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FULL VALUE ASSESSMENT NOT MADE

GOV. TRAMMELL NOTES HARDSHIPS ON THE TAX PAYERS

Tallahassee, Fla., Feb. 28, 1916.

It is very apparent that the attitude of Governor Park Trammell, regarding the basis upon which the 1916 tax assessment should be made is going to result in the assessment being made upon a fifty per cent basis, instead of being raised to a full cash value basis as recently ordered by the State Tax Commission.

The Governor has already received replies from a majority of the tax assessors agreeing to his position upon the subject. To have raised the assessment to a full cash value basis would, as pointed out by the Governor, have resulted in the taxpayers of the state having to pay a very much increased state and county tax.

The increase for 1916 in the state taxes alone would have amounted to four hundred and fifty thousand dollars on account of millages the Governor had no authority to reduce, and the county tax in some of the other states would have amounted to not less than two or three million dollars.

The Tax Commission has been in session for some time and has been studying the various reports of the assessors and the various proposals for the assessment of the state.

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ALLIES HEED THE REQUEST OF AMERICA

WAR CLOUD WILL DISAPPEAR FROM OUR HORIZON

Washington, Feb. 28.—With the apparent quieting down of the situation in Congress the submarine crisis shifts back to the negotiations between Secretary Lansing and Count von Bernstorff.

Mr. Lansing said today there was no intention of transferring the negotiations to Berlin to be conducted between Ambassador Gerard and the Berlin foreign office, as was intimated in dispatches published abroad.

While the situation in Congress apparently is being held in check by the administration leaders, the state department continues to await receipt of certain appendices to the Austro-German notice, which are intended to demonstrate that British armed ships have used their guns offensively against submarine.

On the situation as it now stands President Wilson is to be seen in his de-M. negotiations to secure the right of Americans to travel on ships armed for defense only.

From German sources come suggestions that the Teutonic governments were inspired to issue their new notice by the American proposal to the allied powers proposing a program of inspection of ships and submarines.

The British government has not repented the American suggestion, but is consulting her allies. The same sources pointed out that the British or French merchant ships have come under American ports with arms since the United States expressed a preference for the armament in question.

Though technically an entirely separate question from that of the right of merchant ships to carry defensive armament, the Lusitania case remains in abeyance because the state department fears that the German pledges to refrain from attacking liners without warning may not extend to future operations.

Therefore, the department has called upon the German government for information on that point and is now awaiting a response.

The Silo Question Will Make You Money

I wish to again call the attention of Sanford truckers to the matter of beef production from corn silage that can be grown on our truck farms after lettuce and celery crops are removed.

Northern farmers are spending the entire year to do this thing that we can do as a catch crop proposition, not interfering with our lettuce and celery business in the least, but on the other hand, benefitting it greatly.

The man who will feed a hundred beef cattle for ninety days will be practically sure of a profit of not less than \$1800.00, and the compost heap resulting from his cattle feeding will rejuvenate his farm for lettuce and celery production.

We have needed something of this kind to give backbone to our farming operations here at Sanford and to make us more independent of the variable and uncertain vegetable market with which we are forced to deal every year, and there is no doubt but that there is a comfortable living to be earned out of beef production from corn silage, as seen from the vegetable business by any Sanford farmer who will make the effort. Every reasonable assistance will be rendered by our banks, our state department and government department of agriculture in furthering this business.

Only Two Days From Latest Date It Can Occur

March 8 will be a Wednesday in the year 1916. It will be the latest date of the year for the celebration of the Easter festival. 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FLORIDA'S SOLDIERS

State Will Furnish Two Thousand Under New Plan

Washington, D. C., Feb. 28. Under the new plan for building up the country's military forces that has been drafted by the house committee on military affairs, the state of Florida will be called upon the first year for at least 2,000 militiamen, or an average of 500 for each congressional district. At the rate of \$49 a year for enlisted men the Florida guardsmen would receive \$96,000 annually from the federal government and the pay for the officers would bring the total up to over \$100,000.

The house committee estimates that its plan of preparedness will cost \$155,000,000 for the first year, exclusive of coast fortifications, which are provided for in a separate bill. This is about \$15,000,000 less than Secretary Garrison asked for and about \$50,000,000 under the sum required to finance the war college program.

Of the \$155,000,000 it is proposed to spend approximately \$11,000,000 for the pay of the national guard. It is estimated that this sum will pay at least 200,000 militiamen which is, in round numbers, as many as may be expected to enlist the first year. The next year 250,000 guardsmen are hoped for and the next appropriation bill will have to be increased proportionately.

The \$500,000 increase in the regular army will cost approximately \$30,000,000 annually, or somewhat less than \$1,000 for each man. This item consumes the larger part of the increased appropriation for the military establishment, including, as it does, the pay and subsistence of the additional troops.

The remainder of the \$100,000,000 increase in the appropriation will be used for the purchase of arms, equipment, and other military supplies. The \$100,000,000 increase in the appropriation will be used for the purchase of arms, equipment, and other military supplies.

Another phase of the situation which is of direct interest to Florida is the favorable report made by the military affairs committee on the McKellar bill appropriating approximately \$4,000,000 for more extensive military training in private and military schools. The money is to be used to pay tuition of 100 or more boys who will agree to take military instruction along West Point lines for four years and who upon graduation will be available for service with the reserve. This money is to be paid to any state that does not itself appropriate half of the amount from its own treasury and abide by regulations to be prescribed by the War Department. McKellar expects to propose similar legislation for other states.

Mildew Attacks Roses

Mildew on roses may be controlled by spraying with fungicides. In advanced stages of the disease, however, remedies are apt to be disappointing, according to P. H. Rolfe, of the University of Florida College of Agriculture. Control may be afforded before the disease has advanced to such a stage that the affected parts will be sufficient for in others systematic spraying must be done.

Dusting with flowers of sulfur helps some, but it is not so effective as some of the recognized fungicides. Among those which can be used are lime sulfur solution or some of the soluble sulfur compounds, ammoniacal solution of copper carbonate, and bordeaux mixture. Bordeaux, however, is objectionable because it stains the leaves.

The first treatment which Professor Rolfe recommends, where the plants are badly infested, is pruning. Take out all the parts which are severely attacked and all those which show black blotches. Then follow with the spray.

Seven Cows Made Him Rich. Wert Love, who died recently at Warfa started as a cowboy without even a horse that he could call his own and became a millionaire owner of vast herds and a ranch that was a domain within itself as near as El Paso (Tex.) dispatch to the Philadelphia North American.

A resident of West Texas since 1885, Wert Love was known to every cowboy man from Fort Worth to El Paso. He had his peculiar characteristics, and credit was one of them. But while he was frugal he never allowed a genuine case of distress to go unrelieved. When other cowboys were drawing their wages in good luck in the eighties and riding to El Paso or San Antonio to spend the money in riotous living or over the gaming table, Wert Love was putting his earnings into cows. His start was seven cows. At his death he could not have counted all the cattle in his herd if he had ridden hard for a month at the task. His first work after coming West was for Jim Powell, a cousin, near Fort Davis. He was a more boy, and received only \$25 a month and his board. He refused to take any money except that necessary to buy his clothes, which were few, and asked to be paid in cows.
