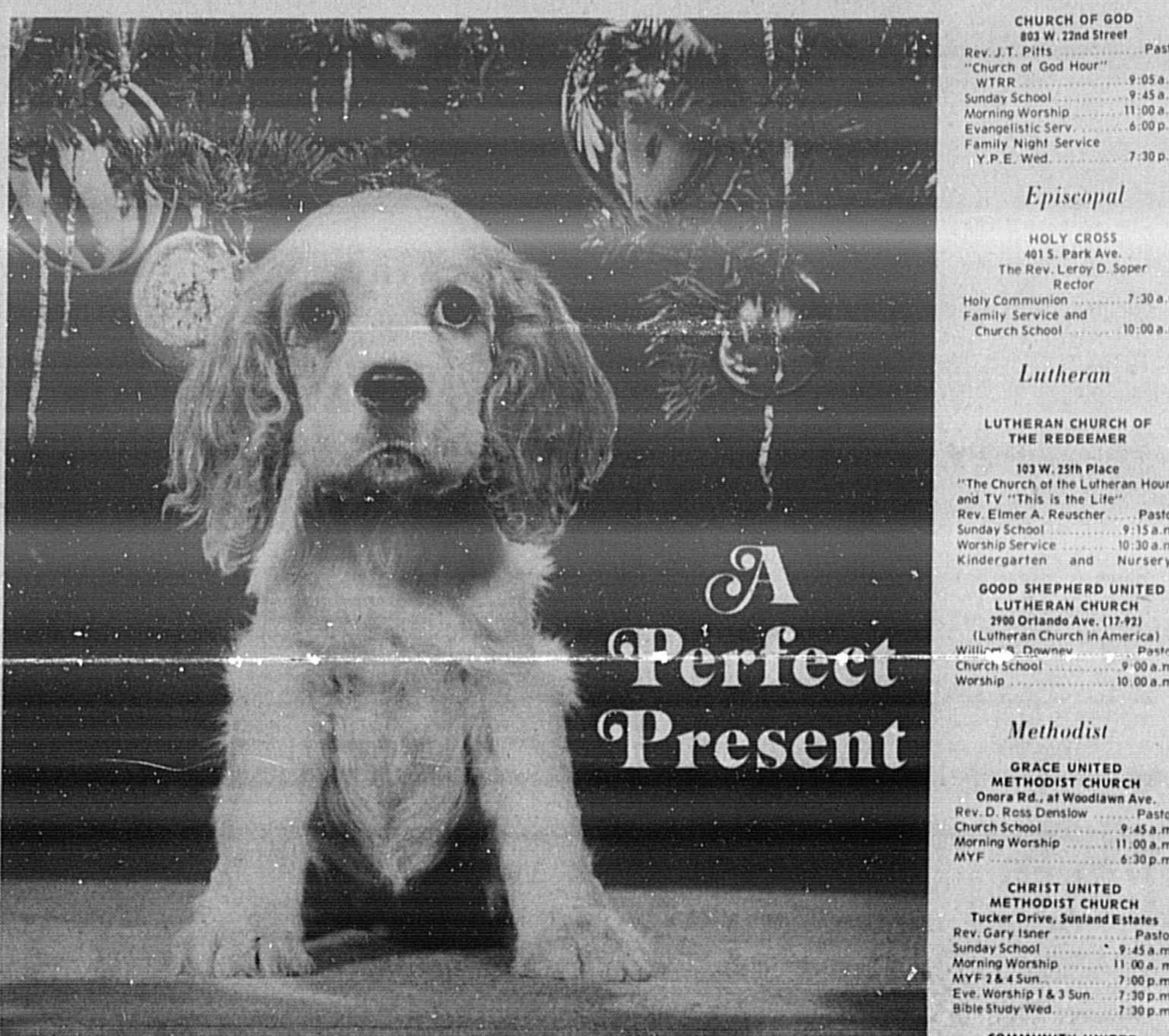

Agreement Reached At Mideast Summit

GENEVA, Switzerland (AP) — The Middle East peace conference adjourned today with agreement to work quickly to separate the tangled Israeli and Egyptian forces on the Suez Canal. Today's final session lasted a mere 15 minutes because agreement on the committee had been worked out beforehand in contacts between Kissinger, Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko and chief delegates from Israel, Egypt and Jordan. The formation of the committee was seen as a positive step to keep the movement of the conference under way until after the Israeli national elections Dec. 31.

VICTORIA, B.C. (AP) — Three men who survived a month of drifting at sea, powerless, without sails and eventually without food, also were kept from reaching port by poor weather after being rescued by a helicopter.

WASHINGTON (AP) — A hopelessly hamstringing House energy bill early today. Then it refused to let Congress take a month's vacation. The House voted down the Senate bill 219 to 234. Many congressmen opposed the Senate bill because it did not contain a restriction on windfall profits for oil companies.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Small Business Administration plans to fire two officials who have figured prominently in a congressional probe of alleged corruption within that agency, an SBA spokesman says. The spokesman said the pair—Russell Hamilton, former chief of the Philadelphia regional office and Thomas F. Regan, former chief of the Richmond, Va., office—and a third official were notified Friday that they face dismissal within 30 days.

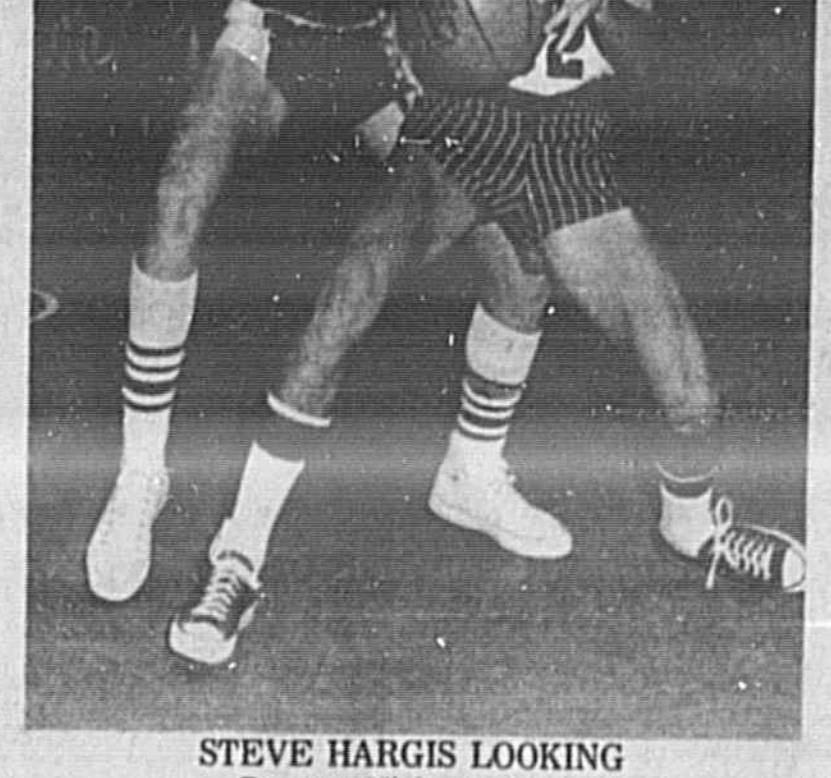

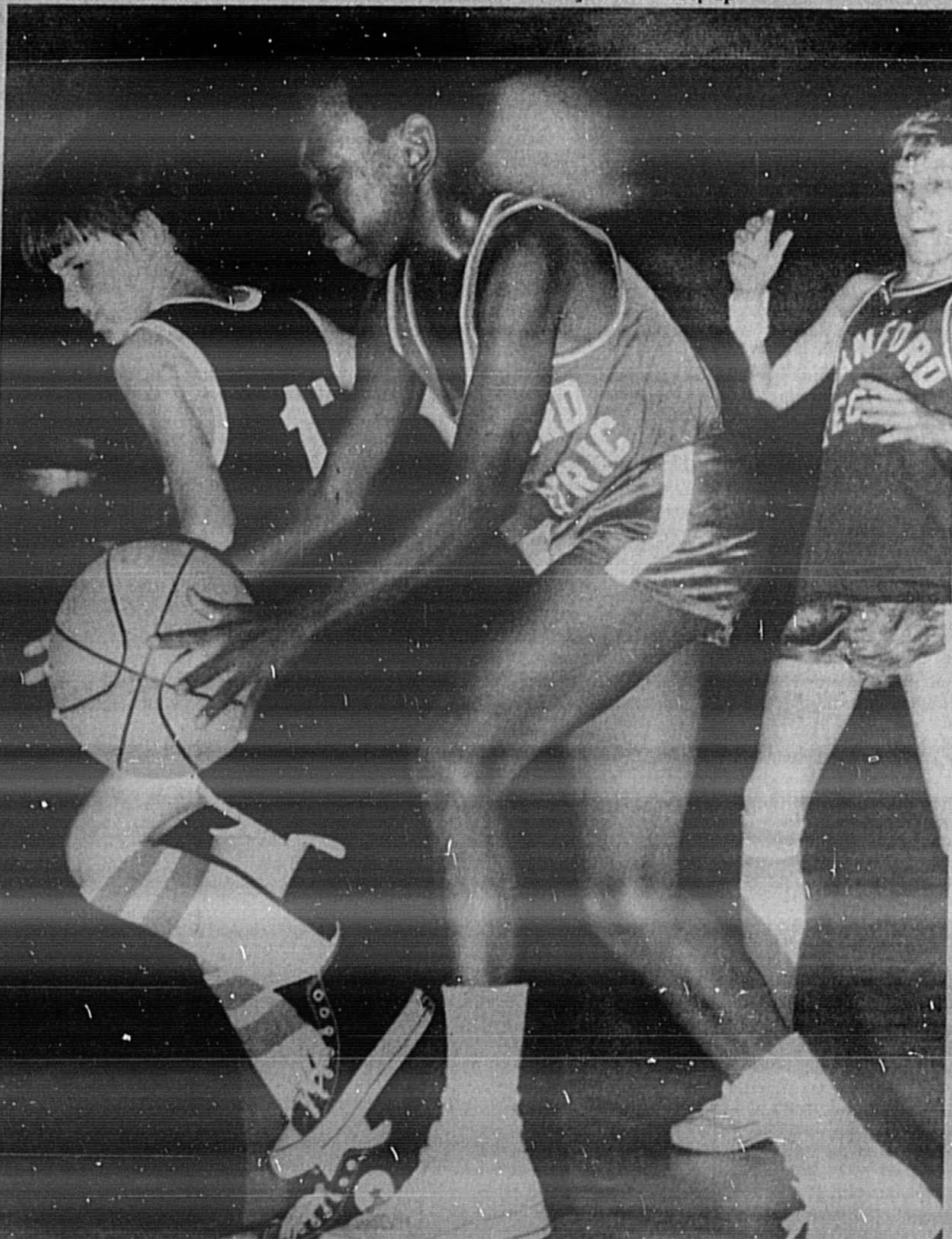

Stone's Senate Goals Could Help Askew Move

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—Secretary of State Richard Stone's U.S. Senate ambitions could give Gov. Reubin Askew a crack at appointing a kindred soul to the Cabinet.

And that could spell trouble for Harmon Shields, the marine resources director who apparently will be named natural resources director by a 4-3 Cabinet vote on Jan. 3.

There's a good possibility that Stone, expected to announce his Senate candidacy shortly, will resign his state office sometime between January and July. A number of Stone's friends are urging him to resign if he seeks the Senate.

Their reason is that the secretary of state is Florida's chief elections officer and has gained new responsibilities under the 1973 law creating the Elections Violations Commission.

Political opponents might stick a hard-to-shake conflict of interest tag on Stone if he holds his office. The new law makes the attorney general a pinch-hitter for Stone if questions arise concerning his race but the applications of that act have yet to be tested.

Stone declined comment on the possibility of a resignation, saying, "I'll discuss that when I discuss my intentions."

But he offered this glimpse into his thought processes: "Obviously any officeholder who is an elections officer who is either running for reelection or running for other office has to be concerned about the possibility of conflict of interest."

Although a resignation could enhance Stone's candidacy it might be delayed until July, when the qualifying period for candidates ends.

If Stone created a Cabinet vacancy by resigning Askew would appoint the new secretary of state and undoubtedly would opt for someone who shares his views on vital issues.

And, from Askew's point of view, the selection of a new natural resources director is one of the most vital issues facing the Cabinet.

Christian Says Bus Halt Won't Solve Fuel Lack

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—Education Commissioner Floyd Christian believes it would be a mistake to end busing schoolchildren "on the pretext of saving fuel."

"I think it's a red herring," he said. "It won't save any money. Those members of Congress who because of the fuel shortage are going to tackle busing are making a mistake."

Education officials point out that of the 690,149 students bused to school in Florida, 79.8 per cent are in counties where a federal court has ordered busing to achieve a racial balance in the classrooms.

Therefore, the officials said, the legislature could not end busing without changing the views of several federal judges.

Christian said he thought it would be unfair to go back to neighborhood schools "because in many instances there are no more neighborhood schools."

Many schools that used to be primarily for black students have either been closed or torn down, he said. Also a large number of schools are now consolidated and no longer located a few blocks from every pupil's home.

Christian said he doubted now if many parents would favor the disruption that would result from the elimination of busing and redrawing of school boundaries.

As recently as a year ago the busing issue was still a fiery topic in Florida.

'Uncertain' Christian World Preparing To Celebrate Birth

Christians today prepared to celebrate Christmas as best they can despite shortages of gasoline, heating oil and electricity, an uncertain economic outlook and the threat of terrorist attacks in some areas.

In Bethlehem, the little town where Christmas began with the birth of Jesus some 2,000 years ago, merchants prepared for the annual influx of pilgrims for midnight mass in the Church of the Nativity.

But the general prediction was for fewer than last year's poor turnout of 5,000 because of the October war and the Palestinian terrorist attack in Rome and Athens last week.

"This is the worst Christmas in years," said one busy souvenir shop owner. "We sometimes get more tourists in midsummer."

From Tokyo to Paris and Berlin shoppers scurried to complete their last minute shopping with stores generally reporting increased sales despite the past year's inflation. Some store managers in Europe and the United States noted, however, that expensive items were not selling as usual.

Pope Paul VI was breaking tradition by celebrating Christmas Eve midnight mass before thousands in St. Peter's Basilica. For the past 26 years the annual Christmas Eve mass was held in the Sistine Chapel for diplomats accredited to the Holy See.

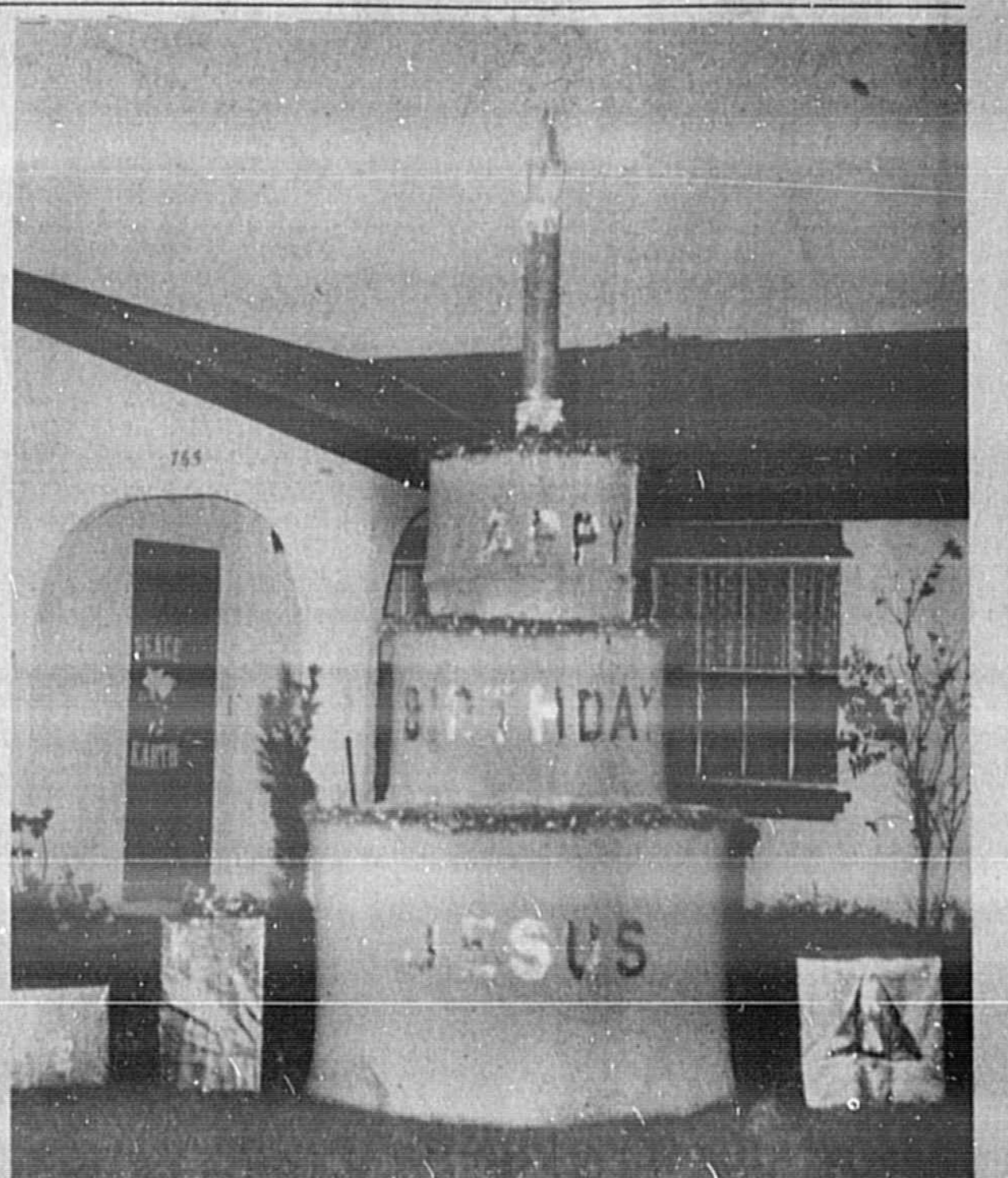
