### Restrictions won't be lifted

HOWEY-IN-THE-HILLS — Water-use restrictions will continue in Seminole County for at least another month, decided governing board members of the St. Johns River Water Management District Tuesday.

Although summer rains have continued most days in July, district officials said rainfall is still below normal. Bill Osborne, director of district data services, said rainfall in Sanford last month was 2.23 inches below the July average, 4.11 inches below the three-month average, 5.65 inches below the six-month average and 7.44 inches below the annual average.

Because the rainy season ends in mid-October, Osborne said there is a good chance the restrictions will continue throughout the winter.

"We're still part way through the summer and we still have average rainfall," Osborne said. "While (rainfall) has improved, it hasn't improved all that much. It hasn't taken us one month or two months to get us to this point."

# Bush warning

## President appears on TV, says Iraq may be costly

WASHINGTON — President Bush, warning the task could be long and costly, appealed to the American people today to "stand up for what is right and condemn what is wrong" and support his deployment of U.S. troops in Saudi Arabia to deter a

possible attack by Iraq.

Bush, in a televised Oval Office address, stressed that Iraqi leader Saddam Hussein's "blitzkrieg-fashion" invasion of neighboring Kuwait could not be allowed to stand and he argued that the lessons learned in World War II proved such an "outrageous and brutal act of aggression" must not go un-

answered.

With a formidable buildup of air, ground and naval forces under way, Bush said the U.S. military role in Saudi Arabia would be "wholly defensive" in guarding against aggression by an "enormous war machine" of Iraqi forces poised along the Kuwaiti border.

The president said Iraq, which has the world's fourth-largest military, had moved "more than 100,000 troops, along with tanks, artillery and surface-to-surface missiles" into

## Britain joins U.S. to combat 'war machine'

Britain joined the United States today in the military buildup to protect Saudi Arabia from what President Bush called the "enormous war machine" that Iraq has amassed in newly conquered Kuwait.

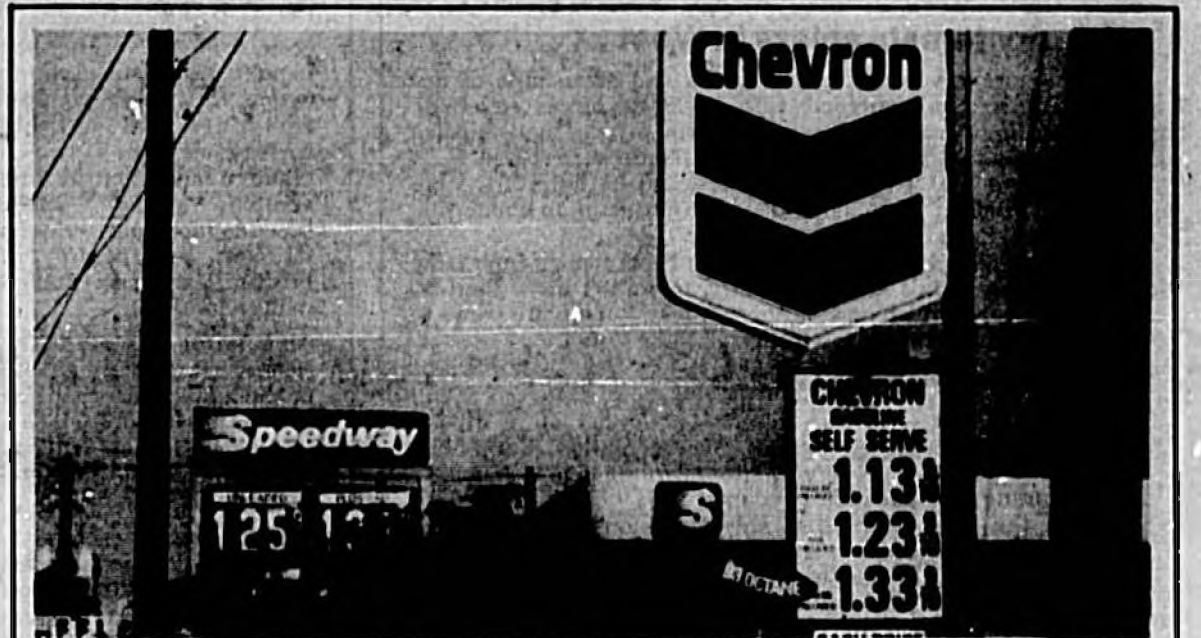
The first of the U.S. troops dispatched by Bush reportedly arrived in Saudi Arabia Wednesday and a group of Americans held in Baghdad was released in Jordan.

The tension in the Middle East was compounded by a Washington Post report that Iraq was loading up chemical weapons.

Acknowledging that "the stakes are high," Bush formally announced and explained his decision to deploy U.S. troops in Saudi Arabia, saying the action was aimed at securing the unconditional withdrawal of Iraqi troops from Kuwait and the restoration of the "legitimate" government of the emirate.

Iraqi President Saddam Hussein, who commands the world's fourth largest military, has rebuffed mounting international economic and military pressure to remove his invasion force from Kuwait.

## Jacksonville man raises the roof

LAKE MARY — A Jacksonville contractor who says Sunniland Corp. backed out of a deal to replace defective roofing shingles raised the roof on the Seminole County company Tuesday.

"The fellow's out in left field," said Dick Frank, state Sunniland roofing manager. Workers returning home Tuesday afternoon

along U.S. Highway 17-92 and Interstate 4 may have spotted an airplane towing a banner reading "Sunniland Corp ripped me off."

Joe Turner, president of Joe Turner Roofing Co., said he hired the New Smyrna Beach airplane to fly over central Seminole County to tell residents he believes he was treated unfairly.

"If I have to, I'll spend \$100,000 to get back \$5,700," Turner said. See Roofer, Page 5A

## Power line issue resolved, beautification set to begin

SANFORD — It appears that work might begin on widening and improving traffic-clogged Lake Mary Boulevard by the end of the year now that the legal chains that tied up Seminole County and Lake Mary, have been loosened.

Legal maneuvers that had been preventing them from undertaking a widening and beautification project on the artery, were eased but

not completely eliminated yesterday, as Florida Power Corporation was ordered to bury its power lines within 90 days.

Following two days of deliberations, Circuit Court Chief Judge O.H. Eaton Jr., yesterday ordered the power company to immediately take all necessary steps to bury its power lines along Lake Mary Boulevard or remove them from the right of way, pending full consideration of the case. ## Martinez joins in demand for gas price probe

TALLAHASSEE — Gov. Bob Martinez called Tuesday for an antitrust investigation into gasoline "price gouging" since the Iraqi invasion of Kuwait and rejected any need to reappraise the state's offshore oil drilling policy.

Martinez asked Florida Attorney General Bob Butterworth to determine if gasoline price increases averaging about 5 cents per gallon, and as high in some locations as 10 cents, violated state antitrust laws.

He also urged U.S. Attorney General Richard Thornburg, whose Justice Department decided yesterday to examine allegations of price gouging, to "begin all possible actions to ensure that the interests of the American people are fully protected, both from foreign aggression and domestic predatory practices."

Additionally, Martinez warned the petroleum industry to "resist the temptation to take advantage of the international situation."

"Florida's motorists are outraged, and rightly so. It is unconscionable for retailers to expect drivers to pay sharply higher prices today for gasoline that sat in the same storage tank at a lower price yesterday," aging in the most cynical form of price gouging.

In a letter to Doug Shelby, executive director of the Florida Petroleum Council, Martinez warned, "The image of the gasoline industry would not be helped by the widespread suspicion that companies artificially raised prices simply to make a few extra dollars at the expense of innocent motorists."

He also rejected Shelby's earlier suggestion that the unsettled international situation justifies opening Florida's fragile coastal waters to oil and gas exploration. State officials have been fighting such exploration for years.

"I can assure you that no such reconsideration will take place," Martinez said.

### Miller tops Young in Georgia primary

Andrew Young's bid to become Georgia's first black governor failed as the former U.N. ambassador lost a primary runoff to Lt. Gov. Zell Miller, who parlayed a state lottery into the Democratic nomination.

With 83 percent of Tuesday's vote counted, Miller, the state's longest-serving lieutenant governor, had 65 percent of the vote to Young's 35 percent.

Young, also a former Atlanta mayor and congressman, disavowed any suggestion that race played a role in his failure to become the first black governor in the Deep South and the second in the nation. Virginia Gov. Douglas Wilder became the first black governor last November.

### Tensions high in jogger case

NEW YORK — Racial tensions mounted outside the courtroom where two black and one Hispanic youth were on trial for attacking a white woman jogger in Central Park as defense attorneys questioned whether the woman was raped.

Although authorities have consistently denied racial bias has anything to do with the case, Robert Burns, an attorney for 16-year-old Yusef Salaam, has hinted that racism led to the arrest and prosecution of a group of innocent minority teens.

Burns told the jury in state Supreme Court in Manhattan during his summation Tuesday "the evidence is so conflicting, emotions have run so high, there are racial overtones that are so powerful, that it is difficult to get to the truth."

### Hot, dry forests ablaze in West

Hot summer weather, gusty winds and thousands of dry lightning strikes combined with tinder-dry trees to create extreme fire danger in Western forests, where thousands of acres of valuable timber and recreational land were ablaze.

More than 170 wildfires, many sparked by lightning, were burning Tuesday over more than 42,000 acres in California, Oregon and Utah.

At least 82 fires were burning in California forests from Lake Tahoe south to Los Angeles County, including more than 50 that flared up in the Sierra National Forest, forcing fire crews to scurry from one hotspot to another.

### Barry jury reaches verdict

WASHINGTON — A jury reached a verdict on a misdemeanor cocaine charge against Mayor Marion Barry but declined to reveal its decision before resuming deliberations on 13 remaining drug and perjury counts.

When the jury returned to the courtroom Tuesday, U.S. District Judge Thomas Penfield Jackson twice asked jury foreman Edward Eagles whether the panel had reached a verdict and Eagles twice told the judge he should poll the jury.

Jackson told Eagles he could not poll the jury until a verdict was announced.

Butterworth said he had already launched an investigation and has joined with attorneys general from a number of other states in urging a U.S. Justice Department probe of gasoline prices.

He said his office is also investigating whether retailers started charging consumers the higher state gasoline tax rate before the hike actually took effect July 1, and kept the money for themselves.

The increase was pegged to existing local fuel levies, for a maximum increase of 4 cents per gallon.

Butterworth said that if antitrust violations are found, the oil companies could be liable for treble damages plus additional penalties.

"Everyone suspects something's wrong when in a matter of minutes of hearing of an international crisis, gasoline prices start soaring," Butterworth said.

Bob McVety, associate director of the industry group, said he could not comment on pricing policies of individual oil companies, but promised the industry would cooperate in any in-

vestigation.

"We recognize many motorists are angry and frustrated, and we are also concerned about the impact these prices might have on the economy," he said.

But he added, "The primary reason (for the increases) is the competitive marketplace."

Officials have expressed concern that higher pump prices could crimp Florida's tourist economy, which provides roughly 20 percent of the state's revenues.

A survey by the American Automobile Association found self-service prices in south Florida were up an average of 5 1/2 cents as of Monday. In Orlando, the average increase was 4.2 percent. The increases averaged 1 1/2 cents in Tampa and about a nickel in Pensacola.

Nationwide, the average price for self-serve unleaded gasoline averaged \$1.18 a gallon, up from \$1.11 on Friday and \$1.07 on Wednesday.

The AAA said it used to take four to six weeks crude oil price increases to be passed along to the gasoline consumer. But with spot-marketing taking place electronically, those price hikes now are being felt instantaneously.

The attack on the paper carriers was reportedly unprovoked and this is the first time carriers have been attacked at that location, the spokesman said.

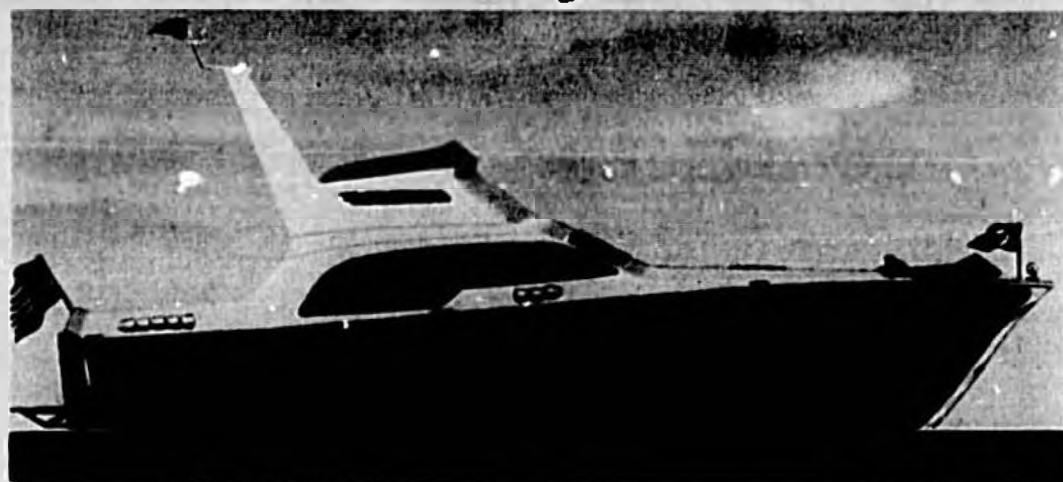
### Window hammered, man cut

# Yacht builder creates jobs soon

## Workers may learn to build boats at community college

SANFORD — When Rex-Meyer yachts brings its new manufacturing facility to Sanford around the first of the year, creating more than 300 new jobs, Seminole Community College may be the site where many of those people learn about building the luxury crafts.

"It's still in the planning stages," Craig Orseno, director of community relations at SCC, said Tuesday. "Nobody has signed any agreements or anything like that."

Until the move to Sanford, Rex-Meyer has produced its custom yachts in Hong Kong and Brazil. The new facilities here will bring an estimated \$133 million to the area economy over the next five years.

According to a spokesman for Rex-Meyer, the company completes about two boats per month in their present Brazilian facility and intends to keep the same pace here after training local workers to do the job.

"If we do have the courses here at SCC, they (Rex-Meyer) will provide most of the instructors," Orseno said.

While Sanford has been an important port for many years and has been the home of several marine manufacturers, there is no tradition in the construction of custom-

made luxury crafts. According to the spokesman, the boat builders employed by the company will have to learn more than simple manufacturing techniques.

Since the 40- and 68-foot boats are built to

meet the purchasers' specifications, the crafters must be versatile.

"It won't be your typical manufacturing operation," the spokesman said.

He added that the company believes the strength of vocational education in the Seminole County public schools and at SCC will provide a good background for the work force.

In addition to boat building techniques, classes designed to train Rex-Meyer employees might include fiberglass molding, drafting and nautical interior design, the company spokesman said.

"The company officials are in Brazil right now supervising the move up here," Orseno said. "When they get back I guess the discussions will begin."

After meeting for nearly 18 hours yesterday, the two sides failed to reach agreement on anything, according to Nancy Wheeler, chief negotiator for the Seminole Education Association. "I believe Ernie (Cowley, the

district's chief negotiator) seems to have no desire to settle this," Wheeler said at the conclusion of the marathon session. "He is dallying on language issues. He was still talking about the same issues (at the end) as he was in the morning."

Cowley was not available for comment.

This year, the union and the district are negotiating all portions of the contract for the first time in three years, so it was expected that the negotiations would take longer than usual, but Wheeler believes the process, in its fourth week, is being dragged out unnecessarily.

"This is taking far too long," she said Tuesday morning. According to Wheeler, salary negotiations have not yet begun as the two sides are still discussing "basic language issues", such as student discipline procedures and compensation time for teacher-parent conferences. Salary could not be discussed until the district's budget was tentatively approved by the school board. That was done on July 31.

Negotiations for the school bus drivers' contract resumed Tuesday afternoon at Greenwood Lakes Middle School.

## Big money talks in American politics

Politicians have at last discovered the S&Ls as a potent campaign issue. Challengers in particular are discovering to their delight that the public is increasingly aware of the fact that the S&L debacle is going to cost taxpayers at least \$300 billion, \$2,000 per man, woman and child over a 40-year period. Democratic candidates, including incumbents, believe they have found a campaign wedge with Neil Bush's S&L troubles. But many of those same Democrats — hoping that voters have forgotten Jim Wright, Tony Coelho and Fernand St. Germain — are reluctant to tamper with an outrageous campaign-finance system that had a great deal to do with allowing the scandal to happen. They are throwing up roadblocks to serious campaign-finance reform.

House Democrats are the chief culprits. They seek to perpetuate a system that allowed S&L political action committees to invest more than \$11 million in congressional candidates and party committees during the 1980s.

As a return on their investment, the thrift industry was given relaxed regulations and delays in closing bankrupt institutions. And taxpayers now are stuck with the tab.

In the Senate, a campaign-finance proposal by Majority Leader George Mitchell, D-Maine, has attracted bipartisan support. Mitchell's bill would cut off the flow of PAC money to Senate candidates, set campaign spending limits and eliminate so-called "soft money" loopholes that allow PACs to evade federal contribution limits.

In the House, however, Rep. Al Swift, D-Wash., has drafted legislation that is, in essence, an investment-protection bill.

Crafted at the behest of the House leadership, Swift's bill does nothing to staunch the flow of PAC money and ignores soft-money abuses. It is not campaign-finance reform.

Swift and his House colleagues may be hoping that campaign finance is too esoteric for the typical voter. Perhaps they're hoping they can slide by this fall by pointing fingers at Neil Bush.

Voters may not know all the campaign-finance intricacies, but they do know that money — big money — has become the mother's milk of American politics.

Polls show that voters are increasingly unhappy and increasingly cynical about that state of affairs. They may decide to wean their elected officials by "throwing the rascals out."

## Gaviria misunderstands American justice system

Colombia's president-elect Cesar Gaviria visited Washington recently, preoccupied with the ongoing perjury and drug trial of Marlon Barry, mayor of the capital city.

The eyes of South America are focused on that courtroom, he said, and the fate of the international drug war may hinge on its outcome. The 43-year-old future chief of state told the Washington Post, "Colombians are waiting for severe sanctions."

Gaviria's motives are understandable. Mayor Barry has become for many South Americans a convenient symbol of America's own drug culpability. The embattled mayor is the quintessential American cocaine consumer who fuels demand for drugs throughout the hemisphere.

Small wonder that Barry's trial is front page news in Colombia. And admission of guilt on the mayor's part is, symbolically, an admission of American guilt — guilt we seem to ignore when we admonish our South American neighbors to deal with their own drug problems.

However understandable, Gaviria's comments reflect a misunderstanding of the American system of jurisprudence. It's a misunderstanding this country may have abetted.

The United States, after all, has encouraged Colombia to extradite its arrested cocaine kingpins to the United States for prosecution and, if convicted, imprisonment. (In Panama, of course, we did more than encourage and cajole.)

The U.S. government has little faith that a justice system traumatized by violence and corruption — as in Colombia — can enforce drug laws in its own territory.

In Colombia, drug money and assassination — and the not-so-subtle comments of a government official — often speak louder than justice. President Gaviria needs to understand that in the American system of justice, Mayor Barry cannot and will not be treated as a political symbol.

## Businesses rip out the union label

HENDERSON, Nev. — After rejecting — by a resounding 3 1/2-to-1 margin — new contract terms proposed by the Nevada Power Co. in its "last, best and final" offer, more than half of the electric utility's employees recently went on strike.

As the 825 strikers picketed under the desert sun for two weeks, union and company negotiators made no progress in resolving their differences over wages, benefits and working conditions.

At the same time, Nevada Power officials began warning that they soon would replace the striking workers, at least temporarily, to handle a growing backlog of work.

On the 15th day of the strike, the workers grudgingly ratified a new contract virtually identical to the one they earlier had spurned. "It stinks," meter reader Brenda Vermillion said of the agreement. The pact called for modest annual wage increases but also hiked the employees' contribution for medical insurance.

"The workers were just scared," added Vermillion. "They were told everybody's going to lose their jobs."

That recent episode in southern Nevada is both thoroughly unremarkable and terribly significant. The causes of the dispute and the events leading to the settlement are duplicated

hundreds of times every year throughout the nation and are emblematic of the state of contemporary labor-management relations.

Especially noteworthy was the company threat to replace the strikers. In recent years, Greyhound Lines, Phelps Dodge, International Paper, Boise Cascade and numerous other companies have gone beyond issuing such warnings. They have hired and trained new workers in the midst of bitter labor disputes.

Frank Lorenzo placed Continental Airlines in bankruptcy to break its union contracts, then hired substitute employees at drastically

lower wage levels. He also led Eastern Airlines into bankruptcy and recruited replacements for its striking workers.

Employers gained the right to hire permanent replacements for strikers in the 1930s, when the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that the practice was lawful in economic disputes over wages or benefits although not in conflicts over allegedly unfair labor practices.

For four decades, that option was seldom exercised. Companies feared they would incur the wrath of powerful unions and antagonize the public if they took such drastic action. At the same time, crossing a picket line to take a striker's job was simply unthinkable for most workers.

But the influence of trade unions, as measured by the proportion of nation's non-farm work force they represent, has severely deteriorated during the past half century. It has steadily dropped from 35 percent immediately after World War II to 16 percent last year.

Against that background, President Reagan enhanced management's power with a single dramatic action in 1981: He declared 11,500 striking air traffic controllers to be engaged in an illegal action when they defied a back-to-work order, then ordered them all fired and replaced by substitutes.

## Souter's solitude under fire

BOSTON — In chapter one of The Mystery of David Souter, we watched assorted senators, journalists, and advocates desperately seeking a paper trail to the nominee's legal mind-set. These first-rate public eyes barely turned up enough scraps to mark the path to his New Hampshire farmhouse.

Now we are into chapter two, in which the very same detectives are sifting for clues in his biography instead of his bibliography. They have thus far come up with a list of Souter adjectives attached to Souter anecdotes. The nominee for the Supreme Court is: book-loving, outdoorsy, thrifty, funny, stoical, silent, humble, hardworking, religious, monastic.

Alas, so far these words have done little to resolve the mystery of his main character. Indeed they have introduced a subplot: David Souter, intellect or nerd? Scholar or dweeb?

But what intrigues me the most in this chapter is what the public eyes are making of what is missing. I'm not talking about the absence of a legal record. I'm talking about the absence of a family, or at least a wife and children.

In the past week, a New York Times editorial asked the question: "Does his bachelor life isolate him from routine human problems, as some suggest, or free him to philosophize and climb his beautiful mountains?" A prominent lawyer asked out loud about Souter's life experience, saying, "This is a man who has never been married, never had children." And more than one friend has quietly asked whether a solitary man has the understanding of real life, especially real family life, real female life, to certify the humanity behind his judgments.

What is going on here? A revival of singles suspicion? A return to the days when public figures needed a Good Housekeeping Seal of Approval?

In the not-so-old-days, it seems to me, it was conservatives who used to draw character conclusions about family life. A single man, never married or worse yet, divorced, was cast as a potentially unstable sort of fellow. Indeed, when Adlai Stevenson ran for President in the Fifties, many Americans were uncomfortable with a man alone in the White House. To be married with kids was to be settled down and safe.

But in the 1990s, the concerns about David Souter's status aren't about instability. They're about rigidity. And they're not coming from conservatives. They're coming from liberals.

As Harvard Law School's provocative Duncan Kennedy muses, "It would be a delicious and amusing twist in the play between liberal and conservatives, if the liberals started proclaiming that only a married man with 2.3 children living in a

suburb was qualified for office."

It hasn't come to that quite yet. By and large, the interest in Souter's private life is a way of trying to figure out just who this masked man is. The women's movement slogan — the personal is political — has become an accepted truth. We try to draw lines from private life to public matters. But I wonder whether there also isn't a new set of assumptions, even biases, against people who are Unmarried With No Children.

That huge baby-boom generation which came late to family has come to it fiercely and fervently. Parenthood is in. It's now seen not only as a matter of biology but of character. Child-raising builds a better you.

Remember back in March, when Kathleen Sullivan lost her job to Paula Zahn? The producer of "CBS This Morning" said that the real difference between the two women was that "Paul's married with a child." The intimation was that motherhood rounded the edges, gave a gal that warm and wiggly protection.

More than one episode of "thirtysomething," more than one article by a baby boomer, revolves around the theme that nobody really knows what life is all about until they've been through a 2 a.m. feeding.

I, too, believe that marriage and children in their complicated, messy dalliance are transforming experiences. You can't be a hero to your spouse. Changing diapers isn't abstract. Parenting teenagers is an exercise in moral relativism. We want judges who understand people as well as precedent.

But it's getting a bit weird when you need a spouse and kids for the resume.

In this chapter of The Mystery of David Souter, they are trotting out old girlfriends and the crew from his mother's retirement home as character witnesses to prove he's human despite being unwed. Guess what? You can be humane and unwed, a creep and a dad. Even in the '90s.

Dear beloved, we have gathered here to look for a Justice not a husband. As any good counselor knows, what's most important is to find out what he thinks before we say, "I do."

## Drug runner gets Washington shield

WASHINGTON — John Hull is not just any Indiana farmer. He used to have a little spread down in Costa Rica, and, during the Nicaraguan civil war, he used the ranch as a supply depot for the contra rebels. When Costa Rica arrested him for drug trafficking, Hull jumped bail and came home. Now he's also wanted for murder in Costa Rica.

But Hull has little to worry about. The last time Costa Rican officials tried to give him a hard time, 19 members of Congress wrote a letter to Oscar Arias, then president of Costa Rica, hinting that anyone who messed with John Hull could endanger friendly relations between the two countries.

If you bounced a check in Costa Rica, the U.S. government wouldn't think twice about extraditing you there to pay your debt to society. But there isn't much chance that John Hull will be similarly inconvenienced. The record shows that he has led a charmed life. Here is the list of particulars:

— According to a 1988 Senate subcommittee report and Costa Rican authorities, Hull allowed his ranch to be used as an arms-for-drugs swap meet. Between 1983 and 1985, the subcommittee found, Hull let pilots fly in with contra munitions and out with cocaine bound for the United States.

— The same Senate report claimed that in 1983, Hull borrowed \$375,000 from the Overseas Private Investment Council, using false documentation, and pocketed the cash. OPIC is a government-sponsored program to stimulate U.S. investments in foreign countries.

— The subcommittee also alleged that Hull falsified affidavits to a U.S. attorney investigating allegations of gun running and neutrality violations in Costa Rica. — In January 1989, Costa Rican authorities arrested Hull on charges of drug trafficking and neutrality violations. He jumped bail last August and fled to the United States. — Last December, a Costa Rican prosecutor charged Hull with homicide in a 1984 bombing that killed eight people. The target of the bombing, dissident contra Eden Pastora, survived.

Costa Rican authorities have not yet asked for Hull to be extradited to face the charges. If they do, they will find a wall of resistance by some members of the administration and Congress. An airing of his case could revive the embarrassing Iran-contra scandal. Jeffrey Feldman knows what happens when one takes on Hull. He was the U.S. prosecutor who tried to investigate Hull in 1985. Feldman's team got the runaround from the U.S. Embassy in Costa Rica, and his request to convene a grand jury was denied. Then the Justice Department dropped the case and sent Feldman to Thailand on other duties. Federal public defender John Mattes met the same brick wall in 1986. He was researching a case for a client arrested for gun running, and he came upon Hull's name. Mattes went to Costa Rica and unraveled details of Hull's contra supply network. He says he encountered "clear attempts to obstruct the truth by elements of the Justice Department and the FBI."

One of Mattes' prime witnesses was Jack Terrell, who ended up being labeled a "terrorist" by Oliver North after Terrell tattled on Hull to Congress. Terrell had worked for Hull, but the two had a falling out. Our associate Dean Boyd has obtained a July 1986 memo prepared by North and initialed by then-President Reagan. The memo to Reagan says Terrell is a "terrorist threat" and details his testimony against contra supporters.

Kuwait. Before Bush's speech, it had not been known that Iraq had transported the missiles into Kuwait.

Administration officials have not given details of which U.S. forces are being moved into Saudi Arabia, although sources said thousands of paratroopers and at least 46 F-15 fighters were arriving Wednesday. A light infantry division was expected to be sent later. The United States already has 34 warships in the area, with more en route.

Warning that it would be "unwise and unrealistic" to

assume that Saddam's adventurism would end with the takeover of Kuwait, Bush said the deployment of U.S. force became necessary only after "exhausting every alternative."

"I want to be clear about what we are doing and why," Bush said. "America does not seek conflict, nor do we seek to chart the destiny of other nations. But America will stand by her friends."

"In a life of a nation, we are called upon to define who we are and what we believe," he said. "Sometimes these choices are not easy. Today, as president, I ask for your support in the

decision I've made to stand up for what is right and condemn what is wrong, all in the name of peace."

"The stakes are high. Iraq is already a rich and powerful country that possesses the world's second largest reserves of oil and over a million men under arms," Bush said.

The president added, "If history teaches us anything, it is that we must resist aggression or it will destroy our freedoms. Apprehension does not work. As was the case in the 1930s, we see in Saddam Hussein an aggressive dictator threatening his neighbors."

but would increase when a new shipment of fuel arrives to replace the supply in his tanks.

"How can we charge more for gas we've already got in the ground?" he asked.

Leonard Shell is charging \$1.12 per gallon of regular unleaded gasoline at self-serve pumps, \$1.22 per gallon of premium unleaded and \$1.32 a gallon of super unleaded. Prices were raised two cents on every grade Monday morning, the first increase at Leonard's station since Friday morning.

While prices have not increased since Saturday at Sanford Mobil Service, 2510 French Ave., Sanford, owner Sylvester Chang said each grade of gasoline would increase by about four cents when a new shipment arrives this afternoon.

"I have to raise my prices when the new shipment comes in because my stocks are really low," Chang said.

Chang is charging \$1.09 per gallon of regular unleaded, \$1.19 for premium unleaded and \$1.28 for super unleaded.

In Lake Mary, prices have not increased since last week at the

7-Eleven store at 110 E. Lake Mary Boulevard, according to store manager Donna Russ.

"Business is still pretty good. People haven't stopped driving. They need gas," Russ said.

Current prices at the store are \$1.12 per gallon of unleaded, \$1.22 for premium unleaded and \$1.30 for super unleaded.

Across the country, lawmakers vowed Tuesday to seek anti-price gouging legislation against oil companies, saying the government is powerless to stop "virtual thievery" by the industry in raising the cost of fuel.

Turner drove to the Sunniland plant Tuesday morning and dumped a truckload of the multi-colored green shingles in the company parking lot before returning to Jacksonville.

Turner said the problem began about two weeks ago when he ordered Tamko shingles from Sunniland to replace a roof in Jacksonville. Turner said he ordered "emerald green" shingles. But when they were placed on the roof, the shingles were actually five different shades of green.

Turner said a Sunniland salesman in Jacksonville pro-

mised the company would give him credit for the order. On that assurance, Turner said he replaced the roof with new shingles. But since then, Turner said Sunniland has refused to pay for the shingles, instead referring his complaint to Tamko.

"The asphalt roofing industry says you should leave the shingles on for at least 120 days and let the color bleed out," Sunniland's Frank said. "You'd be surprised how this sun will bleach out a roof and even cut the color. And if it doesn't, then the manufacturer will take care of it."

"But he wait," Frank said. "He complained on Monday and tore it off Thursday."

Frank said samples of the tile would be sent to the manufacturer for testing.

"We never said we'd take care of it," Frank said. "We didn't manufacture it, Tamko did."

"Sunniland's passing the buck to Tamko," Turner said. "I'm a small roofing contractor. Here's the big corporation boys who want to stomp all over the small contractor."

Turner said if Sunniland does not respond to his request for credit, he'll continue the demonstration.

Lake Mary City Manager John Litten was jubilant over the decision.

"This is really good for the City and Seminole County," he said. "It will give us the opportunity to possibly set beautification standards for the entire state."

Seminole County Engineer Jerry McCollum was also pleased with the decision.

"The next step for us," he said, "is to obtain plans that FPC already has drawn up for the burial of the power lines. They have some, but we haven't received them yet." McCollum said they would be included in the overall plans to be put up for bid. He said even though FPC has 90 days to bury the lines, it is undecided whether it would be better for them to do it ahead of construction or during construction. McCollum said he expected to see actual construction start after the holidays, possibly by the beginning of next year, "but it could be earlier than that, we'll just have to wait and see."

Lake Mary Senior Planner Matt West said the decision on the power line move marked a beginning. West said, "The city still has to sign a contract with a landscape design company but that won't be any problem, then we'll be ready to go."

Randy Morris, who served as chairman of the Lake Mary Boulevard Gateway Committee, said, "I'm pleased, I'm extremely pleased. Judge Eaton is known as a strict interpreter of the law, and I'm happy with his ruling." Morris said over the past two years, his committee has tried to resolve the power line issue, but each time, "FPC has ignored any attempts at compromise." The Gateway Committee consisted of City Planners, Homeowner representatives, Developers and Government officials from Seminole County, Lake Mary and the City of Sanford, and were charged with working out the details of the widening and beautification project.

In his ruling, Judge Eaton wrote, "The project is already several months behind schedule. The dangerous, congested condition of the road requires immediate action in order to protect the public interest."

FPC and the combined forces of the city and county had filed lawsuits against each other to determine whether or not the two governments had the authority to order the power lines

to be buried. In denying the motion for a temporary injunction filed by FPC, Judge Eaton said there is more than a strong likelihood that the county and city would prevail on the merits of the case during a trial. The trial date has been tentatively set for Sept. 17.

The main question, however, is not necessarily centered on the actual burial of the FPC power lines, rather who will pay the cost of changing the power lines from poles to underground conduits. The power company may have to carry the full cost. It may be divided between FPC and a special tax district, or by the city. The cost through the months has been estimated at anywhere from \$1.2 to \$1.5 million. That question is expected to be brought up with the Public Service Commission at a later date, yet to be

announced.

With the City of Lake Mary involved in the boulevard project from Interstate 4 to the easterly city limits, and Seminole County responsible for the road from that point to U.S. Highway 17-92, it has become a multi-government concern. Last December Seminole County Commissioners voted 3-2 against burying the cables, with the intent of having FPC run their lines along taller, wider-spaced "hybrid" poles. Then several months later the matter was reconsidered and the commission voted unanimously to support the undergrounding effort. They also voted to share the legal costs involved with the City of Lake Mary.

As to a projected start date on the Lake Mary Boulevard project, Morris said, "I expect to see work begin by late this year."

A spokesman for Saddam in a televised address reiterated Iraq's claim to Kuwait, saying, "History has proved Kuwait is a part of Iraq." The unnamed spokesman made repeated calls for Arab unity.

Iraq troops invaded its smaller neighbor Kuwait last Thursday, ousted the government and installed a provisional one after accusing its oil-rich neighbor of drilling for oil in a disputed area, overproducing crude and driving down prices.

State-run Cairo Radio reported there had been "a complete shutdown in the flow of Iraqi oil through the Saudi and Turkish pipelines." Iraq had earlier reduced the flow of oil through Turkey, apparently because of reduced demand in the wake of

international sanctions. Turkey said Tuesday it would not allow Iraqi oil to be loaded onto tankers.

The British Broadcasting Corp. reported Wednesday the first deployment of U.S. troops had arrived in the eastern province of Saudi Arabia. But in Washington, a Pentagon spokesman said, "Since we never said troops are leaving, it would be hard to say that they have arrived."

The U.S. deployment decision in the region, intended to bolster Saudi defenses against a possible attack, included dozens of warplanes — bombers as well as fighters — and several thousand ground troops.

Bush assured the American people that the United States "will not initiate hostilities" and that the U.S. forces will "work

together with those of Saudi Arabia and other nations" in trying to deter and intimidate Saddam.

But he said, "Iraq has massed an enormous war machine on the Saudi border. To assume Iraq will not attack again will be unwisely unrealistic."

"If history teaches anything, we must resist aggression," he said, drawing a parallel between Saddam to expansionist policies of dictators such as Adolf Hitler in the 1930s.

Almost simultaneously, British Foreign Secretary Sir Douglas Hurd announced that British naval and air forces will join the multinational effort confronting Iraq in the Persian Gulf.

# Soaring oil prices can't buy security

CAIRO, Egypt — Profits from soaring oil prices may bring Gulf crude producers more cash but little in the way of security from regional bully Iraqi President Saddam Hussein, analysts said.

"Oil producers may increase their revenues in the short-term, but this income will be swallowed up by ... arms purchases," said Ian Jones, a Cairo-based writer on Middle East affairs. "Nobody's thinking about making a quick buck but about how to survive the military threat from Iraq."

"Most of these states are already armed to the teeth ... so money alone, even lots of it, cannot buy them peace of mind."

Other Middle East experts said to talk of fat profits for Persian Gulf crude producers at this stage showed a basic misunderstanding of the region's acute sensitivity to outside threats.

"To talk about the benefits of increasing oil prices is premature, and exposes the fragility of the region as a whole," David Butler, editor of the London-based Middle East Economic Digest told United Press International in a telephone interview.

"People in the Gulf wish this thing wasn't happening," he said. "All of them, including Kuwait, invested huge amounts in security ... but it hasn't done them much good."

He said oil producers might expect their revenue to increase as crude prices hit a five-year high at \$28 a barrel, but they also knew that soaring energy costs could trigger a world recession, inflation and a fall in demand.

Western bankers in the Gulf state of Bahrain said the whole region was marked by weak social, political and economic structures that did not inspire investor confidence at the best of times.

"The problem with the Gulf banking institutions, for example, is that they are basically rather weak ... and this manifested itself when oil prices dropped in the mid-1980s," said a Japanese banker who requested anonymity.

"When you add military insecurity and fears about the free flow of oil through the Gulf to problems associated with a basically weak infrastructure, then you are talking about countries with an uncertain future," the banker added.

## Analysis

Unlike the Gulf Arab states with relatively small populations, Persian Iran — population 51 million — has demanded higher oil prices to finance the war-shattered and cash-strapped nation's postwar economic recovery.

But Iranian Foreign Minister Ali-Akbar Velayati, during a visit

to Damascus, Syria, Monday, indicated that any extra revenue would have to be spent on the country's armed forces rather than on the economy.

"We need to ensure our armed forces are well-equipped ... we cannot sit idly by while Iraq occupies Kuwait," Velayati said.

On a purely economic level, one oil industry source in Abu Dhabi, United Arab Emirates, said Western pressure on Gulf producers to pump more and

replace boycotted Iraqi and Kuwaiti crude could lead to further fluctuations on the market and doubtful benefits to producers.

Iran and the United Arab Emirates have already said they will not pump more than their OPEC-decreed quotas, apparently for fear that boycotted Iraqi and Kuwaiti crude might find its way on the black market and depress prices.

## Saddam scoffs at international military tension

Iraqi President Saddam Hussein today rebuffed mounting international economic and military pressure to withdraw his forces from Kuwait, saying Iraq will fight for "Arab honor."

With Iraqi troops also poised near Kuwait's border with Saudi Arabia, the first of the U.S. troops reportedly arrived and a group of Americans held in Baghdad was released in Jordan.

The tension in the Middle East was compounded by a Washington Post report that Iraq was loading up chemical weapons.

State-run Baghdad Radio, in a broadcast Wednesday morning, called on all Arabs to tune in that evening for "an important statement in a day of joy in the history of your struggle."

Also today, state-run Cairo Radio reported there had been "a complete shutdown in the flow of Iraqi oil through the Saudi and Turkish pipelines." Iraq had earlier reduced the flow of oil through Turkey, apparently because of reduced demand in the wake of international sanctions. Turkey said Tuesday it would not allow Iraqi oil to be loaded onto tankers.

U.S. Embassy officials in Amman, Jordan, said an Iraqi Airways plane arrived in Amman Wednesday from Baghdad, carrying "about two dozen Americans," 12 Britons and 100 Arabs. It was not immediately clear if the passengers had been among the foreigners held by Iraq in Baghdad.

## Iraqi minister disappears from view after invasion

CAIRO, Egypt — Iraqi Foreign Minister Tariq Aziz has disappeared from public view amid the crisis of Iraq's invasion of Kuwait, puzzling Western diplomats who speculated Wednesday he may have been ousted in a power struggle.

The diplomats said Aziz dropped out of sight Friday about the time Iraq announced it had executed 120 military officers for allegedly plotting a coup against President Saddam Hussein at the instigation of an unnamed foreign power.

Initially, Baghdad Radio reported the officers were executed for refusing to participate in the invasion of a fellow Arab nation but later cited the alleged coup plot.

The diplomats said Aziz did not as expected attend an emergency summit by Arab League foreign ministers Friday in Cairo, which ended with a condemnation of Iraq's invasion of Kuwait the day before.

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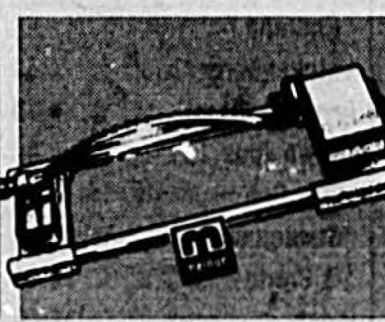
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# African peace-keeping force sent to Liberia

MONROVIA, Liberia — Seven African countries agreed to send a peace-keeping force to Liberia after a rebel leader threatened to attack the U.S. Embassy in Monrovia in order to provoke international intervention in his country's civil war.

Rebel leader Prince Johnson, who is holding hostage an American and at least seven other foreigners, said Tuesday he would attack Marines protecting the U.S. Embassy unless a U.S. or West African peace-keeping force was sent to end the fighting. Johnson also said he would hold the foreigners until the peace-keeping forces arrived.

The hostages were abducted from a Monrovia hotel Monday, the day after U.S. Marines evacuated 62 U.S. government employees, relatives and civilians from the war-torn country.

The United States staged Sunday's evacuation of U.S. Embassy personnel when Johnson threatened to kill foreigners in a bid to force international intervention in the dispute.

State Department spokeswoman Margaret Tutwiler said in Washington the Marines would not intervene in the war.

"The U.S. Marines are in Liberia to defend the embassy, with force if necessary," she said. "They are not there to intervene in the fighting."

The hostages held by Johnson included three Britons, two West Germans, a Dutchman, an Argentinian and a U.S. mining contractor identified as Chris Mendes, 27, of Sacramento, Calif.

Diplomatic sources said representatives of the seven African countries, meeting in Banjul, Gambia, want to hold talks on Liberia that would include all political parties and ethnic groups in order to find a solution to the conflict.

The other rebel leader, Charles Taylor, has been fighting for more than six months to overthrow President Samuel Doe, who took power in a coup a decade ago. When the rebels reached the capital of Monrovia last month, a splinter group led by Johnson broke from Taylor. Doe has remained in his presidential palace.

She said the rebel forces had not harmed the hostages, who are being kept outside the capital. U.S. officials have urged Johnson to release the group immediately.

The State Department said about 41 embassy personnel, including the U.S. ambassador, would remain in Monrovia with about 300 other Americans.

Also Tuesday, the Marines abandoned roadblocks in front of the embassy and moved into the compound.

"There is no need to expose people," an embassy spokesman said.

# New Colombian president vows to fight drug cartel

BOGOTA, Colombia — Cesar Gaviria, sworn in as Colombia's new president, vows to lead a no-holds-barred fight against the cocaine cartels that threaten the nation's democracy.

Vice President Dan Quayle led the U.S. delegation to the inauguration, held in the atmosphere of an armed camp. He called on Gaviria to continue extraditions of drug trafficking suspects to the United States.

"Narcotics terrorism is today the principal threat to our democracy," said Gaviria, a 43-year-old economist. He said the task of leading the fight "cannot be delayed and will take place under my personal direction."

"We will confront it without concessions," Gaviria said.

Four South American countries called for international help for Peru, where newly inaugurated President Alberto Fujimori faces a deep economic crisis.

Presidents or foreign ministers of Andean Mountain countries also met and issued a "Andean Declaration" inviting Bush to a 1991 summit and praised his recent economic initiative to form a common north-south open trade block.

The Bush initiative contains a "new focus" and is the starting point of a "new relationship" in the hemisphere, the countries said, at the same time calling for special trade privileges to help their economies.

# Congress on pre-campaign vacation as session closes

WASHINGTON — When Congress was plotting its salary hike last year, members claimed the loot would assure better government.

Now, with a lot of urgent work cut out for them, the lawmakers have left town on a monthlong vacation.

With only six working weeks remaining before Congress goes out of business, congressional and administration negotiators are not even close to an agreement on deficit reduction.

Other unfinished business includes major legislation dealing with child care, clean air, civil rights, agriculture, housing and campaign finance.

The lawmakers are scheduled to knock off in mid-October to campaign for re-election.

The lame-duck Congress could, of course, return to work after the election, thereby escaping some accountability to the voters.

So much for achieving good government with a pay grab.

Before heading for home, House members did manage one good deed — passage of a bill that would make it illegal to use automatic telephone dialing

systems to send pre-recorded messages to people who don't want them.

Rep. Edward Markey, D-Mass., said that every day more than 7 million households are the randomly selected targets of the electronic hard sell.

Markey said more than 180,000 telemarketers use machines that can automatically dial up to 1,000 phones a day.

Editor Jack Stone of The Anadarko Daily News in Oklahoma reports by phone that his part of America's beleaguered Oil Belt is not looking for an economic boost from the Mideast crisis.

Stone says folks in Anadarko aren't celebrating higher world oil prices resulting from Iraq's invasion of Kuwait, although he acknowledges the crisis might later spur local drilling.

Meantime, Stone said, people in Anadarko are grumbling, as are Americans elsewhere, about an 8-cent boost in gasoline prices at the pump. And he said local farmers are worried about the plunge in wheat prices, based on news reports about the ban on exports to Iraq.

# Cook keeps busy 25 hours a day

WINTER SPRINGS — Joe Klinger, a Winter Springs resident is Our Cook of the Week. Klinger and his wife, Norma, have been married for five years and have three teenaged daughters living at home.

Klinger's daughters are 16 and 18 and Norma's daughter is 14. Their children are from previous marriages.

When Klinger met Norma, they both worked at Harris in Orlando. During their courtship he invited her to his home for dinner where he cooked his favorite meal for her, breaded cinnamon chicken.

"That dinner won her for me," Klinger smiles and says.

Klinger likes to cook and is self taught. He started cooking while in grade school to help out at home. His mother was ill quite often with debilitating migraines and the younger children needed to be fed. That's when he decided to fill the void in the kitchen.

Over the years, Klinger kept experimenting with ingredients, pots, pans, gadgets and produced concoctions that were edible and some not very enticing. However, he and his siblings survived.

Now Klinger cooks on weekends and freezes some items to reheat during the week.

"I just put the food in the micro for a quick meal when I'm in a hurry," he says. "Norma never learned to cook. I don't know how she got by in her previous marriage. Probably TV dinners," he says, chuckling.

Klinger has kitchen gadgets from around the world that fascinate him. Some he bought

from TV offers that are not sold in stores. More recently he purchases from his own business that he and Norma are building in their spare time. They literally started their part-time business on a shoestring and deal in thousands of products and services through network marketing.

"Anyone can do it. I'd be pleased to show anyone who wants their own business how to get started. Just call me," Klinger says.

### BREADED CINNAMON CHICKEN

- 2 - 3 cloves garlic
- 1 1/4 Tbs. frozen apple juice concentrate
- 1/4 - 1 Tbs. soy sauce
- 6 small boneless chicken breasts (halved, skinned)
- 1 1/2 cups fine, whole wheat breadcrumbs
- 1 Tbs. cinnamon
- 1/2 cup white wine

Combine garlic, apple juice and soy sauce in small bowl. Rub chicken in mixture moistening all surfaces. Mix the breadcrumbs and cinnamon together in a bowl. Roll the chicken in the seasoned crumbs. Place the breaded chicken on a non-stick baking pan, sprinkle lightly with cinnamon and cover with foil. Bake at 400° for 1/2 hour, then remove foil and baste with wine. Reduce heat, bake an additional 1/2 hour uncovered. Serve hot or cold, garnish with parsley and orange wedges. Serves 6, 210 calories per serving.

### Topping Mix for Raisin Bread

- 1/2 cup bran
- 1 Tbs. frozen apple juice
- 1 1/2 sp. ground coriander

Continued: Cover baking pan loosely with foil and bake at 400° for 30 min. Remove foil, bake uncovered for 10 min.

Remove from oven. Cover lightly until cool, 20 min. Remove from pan, store in foil wrap.

### CINNAMON RAISIN BREAD

(makes 16 slices, 110 cal. per slice)

- 1/2 cup chopped raisins
- 1/2 cup frozen apple juice concentrate
- 1 Tbs. vanilla extract
- 1 Tbs. rum or brandy
- 3 cups whole wheat flour
- 2 Tbs. cinnamon
- 1 Tbs. ground coriander
- 1/2 Tbs. allspice
- 1 pkg. or Tbs. active dry yeast
- 1/4 cup skimmed buttermilk

Place chopped raisins in a small bowl with apple juice, vanilla and rum or brandy, soak for 10 min. Combine flour, cinnamon, coriander and allspice in a large bowl, mix well. In a separate small bowl, stir yeast into 1/4 cup warm water until dissolved. Add yeast solution to the flour mixture slowly, stirring continuously. Stir in the soaked raisins and liquid, add buttermilk, mix well. Cover the bowl with a damp towel and place it in a warm place. Let rise for 45 minutes. Transfer dough to 9 x 5 non-stick loaf pan (lightly oiled). Stir together the topping ingredients, sprinkle topping over dough, pat well with back of spoon so topping will adhere to dough.

# Put safe distance between baby, TV

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** A friend keeps her baby's crib almost touching a large color TV. She puts a blanket between the two for a shield. I think this represents a harmful situation. What do you think?

**DEAR READER:** I agree. Television sets emit small amounts of electromagnetic radiation that can be harmful to people who are chronically exposed at close distances; for example, some studies have reported a higher incidence of childhood cancers in children and cataracts in adults. Since most of this radiation dissipates within a few inches from the TV set, many experts recommend that viewers sit no closer than four feet away from the screen.

The blanket your friend uses will shield the baby from light but not from electromagnetic waves.

I recommend you share this information with your friend and suggest she put more distance — at least four feet — between the baby and the TV.

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** I'm a 5-foot-7-inch female and weigh 125 pounds. With all the overweight problems of the world, I don't see much on how to gain weight. Do you have any helpful information?

**DEAR READER:** Thinness and fatness are, to a large degree, genetically determined. However, we can modify our inheritances by under- or over-eating.

If you are slim, despite a regular diet, and you do not have an eating disorder, such as bulimia or anorexia nervosa, you should be able to gain weight by increasing your portions, snacking and consuming more starches, such as potatoes, rice and pasta. As your caloric consumption rises, it will exceed your metabolic demands; the excess calories will be stored as fat, and you'll gain weight.

Because some diseases — such as anemia and hyperthyroidism — are associated with inability to gain weight, you might want to have a checkup with your

doctor to make sure you are in good health and don't have a hidden or undiscovered condition. If everything is OK, feel free to "pig out" until you reach a weight at which you feel comfortable, although you do not seem to be particularly underweight for your height. Some experts recommend



regular exercise during weight-gain programs, so that excess calories will be used for muscle development rather than simply stored as fat.

He held today's South cards and had to make five clubs doubled. Declarer won dummy's ace of spades and ruffed a spade. Next he played ace and ruffed a heart. Then he led a club from his hand. West took the A-Q of clubs, but now, rather than lead away from the king of diamonds,

played another spade. Head discarded a diamond from dummy as he ruffed. He then played ace and jack of diamonds, taking the ruffing finesse through West. That brought in the doubled contract and was strong proof that his performance 41 years earlier in winning that life masters pairs was no fluke. Today it is more common to pass the South cards as dealer, intending to come in later with an unusual no-trump bid to show both minors. The advantage of bidding early is that you get a feel for whether partner has actual support for either of your suits. The disadvantage is that partner will no doubt play you for more than eight high-card points.
