Atlantic Seaboard Buried By Heaviest Snowfall In Years

Storm Is Reminiscent Of 1888 Blizzard; Fluff Is Piled Up To Over 14 Inches

Four Deaths Are Blamed On Cold

Air Traffic Is Halted At La Guardia Field In New York

The heaviest snowstorm in years blanketed the Atlantic seaboard from Virginia to Maine today, in some places piling up as much as 16 inches of wet fluff to equal the great snowfall of the famous Mar. 10 blizzard of 1888.

Delaware, New Jersey, eastern Pennsylvania and southern New York bore the brunt of the fall where the maximum depths reached 14 to 16 inches.

New England was swept by a storm which piled up 12 inches of snow in some places. A 16-inch fall halted air traffic at La Guardia Field, New York.

A heavy fog settled over the area, and temperatures were generally in the upper 30s.

Heavy rains were reported in the South, and a rain squall was reported in the Atlantic states Friday.

Conditions were such that the second blizzard of the season was predicted.

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Revisions In Aid To Britain Bill Fought

Senator George Objects To Proposal To Restrict Transferring Of Vessels

WASHINGTON, Mar. 8.—(AP)—Administration supporters, fighting against any further amendment of the British aid bill, contended today that the measure would be worthless if the Senate adopted a proposal to restrict the transfers of naval vessels to Great Britain.

Senator Walsh (D-Mass.) offered an amendment to prohibit the transfer of any naval vessel or aircraft which could not be replaced in three months.

Chairman George (D-Ga.) of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee asserted that the amendment entirely nullified the bill.

Democratic Leader Barkley (D-Ky.) predicted the bill would be no President Roosevelt's desk by Monday.

Senator Wheeler (D-Mont.) one of the measure, conceded the Senate would approve the legislation, adding the "fight against war has just begun."

The Senate received at 4:53 P. M. last night without taking a final vote on the pending British.

U. S. Officials Deny Move To Keep Nation From Joining Three-Power Group

ROME, Mar. 8.—(AP)—Virginia Gayda, Fascist editorial spokesman, indicated today Yugoslavians would be asked to "clarify their position and intentions" toward the Axis powers as a result of the Axis-reported attempt by President Roosevelt to keep the Balkan country out of the Berlin-Rome-Tokyo camp.

State Department officials at Washington said they had "never heard of it," while Yugoslav official circles said no denial was necessary "because the whole business is so ridiculous."

Action Against U. S. Is Possible

Nazis Offer Greeks Territory In Return For 'Victory'

A hint of tightening cooperation between Japan and her European Axis partners came today in a German announcement that Japanese Foreign Minister Yosuke Matsuoka would reach Berlin shortly for "personal deliberations on all questions arising from the collaboration as set forth in the three-power pact."

One suggestion for Matsuoka's visit to Berlin, also Rome, was that the Axis might be contemplating the formulation of a common program of action against Britain and the United States both in Europe and the Far East.

The possibility was also suggested that Japan was about to participate actively in the war against Britain, and desires to explain her position to Adolf Hitler.

Balkan observers intimated that Germany's price for staying the threatened attack on Greece was to grant the Greeks every hard-won mile of their gains against Italy.

German diplomats were reported to have promised Greece she could retain all the territory she held before Oct. 28 when the Italian first attacked if she would sign a peace giving Mussolini a "paper victory" in Albania.

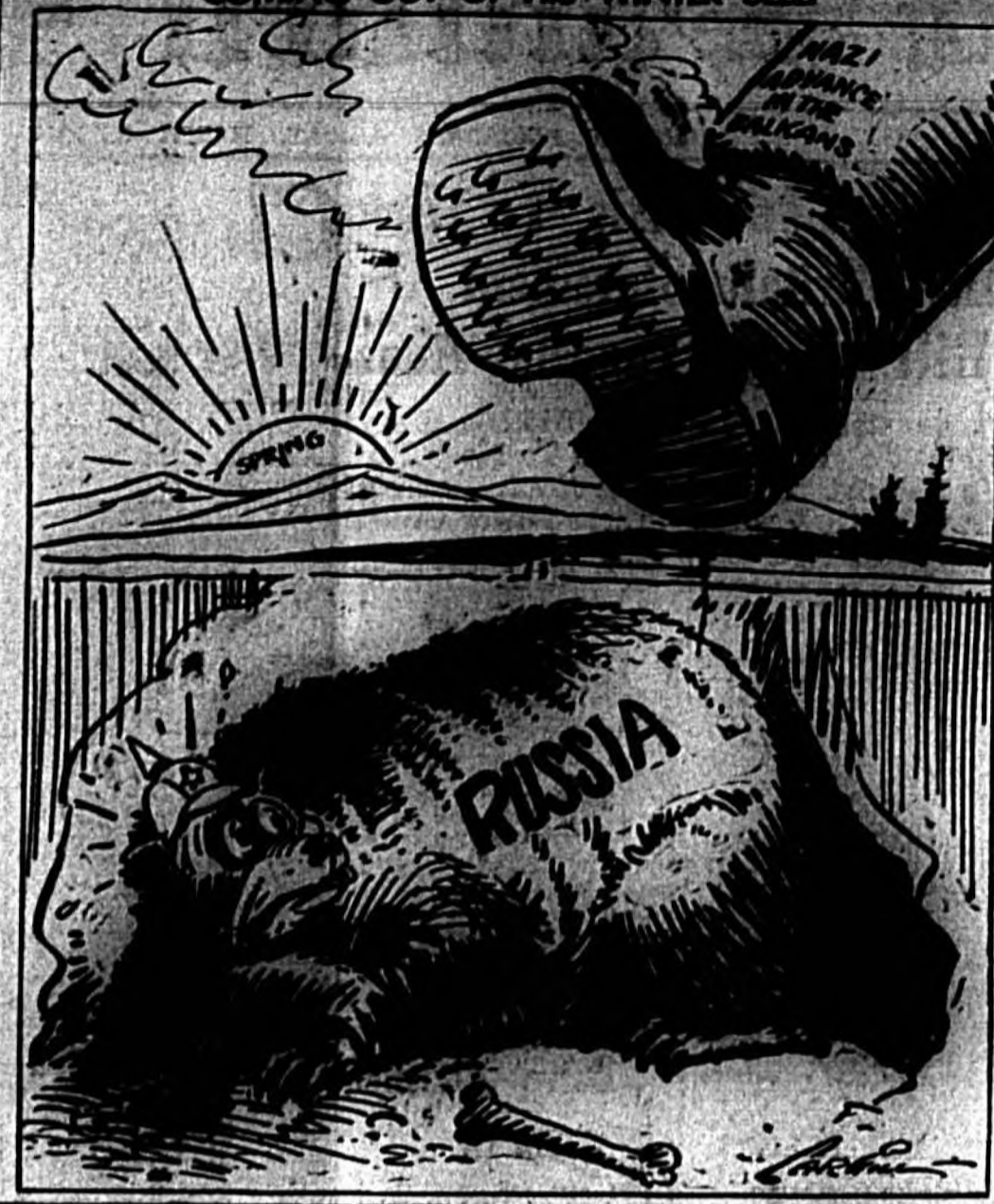

Now and then, we hear something concerning the proposed Florida cross-state canal. It is now in the news again as it is being considered in our defense program. Let us discuss the possibilities of the canal being started again.

Theodore L. Mead

This is the second in the series of articles written by the three students who received honorable mention in the Irving Bacheller Contest. The following essay, "Theodore L. Mead," was written by Natalie Trus.

On February 22, 1852, at Fishkill, Theodore Louise Mead was born. A love of nature was with him from his earliest recollection. He was the first to feel as the naturalist, to feel a beautiful caterpillar into the fire.

His early childhood was spent on the shores of the Hudson where he and his brother were taken at home by their parents. One big memory of his flower garden was his second possession.

When Theodore was ten, the Meads went to Europe for two years to enable the boys to study French and German with the natives. For three years after his return, Theodore attended the public schools of New York City where his love of natural history developed.

Theodore wanted to go to the French Expedition, and since he was too young to go alone, his mother offered to accompany him. While they were in Europe, his mother became a housewife and wished to return to America. Immediately, bribing Theodore with a collection of butterflies to accompany her.

He added to this collection many butterflies for which he searched all over the United States and within five years it was the third largest in the world. After a year in the Columbia School of Mines, he came to Florida to enable the boys to study French and German with the natives. For three years after his return, Theodore attended the public schools of New York City where his love of natural history developed.

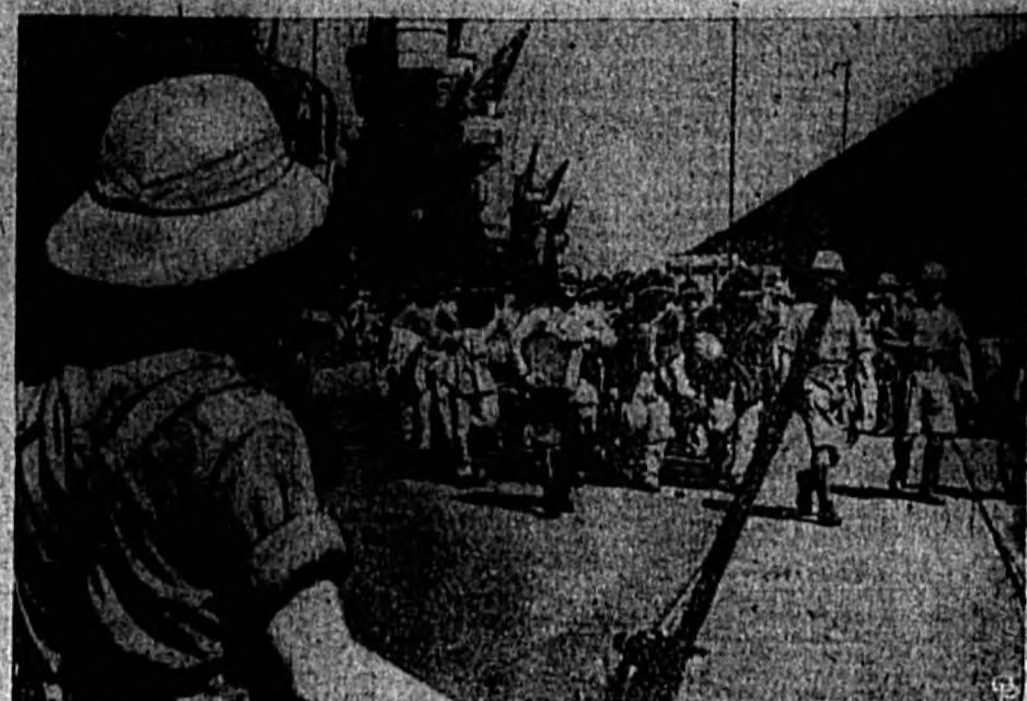

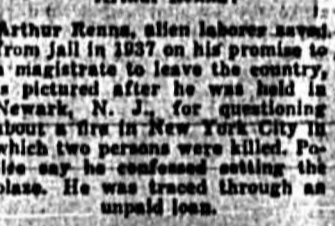

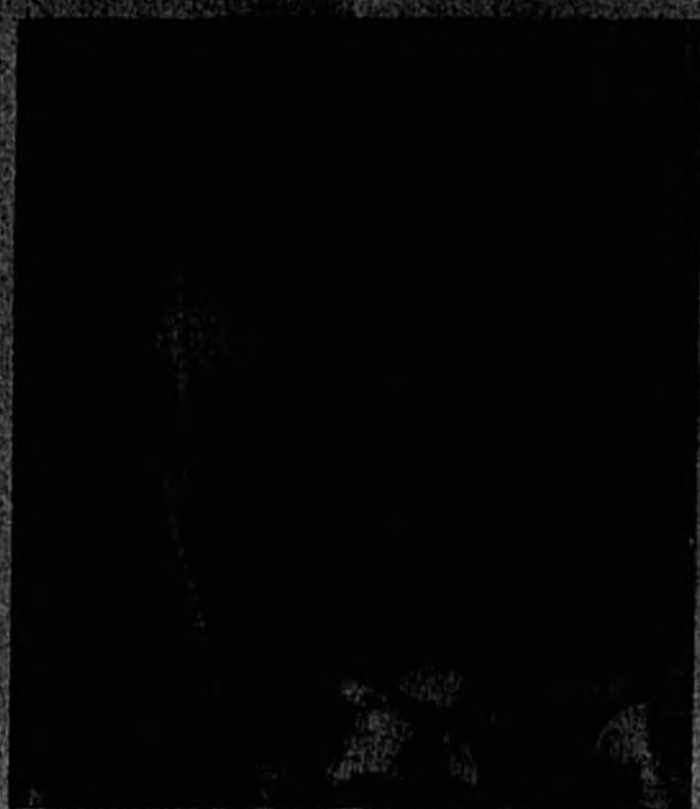

Japan Reported To Have Given Up Her East Indies Plans

Belief Prevails That Country Will Concentrate On Thailand, Indo-China

Danger Signals Noted In East

Nippon Said To Have Fleet Near Singapore, British Base

BATAVIA, Netherlands East Indies, Mar. 10—The belief prevailed in qualified neutral circles today that Japan has temporarily renounced her plans for economic penetration of the East Indies, and will concentrate for the present on Thailand (Siam) and French Indo-China.

Major developments, perhaps including Soviet Russia, Germany and Japan were foreseen in some quarters.

It was considered probable that any important Japanese action in the Pacific would be timed to coincide with major developments in Europe.

New danger signals arose in the Far East. British authorities in Singapore warned residents to be ready for an 48-hour notice to move from "war zones" where it is expected fighting will take place if Singapore is attacked from the sea.

Japan was reported to have massed a strong fleet of warships within quick striking distance of this British island stronghold.

The German airforce smashed into London today and sent its bombers roaring over Britain in a spirit of widespread raiding such as has never been known before.

High explosive bombs were dropped in London in a four-hour raid before midnight. The aircraft after that heavy assault were brief, however, the capital shortly after midnight.

The meeting of the anti-aircraft committee was held in the city.

Mr. Whitehead, who was visiting Jack Hyatt at his home in Lake Mary, is under observation at the hospital. Mr. Whitehead was also injured internally, but not seriously, the physician said.

Mr. Hyatt was in the automobile at the time of the accident, but escaped with minor bruises.

3,500 Bus Drivers Strike In New York

NEW YORK, Mar. 10—A crippling strike of bus drivers sent hundreds of thousands of business-bound New Yorkers scrambling for subway lines and taxicabs today as the city's first major transportation boycott in a quarter century got under way.

The dawn walkout of 3,500 drivers threw rush-hour transportation out of gear on routes serving 875,000 persons. The strikers' C.I.O. demand an eight-hour day, a wage increase, and a three-week vacation with pay.

Naval Bases Are Okeyed By Senators

Posts Will Be Built On Sites Acquired In Destroyer Deal With Great Britain

WASHINGTON, Mar. 10—(AP)—The Senate approved today the establishment of naval bases on sites acquired from Britain in exchange for United States destroyers, an action which the Senate Naval Committee said would have the effect of "Congressional ratification" of the exchange.

The action came when the Senate passed a \$12,258,500 authorization to build public works, including besides the work at the British bases, the development of facilities at Guam, Samoa, the Alaskan area, various other Pacific locations, the Canal Zone, in the Caribbean, and the continental United States.

Britain's labor minister, Ernest Bevin, declared yesterday that Senate passage of the lend-lease bill with its promise of "overwhelming" American material aid to Britain would be a psychological blow to Germany's war effort.

The Greeks and Chinese, fighting wars against the Italian and Japanese members of the tripartite pact, hailed the measure.

Official quarters in Rome and Tokyo were about Bevin, charged with the mobilization of British labor in accelerated war industries, said: "Now that the great productive machine of America is going in with the British communists to pour out airplanes, ships and guns, this overwhelming force and the knowledge in Germany that the forces they started with cannot win will create a psychological effect which will help to break down the spirit of aggression in middle Europe."

The British radio said an American professor named A. Newton Tolbert, who is in Germany in a German language talk to Germany from London, declared the Senate's action amounted to "an informal declaration of war against Hitler."
