

Seminole Also Destroys School Books

Since the Orange County School Board has come under fire for the recent dumping of tons of text books, Seminole County officials say "unwanted books" are a problem here as well in every other county in the state.

"I hate to admit it, but last year we had to dump two dump trucks full of books at the dump because nobody wanted them," Don Coleman, Seminole text-book manager said.

When Coleman said the state has to approve the disposal of books and there are several steps that must be followed, "They are not thrown away in indiscriminately," he explained. "First we try to use them in the county school system. We send out a list of all surplus books we have to all the county schools. After our schools have first choice then we send a list to the state education office and they send it to every state school principal who then has access to the books at no charge," Coleman said.

"The next step is trying to sell them. Ads are run and bids are taken for the whole lot of books," Coleman explained. "If no one wants to buy them then we run more ads and try to give them away," he added, emphasizing that every avenue is pursued to put the books to use before they are buried in a dump. "We even send letters to various private and religious schools asking if they could use the books," Coleman said.

Former text-book manager John Colbert, who is now assistant superintendent of finance, called the situation "a mess," but he added, "I don't think anyone wants to throw away good books; that is just the only known solution."

"When I became textbook

manager in 1969 there was a standing order issued by former Gov. Claude Kirk that no texts were to be destroyed. Well, we had an airplane hanger rented to store the books and we had tons and tons of books. They overflowed the hanger and were also stored in each school. It cost the taxpayers thousands of dollars to keep the books. We had a crew of seven men to stack and sort through the books and prepare the necessary inventory," Colbert said.

When the order was countermanded by the new governor it took nine months to dispose of the books, Colbert lamented. Coleman pointed out that the paper companies are not interested in buying the books to recycle.

"One company offered us \$10 a ton for the books provided we would strip the hard covers off them, but the expense to do that was more than prohibitive," Colbert said.

In the county book storage room there are relatively few texts today, but, warned Coleman, "in about two months this room will be filled."

The real travesty is that the inventories usually include some brand new books as well as stacks of books missing covers, pages or full of writing that obscures the print. Today in the county warehouse there is a stack of texts, some of which have never been issued that are no longer termed a "state-adopted book," Coleman said.

Should the books remain there until the end of January they will be a part of Seminole County's annual offering to the county dump Coleman said.

Each text used in class must be adopted by the state, Coleman said, adding that the adoption period lasts for five years at which time the books are either re-adopted as permissible texts or are dropped from the list.

"The sole responsibility for choosing texts lies with the principal," Seminole School Supt. William P. Leyer said, adding that the only requirement is that they are state approved.

Leyer said book requests never change his office. "The requests go right to the textbook manager and he sends it to Tallahassee," Leyer said.

Coleman pointed out that Seminole County had about \$200,000 to buy books with last year and that figure has increased by \$60,000 for the coming school year.

"There should be no problem for obtaining books for anyone in the county," Coleman said.

Although the main text for each class must be state approved 25 per cent of the county's budgeted book money can be used to provide supplemental books and materials. These additional materials need not be state approved, Coleman said.

Reports of not enough books to go around are incorrect, both Colbert and Coleman insist.

In some cases the principal may decide that it is not necessary for each student to have a book, Colbert said, adding that this is primarily the case in elementary schools.

It has been reported that some students in all grades — have been unable to get the books. According to school officials this is not due to a shortage of books or funds, but policies of individual principals.

Police Shoot Holdup Suspect

An 18-year-old Longwood armed robbery suspect, wounded in a gunbattle with police Tuesday night, was listed in fair condition today at Florida Hospital North, Altamonte Springs.

Police said Walter Borgen Jr. was wounded when officers riddled his car with bullets as he fled an apartment at Garden Court Motel, U.S. 17-92 north of Dog Track Road. Longwood police chief Tom Hennigan and sheriff's deputies had sought to question Borgen in connection with a holdup of Fern Cleaners, U.S. 17-92 and SR 434, a pistol toting robber had escaped with \$54 in small change.

Hennigan said Casselberry detective John Hendy led officers to the motel, saying he had been in contact earlier in the day with a man answering the robber's description.

"Deputy Bob Simmons and I knocked on the door and Borgen opened it. As Simmons asked him to step outside, Borgen dived for the bed and pulled a pistol from under a pillow," Hennigan said.

Someone turned out the lights in the apartment, police said, and Borgen crawled out a rear window and jumped into a car. Officers surrounding the apartment unit riddled the car with bullets, smashing its windows and piercing the body as it sped away.

Police and deputies chased the car north on U.S. 17-92 and onto Hillcrest Drive, a dead-end street, where Longwood Sigs. Jim Pleicoles and Greg Manning fired warning shots as Borgen jumped from the car. The officers said Borgen dropped the gun as Pleicoles circled behind him. Borgen told officers, Hennigan said, that he was wounded in the hall of gunfire at the motel.

City Wants 'Lake' Plans, Votes To Stop Contractor

Sanford city commissioners voted Tuesday night to close down site preparation work on a 27-acre multi-family, office and retail center unless the land-clearing contractor submits acceptable engineering plans within 10 days.

The action came after City Manager Warren Knowles reported DL and M Land-

clearing Co., had not complied with numerous requests for detailed plans on the excavation of a seven-acre "lake" in the center of the multi-million-dollar project.

Knowles expressed fears the "borrow pit," as he termed it, will be a safety hazard with steep banks.

David Gibbs, of DL and M, told commissioners he has a contract to remove muck and fill dirt underneath and to replace the muck as the bottom of a "drainage retention pond."

Gibbs said he has \$60,000 in equipment time tied up on the job for San Sitis Ltd., developer of the center east of U.S. 17-92 between the Sanford Plaza and Pinecrest Shopping Centers. He said he must recover his costs by selling the fill dirt to other developers.

Colbert said his contract calls for the site preparation work to be completed by October.

Gibbs said San Sitis Tuesday agreed to fence the "drainage retention area" for safety.

Knowles said by fencing the area the slopes could be steeper than the city would require without the safety measure.

Colbert said San Sitis Ltd. "can live with" the city commission action and will submit revised drainage plans for the entire project as required.

Bumpers Defeats Fulbright Beck Trial Delayed

Fast-rising political newcomer Dale Bumpers ran away with the Arkansas Democratic senatorial nomination and ended the 30-year career of J.W. Fulbright, one of the leading powers in American foreign policy.

The two-term Arkansas governor ran up almost a 2-to-1 victory margin Tuesday over Fulbright, who has been chairman of the powerful Senate Foreign Relations Committee for 15 years.

At the same time, 73-year-old Wayne Morse was winning the Democratic senatorial nomination for a political comeback in Oregon.

Morse, who like Fulbright was a leading Senate critic of U.S. Vietnam policy, will meet Sen. Robert Packwood in the fall. Packwood, who ousted Morse after 21 years in the Senate in 1968, was unopposed for the Republican nomination.

In Kentucky, another of the Democratic new faces, Gov. Wendell Ford, won the party's nomination to challenge Republican Sen. Marlow Cook in November. Both scored easy victories over token primary opposition.

Just four years ago, Bumpers was a school board member and city attorney in Charleston,

Ark., a town of 1,500. But in 1970 he upset former six-term Gov. Orval E. Faubus in the Democratic primary and went on to oust incumbent Republican Sen. Robert Packwood in the fall.

He won re-election in 1972.

Both Fulbright and Bumpers said they were surprised at the size of Bumpers' win.

Bumpers, 48, had called for new leadership in Washington to deal with problems such as inflation, energy, federal spending and post-Watergate political clean-up. Fulbright stressed his seniority and experience, but at 69 said he would "cheerfully accept" retirement if that was the voters' verdict.

Stay At Hospital Annex To Cost You \$40 Daily

Seminole Memorial Hospital trustees Tuesday set a \$40 daily semi-private room rate for patients transferred to the "Seminole Memorial Pavilion" as Hospital Administrator Robert Bessler assured the facility will be ready for a June 17 opening.

Trustees on recommendation of members Sophie Shoemaker and Andrew Carraway, approved increases in ancillary charges, claiming the new rates are still lower than comparable hospitals.

New emergency room rates were hiked from \$7.50 to \$10, laboratory fees raises ranged from 17 to 50 per cent. Fees for electro-cardiograms were reduced from \$25 to \$23.

Bessler said the staff is ready to occupy the 50-bed former Seminole Lodge Nursing Home on June 17 and the new rate will be \$3 daily less than patients in the main hospital.

He said Blue Cross has approved the rate. The trustees voted to accept before receiving the bid for a van to be used to transport hospital patients and food to the extended care facility. Bids were requested for an emergency generator to be placed there.
