

Senator Willis Of Ohio Dies In Midst Of Welcome Rally

Favorite Son Is Stricken By Cerebral Hemorrhage Just Before His Time To Speak
Solon Was Considered Hoover's Chief Bar To His Nomination

DELAWARE, Ohio, Mar. 31.—(INS)—Ohio was in mourning today for its favorite son, Senator Frank B. Willis, who died suddenly here at 9:09 o'clock last night in the midst of a homecoming welcome prepared by thousands of his fellow citizens.

Stricken by a cerebral hemorrhage, Senator Willis collapsed and died a few moments before his campaign for the Republican presidential nomination was to have been launched in his native city.

National guardians of Delaware, called by their commandant to guard over the body in a funeral parlor here this morning, who relatives made arrangements for the funeral.

Stricken residents of this city were stricken today by the sad news with which the end came to Gray's chapter, where the Senator was to have delivered a speech to his fellow citizens. A band marching at the head of a red light parade in which the Senator rode, had played of ragtime music. A quartette in Columbus rendered vocal selections.

As the quartette began singing "Farewell Senator Willis," from the set of hon. r. called C. A. Jones, his secretary, the Senator said: "Jones, I've never felt this way before in my life. Something's awfully wrong."

Calling for his wife, the Senator then staggered and fell dead in his secretary's arms just as the last strains of "Farewell" wafted through from the reception hall.

Mrs. Willis, prostrated by the tragedy, said she believed her husband had been made ill by the fumes of the torches in the parade to the chapel. She said that during the singing, she had complained that he did not feel well.

The Senator's fellow townspeople matched slowly out of the hall with lowered heads, while in death was announced from the flat car.

Senator Willis was born at Lewis Center, Ohio, Dec. 28, 1871, and had served six terms and commander in public affairs since he had failed unhand.

After his law degree, he became a teacher at Ohio Northern of economics and law. In 1906 when he was admitted to the bar, he began a general practice. But a year previous to his admission he was elected to the state House of Representatives, where he served two terms.

In 1911 he was elected to Congress where he served two terms retiring in 1915, when he was re-elected Governor of the state. After 1917, when his term as the state's chief executive expired, he retired from public life until 1921. In that year was elected United States Senator, in which capacity he has served continuously since that time.

First Year Of Mining Strike To End Today

Instead of Lending Hand To Agreement, Tie-Up That Has Made New Record, Has Been Marked By More Bitterness

WASHINGTON, Mar. 31.—(INS)—The sudden and dramatic death of Senator Frank B. Willis, of Ohio, was a severe shock today to political Washington.

He was one of the central figures in the movement to "stop Hoover" and his death, while in the thick of the fight, threw considerable confusion into the ranks of those who are intent upon keeping the Secretary of Commerce from getting the Republican presidential nomination at Kansas City next June.

Willis and Hoover alone were contesting for Ohio's 51 convention delegates and the fighting was just getting warm.

The first fraction of the political campaign was that Willis' sudden removal from the scene left the Ohio field open for Hoover. Examination of the Ohio primary law, however, revealed the inadequacy of this conclusion, and although the Senator's death was enormously complicated the work of "stopping Hoover," all the opposition was still unwilling today to concede that they have lost their fight on the buckeye but leg.

There are 51 Willis candidates in the field in Ohio, and under the law all have secondary choices. Thirty one of these are said to be favorable among Lowell, Curtis and a few scattered. If the anti-Hoover sentiment can be kept crystallized and disciplined, the opponents of the Cabinet candidate may yet prevent him from getting a majority of the 51 delegates.

If nothing to be seen, however, whether this anti-Hoover sentiment can be kept crystallized—scattered as it is among the rest of the field. The Hoover managers do not think it can be, and it may be that they are right.

Undoubtedly, it was pointed out here today, some of the Willis delegates candidates were kept in the line because of personal and political attacks on the Senator, who may as well wear being the Republican "Boss" of Ohio as any one has since the death of Mark Hanna. Willis was the patronage dictator of the state, and through his judicious distribution of federal offices had built himself a personal machine that was the envy of less fortunate politicians. Some of those who were his delegates were committed to him for further political favor in the state.

Now that Willis is gone, the question was being asked among the politicians today whether these delegates will stand firm. The evident fear of the anti-Hoover camp is a rush for the Hoover bandwagon, if that can be detected, and prevented. The Hoover opposition may be shaken, but it still is determined.

The Ohio preference primary is set to run three weeks away. It is set for Apr. 21, leaving but a short time in which to control and discipline the weakened anti-Hoover forces in the state.

Even with Willis alive and personally directing the fight, most politicians were ready to concede the Secretary of Commerce a part of the Ohio delegation. The Willis lieutenants themselves privately admitted that Hoover could not be kept from getting ten or a dozen delegates from the populous cities like Cincinnati and Cleveland where Willis was unpopular because of his radical prohibition views.

In all the tables which the Hoover managers have privately compiled to show that he will have in excess of 400 votes on the first ballot they have figured on about 15 Ohio delegates. In their more optimistic moments they have claimed a majority of the 51, but the practical politicians of Washington have doubted this.

If now, however, there is anything like a concerted movement to the Hoover standard on the part of those who were held to Willis because of personal or political attachment, it was pretty generally conceded today that Hoover is within sight of the nomination.

The next three weeks probably will tell the story. At least so far as Ohio is concerned.

“Scarface Al” Capone Uses Steel Lined Chair Despite Story Of Reputed Bravery

CHICAGO, Mar. 30.—(INS)—“Scarface Al” Capone looks much like any other man. He has dark hair and eyes, is of medium to heavy build, wears good clothes, is quiet mannered and inclined to be jovial. He is slightly bald. His scars are scarcely noticeable. It is said that he has rubbed olive oil into them to aid in eradicating their blemishes. He lives in the Seventy-seven hundred block in a South Side street. He owns his own home and pays all taxes the moment they are due. He is married. He has one child and has adopted a woman about 30 years old, known as “Matie” Capone. She is a poor relative. He owns about six or eight automobiles of an expensive make. In addition he has had the upholstery lined with solid steel plates—bullet-proof. He affects jewelry, mostly diamond rings and stickpins. Strong Body Guard When he sallies forth by day or night he is accompanied by a body guard of never less than five men and on many occasions as many as a dozen. Most of his business discussions and transactions are conducted in the kitchen of Jackie Cusick’s home. Cusick just now is in a hospital recovering from Pleural pneumonia. Capone goes armed with two or possibly three revolvers of small calibre. Why three? One or even two may clog in an emergency. When one is the head of a gangland there are many “emergencies.” His bodyguard all carry revolvers. He has one man who is a personal attendant. A sort of “gangland valet.” It is the duty of this man to watch for all enemies, all suspicious characters, or amateur police. Of the regular police Capone has little to fear because he knows they have “nothing on him.” It is the sniping amateur newcomer to the force for whom he must watch. Ralph Capone, about 21 years old, Al’s brother, usually travels with the group. Ralph is surly, sullen and is not very well liked. He is dark and rather good looking. Use No Doorbells When the Capone crowd goes to visit Cusick at his spacious south side home, there is no ringing of doorbells. Instead there is a tiny aperture which rings a buzzer in

the parlor of the mansion. That buzzer is always answered by “Hanzo,” Cusick’s chief bodyguard and judging from first appearance rather a simple type of man. The crowd assembles in the living room—Cusick’s daughter, Janet, or his son Charles, 18, may be in the room. His wife, formerly Rose Cohn, may be present. There is no discussion of gang affairs. If a stranger is present, Capone is introduced as “Mr. Brown.” After chatting upon incidental subjects, suddenly Capone will look at Cusick and mutter the one word “Well.” That is the signal. All members of both bodyguards rise and file out to the kitchen, shutting doors behind them. It is then the gang conference are held. One of the gang goes into the basement and brings a few cases of beer to the kitchen. Neither Capone, Cusick or their close bodyguard ever drink whiskey, heavy wines or heavily intoxicating beverages while planning business. Holiday Drinking On Christmas or some other holiday they get admittedly drunk in Cusick’s home but station sober men as lookouts. On such occasions Cusick throws handfuls of gold coins onto the parlor rug to watch the visitors scramble for them. The writer of this article contrived to be present at one of these celebrations and witnessed the bland manner in which Cusick flung gold and Christmas presents to guests. But only beer is served in the kitchen. If Janet or Charles bring visitors into the dining room, Capone and Cusick take their men to the cellar. After the conference has been concluded, Capone may ask Theresa, his wife, and Rose, Cusick’s wife if they care to go to the theatre. In the event they say they do, Capone’s bodyguard valet telephones a theatre box office. Alter The Easter Morning Parade You Will Appreciate An Easter Luncheon

WHAT so delightful as an Easter morning stroll in a bright sun, with the air fresh and clear? There is a gayness of early Spring; winter clothes have been carefully stored away and lighter costumes give a sense of a new awakening. You return to your home with a keen appetite and await your friends whom you have invited to an Easter luncheon. A few flowers, some graceful crystal and silverware—these are your friends. You have no fears about the luncheon itself; it is the ideal meal for a lovely Easter morn. And because you are not selfish, you tell them later, after they have expressed their pleasure, from what recipes you made the selection. Surely you want object if we divulge them here. They are: Russian Eggs (For First Course) 1 level tablespoonful Knox Sparkling Gelatine 1/4 cup cold water or cold broth 1 1/2 cups hot chicken broth 6 eggs Soak gelatine in cold water 5 minutes and dissolve in hot broth (strained broth may be used). Season with salt, pepper and a little lemon juice. Prepare hard-boiled eggs, removing yolks and mashing to a paste with a little melted butter, salt, paprika, mayonnaise or Worcester sauce. Put whites of eggs with mixture and put the two halves together. When jelly is cold, place each egg in a tiny cup or mold and pour jelly around (molds should best be rinsed in cold water). When firm, turn out on a slice of tomato and garnish with lettuce, watercress and bay-onnaise. Eggs may be molded also in green pepper cups, and when very firm, cut pepper in slices. Chicken Mousse 1 level tablespoonful Knox Sparkling Gelatine 1/4 cup cold water 1/2 cup boiling water 1 cup cream 1 level teaspoonful lemon juice 1/2 cup sugar 1 egg yolk 1/2 cup heavy cream Soak gelatine in cold water 5 minutes. Mr. Taxpayer:

Don't be mis-led

These facts are the law:

On and after April 1st, your taxes become delinquent. The Tax Collector must advertise your property for sale and sell and issue tax certificates.

Upon a sale being made during the first year you must pay interest at rate of twelve per cent. At end of second year if your tax certificate belongs to an individual a Tax Deed will be issued and you will be dispossessed of your property, it makes no difference whether it is your home, or business property or vacant lots. If tax certificate belongs to City a suit will be instituted and your property sold at Master's sale. You must pay the Deputy Collector additional fees for the redemption of your property and also the recording fees allowed by law to the clerk of court.

The tax certificate will be duly recorded and become a cloud upon the title of your property, and make it so you cannot sell without paying these additional charges.

Your Charter provides these penalties and your City Commission cannot change or alter these provisions. You must pay your taxes as provided by law or suffer the penalties.

Regardless of the traitor in our midst who urges that you do not pay your taxes, and that you will get out of it somehow, remember you will pay the penalty, and if you break faith with your City and fellowmen at this time, a greater penalty than the above will be yours in the near future and one you cannot escape.

On account of it appearing that many of our citizens have been misinformed as to the penalties they must suffer, if they fail to carry out their obligation of paying taxes, we call these facts to your attention, and allow until the 15th day of April 1928, within which to pay your City Taxes, without any additional penalty.

Regardless of what might happen in the future your tax for the year 1927 must be paid.

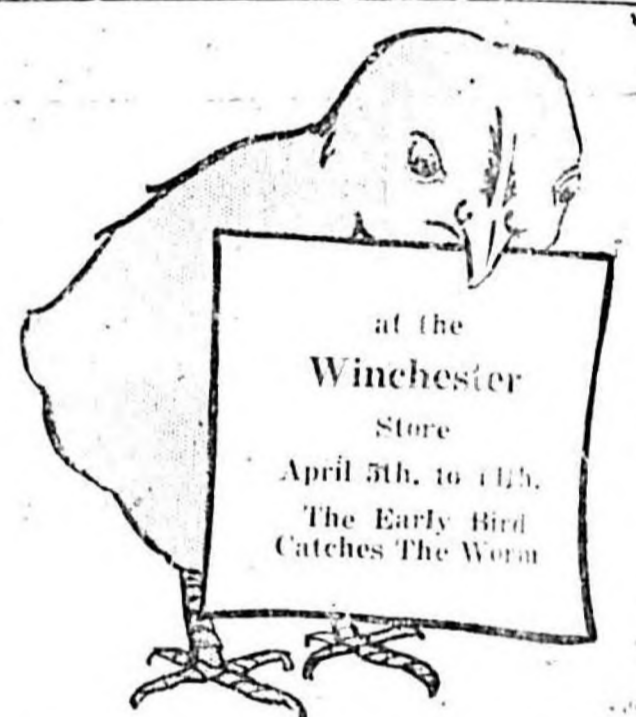

WALTER JOHNSON "VERY SICK MAN" SAYS HIS DOCTOR

Long Time Of Rest And Treatment Will Be Necessary To Mend Health Of Renowned Pitching Ace Of Washington

WASHINGTON, Mar. 31 (INS)—Walter Johnson, the "big train" of the pitching mound for a score of years, is a "very sick man." The doctors claim that a few weeks rest and treatment will bring him around to normal health, but those who saw the big pitcher taken from a train here in a wheeled chair and removed to Emergency Hospital, had their doubts today. The "big smoke" is sick—there is no doubt of that.

The 210 pounds of brown-thatched checked baseballs over American League plates with shining eyes for twenty years have shrunk to 165, and he looks pale and drawn. In a room at the hospital today Johnson was under treatment from several doctors, and he admitted he is uncertain when he will be able to take up his managerial duties in Newark.

The doctors say he is suffering from the after-effects of the flu. The attack which he experienced in Florida this winter, they say, was particularly severe, and the after-effects dragged down his general condition to the point where there is real reason for concern.

Johnson was accompanied northward by Dr. Harry Kaufmann, chief of the Emergency Hospital staff. "Walter is suffering from the after-effects of the flu, and the poison which followed in the intestinal tract have affected his kidneys," said Dr. Kaufmann. "He is very sick, but I am confident that a few weeks of absolute rest and treatment will bring him around all right."

For twenty years, Johnson was known as the "iron man" of organized baseball. For the same number of years he was the leading pitcher of the Washington club. He was released last year in order that he might play the major league. His team, the Newark Braves, are due to open the season April 15.

Cambridge Defeats Oxford In Annual Thames Crew Race

LONDON, Mar. 31 (INS)—A powerful Cambridge crew today defeated Oxford in the 24th annual boat race held on the famous river Thames over the four and one-half mile course between Putney and Mortlake on the Thames.

Cambridge thus won its thirty-ninth victory over its ancient rival, Oxford, which has had 10 triumphs over its rival in 43 years.

The race was held on a calm day. The start of the Cambridge crew was made from the front and in the first half mile was one and one-half lengths in the lead.

At the second mile, Oxford was five and one-half lengths in the van. The next mile was a five-point lead. Oxford slowly crept up on the victors until at the end of the race it was only four lengths behind. Cambridge covered the four and one-half miles in twenty minutes and twenty seconds.

The victory of Cambridge was generally expected, but the ease with which its opponent won the victory was rather a surprise. An hour before the start at 9:45 a. m. this morning the victors had been established as follows:

CARSON REVEALS HIS ATTITUDE ON GLADE DRAINAGE

Denouncer Of Catts Declares Huge Bond Issue Which Has Just Been Approved Should Be Spent By Wise Counsel

OKEECHOBEE CITY, Mar. 31—Carrying his campaign for re-election to the shores of Lake Okeechobee, James M. Carson, Miami attorney, tonight voiced his views for the first time on the Everglades drainage question. Speaking before an audience of several hundred persons assembled in the city, Mr. Carson declared that since the supreme court has affirmed the constitutionality of a legislative act authorizing a \$20,000,000 bond issue for this project, the most important problem now is to see that the funds are judiciously expended.

"Primarily the Everglades drainage question is an engineering problem," he said, "but in a larger sense it is a human problem."

If elected governor, Mr. Carson said he would move the headquarters of the drainage commission from Tallahassee to some place in this district so that "long distance drainage" may be eliminated.

Mr. Carson told his audience that in favor of a dismissal of the present drainage engineer and the employment of one that is recognized as an authority. Of 11 present holders of this position, "the candidate said:

"I believe him to be an honest and faithful public servant, but his method of approach must be wrong because after 15 years' service his work is unsatisfactory to the public."

Mr. Carson said he favored the appointment of a group of three to five men, selected from the district and chosen for the first hand knowledge of the problem, to serve as an administrative board. This board would be the medium through which the citizens would lodge their complaints and in addition it would be entrusted with the duty of guarding the expenditure of funds to carry out the work.

Because the state owns some three quarters of a million acres of land in the Everglades, Mr. Carson said it was entitled to exercise a voice in the matter, and proposed that the present board be maintained with a veto power over the engineer and the administrative board.

Mr. Carson opened his address with a recital of his address and home in New York, Philadelphia, each of them, Boston, Buffalo, Detroit, Richmond, and each of them, Birmingham, Cleveland, Newark, and Quebec. There were 13 cars lined up for the race.
