DOHENY'S WIFE TAKES STAND IN MATE'S BEHALF

Oil Magnate's Wife Relates Events Concerning Turn Off Signatures To Fall's Note Given Her In 1924

Note And Signature Offered In Evidence

Fall Asked For Loan To Extend His Ranch Holdings

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9.—(AP)—Mrs. Edward L. Doheny, wife of the oil millionaire who is on trial here with Albert B. Fall on charges of criminal conspiracy, took the stand today for the defense.

It was to Mrs. Doheny that her husband gave the torn off signature to the \$100,000 note given Doheny by Fall after the oil magnate had sent him the cash in a little black bag while Fall was in the cabinet.

With Fall's name missing from the note, the note was presented to the Senate on Oct. 15 by Doheny himself, who said he had detached the signature and given it to his wife for safekeeping. Later was found to have been placed in a safe deposit box in Los Angeles.

Mrs. Doheny began her testimony with an account of her husband's residence since 1923. She said she had told her husband that she would not take the money from the note.

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STORM CAUSE OF BIG DAMAGE IN CALIFORNIA

Storm Brings Almost Every Variety Of Weather, Including Thunder And Lightning And Hail, Snows and Rain

Gales Sweep Harbors In Southern Section

Japanese Ship Seino Maru With Crew Of 32 Men Reported To Be In Distress

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 9.—(AP)—Pacific shores from southern California to the Aleutian Islands and along the coast of Japan felt the effects of storms yesterday.

The Japanese freighter Seino Maru in distress off the coast of Hokkaido, with a crew of 32 men. A gale swept the harbors of southern California, wrecking the Yawl Point, once owned by the former German Crown Prince and badly damaging a dozen extensive yachts.

The storm brought almost every variety of weather to the sunny side of the state, including rain, snow, hail, thunder and lightning. Lightning set fire to oil tanks at the Imperial Valley.

At San Pedro harbor, a southeast gale played havoc with a fleet of yachts ranging in size from 10 to 50 feet. The yachts, some of them formerly belonging to the German Crown Prince, were reported by Walter Barber, a local yachtsman, to be in distress.

At Santa Monica, police last night were searching for M. L. Indecott, of Hollywood, who was reported drowned just before the storm broke into a fishing dory a mile off the pier and near the spot where a water-pump formed a short time later. Indecott's automobile was parked near the pier last night.

Snow fell at Fallerton near here for the first time in history. Storms were followed by a down-pour of rain. Motorists were reported marooned in Cajon Pass above San Bernardino by snow banked from eight to ten inches deep.

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Kenneth Ormiston Is Arrested After Nation-Wide Search

HARRISBURG, Pa., Dec. 9.—(AP)—Police heretoday admitted that Kenneth G. Ormiston, wanted in connection with the Almee Sempie McPherson kidnaping case in California, had been arrested here.

Chief of Police Thompson said that Ormiston had been apprehended in a rooming house on South First Street, between 9 and 10 o'clock last night and had been housed in a local hotel last night in custody of Chicago detective and one from the local force.

Police officers expressed surprise at the apprehension of Ormiston and Captain Paig denied any knowledge of why he had been taken to a hotel rather than lodged in the police station. However, Detective Oscar Carson was with two private detectives from Chicago, who made the arrest.

He declined to discuss any of the stories which have linked his name with that of Mrs. McPherson. But he was quite willing to talk about anything and everything else.

"I really can't understand," he was quoted as saying, "why it has taken so long for you to find me or rather for somebody to find me, considering the great number who have been trying. For the fact that I have made no particular effort to hide.

"I have not used any disguise," he said from a different angle. "And I have not avoided public places. I have been occupying my present apartment for two months."

"Many of the cleverest detectives in the United States have stood close enough to me for a handshake and none of them recognized me. That happened at Atlantic City in July and August, when the American Detective Society was in convention at the Ambassador Hotel."

"I was living in Atlantic City then, and I used to stroll through the lobby every day mingling with the detectives. Not one gave me a second glance."

The reporters asked him if he had any communication with Mrs. McPherson since he had been caught.

WOMAN WARDEN IS PLANNING FOR INMATES' FUTURE

Mrs. Jessie Hodder, Head Of Massachusetts State Reformatory, Includes Music, Work, Sunlight In System

HERBORN, Mass., Dec. 9.—(AP)—Work, sunlight, color and music are cardinal points in the system which Mrs. Jessie D. Hodder, superintendent of the state reformatory for women in this town, applies to the inmates.

It was her theory of the psychological value of color in the world that led her to set them to work making flags during the World War.

The women are here to use their time, not to serve it. As the warden Mrs. Hodder expresses, her

belief is that most of the women who really belong to the criminal class are the ones to send her charges out of the reformatory on their terms in such improved mental, moral and physical condition that they will become useful and self-supporting. Her methods at Sherborn have been widely copied.

When a woman is sentenced to Sherborn, she is kept apart from the other inmates for three weeks. During this period the reformatory officials study her character and her interest. Then she is given the work to which she appears best fitted—gardening, cooking, dress-making or other duties.

Each treated individually. The sentences are always indeterminate. Good behavior and rapid progress in the work assigned often lead to a parole. Each woman is treated as an individual. Mrs. Hodder stresses the need of willingness, perseverance, cheerfulness and team spirit.

Every room has plenty of fresh air and sunlight. Photographs, pictures and trinkets are permitted for room decoration. When the last block of the 60-day cells was torn out it was replaced by a gymnasium where the inmates are given regular exercise and an opportunity for games.

This reformatory was a pioneer in providing farm and garden work for women prisoners, which Mrs. Hodder considers a very important factor in their development.

Music is encouraged. The women give numerous concerts and once a year they produce an opera.

Old-Time Miracle Plays, Forerunners Of Modern Drama, Are Still Popular

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Dec. 9.—(AP)—Miracle Plays, the religious spectacles of the early church which were the forerunners of modern drama, still flourish in this vicinity and in parts of old Mexico.

The plays, usually given by the Mexican or Indian residents, were brought to the southwest by Spanish priests hundreds of years ago and have been kept alive since that time, almost in their original state.

Miracle plays were introduced in the medieval days after the church had banned Greek and Roman drama. Usually they were very illustrative tableaux of biblical stories, but in time they developed speaking parts and scenery, and eventually the modern play was evolved.

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Memphis Bank Clerk, With Short Accounts, Gives Up To Officers

WORLD LIONS Kenneth Ormiston PLANS OF Is Arrested After MEETING Nation-Wide Search

R. Graham Guest Of Today In Interest For Big Meeting

M. R. Graham, representative of the Miami Lions Club, is expected to be the guest of honor at the convention of the World Lions Club at its headquarters today at the Semoranham camp to Sanford in plans that are being held for the entertainment of 12,000 to 15,000 delegates expected to attend. As outlined to the local club, the convention will be followed by a four-day convention to be followed by an office composed of representatives from each club in the work in conjunction with committees representing the Miami Club and the organization, according to Graham, who stated that a draft of the convention was considered at a meeting of three committees to be held in January.

It is expected that extradition proceedings will be instituted immediately to return Ormiston to Los Angeles. Ormiston is said to have been traced here through a letter. He is believed to have left Chicago three or four months ago. The two detectives who trailed him to Harrisburg were identified as Charles Ellwood and Harry Donnelly. They arrived here about 7 o'clock last night, and immediately communicated with the police with the result that in less than three hours after the detectives' arrival Ormiston was taken into custody.

Ormiston, in company with the two detectives, left the Penn-Harris Hotel, where the trio spent the night, in an automobile. The chief of police said he had no knowledge of their destination other than that the party was heading for Chicago. Chief Thompson expressed the opinion that Ormiston was "spirited away" but admitted that Detective Oscar Carson, who was with the Chicago officers, said Ormiston declared he was satisfied to return after he admitted his identity.

The party left here in a taxicab and officials of the taxicab company said they did not know its destination. They said that Detective Carson vouched for its safe return. The detective declined to discuss Ormiston's departure.

Chief of Police Joseph Thompson declined to discuss the case but said an investigation had been started and that he would issue a statement later.

Chief of Police Thompson said he understood that the Los Angeles district attorney arrived here early this morning but was unable to verify the report.

At the Penn-Harris Hotel, where Ormiston was said to have spent the night in custody of the officers, the management disclaimed any knowledge of the affair. The room clerks said they were unable to give the names of the detectives and said they knew nothing of the missing radio operator spending the night there other than reports.

As a matter of fact, you know, either might be correct. It all depends on what was in the passenger traffic manager's mind when he wrote the advertisement. If he was thinking collectively of two-thirds of all the oats in the United States then he should have written "is produced," but if he was thinking severally of many different little groups of oats, then "are produced" is right.

Remember Rudyard Kipling, who not only is an Englishman and thus supposed to know English, but also a student of literature, wrote something like this, "the tumult and the shouting dies." We give him credit for thinking, as he wrote those lines, of one singular, collective thing, shouting and tumult.

At worst his sin was not so great. He might have said "am."

Colonization Methods

Various organizations and many individuals of Seminole county for years have been endeavoring by means of advertising and in other ways to induce new people to come here and make their homes.

It is a noteworthy fact however, that the population of the county in general has not increased proportionately. While we boast that our greatest asset is our farm products, very little increase in agricultural herbage has been noted for some time.

Secretary Belout of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce in a letter to The Herald urges that more and more activity be encouraged in bringing settlers to this county. It would seem that a constructive colonization plan for our farm lands might result in a dual benefit both to the newcomer and the county as a whole.

To accomplish such colonization in the most effective manner, Secretary Belout makes the following suggestions:

- 1. The advertising and publicity matter about the colonization plan should be accurate and truthful. 2. In every case a study of the particular land to be marketed should be made to ascertain to a certainty in advance what can best be grown on the particular acreage and it should be sold for that purpose.
