# County focus: Projects, how to pay for them

SANFORD - The Seminole County Commissioners will be asked to agree to a plan Tuesday for financing \$6.1 million in capital projects with cash to be repaid through a bond lasue in 1996.

During his morning briefing prior to a work session and regular board meeting, County Manager Ron Rabun will ask Seminole County commissioners for concurrence of the internal financing plan for new voting machines, a new radio communications system and expansion of the health department.

For nearly a year, the county has been structuring a bond issue to pay for four capital projects totally \$20.6 million. The projects include the \$14.5 million construction of a public mafety complex, \$3.5 million 800 Bee County, Page SA

from urban to rural areas without more money for police and prevention programs, says a survey by lawmakers.

In polling sheriffs statewide about gang problems, the House Juvenile Justice Committee got some startling answers from rural areas like Sumter County.

"it's kind of raising its ugly head here, and we're trying to nip it before it gets any worse." Sumter County Chief Deputy Bill Farmer said.

Harriett said the Seminole County sheriff's office is not so naive as to think there is not a potential for gang problems in this county.

"We are dealing with it," Harriett said. "We are taking a pro-active stance against this becoming a problem.

The 1996 Legislature will have to decide what measures have a chance of curbing the gangs and how many scarce budget dollars to spend, said Rep. Lori Edwards, chairwoman of a Juvenile Justice subcommittee reviewing the report.

"Certainly it's a squeeze, but the highest priority we can offer our citizens is their safety," said Edwards. "That it's spreading to rural areas is a major concern."

In the survey, 32 sheriffs said they could identify 380 gangs involving nearly 11,600 youths. and a third said gang activity was a serious problem in their counties.

 Forty percent of the counties with problems reported no gang activity in a 1967 survey. More than two-thirds of the sheriffs said with current resources, the problem would get worse by the year 2000.

"If we didn't have the GREAT program we think it could get worse," Diaz said. "But I think we are giving the young people the tools they need to stay out of gangs.

The 1987 survey by a House panel pinpointed Miami as a gang hotbed with less, but growing, activity in the Jacksonville, Orlando and Tampa

That study said Florida had all the ingredients for gang growth including rapid urbanization. substantial pockets of poverty, rapid population growth and an ethnic mix rivaling that of

California. It noted that gangs were increasingly being organized as drug distribution networks and said growth in drug dealing was leading to an increase in murder, burglary, car theft, violence, gunplay and strong-arm theft.

Edwards added another reason for growing gang allegiance: the decline of the traditional family.

"It offers kids a sense of belonging that they are not getting at home," she said.
In Seminole County, Diaz

noted, there are a lot of young people who like to emulate gang-like behaviors, by their activities.

"I think there are some emerging problems that we can prevent," he said. "There are a ot of wanna-be (gang members) out there. We are doing what we can to intervene before it becomes a problem."

He said that in combatting the gang problem there has to be prevention, intervention and enforcement.

In the new survey mailed out this summer, even some rural countles reported serious gang activity.

# Recycling tops 100 million pounds

SANFORD - Like that little pink bunny who keeps going and going and going, the grass, trees, plants and flowers in this state of perpetual sunshine keeps growing and growing and growing. That means there is a lot of clipping, trimming, pruning and cutting which translates into yard waste.

Seminole County residents recycled 8 million pounds of yard waste during August in the curbside program. Another 4.5 million pounds of yard waste was delivered to county facilities, bringing the yard waste total to 12.5 million for August.

Materials recycled last month pushed the

total for the year over the 100 million pounds mark to 104.5 million pounds. The figures are based on the flocal year which goes from October through the following September, it is the first time since the recycling program began in November 1990 that an annual total has topped 100 million

Along with the yard waste diverted from the county landfill, 1.6 million pounds of glass, plastic, newspapers, aluminum and steel cans were collected in the curbside program. Cardboard to also collected for recycling in Sanford.

With the addition of .3 million pounds of commercial recyclables from city and county programs and .5 million pounds processed at the county small material recycling facility (SMRP), a total of 14.9 million pounds of recyclables were collected in August.

Recycling efforts have increased steadily over the past five years from 17.4 million pounds for 1990-91 (11 months); 73.7 million pounds, 1991-92; 86.8 million pounds, 1992-93; 87.2 million pounds, 1993-94; 1994-95 through August, 104.5 million. Since April, 1992 yard waste has been separated and collected curbaids for recycling throughout all of Seminole County as required by the State of Florida. Recycling helps extend the life span of landfills.

# Discussion: **Appointing** volunteers to boards


Now, Mayor Bettye Smith is proposing suggestions which may make the process more acceptable to commission members who make appointment recommendations.

Many months ago, during consideration for board appointments, it was suggested that no one be considered unless they have filed a statement with the city asking appointment to certain boards. This has been accompliahed by only a few persons however. In many cases, individual commissioners are merely contacted by persons wishing to be named to fill vacancies on certain boards. Their names are subsequently placed into nomination by that particular commissioner.

At other times, appointments were suggested by a commissioners to fill vacancies, when others admitted they did not know the person or his or her qualifications. In some cases, relying on the judgement of the person making the recommendation, the remainder of the commission approved the

At one commission meeting, a suggestion was made by one commissioner for a person to replace a resigning board member. Other commissioners however, indicated they were not even aware of the resignation.

Summers cut the belt with a knife and assisted Mrs. King out of the burning wreckage. The motor home was destroyed by the flames

Both of the Kings required hospitalization for extensive injuries, with Mrs. King's including second-degree burns. Summers recovered with a cut



# Words of caution

Words of caution to store clerks. There is a man going around Sanford ripping you off. He is using an old magician's trick to con you

into giving him more change than he's due.
Two cases were reported on Sept. 7 within a two block area, and only minutes apart, on S. Orlando Drive. A third incident was reported this past Tuesday.

In all three cases, the man either gives a clerk large bills to pay for small purchases, or asks for change in lower denominations. When the money is given by the clerk, he immediately displays much lower denomination bills, and accuses the clerk of giving the wrong change.

In all three of these cases, the clerks. wishing to be honest representatives of the business community, appologize and give what the customer says is the proper amount. The clerk has been conned.

Almost any amateur magician could pull this. It's sleight-of-hand. Hand them a \$50 bill, and within a split-second, they will show only a \$5 bill in the hand. If you don't see what happens, and it does move swiftly, then you probably have no other choice but to believe him.

Basically, it's similar to some of the card tricks we see from time to time. It's always amazing to see this person constantly pulling an ace out of his hand no matter what card he in dealt

The man isn't greedy. In all three cases, he has just taken \$50 to \$60 before leaving. Store owners may not even believe reporting such a low theft is worthwhile, so we don't know for certain if this has only happened

The sleight-of-hand thief apparently knows

that he may not even be reported. In addition, he gives clerks an impression that he is the average customer. On one occasion, he even had a small child in his arms, giving the appearance of an honest daddy out trying to get some change for his large bills.

We suggest store owners and clerks take three steps.

Number one, if someone asks for change for large bills, have another clerk or some other witness on hand to verify the amount given to

Number two, if there is any doubt whatsoever, ask for photo identification and take down the name and other information.

And number three, regardless of how small the theft may have been, if this man succeeds in ripping you off for a few dollars, report it to the police as soon as possible.

Hopefully, this person will trip up sooner or later, and will be apprehended. In the meantime, be careful. There's a magician in our midsts, and he wants to make your money disappear.



# The search for a college president

Seminole Community College was established by legislative edict in 1965. SCC has had a single president, Dr. Earl S. Weldon, He founded the college and has shepherded its expansion during his tenure. Dr. Weldon will retire effective Jan. 31, 1996 after 30 years of service.

The brochure announcing the search for a new president was well presented. The college has grown and provides academic instruction for 30,000 students annually. The campus grounds are scenic covering nearly 200 acres, with 16 permanent buildings.

The trustees of SCC appointed a 19-member presidential search committee several months ago. The committee includes a county commissioner, a banker, business people, physicians, employees of SCC, retirees and SCC students. They reside in Altamonte Springs, Casselberry, Lake Mary, Longwood, Oviedo and Sanford, Lee P. Moore and William Schaffner were elected chairman and vice chairman respectively. The three students serving on the committee are: Lynda Dawson, Stacey Danielle Maye and William Joseph Tiner Sr. The remaining members are: Win Adams, Ruby Nathan Blake, Michael B. Butler, M.D., Elnora Gilchrist, Lynda Graham Mays, Renee Mayer, S. Kirby Moncrief, Van Parker, M.D., Eliza Pringle, Annye Refoe, Matti San-Andres, Janice Springfield, M. Lisa



Valentino and Joseph Williams. For any volunteer citisens' group, choosing a president for the college is a challenge of great magnitude. The results of the committee's deliberations will impact the college and this community well into the next century.

A national search is in process and the position was advertised in: The Chronicle of Higher Education; Women in Higher Education; Black Issues in Higher Education and Hispanic Outlook in Higher Education. Other publications were also utilized.

The committee is currently meeting weekly. Originally there were 101 candidates from about 32 states. Approximately 25 percent of the applicants live in Florida. The committee must


submit their final recommendations to the trustees by Wednesday, Oct. 25. The list of applicants has been reduced to 14.

The trustees are acheduled to select the new president at their regular meeting, Tuesday, Dec. 5, 1995. The new president will be installed Feb.

As the chief executive officer of SCC, Dr. Weldon and SCC are generally thought of simultaneously, one evokes visions of the other. It is a singular accomplishment for an educator to have been responsible for the development of an educational institution. We congratulate Dr. Weldon as he contemplates retirement.

# Who will take care of the kids?

BOSTON - In the rush to overhaul welfare, we must have missed the eulogy hidden in all the rhetoric. After all, this policy-making ian't just about ending welfare as we know it. It marks the end of a long cultural debate about motherhood as we knew it.

Democrats and Republicans, Senate and House, left and right, are wrangling over the details. But they have already arrived at a consensus as radical as it is unacknowledged. It's a consensus that says: A mother's place is in the work force.

The Democrats called their plan "Work First." they labeled the Republicana' plan "Hone Alone." But no one in this rancorous session argued that poor mothers should be at home with their children. Rather, they were arguing about child care funds, about whether anyone would be with those children.

To consider how profound a shift this is, just look back to the origins of welfare. Over half a century ago, the program was deliberately set up to enable widows to care for their children. It purposely discouraged them from going to work. People assumed that children should be with their mothers and that it was poundfoolish to pay others to care for these young. Mothers knew best.

Fast forward to the 1950s when the cultural pressures were overwhelmingly in favor of full-time motherhood. Fast forward to the late movement to "end 1960s when the women's movement first broke through those domestic boundaries. Even then, feminists self-consciously, deliberately, insisted that they were in favor of choice: a woman's choice to stay home or go to work.

Fast forward again, at dizzying speed, through the 1970s and 1980s when a tidal wave of mothers went to work, not to exercise their choice, but because they had no choice. They entered a work world that remains to this

day resolutely hostile to family life.
In a world of working mothers, we have arrived at the point where there is virtually no public support for AFDC. Indeed the women struggling hardest at the lowest-paying jobs are often the most angry at paying taxes for others to stay home. This anger is the real 'mommy war" in America.

The ideal of motherhood - the images and the emotions wrapped up in the age-old portrait of mother and child - makes this a tender subject, too tender to be dismissed in public corridors. It's never explicitly said that children are not better off with their mothers.

Indeed in the welfare debate, it is remarkable how rarely the word "mother" is heard unless it is preceded by the phrase "teen-age" or "unwed." The preferred phrase is "people on welfare" and occasionally "able-bodied recipients" - as if AFDC had suddenly become an equal opportunity program.

'People," said Newt Gingrich, "ought to have to do something for any resources they

get if they are able-bodied under the age of retirement."

"I want a comprehensive welfare bill," said Phil Gramm. "that asks the people riding in the wagon to get out of the wagon and help the

So much for the old button that read "Every mother is a working mother." These "people"

are not doing "something": they are burdensome passengers in the wagon. The message about

what constitutes good motherhood circa 1995 is clear. This summer. Massachusetts Gov. Bill Weld, waxing poetically about welfare reform. talked about the proud look in a child's eyes when his mother went off to her first job. Was that child 15 or 2? Does it still matter?

So too, Bill Clinton, who initiated the welfare as we know

it," talks regularly about "parental responsibility." But "parental responsibility" for a poor. mother now includes a job.

Who will take

care of the children?

We continue to praise middle-class women who leave the work force for child-raising. No leaders worth their re-election would demean these women or preach that they are somehow "irresponsible." But we insist that poor women leave their children for work.

Rather than acknowledging any conflict in these messages, we divide the two groups of unemployed mothers - not by class or by fate or by a husband's paycheck — into moral categories. The one virtuous, the other promiscuous, lazy, maybe neglectful. We would rather not know how many of today's AFDC mothers were yesterday's married mothers.

But as a working mother nearly all my life I know how hard it is. I know how laughable the supports are that this Congress proposes as part of the package to overhaul the lives of families on welfare. And as someone who has watched the vast transformation in American society, I see the old ideas of motherhood finally crashing to the ground with hardly a

We have come through a great change of mind about mothering. And yet we still haven't answered the question asked at the onset: "Who will take care of the children?"

# Pork-laden helium project flies high

WASHINGTON -- It takes a lot for a government program, once begun, to run out of gas - but the federal helium reserve. initiated seven decades ago for a fleet of military blimps, may finally be doing just that.

The Helium Field Operations Project. operated by the U.S. Bureau of Mines and located in Amarillo, Texas, has vied for years with federal mohair subsidies for top honors as the government's most ridiculed pork barrel

Yet the program Reagan couldn't axe it, even in the early days of his presidency when his popularity was highest. In fact, the story of its survival and expected demise is a classic Washington tale of how our

The story of its survival and expected demise is a Washington tale of how our government really works.

government really works. In the early days following World War I, the U.S. military envisioned a large fleet of blimps to be used for reconnaissance, bomb delivery and other duties. So the government began stockpiling helium, which was far better than the flammable gas the Germans

The program puttered along for decades, receiving a huge infusion of cash in 1960 when the government bought the entire reserve for \$258 million borrowed from the American taxpayer. And over time, the program accumulated far more helium than the government will ever need. The current reserve - 32 billion cubic feet - is enough to supply the United States for 80 years - or the entire world for a decade.

Defenders of the helium reserve claim the program should be kept because it turns a 'profit" - \$12 million in 1994. But this is a profit on paper only, since it's one govern-ment agency seiling helium to another. Besides, if NASA and the Defense Department weren't required by law to buy their helium from Uncle Sam, they could find it on the private market at far lower prices.

After years of ridiculing the program, deficit hawks in Congress thought the program was doomed when the Clinton administration set about to "reinvent" government. The word around Congress was that the president's "National Performance Review" would target the program for elimination.

But those hopes faded when Clinton desperately needed an extra vote for his 1993 budget plan, which passed the House of Representatives by a one-vote margin. One of the most critical votes in that dramatic debate belonged to then-Rep. Bill Sarpalius. D-Texas, who just happened to represent the Amarillo district where 200 voting citizens work for the helium program.

Sarpalius told our associate Dale Van Atta that he never cut a specific deal with Clinton in exchange for his vote. But he does acknowledge speaking with Clinton four times on the day of the vote - and that he used his time with the president to push for the helium program. Ultimately, Sarpalius voted with Clinton. Soon thereafter, the helium program escaped criticism when the National Performance Review was released.

Despite his heroic efforts to save the helium program. Sarpalius wasn't rewarded by his Amarillo constituents, who bounced him in favor of Republican Mac Thornberry in the 1994 elections. The helium opponents once again had reason to cheer. Even Clinton who was released from his pledge once Sarpalius was defeated - came out against the helium program.

Health Check, an interactive computer program that gives personalized nutritional profiles and looks and works like an automatic teller machine, will be available for free consumer use at the Orlando Fashion Square on Colonial Drive in Orlando on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Sept. 29, 30 and Oct. 1.

The machine looks like a giant bottle of One-A-Day vitamins and contains a computer that will help consumers assess the nutritional values of what they are eating and drinking on an average day.

They simply click various computer prompts to give the computer the information about their daily diet to be analysed.

The computer analyzes the information and provides the consumer with information about their diet.

It also provides a complete nutritional summary report that shows how your diet measures up to the ideal in a number of key areas, including fat. cholesterol protein. carbohydrates, vitamins and minerals.

"It takes a pretty comprehensive look at the nutritional habits of the consumer based on what they tell the computer," Cadey O'Leary of Manning, Selvage, Lee Public Relations, said.

The consumer will be able to get a basic look at their nutritional plan.

"It's not a comprehensive look at their overall health," O'Leary said, "but it gives people an idea of where they are and where they can make some improvements."

# Study links excess weight to cataracts

CHICAGO - Excess weight. which already is linked to heart disease, diabetes and cancer. now appears to promote cata-

Researchers tracked 17,700 doctors ages 40 to 84 from 1982 to 1988. Over that time, 370 of the men developed cataracts, a clouding of the eye's lens that can cause blindness. It is the third leading cause of disability in older Americans.

The most overweight men had

more than twice the likelihood of developing cataracts compared with the leanest men. That was after taking into account differences in age, smoking habits, vitamin intake and other factors that are believed to affect cataract formation.

The researchers blamed 34 percent of cataracts in the study on excess weight - the biggest single cause - compared with 12 percent blamed on smoking. 4 percent on high blood pressure and 2 percent on diabetes.







# Higher water usually means better fishing

Summer rains and quick changes in water levels are often followed by exceptionally good angler success, according to Sam McKinney, regional biologist for the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission.

"Low water, of course, concentrates fish and makes them more accessible to fishermen. High water on the other hand, often stimulates fish to move into recently flooded areas where there is an expanded, more readily available food base. The increased feeding activity often leads to a corresponding increase in fishing success." McKinney said.

The recent downpours experienced in the central region of Florida have certainly increased water levels. In many cases, fishing is better than usual for this time of the summer.

Plastic worms fished in early morning or late afternoon around newly flooded vegetation are producing good action for the angler. Worms of numerous colors are productive, but black, grape and purple seem to be best.



Buzzbaits are also deadly in newly flooded areas of vegetation. These lures can cover a lot of water in a hurry, and this is very important, as fish are usually very scattered.

challenging. Try to tish areas wth clearly defined boundaries. rather than fishing vast acres of newly flooded flats.

Sebastian Inlet continues to provide good action with snook in the 12-20 pound range. The best fishing is early and late in the day and at night. Use live balt in the daytime and lures such as one-ounce jigs at night. Also expect redfish, ladyfish, small bluefish, jack crevalle, and a few trout and flounder. Tarpon and snook are both active in the Sebastian River.

Captain Jack at Port Canaveral reports steady action with king mackerel on Pelican Flats and S-A Reefs. Wahoo and dolphin are scattered offshore, while the buoy line is still a little dirty for king mackerel. Inside the **Fort**, sheepshead and flounder are biting. Trout and redfish are rated as fair on the flats of the Banana and Indian rivers.

Ponce Inlet has plenty of sheepshead in the 1-5 pound range, and they are eagerly hitting live shrimp or fiddler crabs. A few flounder are bitting finger mullet on the south side of

the south jettles. Drum, redfish, small bluefish, jack crevalle and ladyfish are also present, and

will hit live or dead shrimp. Trout and redfish are rated as good in Mosquito Lageon.




# LMHS senior's letter initiates Bob Ross Day

When asked if they wanted to be firefighters when they grew up, one little boy said, "No. I don't like people to wake me up in the middle of the night."



# Accountant spends spare time creating Victorian heirlooms


