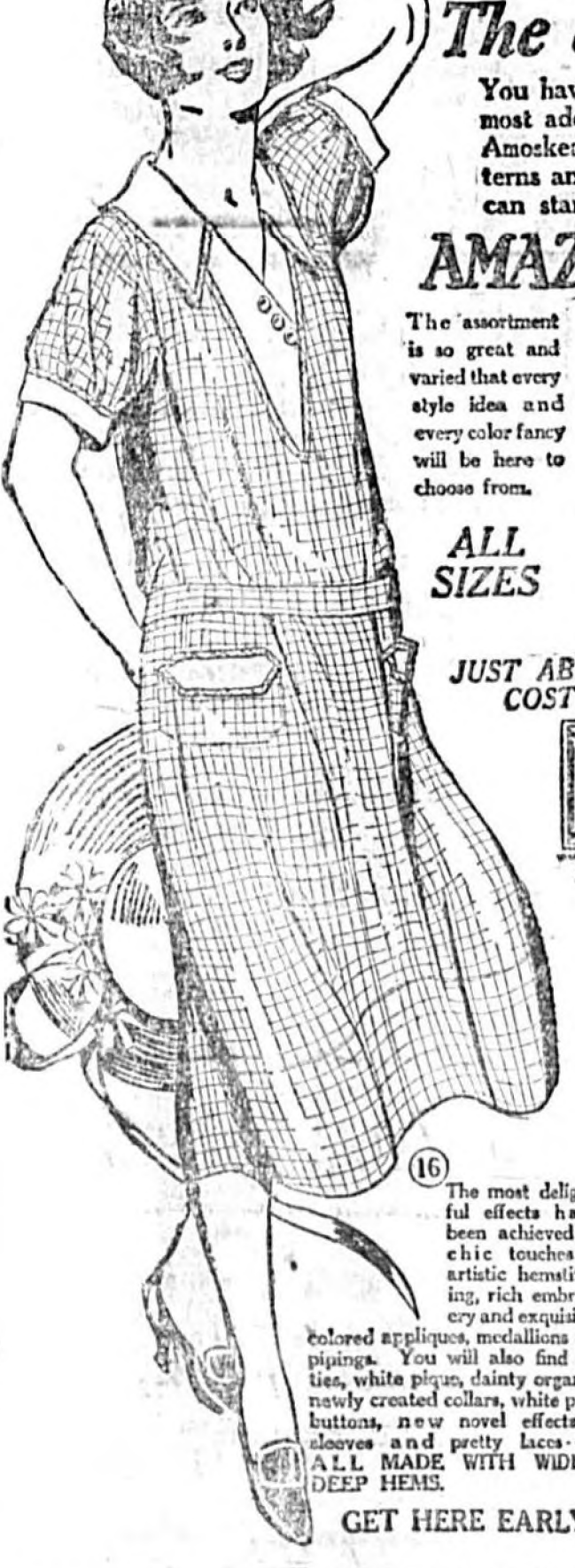

# Remains Monstrous Animal Believed To Be 18,000, 000 Years Old Found Recently

BROOKSVILLE, Ala., Aug. 25.—(P)—The remains of a monstrous animal, believed by Robert Murock of the Florida Rock Products Company of this city, in whose quarry they were found imbedded, to be 18,000,000 years old, and of a species long extinct, are being exhibited here and at Tampa.

The animal, believed to be a tyranosaurus, has footprints of four feet and the probable length of its jaw bone in proportion to its teeth and other bones discovered would be four feet and a conservative estimate would place it at 25 feet in length it was said.

The back molar by exact measurement is six and three quarter inches long and four inches wide. The roots are two and one half inches wide and three and a half to four inches long. There were probably five of these roots to one tooth, it was surmised.

The ivory enamel on the cusps is one-fourth inch thick. One perfect cusp stands above the body of the tooth an inch and a half. There is a distance of one and three quarters inch from one point of one cusp to the point of another. The cusps on one tooth are one and one half inches apart, there being four single cusps and a single cusp to each tooth.

The main nerve canal opening at the base of the teeth is one and three quarters inches in diameter. The tusk of the animal shows where the flesh and bone structure entered in cone shaped form. There are ten layers of ivory in this tusk. Each ring, said Martin Chambly, probably represents a cycle of a year of about 100 years. The huge molar teeth were found in the early age of 1,000 years, he declared.

One bone that was found is petrified, weighing four pounds. It is thought to be the ear bone. It measures six inches in length and four inches in width.

The discovery of the bones of the animal were made in mass of material found on the floor pit in the morning, following an all night excavation at the quarry.

The fact that the animal had tusks would indicate that it is a tyrannosaurus, he said.

On the other hand this may be the jaw bone of the dinosaur, whose broken tusk remains as evidence of the fray, Chamberlain declared.

## STEWART'S WASHINGTON LETTER

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—The American Federation of Labor already has its program for the next session of Congress very definitely worked out. It knows just what it wants and doesn't want it aims to get the former if it can; to do all in its power to prevent the latter, or put an end to it, if it exists now.

President William Green's opinion of his organization's policy is as clean cut and concise as the typical politician's discussion of party plans usually is uncertain and indefinite.

The federation scents a scheme, if Congress cuts out the surtax on big incomes, to put a sales tax in its place. "The average workman's living," President Green told me, "costs him practically all he makes. Taxes are passed along to him on everything. He carries the whole load—except the surtax. The man who sells to the workman makes a margin of profit. He includes his taxes in the prices of the goods he sells, and has his profit clear—

of everything but the surtax. Abolishing the surtax and imposing a sales tax would be putting the entire burden on the poorer man. The federation opposes it. We're for tax reduction, of course."

There's been considerable talk of action by President Coolidge to prevent further coal strike tieups. Nothing doing along that line, is the federation's view. "The supreme court," said President Green "already has held government interference with labor's wages or hours unconstitutional. Those are matters purely between the employers and employes. What's more, we shall oppose any attempt to restrict labor's normal activities further by government tribunals or boards.

We shall join the railroad labor group in an effort to pass the Howell-Barkley bill, providing for adjustment of disputes between the roads and their men by other than governmental means. We shall try to abolish the Railroad Labor Board.

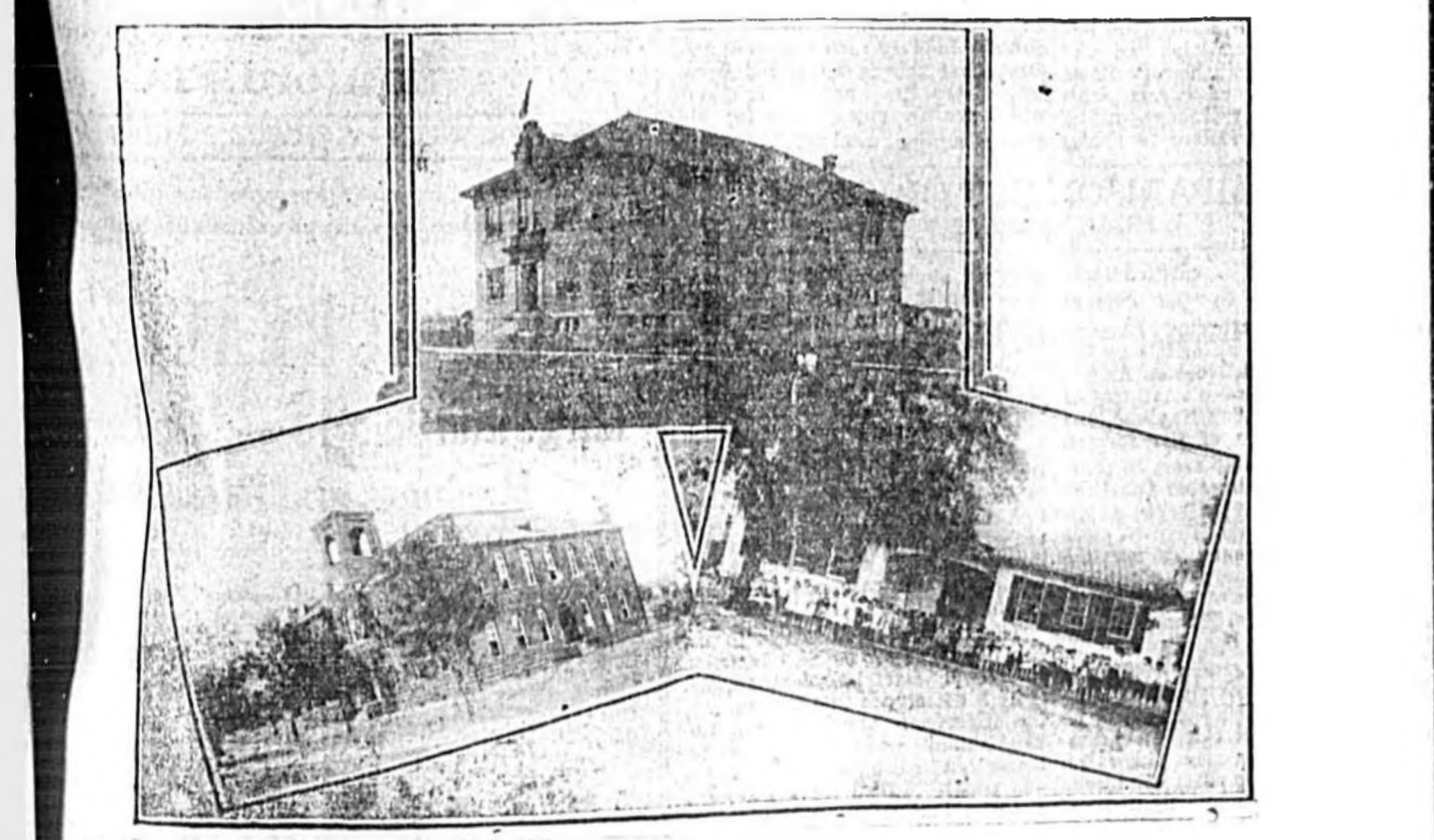

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—(AP)—Little remained today of the fear felt by the Pirates of Pittsburgh in former years when guests at New York's Polo Grounds for the men of McKeever turned back the National League champions for the fourth time in five attempts and gathered into themselves a lead of six full games—an impressive margin with fewer than 40 contests to play.

The fifth battle, the last of the series, was a 9 to 2 rout in which Ray Kremer, in the box for Pittsburgh, labored steadily, supported by tremendous hitting on the part of his mates. Three pitchers of the McGraw staff went to the fray and only one of them survived the attack, Walter Huntzinger holding Pittsburgh safe for three innings after the damage had been done.

Until the fifth inning there was a close contest, but here the youthful Wayland Dean, pitching for the Giants, slipped momentarily, and along with him went the Giant infield, even the remarkable Frisch contributing a misplay in an inning that saw the invaders score six runs. Johnny Rawlings shot a drive into the stands in the following frame, but it was unnecessary.

McGraw's hurling staff, represented in excellent condition before the sport started, stands shattered while that of the Pirates supposed to be crumbling, appears to be stronger than ever.

Pittsburgh was the first to score, picking up a run in the third inning on Kremer's triple and Moore's infield single. The Giants tied in their half on a base on balls to Frisch and singles by Meusel and Terry. The Pirates clinched it in the fifth with six runs, scored on only three hits. A base on balls to Kremer and singles by Moore and Rawlings filled the bases. Cuyler was hit by a pitched ball, forcing in Kremer, and Barnhart sent in Moore and Rawlings with a single.

Dear Ed:  
It's a funny quirk of community pride that no one will ever admit to a non-resident that he ever saw a mosquito in his home town.
