4 Watergate Figures Abandon Jobs

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon today announced the resignations of Atty. Gen. Richard G. Kleindienst and top White House aides H. R. Haldeman and John D. Ehrlichman in a shakeup stemming from the Watergate

He fired White House counsel John Dean III. Nixon named Secretary of Defense Elliot Richardson to become acting attorney general and overseer of all federal investigations of the Watergate conspiracy.

Resigning from the White House staff were chief of staff H. R. Haldeman, domestic policy assistant John D. Ehrlichman and presidential counsel John Dean III.

After making these announcements, press secretary Ronald L. Ziegler said Nixon has asked for nationwide radio and television time to talk to the nation on the Watergate case at 9 p.m. EDT.

Nixon said in a statement that Kleindienst "asked to be relieved as attorney general because he felt that he could not appropriately continue as head of the Justice Department now that it appears its investigation of the Watergate and related cases may implicate individuals with whom he has had a close personal and professional association."

Saying he would nominate Richardson as attorney general, Nixon said that pending Senate action to confirm his choice, "I have asked him to involve himself immediately in the investigative process surrounding the Watergate matter.

He went on

"As attorney general, Mr. Richardson will assume full responsibility and authority for coordinating all federal agencies in uncovering the whole truth about this matter and recommending appropriate changes in the law to prevent future campaign abuses of the sort recently uncovered. He will have total support from me in getting this job done.

Viet Vet Surrenders

By CHRIS NELSON And GARY TAYLOR Herald Staff Writers

A young Sanford Vietnam veteran holding his two small children bostage kept police at bay for 30 minutes with rifle and pistol fire this morning before surrending as officers stormed the door of his mother's grocery store.

No injuries were reported as James Sheppard, 24, of Seminole Gardens fell into the arms of waiting police while other officers ran into the small 9th Street grocery to rescue the children, whose cries of terror had been heard throughout the

Sheppard, shouting "help me. ..help me. . ." surrendered to police at 10:35 after firing dozens of shots into the houses and trees in front of Sheppard's Grocery.

His mother supposedly in the store, remained unaccounted for, according to worried neighbors gathering

after the shooting subsided. His daughter, Serana, 3, and son Thomas, 2, were not hurt.

As police rushed the building, reporters and several witnesses heard shouts allegedly made by a police lieutenant to "kill him. kill him," just as Sheppard stepped to the door, arms raised in surrender.

Police Chief Ben Butler, who headed the capture, flatly denied the charge

No National Boundaries For Energy Crisis La

The energy crisis knows no national boundaries. Japan, the only nation that has suffered the terrors of the atomic bomb, 28 years later is building the world's biggest nuclear power

High atop a cliff overlooking the Pecific near Fukishima, 160 miles northeast of Tokyo, the General Electric Co. is supervising installation of six giant reactors that by 1976 will provide 4 per cent of Japan's energy. By 1985, Japanese plans call for atomic stations capable of generating 60 million kilowatts of electrical power, or about one-fourth of projected needs

Although the United States has a long lead on Japan in total nuclear energy, the largest U.S. complex at Brown's Ferry, Tenn., in the Tennessee Valley Authority, is only half as big as Fukishima.

"The unique 'understandings' between the Japanese government and private industry have allowed them to plunge ahead on a huge scale." says Cos Sfikas, a Lynn, Mass., engineersalesman who directs GE sales efforts in Japan.

"But the time and tides are catching up here, too. There is more pressure from environmental groups. The powerful Fisherman's Association is demanding compensation because of thermal effects on ocean life. There are disputes between local and national taxing bodies. More hearings are demanded. The lead time on future projects is already twice as long."

Despite these pressures, it appears that Japan may move ahead faster than the United States in massive nuclear projects. Dependent on oil imports from the Middle East for more than 90 per cent of its energy and 70 per cent of its electric generating capacity, the Tokyo government is clearly rushing to develop

Chile Unchanged

As commentators try to interpret the results of the recent election in Chile, we are reminded that the way any election turns out depends on how voters themselves analyze the issues. With President Salvador Allende picking up some support for his government, yet remaining outnumbered by the opposition in the Chilean Congress, it is apparent that many Chileans are at opposite poles in interpreting causes of the problems afflicting their country.

The problems are vivid enough-shortages of food and consumer goods, galloping inflation, slowdowns in industrial production, strikes and frequent outbursts of civil and social strife

Spending Curb Is Only Solution

It may have been only coincidence that the U.S. Senate chose the week before the tax deadline for a rare show of responsibility toward federal spending. It voted to impose a \$268 billion ceiling on next year's federal budget. Perhaps to show that President Nixon has no monopoly on fiscal restraint, the ceiling was pegged just a shade under the \$268.7 billion in the ndministration's budget requests.

Battles remain to be fought over the specific ways that spending should be held within such a limit, but it is significant nonetheless that Congress may finally be recognizing that there is far more to gain by limiting the size of the federal budget than by letting it grow and looking for more money to

This healthy shift of attitude may owe something to the fact that Sen. George McGovern painted himself into a corner on the tax reform issue last year. In his presidential campaign he banked heavily on "closing tax oopholes" as a means of financing some of the new spending programs he ws proposing. Under Chilean Reds

Law And Order Just A Joke

SANTIAGO - "It's the only insurance worth having these days," said the Chilean storekeeper, patting a "Law and order are just a joke in Chile, but people still

Storekeepers are particularly vulnerable in Chile today because President Salcador Allende's Marxist government blames them for the country's severe food shortages. Actually, while hoarding and speculation have contributed to a flourishing black market, the chief culprit is the government itself. The Marxists' chaotic agrarian reform has cut farin output to the point that Chile is spending over \$400 million annually in food imports. The Chilean slum dweller, however, accepts the

Hence, the sacking of stores by angry mobs has become commonplace in Chile. An appeal to the police usually is fruitless as Chile's carabineros have orders "to look the

Storekeepers are not the only people who worry about the lack of law and order. Despite legislation prohibiting the unauthorized ownership of any firearm, thousands of Chileans keep their own private arsenals ready for any The armed forces claim they know where most of the

guns are located and that the weapons can be seized at a moment's notice. However, the question worrying many Chileans is, will the military seize them?

Up to now, neither the armed forces nor the carabineros has shown much inclination to intervene in anything less than the most extreme public disorder. One example would be the 25-day transport and commerce strike sponsored by the political opposition last October. The law-and-order question is closely linked to the issue

of military intervention. So long as the country's traditionally apolitical armed forces remain loyal to the constitutionally elected president, Allende can ignore isolated but daily incidents of violence.

Allende has carefully wooed the armed forces during his 29 months in government. He and his Communist-Socialist coalition are keenly aware that the longevity of Chile's experiment in Marxism depends entirely on the generals' good

So far, his assiduous courtship has produced ample

The 25,000-man police force no longer seems as axnious to protect the rights of property owners as they were in pre-Marxist days. Consequently, land invasions have become ordinary occurrences, in the cities as well as rural areas. The poorer classes who form the backbone of Allende's electoral strength now find the carabineros "much more

grocery - I look at labels. I am more delighted to find an item that contains the proper diglycerides and propylene glycol monostearates than I would be to find filet mignon at 73 cents a pound.

An otherwise likely candidate for our larder goes back on the shelf when my magnifying glass reveals

that the forbidden hydrogenated vegetable oil lurks among such innocuous ingredients as ferric orthophosphate, isopropyl citrate, pyridoxine and lecithin. Fortunately, the food industry knows which side its shortening-free

bread is margerined on, and has come up with lookalikes for some of the items that are off limits in low cholesterol diets. Cream, a definite no-no, has all sorts of stand-ins, from pale powders that come in jars to liquids that hang out in small cardboard

cartons and try to emulate their fatty cousins in looks and coffeelightering activities.


Since egg yolks are packed chock full of cholesterol milligrams, my husband's over-easy breakfast piece de resistance has been eliminated. However, all has not been lost. A substitute egg, which resembles the real thing in every way except

Costly, Wasteful Housing Program Fails of Its Aim

A recent in-house review of federal housing and urban renewal programs does not present a pretty picture. The rehabilitation loan program has provided quarter billion dollars in subsidized 2 per cent, 20-year loans over the past eight years to selected owners and tenants to promote the rehabilitation of property in


Investigators uncovered the distressing fact that in some localities, overhead or administrative expenses have accounted for half of the costs of the program In a majority of cases, the aid did not go to help the neediest families. Well over half of the subsidized loans have been going to persons with incomes above the median in their areas. Nearly 500 went to those earning

Though the improvement of substandard housing was a major objective, most of the housing being subsidized already met minimum housing code standards. Families receiving the loans used the funds for additional im-

The situation in the 24-year-old \$13 billion urban renewal is worse. The studies indicate a substantial part of the federal subsidy has been going to land speculators who have unloaded land at several times its worth. In one eastern city local officials documented chased land at more than double its appraised value the price paid exceeded the appraisal by more than 500 per cent in nine instances, by 1,000 per cent in five, by 1,500 per cent in three and by 2,000 per cent

Participating cities must observe 1,800 pages of federal regulations. Local officials must, of necessity, spend much of their time finding ways of staying within or circumventing the rules. In many cases this further distorts the objectives.

Commitments now outstanding in federal low-rent public housing, rent supplement, home ownership assistance and rental housing programs are expected to cost the taxpayer \$57 billion to \$82 billion in direct subsidy payments over the life of the projects. Yet the investigators have found these programs provided "a fortunate few with new housing while comparable families pay more for unsubsidized housing





Rogers Talks On Indochina

By HARRISON HUMPHRIES Associated Press Writer WASHINGTON (AP) - Secretary of State William P. Rogers appears before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee today in the face of mounting congressional concern over continued fighting in Indochina.

During his last appearance, in February, Rogers expressed administration confidence that the Jan. 27 Vietnam cease-fire agreement would be observed. Within the past two weeks, however, the United States and North Vietnam have formally accused each other of violating the agreement; U.S. bombers have intensified strikes in Cambodia, and the White House has announced that Henry A. Kissinger will return to Paris for talks seeking "strict implementation" of the accord.

The Senate Foreign Relations Committee released on Friday a staff report on stepped-up U.S. bombing in Cambodia. The study concluded that the United States is "far more deeply and directly involved in the conduct of the war in Cambodia than ever before."

The report disclosed a daily average of 58 B52 bombing sorties beginning March 16, three times the rate of the first two weeks in March, and an average of 184 tactical and gunship sorties draw.

Concentration of the attacks shifted by mid-April, the report said, from North Vietnamese and their supply lines to predominantly Cambodian rebels fighting the government forces of President Lon Nol.

O'Malley Pal Under Indictment

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) - Florida Insurance Commissioner Tom O'Malley says he's not worried about testimony to a federal grand jury on his friendship with a representative of a firm recently indicted on bribery charges in two states. The Tampa Tribune has reported. O'Malley confirmed that he was called to testify "probably in August" last year by the Buffalo, N.Y. grand jury about his friendship with Horace Drew, a Florida representative of Automatic Voting Machines Co., the newspaper said. AVM and local officials have

been indicted in Texas and Arkansas on bribery charges. "As far as I'm concerned, I have nothing to worry about on that matter," O'Malley was quoted as saying. "I went and testified. I answered all their questions to the best of my


