

## Senator Willis Of Ohio Dies In Midst Of Welcome Rally To End Today

Favorite Son Is Stricken By Cerebral Hemorrhage Just Before His Time To Speak

Swoons As Band Plays Farewell

Colon Was Considered Hoover's Chief Bar To His Nomination

DELAWARE, Ohio, Mar. 31 (INS)—Ohio was in mourning today for its favorite son, Senator Frank B. Willis, who died suddenly here at 9:00 o'clock last night in the midst of a homecoming welcome prepared by thousands of his fellow citizens.

Stricken by a cerebral hemorrhage, Senator Willis collapsed suddenly a few moments before his campaign for the Republican presidential nomination was to have been launched at his victory.

National guardmen of Delta were called by their commandant to stand guard over the body in the funeral parlor here this morning while relatives made arrangements for the funeral.

Stunned residents of this city were still dazed today by the suddenness with which the end came. Gray's Chapel, where the Senator was to have delivered a speech was crowded with his admiring fellow citizens. A band, marching at the head of a red light parade, which the Senator had played during the campaign, was still awaiting him at the door of the church.

A quartette began singing "Farewell" Senator Willis arose from the seat of honor, called C. A. Jones, no secretary, the Senator said: "Jones, I've never felt this way before in my life. Something's awfully wrong."

Calling for his wife, the Senator then staggered and fell dead in his secretary's arms just as the last strains of "Farewell" wafted through from the reception hall. A physician called from the audience pronounced death due to cerebral hemorrhage.

As the quartette began singing "Farewell" Senator Willis arose from the seat of honor, called C. A. Jones, no secretary, the Senator said: "Jones, I've never felt this way before in my life. Something's awfully wrong."

It remains to be seen, however, whether this anti-Hoover sentiment can be kept crystallized—scattered as it is among the rest of the field.

The Hoover managers do not think it can be, and it may be that they are right.

Undoubtedly, it was pointed out yesterday, some of the Willis' declared candidates were kept in line because of personal and political attachment to the Senator, who may as near being the Republican "Boss" of Ohio as anyone has since the death of Mark Hanna. Willis was the patronage dictator of the state, and through his judicious distribution of federal offices had built himself a personal machine that was the envy of less fortunate politicians. Some of those who were his delegates were committed to him for further political favor in the state.

After his law degree, he became a teacher at Ohio Northern Economics and Law. In 1906 when he was admitted to the bar, he began a general practice. But six years previous to his admittance he was elected to the state House of Representatives, where he served two terms.

In 1911 he was elected to Congress where he served two terms, retiring in 1915, when he was elected Governor of the state. After 1917, when his term as the state's chief executive expired, he retired from public life until 1921. That year was elected United States Senator, in which capacity he has served continuously since that time.

## DEATH OF WILLIS IS SEVERE SHOCK TO OHIO POLITICS

Instead of Lending Itself To Agreement, Tie-Up That Has Made New Record, Has Been Marked By More Bitterness

Industrial Losses Run Into Millions

No End Is In Sight And 20,000 Additional Miners Are Slated To Cease Work Tonight

WASHINGTON, Mar. 31 (INS)—The sudden and dramatic death of Senator Frank B. Willis, of Ohio, was a severe shock today to political Washington.

He was one of the central figures in the movement to stop Hoover, and his death, while in the thick of the fight, threw considerable confusion into the ranks of those who are intent upon keeping the Secretary of Commerce from getting the Republican presidential nomination at Kansas City next June.

Willis and Hoover alone were testing for Ohio's 51 convention delegates and the fighting was just getting warm.

The first reaction of the politicians was that Willis' sudden removal from the scene left the Ohio delegation clear for Hoover. Examination of the Ohio primary law, however, revealed the inaccuracy of this conclusion, and although the Senator's death was enormously complicated the work of "stopping" Hoover, the opposition was still unwilling today to concede that they have lost their fight on the buckeye battleground.

There are 51 Willis candidates in the field in Ohio, and under the law all have secondary choices. Thirty-one of these are said to be favorable to Dawes, with the rest split among Lawless, Curtis and a few scattered. If the Anti-Hoover sentiment can be kept crystallized and disciplined, the opponents of the Cabinet candidate may yet prevent him from getting a majority of the 51 delegates.

In the chief battleground, West Virginia and Central Pennsylvania, Ohio and Northern West Virginia, the biggest operators are fighting a hard struggle with the union, many of them already running open shop, or will attempt to later. The additional 20,000 men affected are in the fields, enlisting from the section of Lewis and Wyoming Mountain, Washington and Madison. It will continue union operation by a private gangway and accepted by "local units." At the time of his death, Senator Arthur, chairman of the Public Lands Committee, when the sensational case was made, was said to have made the following statement:

"Today it appears that a greater number of bituminous operators in states west of the Ohio River will continue the work under the existing wage scale, contrast to their attitude of a month or six weeks ago," said Lewis. "In part this is due to the recognition that their drive for lower wages is losing momentum."

The United Mine Workers will continue their policy of resisting wage cuts, and at the same time permitting any miners to operate after April 1 that will agree to continue the present scale of wages.

Neither group has shown willingness to compromise. A majority of operators have told the Senate Coal Committee they cannot exist without a reduction of the Jacksontown wage for which the union is striking.

Even with Willis alive and personally directing the fight, most politicians were ready to concede the Secretary of Commerce a part of the Ohio delegation. The Willis' lieutenants themselves privately admitted that Hoover could not be kept from getting ten or a dozen delegates from the populous cities like Cincinnati and Cleveland where Willis was unpopular in cause of his radical prohibition views.

In all the tables which the Hoovers managers have privately compiled to show that he will have an excess of 400 votes on the first ballot they have figured on about 15 Ohio delegates. In their more optimistic moments they have claimed a majority of the 51, but the practical politicians of Washington have doubted this.

If now, however, there is anything like a concerted movement to the Hoover standard on the part of those who were held to Willis because of personal or political attachment, it was pretty generally conceded today that Hoover is within sight of the nomination.

The next three weeks probably will tell the story. At least so far as Ohio is concerned.

## Tex Rickard Signs Heeney To Fight Gene Tunney For His Title During Summer

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Mar. 31 (INS)—Tex Rickard has signed Jim Heeney for a championship fight with Gene Tunney in July, it was announced here today.

Tex Rickard, in making the announcement, declared the fight would take place either in America or England. "I am now writing a word to London and if those terms are agreeable, I shall take the match there," he said. Rickard signed Heeney through the latter manager, Charley Harvey.

"It will be the only heavyweight title bout of the year," he pronounced.

Negotiations for a Tunney-Heeney meeting this summer have been going on for some time and Charley Harvey, the New Zealander's manager, has been Florida discussing the matter with the promoter.

Seven challenges have been officially registered with the New York Athletic Commission by heavyweights desirous of taking a crack at the crown. The contenders who have posted the entries here are Heeney, Jimmy Risko, Phil Scott

and Eddie Foy, Jr., and the ultimate challenger will be determined by a draw with Sharkey.

The latter being eliminated by loss to Biskoff a few weeks ago.

There had been some talk of making Risko and Heeney to determine the ultimate survivor but champion Tunney is known to have favored Heeney as an opponent and it is assumed that Rickard's announcement today represented a continuation to the title holder's wishes. In arranging Risko will be the only other contender who remained to contest the honor with the man from "down under" and the latter's decision was following a better earlier in the season immediately in the need the champion for the title in July.

# Mr. Taxpayer:

## Don't be mis-led

### These facts are the law:

On and after April 1st, your taxes become delinquent. The Tax Collector must advertise your property for sale and sell and issue tax certificates.

Upon a sale being made during the first year you must pay interest at rate of twelve per cent. At end of second year if your tax certificate belongs to an individual a Tax Deed will be issued and you will be dispossessed of your property, it makes no difference whether it is your home, or business property or vacant lots. If tax certificate belongs to City a suit will be instituted and your property sold at Master's sale. You must pay the Deputy Collector additional fees for the redemption of your property and also the recording fees allowed by law to the clerk of court.

The tax certificate will be duly recorded and become a cloud upon the title of your property, and make it so you cannot sell without paying these additional charges.

Your Charter provides these penalties and your City Commission cannot change or alter these provisions. You must pay your taxes as provided by law or suffer the penalties.

Regardless of the traitor in our midst who urges that you do not pay your taxes, and that you will get out of it somehow, remember you will pay the penalty, and if you break faith with your City and fellowmen at this time, a greater penalty than the above will be yours in the near future and one you cannot escape.

On account of it appearing that many of our citizens have been misinformed as to the penalties they must suffer, if they fail to carry out their obligation of paying taxes, we call these facts to your attention, and allow until the 15th day of April 1928, within which to pay your City Taxes, without any additional penalty.

**Regardless of what might happen in the future your tax for the year 1927 must be paid.**

**CARLTON AND HATHAWAY**

The idea would be most gratifying to the reader to learn that regarding the above article, we could not be more correct.

It has been agreed for Dr. Carlton to teach the physiologic and political campaigning with a good mobile company. "This will be proved." That could mean "I do not care." That could mean "I am reliable information" and "I am generally understood." It does not prove what Theodore Roosevelt means.

Mr. Carlton fired his big gun in Tampa last Wednesday night. On, rather, he pulled the trigger. The detonation was tragically incomplete. The long awaited "spectre" of the spectre of martial law in the road department came to pass in the road department.

It is the opinion of the public that the road department has been doing them a great disservice. This is the true picture of corruption. It is the blow below the belt received by the road department. It is the blow from the side.

Mr. Carlton is correct. But we would like to think that Mr. Carlton's name is clearer to show his activity in the road department than to do the same that Dr. Hathaway, the capital of Florida, in that there is a good editorial in progress. Indeed, he seems to indicate whether he wants to change him or not. According to the Tampa Tribune, he "shouldn't be in that he is not graft or corruption." Yet in the next paragraph of the Dr. Hathaway's account he qualified as saying, "He has used that before June 1, you will hear enough to satisfy any unsought/unpredicted name, not only of waste, extravagance and graft and corruption as well."

Among Mr. Carlton's "facts" are instances of sales purchases or re-purchases of the road department, which, he alleges, indicate extravagance and waste of not graft.

Insofar as these "facts" refer to his charges of extravagance and waste, we hope Dr. Hathaway will see fit to recognize them and make the satisfactory reply we believe can be made. Since Dr. Hathaway is a good candidate for governor and is running on the public record we concede the right of Mr. Carlton or any other political opponent

to self-respect and clean conscience. We can imaging that he finds it hard to keep evenly on his course when Carlton broadcasts such reflections on his honor, and induces against his honesty as those at last Wednesday night. But if failed to do so, if he permitted himself to be drawn into the game of bitter personalities and unfair insinuations which Mr. Carlton is playing, he would identify himself? with proportions much smaller than those in which the vast majority of the people of Florida are thinking of him today.



## WALTER JOHNSON CARSON REVEALS "VERY SICK MAN" HIS ATTITUDE ON SAYS HIS DOCTOR GLADE. DRAINAGE

**Long Time Of Rest And Treatment Will Be Necessary To Mend Health Of Renowned Pitching Ace Of Washington**

WASHINGTON, Mar. 31 (INS) — Walter Johnson, the "big train" of the pitching mound for a score of years, is "a very sick man." The doctors claim that a few weeks rest and treatment will bring him around to normal health, but those who saw the big pitcher taken from a train here in a wheeled chair and removed to Emergency Hospital, had their doubts today. The "big smoke" is sick—there is no doubt of that.

The 210 pounds of brawn that bucked baseball over American League plates with sizzling speed for twenty years have shrunk to 165, and he looks pale and drawn. In a room at the hospital today Johnson was under treatment from several doctors, and it admitted is uncertain when he will be able to take up his managerial duties in Newark.

The doctors say he is suffering from the after-effects of the flu. The attack which he experienced in Florida this winter, they say, was particularly severe, and the after-effects dragged down his general condition to the point where that is real reason for concern.

Johnson was accompanied northward by Dr. Harry Kaufman, chief of the Emergency Hospital staff.

"Walter is suffering from the after effects of the flu, and the poison which followed in the intestinal tract have affected his kidneys," said Dr. Kaufman. "He is very sick, but I am confident that a few weeks of absolute rest and treatment will bring him around all right."

For twenty years Johnson was known as the "iron man" of organized baseball. For the same number of years he was the leading pitcher of the Washington club. He was released last year in order that he might try the managering game. His team, the Newark Bear are due to open the season April 18.

## Cambridge Defeats Oxford In Annual Thames Crew Race

LONDON, Mar. 31 (INS) — Cambridge, as we may defeated Oxford in the 111th annual boat race between the two famous universities over the four-and-one-half miles between Putney and Mortlake on the Thames.

Denouncer Of Catts Declares Huge Bond Issue Which Has Just Been Approved Should Be Spent By Wise Counsel

OKEECHOBEE CITY, Mar. 31—Carrying his campaign for government to the shores of Lake Okeechobee, James M. Carson, Miami attorney, tonight voiced his views for the first time on the Everglades drainage question. Speaking before an audience of several hundred persons assembled in the city, Mr. Carson declared that since the supreme court has affirmed the constitutionality of a legislation authorizing a \$20,000,000 bond issue for this project, the most important problem now is to see that the funds are judiciously expended.

"Primarily the Everglades drainage question is an engineering problem," he said, "but in a larger sense it is a human problem."

He elected governor, Mr. Carson did he would move the headquarters of the drainage commission from Tallahassee to some place in this district so that "long distance telephone" may be eliminated.

Mr. Carson told his audience that he favored disbanding of the present drainage engineer and the appointment of one that is recognized as an authority. Of the present holder of this position, "he candidate

said: "I believe him to be an honest and faithful public servant, but his method of approach must be wrong because after 15 years' service his work is unsatisfactory to me."

Mr. Carson said he had the appointment of a group of three to two men, selected from this district and chosen for the first hand knowledge of the problem, to serve as an administrative board. This board would be the medium through which the citizens would express their complaints and in addition it would be entrusted with the duty of guarding the expenditure of funds to carry out the work.


Because the state owns some three-quarters of a million acres of land in the Everglades, Mr. Carson said it was entitled to exercise voice in the matter, and proposed to the present board to remain armed with a veto power over the engineer and the administrative board.
