



SCIENTISTS ARE NOW DREEDING CROPS THAT WILL RESIST INSECTS

A new chapter is being written in the story of man's battle struggle that seems to grow more intense from year to year. The new chapter deals with the develsess resistance to certain crop pests, a step greatly desired by everyone who has had to struggle against pests to produce crops.

While new and more powerful insecticides are still coming on the scene, giving fresh succor to trolling peats, the discovery and development of varieties of diftance to pests is indeed encouraging. Department of Agriculture

Although work with other crops has been less extensive than that with wheat and corn, the Department men report striking results already in breeding sorghums resistant to chinch buz, barleys sesistant to the greet buy alfalfa resistant to pea aphid and polato leafhopper, sugarcane resistant to the augarcane horer, aunflower resistant to seed weevils, and even

They find records of resistance in nearly 100 different plants in-volving more than 100 different insect pests. No doubt the group will include plants of conomic importance in Florida if the breeding for resistance is carried on with such a large varie' 7 of plants. But the scientists tell us it is a slow process, even with plants that yield more than one crop a year. Anyway, Florida growers hope that they will succeed before many years and thus help to reduce a large annual pest control bill.

### Ultraviolet Light

Reducing Disease By ALTON L. BLAKESLEE

sacciated Press Science Reporter NEW YORK—A six year study at St. Luke's Hospital has showed a marked decrease in respirator; liseases through use of ultraviolei lights throughout an entire con-valescent building for children. Reporting the study in the New York State Journal of Medicine Drs. Gertrude M. Hyde and Regi-nald A. Higgons said they believed it was the first time such a build-ing was covered completely for air

#### Ceiling Lights

The lights, hung from the ceiling, irradiated only the upper hal of the rooms with ultraviole: light. It is the ultraviolet in sunlight that tank the skin. Burning night and day, the lights gave every cubic foot of air in the entire building a sterilizing effect equivalent to 100 complete changes of air every hour, they said.

At night the lights gave a faint low resembling moonlights, but the youngsters had no trouble sleeping. The usual night lights

The study covered three years without the lights, and three years with them. The figures "indicate a reduction of 33 per cent in the actual number of children feverish from respiratory diseases for the treated years as against the un-

treated years."

Disease Checked

The lights also appeared helpful, the physicians said, in limiting the spread of outbreaks of contagious diseases.

Some of the adult attendants also had dewer respirator; infections. The odor usually found in children's institutions disappear




