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Whirlway Living In Lap Of Luxury In Bluegrass Area

LEXINGTON, Ky. — Whirlway's not making much money these days, but he's knee deep in bluegrass, cutting three spots a week, and having the time of his young life, once a fortune he piled up in a little more than three years' track.

At five, the stud of Warren Springs, a chestnut, is making a career which earned him more money than any other thoroughbred in the history of the track, \$501,101.50 that was only one career. His next one begins in 1944, when he enters the stud at Calumet Farm, where he was foaled and where he now lives. He's "Mr. Thoroughbred." Now Whirlway may be "Mr. Long Tail" to those thousands of fans who watched him win 32 of his 40 races, but he is "Mr. Thoroughbred" to the boys at Calumet.

The son of Blenheim II Dust whirl who returned home from the racing wars on July 6, spent the first days back on the farm acquainted with a new surrounding. His handlers started unwinning him and then Whirlway was turned loose in his paddock. He's having a good time, said Bill Bell, who has charge of the Calumet Farm studs. "He is a nice-mannered horse, looks fine and already is putting on a little weight."

Whirlway took the No. 1 spot at the barn, where three other studs, Sun, Teddy, Champ, Play and Bull Lea are quartered. The name will be mounted on his forehead.

Incidentally, Man O'War, who was retired from the stud last Spring at the age of 25, is quartered at Faraway Farm, only a few miles from Whirlway.

Stud Fee To Bring \$1,500
Several bookings already have been made for the Wright thoroughbred next year for a stud fee of \$1,500. Thus, it would be possible for one of Whirlway's sons or daughters to be competing in the 1945 Kentucky Derby.



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Canadians Are Told No Plans By Roosevelt

Axis Will Discover What Quebec Conference Did In Due Time, FDR Declares

OTTAWA, Aug. 25, (AP)—President Roosevelt told the people of Canada today that the United States and Great Britain had attended the Quebec war conference and that they should have realized that "surrender would pay them better now than later."

The American Chief Executive did not drop a hint as to the specific matters of war strategy discussed in the conference which ended yesterday but said that in due time "we shall communicate the secret information of the Quebec conference to Germany, Italy and Japan in the only language their twisted minds seem capable of understanding."

He spoke from the archway of the peace tower in the main parliamentary building of the Dominion.

He closed with a paragraph in French for the benefit of the Canadians of French descent who were present.

U. S. Civilians Plans Completed

Allocated 75% For Dedication Of Food Production Recreation House

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25, (AP)—President Roosevelt advised American civilians today that they have been allocated 75 percent of the nation's food production for the current fiscal year.

He said in a quarterly Lend-Lease report to Congress that current "domestic food shortages" are due to increased consumption by the armed forces and civilians who were not due to any appreciable extent to Lend-Lease shipments abroad.

He said the Food Administration had tentatively allocated food production for the year ending June 30, 1944 as follows: 75 percent to the civilian population, 13 percent to the armed forces, 10 percent to Lend-Lease and 2 percent to the United States territories and special needs.

The President also reported that except for the responsible Fascist leaders, "the people of the Axis need not fear unconditional surrender to the United States."



Verdict Gives City Right Of Way On Park

Property Owners To Be Compensated For Additional Land and Trees Removed

A jury in Circuit Court yesterday gave the city of Sanford the right of way on the condemnation proceedings which had been instituted in order to improve and extend the right of way on Park Avenue between Tenth Street and Twenty-third Street to permit widening of the pavement from 24 to 44 feet.

The actions and proceedings moving back sidewalks, tree (not) impeding trees and shrubbery, which must be removed, were to be compensated for, together with the value of the land it was decided by the court.

All paving, removal and relocation of sidewalks and other work will be done by the State at state expense. All other owners of property along this section of Park Avenue have voluntarily donated to the city the necessary right of way, according to City Attorney Fred R. Wilson.

Health Unit Has Supply Of Insulin

The Seminole County Health Unit has a supply of insulin on hand to be distributed to indigent patients through their personal physicians. It was announced today by Dr. Leola H. Dams, the insulin is used in the treatment of diabetes and is available to all indigent persons in the State of Florida. Funds making this possible have been appropriated by the Florida Legislature, he stated.

Patients needing insulin must be citizens of Florida and must have a signed statement from a doctor of medicine saying they are in need of the drug but are unable to pay for it. Any person who makes a fraudulent application for and obtains insulin contrary to these conditions is punishable by law, Dr. Dams said.

Application forms for insulin can be obtained from the county health officer of any county having a full-time health unit, or they can be obtained from the Florida State Board of Health, P. O. Box 219, Jacksonville, Fla.

School Classes Will Be Hit By Teacher Shift

Transfers To Armed Services, War Industries Cut Deep

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25, (AP)—Thousands of classrooms will be closed and other complications will be caused when schools open this fall because of the teacher shortage. A recent National Education Association survey shows 75,000 fewer teachers than usual signed up by the country's elementary and high schools. This study estimated that later sign-ups would leave a shortage of 15,000 to 25,000. The armed forces and war jobs have been calling teachers from their former work in the white north.

Commenting on the teacher situation in Seminole County, Supt. I. W. East said today: "By using every available teacher including those who have taught in the past, we expect to have very little shortage of teachers in the white north."

In the colored schools, however, there will be a shortage due to the fact that a number of the teachers at the County Academy have been taken by the draft, he said.

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Civilians Save Tomato Tie-Up 7 Miles Long

1,000 Unload Trucks At Camden; 600 Soldiers Take Over Job

CAMDEN, N.J., Aug. 23 (AP)—A threatened food production crisis here Monday as 1,000 civilian volunteers pitched in and unloaded miles of waiting trucks loaded with tomatoes that were about to spoil in a hot sun that had ripened them all at once.

When the line forms again tomorrow, the civilian volunteers will give way to 600 soldiers from Fort Dix, N.J., who have been granted leave and given permission by the War Department to work in the huge plant of the Campbell Soup Company. This contingent will be replaced Wednesday by another group of 600 soldiers.

A file and drum corps contributed to the gala occasion as volunteers from other industries and business firms in Camden and nearby communities gave up their Sunday holiday to relieve the manpower shortage at the Campbell plant at the peak of tomato canning.

The trucks, many of which had been 24 hours in a line that stretched for nearly seven miles away from the plant at one time, began to move with normal rapidity and the peak of 507 trucks was whittled down to sixty-six by mid-afternoon. Late today, A.C. Dorrance, president of the company, announced with satisfaction:

"A tomato was spoiled."

This was the second Sunday in the company's history that the plant was in operation. The first time was last year when a combination of hot sun and dry weather ripened the tomatoes on the surrounding farms all at once, and considerable spoilage resulted from the lack of man power to handle the situation.

The troops arriving tomorrow will be fed at the Campbell plant and quarters in Camden's Convention Hall. They will be paid the prevailing wage of 66 2/3 cents an hour, in addition to their Army pay.

Rehabilitation Of Combat Fliers Begun At Miami

Returning From Overseas Men To Be Fitted For New Tasks

MIAMI BEACH, Aug. 23 (AP)—The army air forces announced yesterday the beginning of a new program to fit returning combat fliers into new jobs that will give them the greatest opportunity to help win the war.

Assuming command of a new redistribution center, Col. Luther Hill declared in a press conference that officers and men returning from overseas would be sent here for a period of careful individual study before being assigned.

With 70 Men To Jobs

It is the first time, he said, that an effort was being made to place each man in the job for which he was best fitted.

The program will serve as a model for the ground forces and special branches of the armed services, Colonel Hill said, and eventually will be merged into a planned demobilization at the end of the war.

The station here, and one at Atlantic City, will begin operations simultaneously, the first man arriving about the middle of September.

A third station will be established in the near future, depending on the needs of officers and men overseas, Colonel Hill said.

"No matter how good a pilot or a gunner may be, he can't be expected to continue on combat duty indefinitely."

"After a period in the war theaters on the home front, each man will be sent here, or one of the other redistribution stations for a thorough physical check, and study on an individual basis."

Plan Physical Program

"He will get a chance to play around on the home front and get a kind of recreation that will smooth away the stresses of combat flying. At the same time he will be given a thorough physical check. We will talk to classification and personnel experts. His personal record will be studied. From all this, his next assignment will be worked out."

"Some will return directly to combat duty, some will become instructors. Some will be around the home front, and some will be sent to civilian life."

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Cost Of Foods Is Lower Now Than In 1918

OPA Issues Comparisons, Shows Sharp Price Rise In 1919

NEW YORK, Aug. 25. (AP)—Retail prices of common food commodities at the end of the first world war, in November, 1918, were much higher than now, according to a comparison of prices released by the Federal Office of Price Administration director, said recently as he released a comparison of prices.

From official government sources, Mr. Russell compared war-time prices on bread, bacon, eggs, butter, lard, rice, sugar and coffee.

In an effort to show the effectiveness of the O.P.A. price control program holding down the cost of living.

The comparison showed that bacon in November, 1918 sold at 50 cents a pound, while now the selling price is 42 cents a pound. Eggs at the end of the last war were selling for 51 cents a dozen; today they are 59 cents for medium Grade A.

Butter at 75 cents in 1918. The current ceiling price on Grade A tub sweet butter is 50 cents a pound, but consumers in November, 1918 had to pay about 75 cents, while lard then was selling for 36 cents a pound and can be purchased now for 19 cents a pound.

White bread, which in 1918 cost about 10 cents a pound, now is selling for about 9 cents a pound, and the ceiling price on packaged rice is now 12 cents a pound, compared with 17 cents in 1918. Sugar, now selling for 8 cents

a pound packaged, cost the consumer about 12 1/2 cents a pound then, while coffee packed in tins sold for 49 cents a pound in the last war, as compared with 44 cents now.

Even more significant, said Mr. Russell, was the extent to which food prices rose after the last war. According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the Department of Labor, sugar, for example, sold at 28 1/2 cents a pound in July, 1920, and bacon at about 55 cents a pound.

Over-all price picture according to B.L.S. statistics, also was shown in the index of retail prices, based upon an index of 100, for 1913. Retail food prices were at 168.3 in 1918, and 146.9 in 1919, jumping to 291.1 in 1920. The B.L.S. report showed that on a base index of 100 for 1935-39 prices, increases were at 113.1 in December, 1941, and at 113 in May, 1943.




"Cobb was one of the best competitors I've seen," he said. "And you can't overlook the records he piled up."

TAMPA, Aug. 25, (FNS)—Just prior to his departure for Key West to attend the Senate Sub-Committee hearing on the question of refunding Key West's municipal indebtedness, Pat Whittaker, retained by the committee as its attorney, stated that the sole concern of the investigation made at the request of city officials and conducted at their expense, was to bring out the true facts in the case.

He said he had gathered a mass of information and some very startling facts would be revealed which would prove of genuine interest to taxpayers, not only in Key West but throughout the state.

The investigation is being conducted by a sub-committee of the Shands Committee with Senator John Beacham of West Palm Beach serving as chairman, the

other members being Senator J.A. Franklin of Ft. Myers and Senator J. Ed Baker of Umatilla. Two other members of the committee have been asked to sit in on the hearing, Beacham said, Senator Shands of Gainesville and Senator Walter Rose of Orlando, all of whom are expected to attend the public meeting scheduled to be held in Key West this week.

Officials and citizens of Key West are aroused over the blocking of this refunding program which represents a saving of approximately a million dollars to taxpayers and caused their appeal for the investigation by the Shands Committee a short time ago.
